Dear Affiliate Partner:

To assist you in complying with the reporting requirements for children's television and the requirement that stations air "core" educational and informational children's programming, we are providing you with episode-specific descriptions ("**The More You Know**" educational and informational programming block) as set forth in the attached Quarterly Children's Programming Report for the 1st quarter of 2023. Please note that we have not included the specific dates and times for each of the programs as that information may be station-specific.

This report is divided into the following categories:

1. Educational Objectives and Show Summaries: **The More You Know** both for programs broadcast in the 1st quarter of 2023 and those planned for the 2nd quarter of 2023.
2. Core Programming: Regularly scheduled programming furnished by the NBC Network that is specifically designed to serve the educational and informational needs of children ages 13-16. Each of these programs is identified on-air as educational and informational with the "E/I" icon and is similarly identified to the national listing services. Please note that the target age range for **The More You Know** programming is identified as 13-16 years old.
3. Other Programming: Programming furnished by the NBC Network that contributes to the educational and informational needs of children 16 and under but is not specifically designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children.
4. Public service announcements targeted to children 16 and under.
5. Non-broadcast efforts that enhance the educational and informational value of NBC Network programming to children.

The regularly-scheduled children's programming and promotional content furnished to you by the NBC Network during the 1st quarter of 2023 complied with the commercial limits of the Children's Television Act, and 47 C.F.R. §§ 73.670(a)-(d), provided that you broadcast and distributed such programming as furnished to you by NBC, and did not add any promotional or advertising content thereto other than as directed by NBC via weekly postings on APT.

Despite the recent revisions to the Children's Television Programming Rules we will continue to provide this report on a quarterly basis. Please consult your legal counsel with any questions.

In the 1st Quarter of 2023, NBC continued airing The More You Know Educational/Informational programming block, designed for older adolescent children, ages 13-16. Each of the six shows has a hosted format, featuring non-fiction, informative programming that extends NBC's iconic The More You Know brand to Saturday mornings. The audience views inspiring stories about the environment, social change, health and wellness, and community engagement. There were no changes to the lineup for Q1. Stations continued to have the option of airing the final hour of the block (*Roots Less Traveled* and *The Voyager with Josh Garcia*) on their primary channel or on their secondary D2/D3 channel.

#### EARTH ODYSSEY WITH DYLAN DREYER

Earth Odyssey with Dylan Dreyer is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. Earth Odyssey with Dylan Dreyer will take viewers on an incredible journey to the wildest points on the globe, uncovering the connection between the environment, the wildlife, and the human beings that surround them. Hosted by Meteorologist Dylan Dreyer, Earth Odyssey with Dylan Dreyer will reveal a new destination each week, ranging from Africa, Indochina, the Middle East, and many untamed islands around the world. Audiences will come face-to-face with fascinating native animals, some cute and some dangerous, while educating teen viewers with amazing facts about nature and wildlife. Earth Odyssey with Dylan Dreyer gives audiences a captivating look at the symbiosis between all living things, in the most larger-than-life places on Earth.

#### WILD CHILD

Wild Child is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. Wild Child will take viewers on an adventure to meet the cutest, most curious, most fascinating baby animals on the planet. Along the journey, audiences will witness the incredible bond that exists within the animal kingdom between parents and their children. Hosted by Sheinelle Jones, Wild Child will reveal how these untamed youngsters are born, how they play, and how they learn to survive in the wild. Each week, viewers will witness a wide variety of wild animal children in their first years on Earth as they overcome environmental challenges and threats from predators.

#### HARLEM GLOBETROTTERS: PLAY IT FORWARD

Harlem Globetrotters: Play It Forward is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. Harlem Globetrotters: Play It Forward celebrates the historic franchise that has delighted fans of all ages with joy and goodwill for nearly a century. Hosted by Craig Robinson, audiences will get to know the new generation of talented Globetrotters

players and coaches, while witnessing how they bring their unique skills and passions both on and off the court. From teaching financial literacy to community engagement to sharing the importance of eating healthy and staying fit, Harlem Globetrotters: Play It Forward will educate viewers in a manner accessible and understandable to children aged 13-16. Each week, Harlem Globetrotters: Play It Forward will feature stories of both compassion and mind-blowing athleticism, demonstrating the incredible impact that basketball can have for generations to come.

