Rock Fall Hazard Report were sent to property owners of hillside land that poses a hazard to homes and roads below from loose boulders. The City and County is letting these property owners know they are liable for any damage or injury caused by loose boulders rolling down the property.

The City and County has already spent \$2 million netting new roads and is expecting to spend an additional \$3 million more.

Helping the Hungry was the kick-off campaign for the Hawaii Food Bank 44th annual food drive. The Food Bank received 12 million pounds of food last year and is hoping to receive more this year.

Tsunami Ready banners were displayed at the State Capitol to show how high waves get during a tsunami. A press conference was held at the Governors office to introduce the Tsunami Ready web site.

Seoul Sister City ceremony was held at City Council Chambers celebrating the 40th anniversary of the sister city relationship between Honolulu and Seoul, Korea. Both the Honolulu City Council and the Seoul City Council were on hand for the ceremony.

Halawa Yard PV Panels: 1100 PV panels were installed at the Halawa Yard facility to help reduce the electric cost at this facility. The panels will help save \$38,000 per month in electric cost. The panels were placed over the parking area and now provide covered parking for those at the Halawa Yard.

Zhangzhou Sister City ceremony was held at council chambers, celebrating the sister city relationship between Honolulu and Zhangzhou, China.

Gifts were exchanged and both sides look forward to the new opportunities in business, education, cultural exchange.

Restored Bus Routes: Five bus routes were reactivated after having been cut due to budget costs. The five restored routes will cost an additional \$4 million to operate and is in the fiscal budget.

Bulky Trash Fines: Starting May 1, the City and County will begin fining residents \$250 per day for bulky trash items placed curbside before the last Monday of the month pick-up.

DMV Line Cams: The City and County of Honolulu website now allows residents to check the lines at various DMV offices around Oahu. This service will allow residents to find the shortest lines and help save time.
