He'll also assess the hearings thus far of the House Committee investigation of the January 6th insurrection and failed coup attempt -- and the likelihood that Trump and his inner circle will be indicted by the Justice Department for their multiple crimes against democracy.
- 4) Megan Fountain, an organizer with Unidad Latina en Acción, talks about the coalition of groups that are organizing locally, statewide and across the country to fight for women's reproductive rights -- and what can be done here in Connecticut to support women in other states where abortion has been, or will soon be criminalized.

Wade federal protections for women's reproductive rights, reflecting on the culture of indigenous women who controlled their own bodies, lives, environment, as main community decision-makers.
- 4) Melvin Goodman, a senior fellow at the Center for International Policy, who had a 42-year government career at the CIA and State Department, talks about his latest article, "Moscow's War In Ukraine vs. Washington's 'Special Military Operation," explaining why it's critically important to find a diplomatic solution to end the war in Ukraine.

- 3) Ellen Brown, founder of the Public Banking Institute and the author of a dozen books, including the best-selling "Web of Debt," discusses her recent article, "Interest Rate Hikes Will Not Save Us From Inflation," the current direction of the U.S. economy, and the progress being made across the U.S. to establish public banks at the local and state level.
- 4) Bruce Barrett, founder of I Wage Peace and president, Barrett Outdoor Communications Inc., talks about his group's "Serve, Pray, Heal Interfaith Service Day," Sunday August 7, 2022 in New Haven, CT, which brings together Jewish, Muslim, and Christian youth from Israel for a day of community service. These laws which may charge protesters with felonies for disrupting "critical infrastructure," are clearly aimed at suppressing Indigenous and environmental activists' opposition to oil and gas projects.
- 4) Melinda Tuhus, WPKN journalist and Between The Lines Radio Newsmagazine producer talks about the September 8th protest in Washington, D.C. where climate activists descended on Capitol Hill to lobby their elected officials and hold a rally opposing the fracked gas Mountain Valley pipeline. Dr. Zaki Lababidi, MD was born in Homs, Syria, graduated from medical school in Damascus in 1985, and has been working as an interventional cardiologist in Arizona. He is involved with the Syrian American Council and is engaged in lots of different work related to Syria.

Dr. Lababidi, MD shares his story and work, and he contextualizes the Syrian Revolution and the significance of remembering the 9 Year Anniversary of the Ghouta Massacre.