#### ONE TEAM: THE POWER OF SPORTS

One Team: The Power of Sports is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. One Team: The Power of Sports features stories that focus on diversity, inclusion, and how sports often bring people together for a common goal that goes beyond the playing field. Hosted by Corey Robinson, this series shines a light on people who have used sports to overcome obstacles or to help their community. Viewers will learn the value of acceptance, and how everyone deserves a fair shot in life. No matter the level of competition, One Team: The Power of Sports demonstrates the impact sports can have on people, regardless of their gender, background, or the color of their skin.

#### ROOTS LESS TRAVELED

Roots Less Traveled is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. Roots Less Traveled follows two family members, often from different generations, as they gain a newfound understanding and respect for each other on their quest to learn more about their family history. Each week on Roots Less Traveled, a new pair will set out on an adventure to solve a mystery in their family tree. From rumors of a relative who sailed on the Titanic, to stories of homesteaders forging a new path for future generations, our duo discovers the truth behind the tales that have been passed down in their family, while our viewers learn the personal stories behind notable historical moments. Viewers will be taken on a literal journey to unique places around the globe, learning more about the culture and history of these significant locations and events that happened there. Throughout this experience, we will witness these family members grow closer as they gain wisdom not only about themselves, but also about how their past has helped shape their present.

#### THE VOYAGER WITH JOSH GARCIA

The Voyager with Josh Garcia is a live action, half-hour television program designed to meet the educational and informational needs of children aged 13-16. **EARTH ODYSSEY WITH DYLAN DREYER**

**CRUISING THROUGH COSTA RICA [EDD501]**

Today on Earth Odyssey, host Dylan Dreyer takes us on an adventure to Costa Rica to explore the incredible creatures that call this tropical oasis home. First up, we'll travel to the jungle forests to spend the day with a group of mantled howler monkeys. Mantled howler monkeys are the largest known New World monkeys, producing some of the loudest sounds in the forests. While the mantled howler isn't the noisiest of the nine howler monkey species, its vocal demonstrations can still be heard from miles away. We'll find out that howler monkeys can live to be about twenty years old in the wild. We'll also learn that howler monkeys have a prehensile tail which acts as a fifth limb that can grasp branches. Next, we'll take to the skies to meet one of the world's most iconic and exotic bird species, the great green macaw. Also known as the great military macaw, these incredible birds have a lifespan of about fifty years in the wild and eighty in captivity. We'll discover that macaws have specialized tongues containing a scaly exterior and a bone. Currently in danger of extinction, we'll also learn about protection and reforestation efforts in Costa Rica to help save the great green macaw.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we visited Costa Rica to learn more about the brilliant wildlife that flourishes there. Despite its small landmass, Costa Rica is an entire world of its own and continues to be an oasis for so many of Earth's most spectacular fauna and flora.]**

**WILD CHILD**

**A WILD ZOOTOPIA! [WLC308]**

Today on Wild Child, host Sheinelle Jones takes us across the world to find our planet's most incredible zoo residents. We'll learn that when it comes to creating comfortable home zones, most zoos design their living spaces to be as close to an animal's natural environment as possible. First up, we'll discover more about a unique animal from down under, the grey kangaroo. We'll learn that at birth, joeys are only about the size of a jellybean. Grey kangaroo joeys will use their mother's pouch for about eleven months, even after growing to be about three feet long. In the wild, grey kangaroos like to browse open grassland and woodland areas. We'll find out that when feeding, kangaroos move with all four feet on the ground using their tail as support. Next, we'll learn about a fascinating but endangered species, the red panda. Red pandas are excellent tree climbers with semi-retractable claws like a cat. Red pandas and giant pandas share a love of bamboo, but their species are not actually related. We'll find out that studies show red pandas are most closely related to raccoons. We'll also learn that red pandas have been identified as both nocturnal and crepuscular, sleeping for up to 17 hours a day.

