Issue: Communicating with Autistic Persons

Synopsis: Communicating with someone who was just in a highly stressful situation like a car accident can be challenging at times. Communicating with someone who has a disorder on the Autism spectrum can be challenging even in non-stressful situations. River Radio, along with a number of partners, arranged to have devices created which allow first responders to communicate with autistic children during particularly stressful situations. These devices are called "pick cards."
