But any doctor will tell you, if you take in too much salt, you'll start to have health problems. The same negative effect is happening in the Central Valley in California. On any given day, water imported into the valley brings in 250 tons of salt. Left untreated, salinity impairs surface and groundwater used for drinking, farming, industry, the environment and recreation. Commonly referred to as the "fruit basket of the world," the Central Valley is one of the most productive agricultural regions in the world. Fifty percent of the fruits and vegetables consumed in the U.S. are grown in the Central Valley. The problem is salt. And it is not just a problem in California; salinity in the soil is a problem in: Nevada, Utah, Arizona, Texas, New Mexico, Louisiana, Colorado, Florida and in other states. Those involved agree the solution is complex and costly - it doesn't just affect agriculture - salt concentrates in urban wastewater (water from our laundries, toilets) and this salt goes into our rivers and groundwater, increasing salinity and harming the environment.