**[Educational Message: Endangered animals are so rarely seen in the wild, their daily lives and habits**

**can be a complete mystery to us. Studying them in protected sanctuaries gives biologists an incredible opportunity to understand them in ways we never could before, helping us protect and ensure their survival into the future.]**

### **HARLEM GLOBETROTTERS: PLAY IT FORWARD**

#### **BEATS & BUSES [HGL108]**

Today on Harlem Globetrotters: Play it Forward, host Craig Robinson shows us a group of aspiring teen-girl music producers and Hotshot takes a touching look at the city that raised him in Harlem, New York. First up, we'll learn more about a program in Los Angeles called "Girls Make Beats" that teaches young girls how to be music producers, DJs, audio engineers, and more. We'll find out that only about three percent of professional music producers in the industry are female. Here we'll witness Jet, Bulldog, Wham, and Cheese as they compete to see who can create the best music beats, of course, with the help of some talented young girls. Next, we'll join Hotshot as he takes us on a trip down memory lane in Harlem, New York. Here we'll find out how Hotshot's struggles growing up helped motivate him to work even harder to become the skilled basketball player he is today. We'll also spend some time with Hotshot's mother and brother as they reminisce on their childhood and discuss the challenges of living with dwarfism.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we discovered more about Hotshot's childhood in Harlem and how he overcame many struggles to get to where he is today. As we've seen, practice and determination can make all the difference if you remain dedicated and passionate about your goals.]**

### **ONE TEAM: THE POWER OF SPORTS**

#### **GO IRISH! [TPS308]**

First, Rudy Chapman's love of Notre Dame hockey has been an inspiration not only for him, but for the entire team. He first attended an Irish hockey game at age two and instantly fell in love with the game. At six years old, he was diagnosed with Ewing's sarcoma, a rare form of bone cancer. As he struggled through grueling treatments, Notre Dame invited Rudy to attend an Irish home game. When the team received word that Rudy had been declared cancer-free, Notre Dame won on a night when the greatest victory belonged to their most loyal fan. Next, Olympic legend Jordan Burroughs makes one last run for gold. Considered to be one of the greatest freestyle wrestlers of all time, he has won every kind of championship the wrestling world has to offer: NCAA titles, Pan Am medals, world championships, and even a gold medal in the 2012 Olympic games. With his sixth gold medal at the 2022 world championships in Belgrade, Serbia, Burroughs now has a combined seven total golds in world championships and Olympic games. That's the most ever for an American wrestler, breaking a 30-year-old record set by John Smith in the '92 Barcelona games.

**[Educational Message: Wins come in all shapes and sizes, both in and outside of sports. Viewers learn how hope and determination can lead to victory, and the importance of sharing that success with others so they may carry the torch on their own paths.]**

## **ROOTS LESS TRAVELED**

### **WATCH ALONG WITH PAUL & KALINA [RLT206]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll be watching along with Paul and Kalina as they reflect on their experience at the Civil War battleground of Port Republic, Virginia. In this episode, we'll find out what Paula and Kalina took from this journey and how it's changed their relationship for the better since. At the battleground of Port Republic, the two discovered that Paul's great grandfather, Austin D. Springer, was a drummer boy for the Union Army. We'll find out that officers directed the musicians to play certain songs that communicated orders to the soldiers. We'll discover that these musical roots run deep in their family, as Paul and Kalina both have a background playing the drums and percussion instruments. Later at Port Republic, Paul and Kalina learned that Austin Springer was taken prisoner by the Confederate Army in 1862. Based on historical evidence, it's believed that Austin Springer stayed behind to help the wounded rather than fleeing the invading Confederate Army, leading to his swift capture. However, Paul and Kalina discovered that Austin Springer eventually escaped capture and hid in slave huts until he made his way back to the Union Army. We'll find out how this amazing revelation helped inspire Kalina to show more acts of kindness to others in her own life. Not only did this experience bring Paul and Kalina closer together, they are currently planning future trips to discover more about their family heritage.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we took a look back at Paul and Kalina's experience learning about a side of their family that was previously unknown to them. At a battleground in Virginia, Paul and Kalina learned about the acts of kindness that helped Paul's great grandfather survive the Civil War. We discovered that this revelation had a profound impact on Kalina to make more positive changes in her own life.]**

