In an update, the CDC says that reports of the influenza A virus are on the decline while reports of the influenza B virus were more prevalent. A spokesperson for the CDC told CNN that influenza B can be "just as severe" as influenza A, and that "we also know that influenza B tends to be more severe for younger children." As of its latest update, the CDC reports that flu-related child deaths are up to 133 for the 2017-2018 flu season. There were five pediatric deaths reported between March 10 and March 17 related to influenza B, and one related to influenza A. During this week, 2.7 percent of patients visiting a doctor's office complained of flu-like symptoms.

The governor Ricardo Roselló, qualified of unacceptable the interruption of the electricity, which happened when an excavator operator hit the main electric powerline in the Island. The irony is that the employee works for a company responsible for restoring the service after the damages of hurricane Maria.

In 2016 alone, there were more than 96,000 cases reported. The illnesses include such Maladies as West Nile Virus, Lyme Disease, and Zika Virus. The CDC says the numbers show bug bites are more than just summertime nuisances, they can cause very serious health problems, even death.
Economia	Despierta America	05/11/2018	0:23	Rising pump prices are blunting the positive effects of sweeping tax cuts on Americans' spending, potentially undercutting a pillar of economic growth this year. President Trump's decision this week to withdraw from the Iran nuclear deal and reinstate sanctions against that oil-rich country could constrain global supplies, further pushing up crude and gasoline prices.
Salud	Despierta America	06/11/2018	0:30	Toddlers in America are eating too much added sugar, and the problem only gets worse as they get older, a new study conducted by researchers at the Centers for Disease Control found. Extra sugar consumption has been linked to high levels of obesity, cavities, asthma, and risk factors for heart disease later in life. It's also been associated with higher cholesterol levels and elevated blood pressure. Added sugar is especially bad for children, as it sets diet preferences that could lead them to make poor nutritional choices later in life. The American Heart Association already recommends that children under the age of 2 avoid food with added sugars, including ready-to-eat cereals, baked goods, desserts, sugary drinks, yogurt, and candy. But researchers at the CDC found that some parents don't seem to be following those guidelines.

More than one million 300-thousand units of "honey smacks", that of the red box with the frog in the front. The withdrawal is due to a possible contamination of salmonella which has already affected some 60 people in more than 30 states. The Federal Medicine and Food Agency works as part of the company to remove the cereal, consumed in its majority by children. The stroke cases have dates of expiration between June 14, 2018 and 2019.

Her mother, a registered nurse, then took her to a walk-in clinic, and later to an emergency room, where doctors gave her a diagnosis of chronic kidney disease, for which she had expressed no previous symptoms.

Ricardo Arambarri in his segment "Cuide su Bolsillo" or "Take Care of your Wallet," talks about how kids should have a firm grasp of basic math skills and should be comfortable with numbers. He interviews Sofia Macias, a financial specialist, who says that while many parents and teachers talk to children about spending and earning money, saving, and other general topics, there is not enough attention on subjects such as debt and family income. Research shows that sensitive topics such as income and debt should be tough not to cause children to worry or become anxious, but to teach them about money management, debt, accounting, and credit. Also it's important to develop in children the ability to make decisions and to express their wishes. Macias recommends to start talking to children about the difference between wants and needs, how credit works. It is also important to talk about bills and the importance to pay them on time.

"In them [the makeup] were found residues of bacteria and human waste," Captain Marc Reina said in a Twitter message, which also added photos of the confiscated products. In the operation in the Santee Alley area, popularly known as the Los Alleyways of Los Angeles, cosmetics of famous brands such as Anastasia, Urban Decay, MAC and Kylie Cosmetics, among others, were found. As a result, six people were arrested and could now face charges for various violations in the agreement with brands registered. It's not the first time. police carried out a similar operation last February after receiving complaints from some clients, who said they had developed hives and rashes after buying counterfeit cosmetics, KTLA, detective Rick Ishitani, said.

While a \$45,000 salary might be sufficient for a family of three in South Dakota, you would need close to \$60,000 on average to keep up in Hawaii, Connecticut, Massachusetts and New York, and a whopping \$68,000 a year to get by in Washington D.C. That's according to data from MIT's living wage calculator, which determines the minimum amount necessary to meet basic needs without relying on outside help. The model takes into account factors such as child care and health insurance, in addition to food and other regular costs. To illustrate how these numbers vary across the U.S., Zippia mapped out what a living wage would be, or how much you would need to earn to live "comfortably" (above the poverty line) in every

				state. These numbers account for a family of two adults and one child and don't include conveniences such as restaurant meals, vacations and money left over for investments.

