Section I. Issues

The station has identified the following as significant community issues in this quarter:

1. Genesis-Thomas County Food Pantry
2. Fly Kansas Air Tour
3. GED Tutoring
4. ESL Classes
5. Blood Drive

7. Dental Services for Low-Income Patients

Section II. Responsive Programs

The station has broadcast programming for each of the above-referenced issues, as detailed below.

1. The Genesis Food Bank. Three different 30-second announcements ran on KTCC in October, November, and December to assist the Genesis-Thomas County Food Pantry. One announcement encouraged listeners to make non-perishable food or monetary donations. One announcement directed those in need on how and where to obtain food. The third announcement thanked volunteers for their generosity. Each PSA ran four times per day.
2. Fly Kansas Air Tour. The Fly Kansas Air Tour is coming on Oct 5th, from 11 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. at Shalz Field Airport. More than 20 aircraft are expected. Students can learn from pilots, discover career opportunities, and check out the planes. Brought to you by the Kansas Division of Aviation and the Kansas Commission on Aerospace Education (KCAE). A 30-second announcement ran two times per day the first week of October.
3. GED Preparation. Colby Community College Adult Education offered free tutoring for individuals interested in obtaining their GED. The announcement ran twice per day in October, November, and December.
4. ESL Class. Colby Community College Adult Education offered free classes for individuals interested in learning English as a Second Language. The announcement ran two times per day in October and November.
5. Blood Drives. KTCC promoted a local Red Cross blood drive scheduled in December. The PSAs ran three times daily. The Red Cross national blood supply has fallen by about

25% since August. Blood product distributions to hospitals are outpacing the number of blood donations coming in, and your help is needed. Anybody in good health who's at least 16 years old and weighs 110 pounds can save a life by donating.

6. Food for Fines. The Pioneer Memorial Library accepted food for fines through December 30th. Canned or packaged foods taken to PML erased fines. Collected food will be donated to the Genesis-Thomas County Food Bank in January. The announcement ran twice per day in December.
7. Dental Services for Low-Income Patients. The Colby Community College dental hygiene program offers free services to people of all ages in northwest Kansas. The program provides a complete exam from a dentist that includes x-rays, a periodontal evaluation, oral cancer screening, and thorough cleaning. Information can be sent to local dental offices. A 45-second announcement ran two times daily throughout the quarter.