## **THE VOYAGER WITH JOSH GARCIA**

### **CARIBBEAN DELIGHT [VJG323]**

Host Josh Garcia spends the day ashore in St. Lucia discovering the landscape, food, and art of one of the Caribbean's most beautiful islands. First, Josh visits a rainforest where, high in the trees, he learns the importance of the rainforest to the island's population. Seventy-seven percent of this island is rainforest, and it encompasses 19,000 acres of mountains and valleys. It is home to more than 2,000 native species, 200 of which occur nowhere else in the world. He gears up and experiences the island's lushness by zip-lining across the tree canopy. Next, Josh visits the oldest working estate on the island that grows and produces St. Lucia's world-famous chocolate. Evidence of chocolate consumption goes back three to four thousand years. St. Lucia's soil is high in sulfur, one of the essential nutrients needed for plant growth, and this makes for a prosperous environment for cacao trees. A cacao tree can live to be one hundred years old but only produces fruit for half its lifetime. Here, Josh learns an old technique for polishing cocoa beans by dancing on them in a barrel. Then, he takes a food tour through St. Lucia's largest outdoor market and learns about native fruits and how once-exotic spices helped create the island's popular creole cuisine. Castries is the largest town on the island and in its center is a huge open-air market, first opened in 1894. This market is commonly called La Place which means meeting place. There, Josh sits down for a plate of St. Lucia's national dish of salted fish and green figs. Finally, Josh meets with two local artists, a father and son, whose



work embodies the spirit and traditions of the island carved into scavenged wood. Traditional masks of St. Lucia are intended to tell stories through the images carved into the wood.

**[Educational Message: Local markets can teach you a lot about a country’s cuisine. You can typically find local delicacies and even see regional varieties of familiar fruits and vegetables and learn their local names. For example, a green banana in St. Lucia might be called a green fig.]**

### **EARTH ODYSSEY WITH DYLAN DREYER**

#### **STRANGE ENCOUNTERS ON THE SAVANNAH [EDD502]**

Today on Earth Odyssey, host Dylan Dreyer takes us on a journey to Africa to find the weirdest wildlife behaviors. First up, we’ll meet with a giraffe that’s practicing a very unusual activity. We’ll find that this iconic African herbivore is chewing on an animal bone. We’ll learn that this behavior is typically only seen during the height of the dry season when the giraffe is suffering from lack of nutrition. Chewing on bones becomes a vital practice when this herbivore can no longer find the calcium and phosphorus that it needs in the foliage it usually feeds on. Here we’ll witness how the giraffe uses its nearly two-foot-long tongue to dexterously maneuver the pieces of bone in its mouth to absorb critical nutrients. Next, we’ll discover more about the peculiar behavior of one of Africa’s apex predators, the crocodile. We’ll learn that the average crocodile only eats about fifty meals per year. Crocodiles can swim at speeds of eighteen miles per hour and run at eleven miles per hour. We’ll learn that crocodiles practice a behavior known as “death rolling” when securing their prey. Here we’ll witness the massive crocodiles as they subdue their next meal by rolling continuously under the water. We’ll discover that dinosaurs and crocodiles are both part of a subclass known as archosaurs.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we traveled to Africa to learn more about the weird and wonderful wildlife that call this continent home. When it comes to surviving in the wild, being bizarre can be an advantage in almost any environment. The strangest creatures and the strangest habits are often those that are best suited to their surroundings.]**

