<p><b>Aug 17-18, 2013</b> Washington, DC – Show #32 2013 (WFDC)</p>	<p><b>Armando Guzmán</b></p>	<p>Just last month, Puerto Rico celebrated the 61st anniversary of becoming a Commonwealth of the United States. But ever since, its political status has been the center of controversy, as there are sectors of its 4 million inhabitants who favor the island to become a permanent state of the Union or an independent nation. Yet the current Governor and the political party he represents, favor Puerto Rico to remain a Commonwealth.</p> <p>The political status of the island has been yet again under the federal legislative consideration, and key Puerto Rican political leaders visited Washington, DC to defend their respective views before the powerful U.S. Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources. Perspectiva Nacional was at the hearing, and also had a chance to talk with Governor Alejandro Garcia Padilla of Puerto Rico, and Pedro Pierluisi, Resident Commissioner of the island in Washington, DC. Moreover, we get a chance to understand what a Commonwealth of the U.S. represents for Puerto Rico, with the Executive Director of the Puerto Rico Federal Affairs Administration, Juan Eugenio Hernández Mayoral.</p> <p>In addition, two California farmers and entrepreneurs join to our studios to tell us the need for Immigration Reform for the strawberry industry. We analyze the report, the Welfare benefit and all the issues it poses and whether if it's fair or not that a person who does not work receive aid beyond what is earned in the workplace. To this end, our guests Ana Sol Gutierrez, Democratic delegate in the Maryland state legislature; Ben Monterroso, SEIU union leader, and Maricruz Magowan, economist and Republican strategist, joins us in the show.</p> <p>In addition, Juan Carlos Hidalgo, from the CATO Institute, defends the study and its results, and is confronted with in depth questions and comments from two journalists covering the federal capital: Antonio Avendaño, editor of the newspaper El Tiempo Latino, and Eva Saiz, Washington correspondent, for Spain's newspaper El Pais.
