ISSUE:

How has the pandemic affected operations at CSU Pueblo?

Discussion of Issue:

Amidst a global pandemic, everything has changed. The number of students needing financial support is higher than ever, considering some have lost their jobs and many have needed access to improved technology and WiFi to complete their coursework remotely. High school students who have had to go through the admission process during the COVID-19 pandemic have had different struggles to be accepted into colleges and college fairs were shifted to virtual fairs and held via Zoom. Then, there's the issue of how to maintain tradition, engagement and relationships with alumni and host fundraisers at a time when large gatherings cannot be hosted. The university had many offices and departments adapt to the changing circumstances that followed in the wake of the pandemic. We discussed how the pandemic and remote operations impacted the CSU Pueblo Foundation, the Admissions Office and the Office of Alumni and Community Relations.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions and news stories. The following are illustrative examples of such programming:

Discussion of Issue:

a. T-Wolf Talk 10/04/2020 7:00 a.m. – 7:51 a.m.

Daniel Minich, admissions counselor for CSU Pueblo, talked about the different processes that he and his team have had to adapt to reach different students and recruit them to CSU Pueblo in these difficult times. Minich talked about students feeling “Zoomed-Out” and struggling to try and make connections with the new prospective students who may want to choose CSU Pueblo. Minich says that enrollment was only down two percent because of COVID-19 and the University had anticipated to be down 10 percent. Minich says that he and his team were working around the clock to promote CSU Pueblo to prospective students. (Local).

b. T-Wolf Talk 10/18/2020 7:00 a.m. – 7:41 a.m.

CSU Pueblo Foundation CEO Todd Kelly and Communications and Events Manager for the Foundation, Amber Shipley, discussed the challenges and difficulties to try and put on different fundraising events for the college in a virtual manner. Shipley coordinates and creates the events for the Foundation and explained how difficult it was to host the President's Gala (a formal in-person annual event) virtually this year. They also talked about one of the most notable fundraising efforts hosted by the Foundation, CSU Pueblo Give Day, which was held on October 29, 2020. Give Day is a donation day that is promoted to friends and alumni of the university

across the world and serves to raise funds for various campus initiatives, fundraising campaigns, campus programs and student scholarships. Many of these funds donated go into emergency scholarship funds to help students who may struggle with homelessness, transportation issues or hunger. Kelly explained that it has been difficult to try and lead during a time like this, but at the end of the day he just wants to make sure that students are supported via scholarships that they deserve. a. T-Wolf Talk

Tracy Samora is the Director of Alumni & Community Relations for Colorado State University Pueblo. The mission of the CSU Pueblo Alumni Association is to enhance the relationship among alumni, the university, and the communities. There are currently 12,000 alumni within Pueblo County, 20,000 within the state of Colorado and a total of over 45,000 in the history of all five university names graduated from this establishment. The key to keeping in contact with all of these individuals and providing them with information about events, happenings, fundraisers and opportunities is time consuming and rewarding. It is done through email, social media, local media, mail outs, alumni magazine and visibility at events. Samora noted the difficulties and challenges of maintaining relationships with alumni during the pandemic and discussed the virtual events planned for “Celebrating CSU Pueblo’s Past, Present, and Future,” which would be an online and social media driven engagement campaign with the alumni base. 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ISSUE: Will the cold and flu season be a bigger problem given the COVID-19 pandemic happening at the same time?

Discussion of Issue: With cold and flu season rounding the corner, fears had arisen about people getting sick in higher numbers because of all the viruses circulating around. Many people are concerned about knowing the differences of whether they are experiencing a cold, the flu, allergies or the coronavirus. There is also a renewed push from public health officials for people to get their flu shots this year.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions and news stories. The following are illustrative examples of such programming

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Zak VanOoyen is an RN/BSN who works as a program director for the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment. VanOoyen talked about the importance of the flu vaccine especially this year when there is a global pandemic looming in the background. VanOoyen talked about the fear that public health officials have with people getting the flu and then getting infected with COVID-19. The Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment has had a COVID-19 testing site that has been open to the public and VanOoyen encouraged anyone who is showing symptoms to go to the Colorado State Fairgrounds to get tested for COVID-19. 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ISSUE: What is the state of COVID-19 in Pueblo County?

Discussion of Issue: Pueblo County has been severely impacted by COVID-19, and the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment has tried their best to keep the pandemic under control in the county. Amidst rising COVID cases in the county, the city had imposed a curfew as well as other regulations to keep the citizens safe.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions and news stories. The following are illustrative examples of such programming:

Public Information Officer for the Pueblo Department of Public Health and Environment Sarah Joseph discussed the impact COVID-19 has had on the Pueblo community. She noted that it has hit the community hard this fall, with cases rising exponentially. During the time of this recording, a curfew had just been put in place in Pueblo County requiring all of its citizens to make sure they were inside their homes between the hours of 10:00 p.m. and 5:00 a.m. Joseph says, “It’s going to take a community effort to try and combat this virus, I know we are all worn down from the virus, you are worn down, we all are worn down but we need to try our best to try and combat this.” (Local).

*Due to the increase in cases (Pueblo averaged over 300 positive cases a day in November and was the deadliest month on record) and the concern of another wave of the virus hitting after Thanksgiving, the program was rebroadcast on November 15 and December 6 to remind listeners of the severity of the virus in the community.

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ISSUE: How is the United Way of Pueblo County supporting families in need during this holiday season?