### **WILD CHILD**

#### **UNIQUELY EUROPEAN! [WLC309]**

Today on Wild Child, host Sheinelle Jones takes us on a wild ride to discover the fascinating baby animals of Europe. First up, we’ll learn about a cunning canine predator that loves to blend in with the pack, the gray wolf. We’ll find out that the cold, wooded environments of Northern Europe are the ideal habitat for these expert hunters. At birth, wolf babies cannot see or hear and weigh about one pound. At only six months old, the wolf pups are big enough to help the hunting party. We’ll discover that when the young adults reach the age of three, they can either join the wolf pack or leave to find their own territory. Next, we’ll venture deeper into the woods to get a closer look at the national animal of Finland, the Eurasian brown bear. Native to Europe, Asia, and North America, the brown bear has the largest geographical distribution of any bear species. Bears are omnivores, meaning they can enjoy both plants and meat in their diet. We’ll find out that Eurasian brown bears can weigh up to 780 pounds. Brown bear cubs have about two years to enjoy their

mother's care and learn the ways of the wild before they venture out on their own.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we took a tour of Europe to discover the young animals that call this diverse and magical landscape home. It takes resilience and flexibility to survive in an environment with so many changes through the seasons.]**

**TRICK SHOTS & TEA PARTIES [HGL109]**

Today on Harlem Globetrotters: Play it Forward, host Craig Robinson takes us to an uplifting tea party, then Wham, Cheese, and Hammer learn about the construction industry. First up, Torch, Hammer, and Hot Shot head to Broward, Florida, to meet with a non-profit group supporting and encouraging at-risk girls. We'll learn how their tea parties serve as mentorship programs that help inner city girls with life, communication, and etiquette skills. We'll also discover some interesting historical facts such as the earliest physical evidence of humans drinking tea dates back to around 200 B.C.E. Next, we'll go to Palm Beach, Florida to discover more about career paths in the construction industry and visit an actual construction site. We'll also learn about local affordable housing projects as well as a foundation that is providing career opportunities in construction for at-risk youth. We'll follow along as Wham, Cheese, and Hammer's construction skills are put to the test.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, the Globetrotters attended a tea party to learn more about a mentorship program for at-risk girls. We discovered that having a mentor or any other positive influence can help you better succeed in life. We'll witness how a simple tea party can have an incredible and lasting impact on both little girls and the community.]**

**FIRST STEPS [TPS309]**

First, Paralympian Tyler Carter gives a tour of the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Museum in Colorado Springs. The Museum has three levels of artifacts, technology, videos telling the stories of our U.S. Olympians and Paralympians. The U.S. has won more Olympic and Paralympic medals than any other nation, with an abundance of athletes that make up the country's rich history in the games. Next, Valerie Rogosheske tells her story about being one of the first women to run the Boston Marathon. Over 30,000 of the world's best runners head to New England every April to compete in the marathon. Except women weren't allowed to run the race until 1972, when Valerie and 7 other women became the first to officially enter. Now, Valerie celebrates 50 years of progress for women by running with her two daughters Abby and Allie.

**[Educational Message: Sports history has a long list of champions and role models who have paved the way for others. Viewers learn that simply showing up can have radical effects and create lasting change for future generations.]**

