
Issues/Program Report for Q3 2021


WFIN News Director Matt Demczyk has noted the following as significant issues during the July 1st – September 30th time period:

- Cooper Tire reached a big milestone



Subject: Ball Corp. Shooter Alert

News Broadcasts: 9/12

Multiple law enforcement agencies responded to Ball Corporation on Sunday afternoon after receiving an alert about an active shooter from the company's alert system. The Hancock County Sheriff's Office, Findlay Police Department and Ohio State Highway Patrol all responded and teams started searching the huge facility. After about 2 to 2 1/2 hours, the facility was totally searched, with both the primary and secondary searches revealing no victims or suspects. Authorities say Ball Corp. will be looking into whether a worker reported the false alarm or if it was a glitch in the company's active shooter alert system.

Subject: Suspicious Death

News Broadcasts: 8/5

The Findlay Police Department is investigating what they're calling a "suspicious death." Police responded to 614 South Blanchard Street at 12:24 p.m. Thursday after dispatch received a call about a deceased male. Upon arrival, officers located a deceased male. The Ohio Bureau of Criminal Investigation was contacted to assist with processing the scene. Police say they are in the initial phase of the investigation and further information will be released later. An autopsy is pending at the Lucas County Coroner's Office.

Subject: Band Director Mom Shot

News Broadcasts: 9/24

The woman killed in a shooting at a Kroger in Tennessee on Thursday was the mother of the director of bands at the University of Findlay. Wes King wrote on Facebook, "I cannot believe I am typing this, but my mother Olivia King was one of the victims today at the shooting in Collierville at Kroger. I normally don't post publicly about Mom's medical concerns, but this is obviously different." He then posted an update saying his mom died of her injuries, "she was shot directly in the chest. EMTs attempted CPR

until the hospital. They tried to save her at the hospital to no avail. I apologize for the graphic details, but this type of crime needs to stop being glossed over and sanitized. No one deserves this." Wes King was hired as the University of Findlay's Director of Bands in July of 2020.

Subject: Flood Basin Decision Made

The Maumee Watershed Conservancy District Court voted on Friday to add the Eagle Creek Floodwater Storage Basin to their official plan. "This is a wonderful day for Findlay," said Mayor Christina Muryn. "This has been an issue that's plagued our community for far too long and I'm really excited we were able to take this next step to continue to move flood mitigation forward." Muryn added that there's a lot of hope in the community that we're finally going to get some resolution and no longer be afraid every time it rains.

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A high speed chase went from Interstate 75 to the streets of Findlay before finally ending when the suspects bailed out and were apprehended. The chase on Monday afternoon went from I-75 to State Route 12, which is West Main Cross, and into downtown.

After going down some neighborhood streets, the chase got on South Main Street where the suspect's vehicle clipped a car near Blanchard Valley Hospital. The suspect's car got a flat tire and hit two sign posts on Highland Drive, just south of the hospital, and came to a stop.

Subject: Dollar Tree Fire

News Broadcasts: 9/30

The Findlay Fire Department responded to a fire at the Dollar Tree at 2250 Tiffin Avenue.

The fire started at around 5:30 p.m. Thursday and was in the storage area of the store.

Battalion Chief Matt Cooper says the first firefighters on the scene saw heavy fire and smoke coming from the northwest portion of the building. Everyone had been evacuated from the store when firefighters arrived and no civilians or firefighters were injured.

Subject: Flash Flood Watch Issued

Much of northwest Ohio is under a Flood Watch as heavy rainfall is expected. The Flood Watch goes through Thursday morning. Forecasters say rainfall amounts could be between 2 to 4 inches with locally higher amounts in the heaviest rain. There is a possibility for widespread flooding resulting from small streams and creeks flowing out of their banks and flooding from rivers. The heaviest rain is expected to fall late Tuesday and through Wednesday.

The football game between Van Buren and Liberty-Benton that was set for Friday has been canceled due to a number of Van Buren players being unable to play. The Findlay plant was constructed in 1919 and was Cooper Tire's first manufacturing facility. Today, it employs approximately 900 associates within one million square feet of production space. Subject: Heavenly Pizza Employee Day

Heavenly Pizza in Findlay held an Employee Appreciation Day recently in which all the money that came in that day went directly to the staff. Owner Josh Elchert says his employees ended up making \$78 an hour on Monday, July 5th. "We just really wanted to make a big deal, and 78 dollars an hour to make pizza is a pretty big deal, but we just wanted to make sure they felt valued and appreciated." Josh said, while many restaurants have been experiencing staffing shortages, they've been able to stay fully staffed thanks to their dedicated employees.

