DESALINATION PLANT

KCAL9 Reporter Michele Gile reports that the California State Lands Commission has unanimously approved a desalination plant project in Huntington Beach. The plant would provide water to areas around Orange County, but dozens of people are protesting the proposal.

GARCETTI CLIMATE SUMMIT

KCAL Anchor Leyna Nguyen reports that Los Angeles has joined 11 other cities in an environmental pact. L.A., London, Paris, Seattle and more have promised to only buy zero-emission buses starting in 2025, to make major areas in their cities free of fossil fuel emissions by 2030. There are an estimated 59-thousand buses operating in the 12 cities.

CLIMATE CHANGE

A report released by more than a dozen federal government agencies, contradicts many things the President has said and done on environmental issues, primarily regarding the issue of climate change.

KEYSTONE PIPELINE

November 16, 4-5 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Juan Fernandez reports that the controversial Keystone Pipeline has been shut down, after it leaked more than 200thousand gallons of oil in South Dakota. The owner of the Pipeline doesn't believe oil got into any drinking water system or other waterway, but environmental activists say this incident shows why another section of the Pipeline in Nebraska should not be approved.

<u>GLITTER BAN</u>

November 30, 4-5 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Peter Daut reports that there is an effort underway to ban glitter, due to its effects on the environment. Scientists say the tiny bits of shiny plastic are a global hazard and pollute the oceans. One researcher found a third of all fish caught in the UK had eaten glitter. In 2015, California became the first state to restrict use of non-biodegradable glitter, and seven other states have followed.

MONUMENT ROLLBACK

December 4, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that several environmental groups say they're suing to block President Trump's move to shrink a national monument in Utah. The President wants the Grand Staircase-Escalante National Monument to be reduced by approximately 45%. It is rich with oil, gas and uranium. Native tribes are joining the environmental groups to fight back.

AIR QUALITY

December 11, 4-5 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Juan Fernandez reports on concerns about the air quality in the Ojai Valley, which has reached hazardous levels due to the Thomas Fire. The Ventura County Air Pollution Control District is advising people to avoid vigorous outdoor activities. The Thomas Fire is the biggest of the five active wildfires burning in Southern California.

LAUREL CANYON PRESERVATION

December 26, 12-1 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Andrea Fujii reports on a victory for environmentalists in L.A., who after years have succeeded in buying a prime piece of real estate in Laurel Canyon. The property between Lookout Mountain and Stanley Hills Drive in the Hollywood Hills will be off-limits to developers. Preservation groups acquired 17 acres, which will be turned over to the Mountains Recreation and Conservation Authority.

HEALTH & MEDICINE

<u>NOBEL MEDICINE</u> October 2, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that three U.S. scientists have become Nobel laureates. Jeffrey C. Hall, Michael Rosbash and Michael W. Young were recognized for their groundbreaking work in studying our biological clocks. The researchers uncovered that a mismatch between the environment and circadian rhythm has an affect on health. Long-term imbalances are linked to increased rates of cancer, diabetes and Alzheimer's.

VIRTUAL REALITY PAIN

October 9, 12-1 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Chris Martinez reports that virtual reality can transport our minds to digital worlds, and researchers are harnessing ways to use the technology to help patients escape their pain during difficult procedures. Researchers think the technique can also be used for dental procedures and childbirth.

DEMENTIA IN DOLPHINS

October 26, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Teri Okita reports that a rare discovery in the animal kingdom could lead to medical breakthroughs for humans, after some scientists say they have discovered Alzheimer's disease in dolphins.

ALCOHOL CANCER RISK

November 9, 12-1 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Sandra Mitchell reports that according to the American Society of Clinical Oncology, even the light drinking of alcohol can be dangerous. Researchers say people who drink less than 44 ounces of alcohol a day may have higher risks of getting cancer in the mouth, throat, liver and colon. Doctors say alcohol can also raise the risk of breast cancer in women.

<u>GENE EDITING</u>

November 15, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Leyna Nguyen reports that California doctors are the first to attempt to 'edit' DNA inside a living person. Scientists at UC San Francisco's Oakland Hospital are trying to tackle incurable diseases, by changing genes from the inside out.

L.A. COMMUTE SUBWAY STUDY

November 29, 8-9 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that USC researchers have made a disturbing discovery about the most popular Metro rail line in L.A. The team discovered that for riders of the Metro Red Line, the risk of getting cancer over a lifetime is ten times greater than the acceptable threshold set by the EPA and World Health Organization. Researchers believe the main reason is the high concentration of a cancer-causing chemical called hexavalent chromium on the train cars.

BREAST CANCER TECHNOLOGY

December 13, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Elsa Ramon reports that doctors in Southern California are testing a technology that could save lives, in the area of breast cancer detection. It's a three-dimensional ultrasound, designed for patients with dense breast tissue. The machine scans the entire breast using sound waves—there is no radiation and no compression of the breast.

CELL PHONE WARNING

December 14, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Orange County Reporter Stacey Butler reports that the state of California is releasing first-of-its-kind guidelines on how to use, carry and store cell phones, in an effort to prevent possible health problems. The California Department of Public Health says long-term, high-use exposure to the energy emitted by cell phones could impact health.

<u>CALIFORNIA FLU DEATHS UP</u>

December 30, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Andrea Fujii reports that 10 people under the age of 65 have died from the flu in California, in a time frame where one or two deaths would typically be seen. Doctors say part of the blame is due to the flu vaccine, which isn't working as well as it has in prior years.

POLITICS

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MAYOR / DOMESTIC VIOLENCE October 5, 8-9 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Suzie Suh reports that October is Domestic Violence Awareness Month, and L.A. Mayor Eric Garcetti has announced that L.A. has been awarded \$900-thousand by the U.S. Department of Justice, to help victims of domestic and sexual violence.

TRUMP PUERTO RICO October 12, 12-1 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Juan Fernandez reports that as Puerto Rico struggles to recover from two hurricanes, President Trump is warning that the federal government can't continue to help the islands indefinitely. In a series of tweets, the President wrote that the United States cannot keep FEMA, the military and first-responders in Puerto Rico "forever".

TRANSGENDER BAN BLOCKED

October 30, 4-5 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Leyna Nguyen reports that a U.S. federal court is blocking the President from attempting to keep transgender service members from serving in the military. The Trump administration can appeal, but for the time being the President's proposed ban is unenforceable.

<u>GOP TAX PLAN</u>

November 2, 8-9 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Political Reporter Dave Bryan reports that House Republicans have released their long-awaited tax plan. Most tax experts and lawmakers agree it will save large companies billions of dollars, but there is fierce debate regarding what it will do to the middle class.

POLITICAL RESPONSE

November 6, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Correspondent Nancy Cordes reports that in the wake of the Texas church shooting, Democrats are pushing for stricter gun laws, as Republicans push for patience. The U.S. rate of firearm homicides is six-to-16 times greater than the rate in other Western countries.

FEDERAL JUDGES

November 15, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Correspondent Jessica Schneider reports that President Trump's impact on the federal justice system is accelerating. Eight of the President's nominated judges have been approved, and there are hearings set for six more.

TRUMP TAX FIGHT

KCAL9 Political Reporter Dave Bryan reports that California Governor Jerry Brown is blasting the GOP tax overhaul plan, saying that he believes much of it is a product of revenge, punishing states like California, New York and New Jersey for voting against Donald Trump. GOVERNMENT SHUTDOWN