## **ROOTS LESS TRAVELED**

### **WATCH ALONG WITH ASHLEY & ELLIOT [RLT207]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll be watching along with Ashley and Elliot as they reminisce about their special trip to Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. In this episode, we'll find out that this journey would end up meaning much more to Ashley and Elliot than they could have predicted. Ashley and Elliot began their adventure with a sailing lesson where they learned that their five-times great grandfather, Henry Osborn, was taken prisoner on a boat in the Revolutionary War. During their sailing lesson, Ashley and Elliott learned what it would have been like to be a shipmate on a similar sea vessel during that time. The siblings also discovered that their three-times great-granddad, Samuel Osborn, went from debtor's prison to owning a fleet of whaling ships. Not only did Samuel Osborn represent an incredible "rags to riches" story, we also found out he was hailed as a local hero in 1871. We learned that it was common at the time for vessels from Massachusetts to venture into the Arctic to hunt the regional bowhead whale. On one particular voyage, weather proved to be disastrous and left thirty-three whaling ships stranded in icy peril. We found out that Samuel Osborn sent ships of his own to rescue the men, helping to bring more than a thousand people home safely. We learn that this story of selflessness resonated strongly in Ashley, helping illustrate to her the characteristics of a true leader. A surprise visit from Ashley and Elliot's parents allowed them to share their newfound family history. However, we'll find out that soon after this incredible experience, Ashley and Elliot's father tragically passed away. Although this was a devastating blow to the family, both Ashley and Elliot are grateful for the opportunity they had to share this information with their father before he passed.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we took a look back at Ashley and Elliot's experience learning more about their family heritage in Massachusetts. We discovered that Ashley and Elliot's father passed away soon after this trip. However, we learned that this tragic experience has bonded the family more than ever. By telling the stories and learning more about our lost loved ones, we can help them live on forever.]**

## **THE VOYAGER WITH JOSH GARCIA**

### **KICKING IT, RIO STYLE [VJG223]**

Host Josh Garcia sails into the world-famous city of Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. At one of the city's colorful open-air markets, Josh discovers Brazil's vast array of exotic fruit and sinks his teeth into some of its juicy bounty. Brazil has roughly 5 biomes and each one yields different fruits. A biome is a major ecological community characterized by the animals and plants living in that region. One of these fruits is Jabuticaba, an unusual Brazilian grape tree that produces fruit directly from its trunk. Next, Josh teams up with a local soccer player who teaches him how to master Brazil's national sport. With five titles, Brazil has won the most World Cups. One technique called pedalada means "pedaling" in Portuguese. Finally, Josh goes on a thrilling adventure as he tours Rio from the sky, hang-gliding high above the city. We'll find out that elephants can drink up to fifty gallons of water per day. During the dry season, elephants will use their tusks to dig up dry riverbeds to access water. Known as the largest terrestrial animal on the planet, we'll discover that elephants can grow to weigh over 10,000 pounds. Next, we'll learn more about another iconic African animal that towers above the rest, the giraffe. We'll discover that a newborn giraffe is roughly six feet tall at birth. While adult females grow to about fifteen feet, we'll find out that males can grow up to nineteen feet tall. We'll also discover another unique way of differentiating male and female giraffes from one another. We learn that female giraffe's horns have hair while the male's horns are hairless. Also, we'll discover that giraffes possess an incredibly dexterous tongue that can grow over two feet long.

Fur seal pups spend a large proportion of time playing with other pups and objects such as seaweed and reef fish, attaining skills they'll need later in life. We'll find out that fur seals are most at home in the water, spending months away from land at a time. Next, we'll travel to the South Pole to discover more about one of their most iconic residents, the gentoo penguin. Here we'll witness the birth of a gentoo penguin chick after thirty-nine days of careful incubation by both mom and dad. Gentoos are unusual compared to other penguins in that they raise two chicks instead of just one. We'll also learn that gentoo penguins can swim over twenty miles per hour and to depths of six hundred feet. Researchers believe that their speed in the water, plus the fact they fish close to home, means that gentoo youngsters get fed more often.

These young winter warriors must learn fast when it comes to battling the harsh conditions of the coldest season. We'll discover that the Caribbean flamingo fossil records date the species to about 10 million years ago. Flamingos have a truly humble start as a single egg being laid in a muddy mound. Here we'll follow a baby flamingo in its first days of life as mom and dad take turns caring for the vulnerable chick. We'll discover that flamingos develop their pink color over time through pigments in their diet.

