It's now as The Blade, the area where crime is happening - prostitution is happening and violence is happening and the same time Phoenix PD is facing other issues, plagued with a lack of Police Officers as we all know there's been a shortage of Police Officers for quite some time. And because of that - they had to get creative - the Police Department has been doing everything they can to address that. Part of their plan includes the creation of a New Resource in North Phoenix - with the launch of a real time operations center at the Cactus Park Precinct - near 43rd Avenue and Cactus Road. The Center is assigned four specialists. All the specialists are assigned, specifically assigned to patrol squads, the RTOC uses special technology to aid police work along the 27th Avenue Corridor a stretch between Indian School and Bell Roads, where officers have seen the uptick in crime. Some of the technology utilized at the Center - gun shot detection technology, which works on triangulation and that guides officers to where shots are being fired, license plate readers. The specialists here will review the information to ensure that in fact that vehicle is stolen and when it goes through our second license plate reader, they broadcast that information to the officers in the field. When Alaska and United airlines technicians examined other max9s, they found loose bolts around those door plugs too. The fuselage for the max is made by Wichita-based spirit AeroSystems, then delivered to Boeing for final assembly. (David Calhoun/Boeing CEO) "we're not going to point fingers there.