Discussion of Issue:

The holiday season can stretch the pockets of many families on a “normal” year, but given the uncertainty of 2020 and many families wondering where their next meal is going to come from, the United Way of Pueblo County helped find aid for these families during a difficult holiday season.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions and news stories. The following are illustrative examples of such programming:

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Bianca Hicks, Director of Marketing and Events for the Pueblo County United Way, discussed the upcoming, “Thanks for Giving” food drive. This is an annual event to provide supplies for a traditional Thanksgiving meal to families in Pueblo. Hicks says that the need is higher than ever during times like these, but has seen people in the community giving more now than they ever have. Hicks also touched on the fact that the community partners have been working now more than ever in trying to help each other out during a time where nonprofits are being stretched to their limits. (Local).

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ISSUE:

What is being done to address the homelessness issue in Pueblo?

Discussion of Issue:

Homeless and providing shelter and resources for the population has been an on-going issue that has also been impacted by the pandemic. Shelters had to pivot and adjust operations to follow enhanced cleaning procedures, mask wearing, and distancing to the best of their ability. Many organizations in Pueblo serve the community and have developed new projects to help house the homeless and provide resources and care for them safely during the pandemic. Pueblo has also seen a housing drought – a lack of affordable and available housing options. This issue was addressed via long-form programming during our regularly scheduled weekly talk show.

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Courtney Seder is the Marketing Director for Posada. Posada has been a staple in the Pueblo Community serving the community as a nonprofit for decades trying to combat the growing rate of homelessness since the turn of the 2008 recession, and help hamper the effects the pandemic has had on the community. She discussed the struggles that the COVID-19 pandemic had brought to her team and how they have had to think outside the box in order to try and help and reduce the number of homeless in Pueblo by providing education, information and resources to keep people off the streets. Seder also talked about the housing crisis that the United States may be facing in the New Year and how Posada is working try and make more available housing units for those that are struggling. (Local).

*This program was rebroadcast on November 29, 2020 to bring heightened awareness to the community about the resources Posada provides.

b. T-Wolf Talk	12/13/2020	7:00 a.m. – 7:34 a.m.
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Teah Miller, Director of Crisis Services, and Dawn Yengich discussed the new 35-unit housing facility Health Solutions is building to help raise people from “homeless to housing.” The apartment complex is designed to accommodate one to two people per unit and will have a property manager and a caseworker assigned to each resident. The goal is to provide mentorship to the residents and teach them how to maintain a home, how to pay rent, bills, etc. The project is expected to be completed in the summer of 2021. Miller and Dawn also discussed the other resources Health Solutions provides, including crisis services 24/7 for clients who live in Las

Animas and Huerfano counties, as well as “Boredom Buster Bags” for children and the elderly. They also mentioned the Colorado Spirit Line that the elderly can call to visit with people who can keep them company over the phone. (Local.)

c. T-Wolf Talk

12/20/2020

Kathy Cline, Director of the Pueblo Rescue Mission, talked about the homeless population in Pueblo, how the Pueblo Rescue Mission has been able to operate during the pandemic and plans for new housing projects with Posada and Health Solutions. She mentioned that the Rescue Mission can shelter up to 90 individuals and that some of those living at the shelter may be moving into the new housing facility. Cline explained that homeless isn’t typically the “guy with the backpack holding the sign,” and that many of her clients are elderly, on oxygen and need medical care. She talked about the many resources available in Pueblo that are available to help support individuals who may be struggling and are facing homelessness. (Local.)

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ISSUE:

What impact has the pandemic had on the local animal shelter?

Discussion of Issue:

At the beginning of the pandemic, many animal shelters were celebrating empty kennels for the first time. Pet adoption is a serious process that should be given careful consideration. Training pets, feeding them properly and providing medical care are all responsibilities of pet owners. During the holidays, many people consider giving puppies and kittens as gifts; however, they may realize they aren't fit for their homes and take them to the local shelter after the holidays are over.

Programming: KTSC-FM addressed this issue through several different kinds of programs, including public affairs discussions and news stories. The following are illustrative examples of such programming:

a. T-Wolf Talk 12/27/2020 7:00 a.m. – 7:34 a.m.

Kate Aviv, Community Relations Specialist for the Pueblo branch of the Humane Society of the Pikes Peak Region, talked about adoption rates during the pandemic, advice for pet owners and programs and services that HSPPR-Pueblo provides. She explained that the shelter has adoption certificates available to give as gifts and the importance of meeting pets to ensure that both owners and furry-friends are a good fit for each other. Aviv explained the adoption process and how the shelter has adjusted operations during the pandemic. Adoption hours are still available, but guests must check-in and wait in their car until they are called back in to reduce the number of people in the building at one time. She also explained the other services that the Humane Society provides, including Animal Control and payment plans to help people pay for needed medical care for their pets. Aviv discussed the importance of making sure your pets are inside when the temperature drops, or ensuring that pets have warm, dry and comfortable shelter if they are an outdoor pet. (Local.)

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b. Public Services Announcements PSA'S, 30 sec., variable:

KTSC-FM broadcast a number of public service announcements throughout the three months providing information about COVID-19, texting and driving, child safety and car seats, driving under the influence of alcohol, adoption and foster care, childhood hunger, suicide awareness, and shelter pets. c. News Programming

During the last quarter, KTSC-FM News Department covered important events relating to a variety of local community issues broadcast in our daily five-minute news brief airing at 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday; duration of 25 minutes per week, totaling 325 minutes of news programming for the last three months.
