Renton School District is changing its classroom lights to L-E-D's. The orange lights are calming and the blue lights help focus on concentration. The lighting is also expected to have an impact for students with autism and are often bothered by the buzzing of fluorescent lights.

The mayor is unveiling his new universal pre-school program for 3 and 4 year old starting in September in Seattle. There will be four location within the city this year and next year an additional 25 classrooms will serve an additional 500 children.

The program is called "Summer Boost". It started out as a pilot program with just 30 kids at the Boys and Girls Club in South Puget Sound. The program has been so successful that 300 kids across five different school districts are reading and talking math problems this summer.

A coding Dojo school in Bellevue trains hundreds of tech-hopefuls and is now working to offer the program for free to those fighting to pull themselves out of the sex trade.

The Washington State Supreme Court handed down a decision that found the state's charter schools law to be unconstitutional. The court said charter schools cannot be privately operated and publicly funded. Right now the majority of funding for private charter schools comes from taxpayer support.

The Washington Charter School Association has a \$14 million dollar private fund to keep the doors open this year in all charter school in the state including Destiny Charter Middle School in Tacoma.

Seattle Central Community College has a new approach to complete pre-college math. They have created four courses that teach "relevant" math depending on a student's future plans. Each path tailors math to business, science, arts or non-engineers going into the workforce.

Private donors and companies have been raising millions of dollars so students in South Seattle can attend the freshman year at South Seattle College for free. Now about 100 students are able to take advantage of this program.

Park and Ride stations throughout the Seattle area are full before the morning commute even gets started. The worst in the area seems to be located in Tukwila where many of the vehicles are using the site as a parking lot.

The Seattle City Council proposes a plan to eliminate single family housing areas in the city to allow for more density under the guise of low-income housing.

Seattle is conducting an online survey to focus on light rail expansion throughout the Seattle Metro area as well as the addition of rapid bus service along the 405 freeway. In order for the expansion to become a reality voters must approve the project in an election slated for November of 2016. The money would come from increasing sales tax, an increase of the motor vehicle excise tax and a higher property tax.

Seattle engineers are working to improve the traffic turn lanes that are creating long waiting lines and jams.

7:30am. The main complaint is there aren't enough spaces and that many drivers use this lot for free public parking.

Clallam county reports a young woman with a peak immune system got the measles during a county outbreak in the spring and has now died. It is the state’s first report of a death from measles since the 1990s.

Ebola suit worn by medical teams has been redesigned to better protect them against contracting the disease.

The skin pen is the newest gadget to reduce face wrinkles. It essentially pokes hundreds of fine columns into the tissue damage in the skin through the micro needles and allows new collagen and elastic to come in and actually make the skin brighter and smoother.

Children experiencing growth spurts can experience pain in such areas as their knees. A Children’s Hospital physician uses cold therapy to eliminate this problem. Some people have specific headache triggers: hot, cold, light, certain foods – and they learn to avoid them. A professor at the University of Washington School of Medicine has written a book on mall walking. It encourages these establishments to open before regular business hours to allow people to exercise in their facility.

Kidney stones are now a problem with kids and teens.

A new study shows that breast cancer patients, especially those who undergo chemo are more likely to gain weight in the four hours after diagnosis than women who've never had cancer.

Doctors are looking to see if a combination of behavioral and environmental factors could play a role in preterm births. They are starting to find that the microbiome, or those bacterial or microorganisms that live on or in the human body may be playing an important role.

An Alzheimer's risk test is now available. Doctor's focus on those modifiable risk factors and give people a blueprint or a roadmap for improvement, or reducing those risks. He starts by discussing diet, exercise, cholesterol and blood pressure; all considered factors that can slow dementia's progression. Clinicians also test psychomotor speed and an MRI is taken to check the brain for fluid spaces.

Some children usually between the ages of 3 to 7 have experience sleep terrors. The most common cause is sleep deprivation. One parent is trying scented oils in the room and claims that seem to help.

Men may tend to ignore chest pain and simply live with it. This condition need to be checked out by a physical, it may be coronary artery disease requiring bypass surgery.

A patient newly diagnosed with inoperable lung cancer is undergoing immunotherapy in attempt to beat the disease. A series of drug infusions specific to the disease is completed over a three month period. After a few weeks the tumors begin to shrink and after three months they have disappeared. It is hoped that immune system should now have the ability to fight the cancer if it recurs.

Research shows preemies gain more weight, experience fewer invasive procedures, develop fewer infections and have better overall outcomes if they are placed in a private room with their parents immediately after birth.

The reality is if you are highly stressed you are 35% less likely to work out. You are 200% more likely to fail at a diet. A new online tool and APP can help you manage it. Mequilibrium is free on I-Tunes.

A non-profit gym caters to those with spinal cord injuries. Certified strength and conditioning specialists use restorative exercises for everything from spinal cord and traumatic brain injuries to multiple sclerosis. Workouts are intense.

Many people are requesting to get face lifts so that they look better when posting their pictures on facebook.

Wernicke Syndrome is caused by alcoholism, pregnant women suffering from severe morning sickness or obese people who have had bariatric surgery. Its symptoms include short term memory loss, confusion, sleepiness, drowsiness and acting differently. The remedy is thiamine (vitamin B-1) tablets or injections.

Kids in Washington State are able to meet with their psychiatrist through telepsychiatry provided by Children's Hospital in Seattle. This service is provided to those who don't have access to mental health professionals in their hometowns. There is a big demand especially for patients who have ADHD.

Some over-the-counter lice treatments are becoming less effective. Research has been done that finds that nearly all of the lice populations have had high levels of gene mutations, which have been linked to treatment resistance. Experts say those dealing with resistant lice should get some professional help or prescription meds from a doctor.

A new way to detect and prevent epileptic seizures has now become available. It is a device that a neurosurgeon can implant in the chest to detect a change in heart rate, which normally spikes before seizures. When that happens, an electric impulse stimulates the vagus nerve. This resets the electrical activity in the brain and hopefully stops the seizure.

Heroin use in the Seattle area is up and is responsible for 45% of overdose deaths in the area.

Sharing needles with other drug addicts can result in Hepatitis C. It may take up to eleven pills a day to keep the liver functioning and fend off itchy rashes, skin lesions, jumbled thoughts and extreme fatigue.

A condition called bladderexstrophy is a condition in which a child is born with the bladder is outside the body and is more common in boys and also more complicated to fix. If the condition is not closed there are consequences long term including cancer.