Subject: R+L Carriers

The Findlay City Planning Commission has reviewed and approved a site plan for R+L Carriers. R+L Carriers is a family-owned, freight shipping company built on the idea that a satisfied customer is their number one priority. Tim Mayle, Director of Economic Development, says the company's values make them an ideal fit for Findlay. "We first began working with the Site Selector for R+L Carriers before COVID19 emerged."

Subject: Solar Farm

The Hancock County Commissioners have come to an agreement about future tax revenue with the developers of a solar farm project near Arcadia. Tim Mayle, director of Findlay-Hancock County Economic Development, says the agreement will generate \$1 million annually for local school districts, townships and the county. Construction could begin in late 2022 and it could be ready to go in late 2023.

The University of Findlay's College of Business is offering assistance to entrepreneurs through a new multi-faceted program, the Business Resource for Innovation, Teamwork, and Entrepreneurship, or (BRITE) Center. UF says the BRITE Center will offer guidance in starting a new business or exploring a new profession by offering events where participants can gain insight on the validity of a business idea and even get paired with a mentor in a relevant industry to get real-world advice.

Subject: Whirlpool Vaccine

Whirlpool Corporation, which has a plant in Findlay and employs about 10,000 people at five facilities in Ohio, is trying to get more of its workers vaccinated. Whirlpool is offering to pay workers \$1,000 who get vaccinated against COVID-19. It comes as the Biden administration prepares an emergency rule that will require large companies, like Whirlpool, to ensure their entire workforce is vaccinated - or subject them to weekly testing.

Subject: Alliance President Retiring

The head of the Findlay-Hancock County Alliance is retiring. John Haywood's retirement will be effective August 13th. Haywood has served as President and CEO of The Alliance since 2011.

Haywood began his relationship with the Chamber and Economic Development twenty years ago, serving on both boards. Haywood had previously retired as Findlay Division Vice President of Whirlpool where he worked for 24 years.

U.S. Senator Sherrod Brown was in Findlay on Thursday for a roundtable discussion on housing needs as Congress works to make new investments in communities. The Democrat is the chair of the US Senate Committee on Banking, Housing and Urban Affairs. The senator and mayor agree that upgrading local housing and other infrastructure is crucial in helping attract businesses and residents. We also caught up with Findlay Mayor Christina Muryn after the roundtable discussion.

Subject: Cross Sewage Bill
News Broadcasts: 7/23

A bill has been introduced by State Representative Jon Cross that would ban cities from dumping sewage into Lake Erie and impose stiff fines on those who do. Cross says he crafted the bill after revelations that the City of Maumee has been dumping as much as 150 million gallons of sewage each year into the Maumee River for the past 20 years, far exceeding their allowable limit. The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency fined the City of Maumee \$29,936. Algae blooms in Lake Erie, in particular the lake's western basin, have been a major focus of policymakers in recent years. Cross says farmers have been unfairly singled out as a cause of algae blooms.

Flag City Night Out was a huge hit with the many people who came out to Findlay's Riverside Park for the event on Tuesday night. Findlay Mayor Christina Muryn was happy to see so many people having fun and interacting with local public safety professionals. One firefighter told us he probably lifted around 100 youngsters up into the fire truck to sit behind the wheel during the event.

Hancock County health officials are reporting another increase in COVID cases in the county. Hancock Public Health says there were 253 new cases, 19 new hospitalizations and one new death during the week of September 3rd through the 9th. Hancock County is averaging 36 new cases per day. Community transmission in Hancock County remains "high" as defined by the CDC. Hancock Public Health says 43 percent of Hancock County residents are fully vaccinated.

The Findlay Police Department says a man was arrested after stabbing another man during a fight. It happened in the 2400 block of Jennifer Lane at around 9:30 Monday night. Police arrived to find a 26-year-old man suffering from a stab wound. He was taken to Blanchard Valley Hospital for treatment of the wound that police describe as not life-threatening. Police say William Burkhalter, 35, of Findlay, was taken into custody at the scene.

Subject: Wolfies Robbery Suspect

Some Findlay police officers made quick work of a robbery suspect. The Findlay Police Department says officers were dispatched to Wolfies Roasted Nuts on Glessner Avenue for a robbery in progress at around 3 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Police say a man had entered the business, stated that he had a gun, and demanded the money. Police arrived to find the suspect, 43-year-old Christopher Sterling, of Findlay, in front of the store. He was taken into custody without incident.
