In late March all schools in Southern California were closed due to the COVID-19 pandemic. The Los Angeles Unified School District stepped forward with numerous initiatives to facilitate the continuing education of over 700,000 K-12th grade students. The District arranged for wifi connectivity and devices for online learning for every student. KLCS rescheduled all programming from 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., Monday through Friday to age appropriate Curriculum Related Programming. Additionally KLCS provided this programming over the air and live via it's website for online access.

Within weeks of this speech, on June 6, 1968, Kennedy also would fall victim to an assassin's bullet.
