The DOE was already trying to figure out how to handle a \$10 million budget restriction by the legislature when Governor Linda Lingle instructed all state departments to trim 4% from their budget. That comes out to a loss of \$9million for public schools. The Governor says the cuts are necessary because the slumping economy means less tax revenue for the state.
