KAMALA HARRIS SWORN IN

January 3, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports on the swearing-in ceremony for the 115th Congress. Kamala Harris was one of the more than 30 senators sworn in. Harris is former California Attorney General, and the first African-American senator in the state's history. Harris is the daughter of Indian and Jamaican immigrants, making her the first Indian-American, first biracial and second African-American to serve in the U.S. Senate.

RACIST STUDENTS

January 15, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Cristy Fajardo reports that shockwaves are rippling through Buena High School in Ventura, over racist photographs posted on social media, by two students. The pictures depict African-American lynching. Students from the school's anti-bullying club say they haven't been seeing racial discrimination from any student, and were very surprised when these posts were revealed.

IMMIGRANT AFFAIRS

January 25, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Rachel Kim reports live from L.A. City Hall, where leaders held a public meeting to let Angelenos know where they stand on federal immigration issues, and to hear the community's concerns. The City Council's Committee on Immigrant Affairs says L.A. will continue to be a place of refuge for people from all walks of life.

'PEOPLE MAKING A DIFFERENCE' / CHARITY KID February 3, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Reporter Andrea Fujii reports that after a visit to Skid Row, a Long Beach teenager decided he wanted to do something to help. Jonas Corona started a non-profit to help the homeless when he was only six years old. KCAL9 Anchor Suzie Suh reports on the confirmation hearing for Education Secretary nominee Betsy DeVos. While Republicans praised her efforts to expand charter schools, Democrats criticized her plans to privatize public education. DeVos is a billionaire who runs several companies that would be directly affected by federal education policy.

CA SCHOLARSHIP CUTS

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that Governor Brown's state budget plan could cost some students their opportunity to go to college. Under the plan, a scholarship program offering middle-class students \$3,000 a year would be cut. KIDS / PET MEDS

KCA9 Anchor Juan Fernandez reports on the growing risk of children being poisoned by drugs that were meant for the family pet. Doctors looked at more than 1400 calls made to the Central Ohio Poison Center regarding pet medicines. They found nearly 90% of the children involved were under age five.

SAFER INTERNET DAY

KCAL9 Reporter Craig Boswell reports on 'Safer Internet Day', as internet companies, advocates for children and families met in

Philadelphia to share ideas about how to stop cyber-bullying and online predators.

SCHOOL ON WHEELS

February 9, 12-1 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Juan Fernandez reports that there are roughly 47,000 homeless people in L.A. County. Many of them are kids, who just want what every other kid wants—to be loved and to learn. A local non-profit called 'School on Wheels' is working to break the Skid Row cycle, by helping to keep kids off the streets and on top of their studies.

TEACHER SHORTAGE

March 14, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Leyna Nguyen reports that California lawmakers are discussing a bill that would give teachers tax breaks, as a way to help ease the state's teacher shortage. According to the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing, the state's shortage is a growing problem.

KCAL9 Reporter Dave Lopez reports on the loud protests that took place in Long Beach, over a controversial tuition hike. Cal State trustees approved their first increase in six years, and students are outraged. Voters approved a tax hike that was supposed to fund education, but as it turns out, the money is going elsewhere.

LAUSD PROM DAY

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that dozens of girls got the royal treatment before one of the biggest events of their young lives. The Assistance League of Los Angeles held its annual 'Operation School Bell' prom day. It's a free event for homeless and low-income high school students, where they receive complimentary dresses for their senior proms. Individuals and businesses donated 500 dresses.

USC STORM WATER

KCAL9 Reporter Jeff Nguyen reports on how a major housing and business development at USC will have an earth-friendly plan for dealing with rainwater. They have created a system to save and reuse the rain runoff. The USC Village is a 15-acre development, and is expected to have the biggest storm water containment and filtration system that is privately owned in the city.

VW SCANDAL

KCAL9 Anchor Jeff Vaughn reports that Volkswagen will pay nearly \$4.5-billion, for cheating on its diesel vehicles' emissions tests. In 2016, the automaker was caught manipulating the emissions tests and destroying evidence to cover it up.

DAKOTA ACCESS PIPELINE

KCAL9 Anchor Suzie Suh reports on another twist in the legal battle over the controversial Dakota Access Pipeline. North Dakota's Senator says the Army Corps of Engineers has been ordered to clear way for construction. The Standing Rock Sioux has spent months protesting the pipeline. The tribe says it would pollute their drinking water.

DIAMOND BAR AQMD

February 3, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Suzie Suh reports that the South Coast Air Quality Management District has rolled out a pollution reduction plan, but not everyone is happy about it. Crowds rallied outside of the board meeting to protest the plan. The proposal would allow warehouses and rail yards to police themselves when it comes to emissions standards. The AQMD is responsible for ensuring clean air in the South Coast Air Basin, including Orange County, and non-desert areas in L.A., Riverside and San Bernardino counties.

SANTA MONICA AIRPORT

February 5, 8-9 a.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Amy Johnson reports that a large crowd is protesting airport pollution in Santa Monica. After decades of protests by people living near the airport, plans have been made to shut it down, but not until 2029. Protestors say the only way to end the noise and pollution is to shut down the airport immediately.

TIJUANA RIVER SEWAGE

February 26, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Peter Daut reports that several beaches in San Diego County remain closed, because the water has been contaminated by raw sewage. Millions of gallons of sewage was dumped into the Tijuana River from the Mexican side of the border, and has been running into the ocean on the American side for weeks.

NOAA CUTS

March 3, 9-10 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Anchor Elsa Ramon reports that steep budget cuts could be coming to the nation's leading environmental research agency. The National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration is facing 17% in cuts. NOAA's research office could lose \$126-million, and the satellite data division could lose \$513-million.

PRUITT CLIMATE CHANGE

March 9, 10-11 p.m. newscast

KCAL9 Political Reporter Dave Bryan reports that the head of the Environmental Protection Agency is reigniting the debate over climate change. Scott Pruitt said he doesn't believe decades of research that blame much of global warming on the burning of fossil fuels. His comments have resulted in a firestorm of criticism, especially coming from environmental leaders in California.

TRUMP AIR EMISSIONS

KCAL9 Anchor Suzie Suh reports on a landmark shift in what doctors say infants should eat to combat severe allergies. Doctors have shifted their position on peanuts, and are advising that infants should start eating foods containing the nuts, especially babies at high risk of developing a peanut allergy, such as children whose siblings already are severely allergic. Doctors say this will help make a big dent in the number of peanut allergies.

DIABETES CITY OF HOPE

KCAL9 Anchor Juan Fernandez reports that City of Hope National Medical Center in Duarte announced a \$50-million grant to help find a cure for diabetes. Doctors say they hope to have a cure for juvenile diabetes within six years.

KCAL9 Reporter Teri Okita reports on a discovery that could make it easier for doctors to identify patients at risk for high blood pressure.

HEALTHCARE MEETING

When used with chemo and radiation, Vitamin C appears to cause a reaction that damages cancer cells, without hurting normal cells.

DOJ INVESTIGATING FBI

KCAL9 Political Reporter Dave Bryan reports that the actions of FBI Director James Comey and his handling of the Hillary Clinton e-mail announcement leading up to Election Day are under scrutiny.
