
WFIN News Director Matt Demczyk has noted the following as significant issues during the April 1, 2022 – June 30, 2022 time period:

- Commissioners approved exclusion zones to prohibit wind and solar projects



The Ohio State Highway Patrol has released the names of the three suspects arrested in connection with the death of a Bluffton police officer on Thursday. Emin Johnson, 20 and Zachary Love, 21, are being held at the Hancock County Jail. (pictured) Dante Tate, 19, is incarcerated at the Medina County Jail. Investigators say the three were in a car that was fleeing from police on Interstate 75 southbound around 2:30 Thursday morning that struck and killed Bluffton police officer Dominic Francis. The officer was placing stop sticks on the interstate in an effort to end the pursuit.

Robert Hathorn has been found guilty of each of the charges he was facing in connection with an altercation with a Findlay trooper along Interstate 75 last fall that left that trooper with a gunshot wound. His bond of \$500,000 that was set in Findlay Municipal Court earlier was carried over. A backseat passenger, 21-year-old Zachary Love, was also arraigned. He pleaded not guilty to charges including the improper handling of a firearm in a vehicle and receiving stolen property. A video arraignment was being set up for a third suspect, Dante Tate, 19, who's still in Medina County where he was apprehended.