On Thursday, the company announced it had found and fixed a "bug" that stored user passwords internally without adequate security. Twitter played down the incident and said there's no evidence any passwords were used for nefarious purposes. But it appears to be showing all of its 336 million users a pop-up window prompting them to change their passwords. Twitter says all 336 million users should change their passwords. If you really enjoy cheese, perhaps your Twitter password was "ilovecheese." You should change the password to a new, entirely unique password that is not related to cheese. Try a combination of four or more unrelated words instead of a common phrase. Drop in some number, characters, and a mixture of upper and lower case letters. Get a password manager</p> <p>Since the best passwords should be hard to remember, consider using a password manager like 1Password or Lastpass. Password managers are applications that can generate long, unique passwords for every service you use, and remember them all so you don't have to. Turn on two-factor authentication. Two-factor authentication is a setting offered on most major services, including social media, email, and financial accounts. Turning it on means even if someone does have your password, they can't access your accounts without a second piece of information, like a code texted to your phone. Twitter calls this setting "login verification." It's under Account -> Security in your Twitter settings. Select "Verify login requests" and you will have to enter a second piece of information each time you login. Twitter will send a code to your phone over SMS or to an authenticator app. Change your other passwords too. Tired of the endless partisan bickering and memes, you stopped posting to Twitter in 2016 and took up knitting. Congratulations on your life choices! But you might still need to change some passwords. If you used the same password on any other services like Facebook or your bank account, you should change those passwords immediately as well. Update them even if you use slight variations that could be easily figured out, such as "ilovecheddar" or "ilovemunster." Make sure each new password is also unique or you will have to go through this process again the next time there is a password issue at one of the services you use.</p>
Economía	Noticiero Univision	05/11/2018	2:00	<p>President Donald Trump is set to unveil his long-awaited plan for reducing drug prices after more than a year of bold promises to tackle pharmacy costs that are squeezing millions of Americans. But the strategy to be outlined in a speech Friday will not include a key Trump campaign pledge to use the massive buying power of the federal government's Medicare program to directly negotiate lower drug prices for seniors. Instead, administration officials are previewing a raft of old and new ideas to increase competition and improve transparency in the notoriously complex drug pricing system with the ultimate aim of wringing more savings for consumers. He said one new proposal would allow senior citizens enrolled in Medicare who hit the catastrophic period to pay nothing out of pocket, "so really relieve a huge burden on our senior citizens. Parts of the plan were previously released in</p>

				<p>the president's budget proposal and would require action by Congress. Those steps include, requiring insurers to share rebates from drug companies with Medicare patients and changing the way Medicare pays for high-priced drugs administered at doctors' offices. Trump staffers said the new steps coming Friday could be taken immediately by the administration without congressional lawmakers, who are mainly focused on November elections. The measures aim to increase competition, create incentives for drugmakers to lower initial prices and stop foreign governments from "freeloading" off U.S. pharmaceutical research. But the officials gave few specifics. Public outrage over drug costs has been growing for years as Americans face pricing pressure from all sides: New medicines for life-threatening diseases often launch with prices exceeding \$100,000 per year. And older drugs for common ailments like diabetes and asthma routinely see price hikes around 10 percent annually. Meanwhile Americans are paying more at the pharmacy counter due to health insurance plans that require them to shoulder more of their prescription costs. Trump officials have hinted for weeks that the plan, in part, will untangle the convoluted system of discounts and rebates between drugmakers and insurers, pharmacy benefit managers and other health care middlemen. FDA Commissioner Scott Gottlieb another Trump official with industry ties -- says this lack of transparency creates a perverse system of incentives in which drugmakers and other health care companies benefit from rising prices.</p>

Shriners Hospitals for Children, headquartered in Tampa, says it is working with Guatemalan and U.S. officials to have the victims taken to the Galveston Shriners Hospital pediatric burn center in Texas. The hospital says it expects to admit several children who are in critical condition after being burned in Sunday's volcanic eruption. Authorities say at least 70 people were killed. Within 24 hours of the explosion, an emergency medical team from the Galveston Shriners Hospital responded to Guatemala to help provide medical care and evaluations. A second team from the Boston Shriners Hospital is currently on standby. The hospital says the children from Guatemala are expected to be transported by the United States military by Tuesday night.</p>

Terry Thompson and his wife, Chauna Thompson, are accused of holding down 24-year-old John Hernandez in a chokehold outside a Houston Denny's restaurant. Hernandez died three days later. Thompson faces up to life in prison if convicted. Chauna Thompson, an off-duty Harris County Sheriff's Deputy during the confrontation, was later fired from the Harris County Sheriff's Office. She's set for trial in October. The couple's lawyers say Hernandez was urinating outside the restaurant when Terry Thompson confronted him, an argument turned physical and Hernandez threw the first punch, initiating the fight joined by Chauna Thompson. Authorities initially tried to charge Hernandez with assault but reversed after a bystander video surfaced.</p>
