July 1	The Five O'clock News	2:40	<p>PEDIATRIC MEDICAL GROUPS SAY THE U-S IS IN THE MIDST OF A NATIONAL EMERGENCY IN CHILDREN'S MENTAL HEALTH - AND SOUTH CAROLINA IS NO EXCEPTION. BUT A RECENT REVIEW INTO THE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES AVAILABLE IN THE STATE'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS - FOUND SOUTH CAROLINA IS STRUGGLING TO KEEP UP. FOX CAROLINA STATE HOUSE REPORTER MARY GREEN EXPLAINS WHAT ELSE THAT AUDIT FOUND - AND WHAT'S BEING DONE ABOUT IT. THAT AUDIT INTO SCHOOL MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES CAME AT THE REQUEST OF GOV. HENRY MCMASTER EARLIER THIS YEAR. IT WAS COMPLETED BY THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES - WHOSE DIRECTOR DETAILED WHAT HE CALLED A "MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS FACING SOUTH CAROLINA STUDENTS" - AND SAYS THE STATE NEEDS "IMMEDIATE, BOLD" ACTION TO ADDRESS IT. "We've seen a growing need for mental health services for children in the state, and we've seen fewer mental health counselors available." THE STATEWIDE AUDIT FOUND MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES ARE CURRENTLY AVAILABLE IN FEWER THAN HALF OF SOUTH CAROLINA'S PUBLIC SCHOOLS - AT A RATIO OF ONE COUNSELOR FOR ROUGHLY EVERY 13-HUNDRED STUDENTS IN HIS REPORT TO GOV. MCMASTER - HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES DIRECTOR ROBBIE KERR CALLED THAT "UNACCEPTABLE." "Our goal is to cut that ratio in half over the next year, and then eventually cut that in half again." MOST OF THE STATE'S SCHOOL-BASED COUNSELORS ARE EMPLOYED THROUGH THE SOUTH CAROLINA DEPARTMENT OF MENTAL HEALTH - AND THE AUDIT FOUND THE SYSTEM IS SET UP TO INCENTIVIZE SCHOOLS TO USE THESE COUNSELORS. "Right now, the reimbursement rate that counselors receive is about double for DMH-enrolled counselors versus if a school hires their own counselors or hires a private provider." THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES BELIEVES GIVING SCHOOLS MORE FREEDOM AND CHOICE TO HIRE PRIVATE COUNSELORS WILL INCREASE ACCESS TO SERVICES. AMONG ITS RECOMMENDATIONS TO IMPROVE THESE SERVICES - IT PLANS TO ELIMINATE THOSE RATE DISPARITIES - WITH INCREASED RATES FOR NON-DMH COUNSELORS SET TO GO INTO EFFECT JULY FIRST. "There are counselors out there now that could provide that service but don't because of that rate disparity." IT ALSO RECOMMENDS USING TELEHEALTH TO INCREASE ACCESS TO SERVICES - AND CONSIDERING A THREE-YEAR PHASE-IN TO REQUIRE SCHOOL COUNSELORS BE FULLY LICENSED. WHILE THAT'S ALREADY A REQUIREMENT FOR PRIVATE COUNSELORS WHO WORK IN SCHOOLS - IT'S NOT FOR DMH COUNSELORS. IN RECENT WEEKS - I'VE BEEN SPEAKING WITH STATE LEADERS ABOUT HOW TO ENSURE KIDS AND TEACHERS ARE SAFE IN</p>

			SOUTH CAROLINA SCHOOLS. ONE ANSWER THAT CONSISTENTLY COMES UP - FROM REPUBLICANS AND DEMOCRATS, LEGISLATORS AND THE GOVERNOR - IS ENSURING ALL STUDENTS HAVE ACCESS TO MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES. REPORTING FROM THE STATE HOUSE, I'M MARY GREEN.

BEGINNING TOMORROW, THE HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES SECRETARY SAYS AMERICANS CAN DIAL, OR TEXT,... NINE-EIGHT-EIGHT TO REACH A NATIONAL SUICIDE PREVENTION HOTLINE 24-HOURS A DAY SEVEN DAYS A WEEK. "It's almost like a 911 for mental health." ACCORDING TO GOVERNMENT STATISTICS, NEARLY 46 THOUSAND AMERICANS DIED BY SUICIDE IN 20-20 AND 12-POINT-2 MILLION SERIOUSLY THOUGHT ABOUT IT. THE BIDEN ADMINISTRATION SAYS ONE IN SIX CALLS TO THE EXISTING 10 DIGIT NATIONAL SUICIDE HOTLINE END WITHOUT CONNECTION TO A COUNSELOR DUE TO LACK OF STATE-LEVEL RESOURCES. THEY'VE SPENT OVER 400 MILLION DOLLARS PREPARING FOR THE LAUNCH OF 9-8-8. STATE-RUN CRISIS CENTERS SAY THEY HOPE IT WILL HELP MORE AMERICANS ACCESS HELP ON THE GROUND, WHERE THEY LIVE, BUT, WORRY ABOUT THE INCREASED VOLUME 9-8-8 WILL SPUR. "If this is successful... We'll be challenged to answer all the calls." 9-8-8 IS DESIGNED TO TAKE IN CALLS FROM ACROSS THE U-S, BUT, CONNECT CALLERS WITH STATE AND LOCAL CRISIS CENTERS CLOSE BY. "We know our services. We know the areas. We know how to get people connected with those services and supports." MANY STATES, THOUGH, ARE ALREADY STRUGGLING TO KEEP UP WITH DEMAND. ILLINOIS ONLY ANSWERED 20 PERCENT OF ITS CALLS DURING THE FIRST QUARTER OF 20-22, MEANING 80 PERCENT OF EMERGENCY CALLERS WERE TRANSFERRED OUT OF STATE. OTHERS LIKE ARIZONA HAVE A HIGH CALL PROCESSING RATE. THEY SAY 9-8-8 WILL HELP THEM PROCESS EVEN MORE.
