Hawai'i's tourism industry established new records in total visitor spending and visitor arrivals in 2016, according to preliminary year-end statistics released today by the Hawai'i Tourism Authority. This marked the fifth straight year of record growth in both categories.

Total spending by visitors to the Hawaiian Islands increased 4.2 percent in 2016 to a new high of \$15.6 billion.

A total of 8,941,394 visitors came to Hawai'i in 2016, representing a 3 percent increase compared to 2015. On average, there were 219,625 visitors in the Hawaiian Islands on any given day in 2016, an increase of 2 percent versus 2015.

Topic: National School Choice Week

National School Choice Week begins in Hawaii and across the country. There are 79 events planned in the Aloha State to raise awareness about K-12 school choice, and 21,392 events nationwide.

The events in Hawaii, which are independently planned and independently funded, include everything from information sessions and open houses at schools to rallies, policy discussions, and movie screenings organized by community groups. Highlighted events include a large celebration of school choice January 24 at the Hawai'i State Capitol.

Gov. David Ige announced the state Department of Human Services will award contracts to 33 homeless shelters. Funding will total \$13,000,000 for 12 months. The new contracts require shelters to focus on outcome measures such as the number of people they will permanently house over the coming year.

The results of the competitive bids show a net increase in state-funded homeless shelter beds, with 3,761 for the next year vs. 3,577 for last year. Additionally, the shelters are proposing to double the number of people they place in permanent housing from approximately 3,000 to 6,200.
