
WFIN News Director Matt Demczyk has noted the following as significant issues during the April 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023 time period:

- A teen opened fire on two people outside a gas station after being assaulted
- Two prison inmates escaped; one was caught and one was found dead in a river
- Officer Dominic Francis' name was added to the fallen officer's memorial
- A new Findlay Police Department Chief of Police was sworn in
- An iconic Findlay root beer stand reopened for business

**Subject: Shooting In Findlay**

News Broadcasts: 4/8

The Findlay Police Department is investigating a shooting that happened Saturday night. The police department says officers responded to a building in the 200 block of East Front Street in reference to an altercation involving shots being fired. Police said two males suffered injuries and one had left the scene before they arrived. The other male was taken to Blanchard Valley Hospital for treatment of his injuries. Police say names of those involved and more details will be released when they become available.

**Subject: Shooting Suspect Identified**

News Broadcasts: 4/8

The Findlay Police Department has identified a suspect in a shooting that occurred Saturday night. The police department says officers responded to a building at 230 East Front Street in reference to a fight involving shots being fired. Two men were struck by gunfire and are being treated at Blanchard Valley Hospital. They are Kcaleeb Gonzalez, 25, of Fostoria, and Daniel Green, 47, of Lansing, Michigan. Police say the suspect in the shooting has been identified as Isaiah Moore (aka Zay James) of Findlay, age 20. He is to be considered armed and dangerous.

**Subject: Shooting Suspect In Custody**  
News Broadcasts: 5/7

A man accused of shooting and wounding two people in Findlay in April is in custody. Isaiah Moore was located in Findlay, arrested, and booked at the Hancock County Justice Center on charges of felonious aggravated assault. The 20-year-old is the suspect in the shooting of two men in a building at 230 East Front Street the night of April 8<sup>th</sup>. The two men wounded were Kcaleeb Gonzalez, 25, of Fostoria, and Daniel Green, 47, of Lansing, Michigan. They were treated at Blanchard Valley Hospital.

**Subject: Gas Station Shooting**  
News Broadcasts: 4/10

The Findlay Police Department is investigating a shooting that happened Monday afternoon involving an adult and two juveniles. The shooting happened in the parking lot of the Circle-K at 100 Crystal Avenue at around 5 p.m. Monday. Police say 20-year-old Marcus Cataline and a 17-year-old male arrived at the Circle-K parking lot in a Chevy Cruze. Another 17-year-old was in a separate vehicle in the parking lot. The parties knew each other.

**Subject: Teen Shooter Turns Himself In**  
News Broadcasts: 4/11

The Findlay Police Department says the 17-year-old who fired gunshots at the car of two people who assaulted and robbed him outside a Findlay gas station on Monday is in custody. The police department says the teen turned himself in to police on Tuesday. The police department says the teen was arrested, interviewed and incarcerated on a charge of having a weapon under disability. The case remains under investigation. The incident happened in the parking lot of the Circle-K at 100 Crystal Avenue at around 5 p.m. Monday.

**Subject:** Escaped Inmate Dead  
News Broadcasts: 5/28

Police in Henderson, Kentucky on Sunday said that escaped Ohio prison inmate Bradley Gillespie's body was found in the Ohio River near his last known whereabouts. "Today, I believe we have closure to our five-day manhunt," said police chief Sean McKinney. The chief said a boater called in around 1:30 Sunday afternoon saying he believed he saw a body in the river. The body was recovered from the river and police said their preliminary investigation indicates that the body is that of Gillespie.

**Subject:** Francis' Name Added To Memorial  
News Broadcasts: 5/23

Bluffton Police Officer Dominic Francis' name was added to the Hancock County Fallen Officer's Memorial at the Fort Findlay FOP during a ceremony on Monday night. Dominic's name was hidden until his father and son pulled away the tape to reveal it, and family members, colleagues and friends of Dominic spent some time with it. "Dominic's death hit our community very hard," said Teresa White, Development Director for the Fort Findlay FOP Lodge Foundation.

**Subject:** Walmart Evacuated  
News Broadcasts: 5/11

The Walmart on Trenton Avenue in Findlay was evacuated around 6 p.m. Thursday due to a false active shooter call. Employees were ushered to a far side of the parking lot as police responded and searched the building. After no threat was found, the all clear was given. The store reopened around 6:40 and employees and customers were allowed back in.

**Subject:** School Threat Arrest  
News Broadcasts: 5/19

The Findlay Police Department says a man was arrested after making a threat on social media indicating a shooting was going to occur at a school. Police responded to Jefferson Primary on Fairlawn Place on Friday afternoon after learning of the threat. Officers made contact with school officials and the school went into lockdown. Investigating officers responded to a residence near the school, and after interviewing the suspect, he was placed under arrest. Police identified the man who was arrested as Chad Johnston Jr.

**Subject:** YMCA Demo Funds Decision

The head of the Findlay YMCA addressed Findlay City Council at their Tuesday night meeting. The YMCA has been purchasing nearby properties in the hope of building a new facility or expanding the current one at 300 East Lincoln Street. There has been concern about how the Y has gone about acquiring some of the properties and that some were historic in nature. "I can't even begin to tell you how much it hurt my heart to listen to the comments, accusations and false information that I've heard about the YMCA over the past few weeks," said Stephanie Parsons. She then asked council to withdraw the Y's application to use city demolition funds to tear down properties it has purchased on East Hardin Street to make room for a planned new facility.

**Subject: Overdose Spike Alert Issued**

Hancock County health officials say there's been a recent spike in suspected overdoses in Findlay and Hancock County. Hancock Public Health on Friday said there had been three overdoses within the last 24 hours. The health department sends out spike alerts when three overdoses occur within 24 hours.

**Subject: Bad Air Quality**

Hancock Public Health is warning that that area is experiencing unhealthy air quality levels again on Wednesday. The bad air quality is due to smoke from wildfires in Canada drifting into the region. "What does this mean for you?" the health department wrote on its Facebook page. "The "Unhealthy" air quality designation indicates that the smoke and pollutants present in the air can potentially affect the health of sensitive individuals, such as children, the elderly, and those with respiratory conditions. It is crucial to take necessary precautions and minimize exposure to outdoor air."
