<p>HUNDREDS OF PEOPLE GATHERING AT A LOCAL HIGH SCHOOL TO REMEMBER FOUR STUDENTS WHO LOST THEIR LIVES IN A CRASH DURING SPRING BREAK. FAMILY AND FRIENDS GATHERED ON THE FOOTBALL FIELD OF CENTENNIAL HIGH SCHOOL LAST NIGHT TO REMEMBER AJ ROSSI, DYLAN MACK AND BROOKE HAWLEY, WHO DIED AFTER THEY WERE HIT BY A DRUNK DRIVER IN HUNTINGTON BEACH, CALIFORNIA. A FOURTH STUDENT, MATT TOUMA, DIED AFTER HIS FAMILY SAYS HE COMMITTED SUICIDE. AFTER THE GROUP FORMED A HEART ON THE FIELD CLOSE FRIENDS AND FAMILY SHARED STORIES ABOUT EACH OF THE FOUR WHO LOST THEIR LIVES.</p>	4/3	4:00a	1 min	2
<p>ONE CLARK COUNTY TRUSTEE WANTS MORE NAMES FROM THE SEARCH FIRM THAT UNVEILED FOUR FINALISTS FRIDAY FOR CLARK COUNTY SUPERINTENDENT. THE FOUR ARE ALL OUTSIDERS, AND INCLUDE FORMER L.A. SUPERINTENDENT JOHN DEASY, FORMER HOUSTON ADMINISTRATOR SHONDA HARDMAN, COLORADO SUPERINTENDENT DONALD HADDAD AND ORLANDO ADMINISTRATOR JESUS JARA. THE BOARD HIRED THE SEARCH FIRM AND IT WHITTLED THE LIST DOWN FROM 77 CANDIDATES. TRUSTEE KEVIN CHILD SAYS HE IS NOT IMPRESSED. SOME IN THE LOCAL BUSINESS COMMUNITY TELL NEWS THREE THE DISTRICT NEEDS AN OUTSIDER TO COME IN AND BRING A FRESH PERSPECTIVE, WHICH THE DISTRICT HAS DONE IN THE PAST. BEN CARSON, SECRETARY OF HOUSING AND URBAN DEVELOPMENT, GIVEN A TOUR OF THE SHANNON WEST HOMELESS YOUTH CENTER DESIGNED TO HELP YOUNG PEOPLE 16-24 YEARS OLD WHO SIMPLY HAVE NO WHERE ELSE TO GO. CARSON IS IN LAS VEGAS TO GET A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF OUR COMMUNITY'S SPECIFIC HOMELESS ISSUES. NEVADA IS CURRENTLY NUMBER ONE IN THE NATION FOR THE NUMBER OF UNACCOMPANIED HOMELESS YOUTH. CARSON SAYS, IN THIS CENTER, THERE ARE SOLUTIONS. CARSON SAYS IT'S ALSO IMPORTANT TO GIVE THE HOMELESS A SAFE LOCATION TO MEET WITH SERVICE PROVIDERS. A ONE-STOP SHOP FOR MANY OF THEIR NEEDS. SOMETHING THE CITY OF LAS VEGAS IS CURRENTLY DOING WITH "THE COURTYARD" AT LAS VEGAS BOULEVARD AND FOREMASTER. <p>FOR THE SECOND YEAR IN A ROW, THE CLARK COUNTY SCHOOL DISTRICT IS FACING A DOUBLE-DIGIT DEFICIT. ACCORDING TO OUTGOING SUPERINTENDENT PAT SKORKOWSKY, THE DISTRICT IS ENTERING THE NEXT SCHOOL YEAR 68 MILLION DOLLARS IN THE HOLE. RESULTING IN A 47 MILLION DOLLAR BUDGET CUT. MOST OF THE DEFICIT- CAUSED BY LOSING AN ARBITRATION RULING THAT FORCES CCSD TO GIVE TEACHERS RAISES. <p>CULINARY UNION MEMBERS HAVE VOTED TO STRIKE IF A NEW CONTRACT ISN'T REACHED WITH MOST OF THE LAS VEGAS STRIP'S LARGEST CASINOS. THIS IS A LIVE LOOK AT OUR FABULOUS LAS VEGAS STRIP WHERE THOUSANDS OF THOSE UNION MEMBERS WORK. ABOUT 99 PERCENT OF THE 25-THOUSAND UNION MEMBERS WHOTE VOTED APPROVED A STRIKE. THE NUMBERS CAME IN JUST HOURS AGO. THAT MEANS ANYTIME AFTER JUNE FIRST, WHEN THE CURRENT CONTRACTS EXPIRE, THOSE WORKERS COULD STRIKE. THAT COULD MEAN BIG PROBLEMS FOR STRIP RESORTS IF THE UNION'S MORE THAN 57-THOUSAND MEMBERS HIT THE PICKET LINES. THE WORKERS WANT BETTER WORKING CONDITIONS, HIGHER WAGES, AND JOB SECURITY, ESPECIALLY PROTECTION FROM ADVANCING TECHNOLOGY THAT COULD ELIMINATE SOME JOBS. <p>A 90 MINUTE POWER OUTAGE AT MCCARRAN INTERNATIONAL AIRPORT'S TERMINAL ONE CAUSED HOURS OF DELAYS AND HEADACHES FOR TRAVELERS. TICKET COUNTERS AND BAGGAGE CLAIM CAME TO A STANDSTILL. MC CARRAN AIRPORT OFFICIALS SAY THE POWER TO TERMINAL 1 FIRST WENT DOWN JUST AFTER 7 THIS MORNING BECAUSE OF A BAD ELECTRIC CABLE. FLIGHTS WERE DELAYED, TICKET CHECK IN WAS AT A STANDSTILL, AND BAGGAGE PICKUP CAME TO A HALT. AHMAD CLAY WHO FLEW IN FROM OKLAHOMA SAYS TWO HOURS PASSED AND THERE WAS NO SIGN OF HIS SUITCASE. NV ENERGY EVENTUALLY REROUTED POWER AND ELECTRICITY POPPED BACK ON IN TERMINAL 1 AROUND 9AM. UNFORTUNATELY THROUGHOUT THE MORNING AS THE SYSTEM RESET ITSELF THERE WERE A FEW BRIEF, INTERMITTENT OUTAGES. ## Categories

1. National News  
News of national interest which includes significant treatment of community issues.
2. Local News  
News of local interest which includes significant treatment of community issues.
3. Local Civics Affairs Programming  
Programming which includes, but is not limited to, broadcasts of interviews with (or statements by) elected or appointed officials and relevant policy experts on issues of importance to the community, government meetings, legislative sessions, conferences featuring elected officials, and substantive discussions of civic issues of interest to local community communities or groups.
4. Local Electoral Affairs Programming  
Programming which consists of candidate-centered discourse focusing on the local, state and United States Congressional races for offices to be elected by a constituency within the licensee's broadcast area. Local electoral affairs programming includes broadcasts of candidate debates, interviews, or statements, as well as substantive discussion of ballot measures that will be put before the voters in a forthcoming election.