In that role she's made it her mission to help every single NFL veteran who wants to improve themselves and their community find their path. The Legends Community was created to build that brotherhood among retired NFL players. Players are people too, with causes that are near and dear to them, and Tracy is in support and service to players to empower them to lead on and off the field. In 2021, over 900 players participated in My Cause My Cleats, a vehicle that raised money for charities.

Loyd Ford's children would contest their father's will through a series of Supreme Court cases. Remarkably, we'll learn that Larkin Ford prevailed and was awarded the very same farm that he worked on as a slave. Here we'll witness Sharee and DeVonn emotionally reflect upon the incredible resilience and perseverance of their enslaved ancestors. Seeing his family heritage physically represented in a historical museum had a profound effect on DeVonn and has allowed him to further connect with his past. Not only has this experience brought DeVonn closer to his mother, Sharee has since connected with other Ford family members to share the unique history she's learned about their ancestors.

First, Josh takes a walking tour and learns the importance of this old harbor and how this city acquired some very modern architecture. The Leuvehaven Harbor is the oldest dock harbor of Rotterdam and is over 400 years old. Even today, it's still one of the biggest ports in the world. Since the city of Rotterdam was destroyed in World War II, the city was rebuilt in a more modern, practical style of architecture. Modern architecture like the Cube Houses were built in the late 1970s to resemble an abstract forest, and the city center district was reinvented for mixed use, meaning both residential and commercial use, which can result in fewer carbon emissions. Then, he visits the nearby town of Gouda, and a unique cheese warehouse, where he learns about the art of making Gouda cheese. Dating back to the 12th century, Gouda is one of the oldest recorded types of cheeses. Gouda is most commonly made from cow's milk, but some variations are made from goat's or sheep's milk. Finally, Josh visits the famous windmills of Kinderdijk to explore their inner workings and importance to the neighboring farm community. A miller is responsible for running a windmill to keep it in the direction of the wind and running at the right speed. A windmill is a machine that runs on wind power and it can drive different machinery, and was originally used to mill grains, pump water, or mill wood.

**[Educational Message: Witnessing architecture that combines style with function and innovation can be an impressive sight, and can inspire future innovative design. For architects, it is important to consider the small ways function can improve day-to-day life for the communities they serve.]**

We'll find out that female terrapins are larger than males and can grow to weigh up to fifteen pounds. Terrapins typically feed in the water where they find snails, small fish, crabs, and frogs. But it's when it's around buffalo that the terrapin stands out for one very original feeding habit. We'll discover that these terrapins will eat the ticks that they find on the buffalo's backs. While turtles may not mind the presence of other turtles, we'll learn they are not generally considered social animals. We'll also discover that the earliest known turtles walked the Earth about 220 million years ago. Next, we'll find out more about another African animal with a peculiar adaptation, the zebra. We'll learn that each zebra's coat is completely unique. Their stripes can be thick or thin and they are always of different designs. We'll discover that scientists do not fully understand the purpose of zebra stripes but suspect they may help keep away heat and insects.

**[Educational Message: From the beautiful to the bizarre, every species on our planet has their own way of thriving in the wild. As they've evolved and adapted, their habits have given them special tools to ensure their survival and pass along their knowledge to younger generations.]**

Females will carefully lay between 100 to 400 eggs on a sturdy leaf or branch. When conditions are warm enough, the egg cases crack, and babies begin to hatch. As they develop, praying mantis babies go through up to six molting stages before they reach maturity. A praying mantis can molt to change its color depending on the season. We'll also discover that a praying mantis is the only known insect with 3-D vision like in mammals. Next, we'll meet an animal that's wholeheartedly embraced the urban lifestyle, the Canada goose. Baby Canada geese, known as goslings, can dive up to forty feet deep at just one day old. We'll also learn that Canada geese are monogamous and will typically mate with just one partner for life. Canada Geese usually forage in groups and on land, where they mostly feed on a variety of plants including grass, seeds, and berries. We'll discover that Canada geese can eat up to three pounds of grass each day.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we took a safari into the cities to reveal the wild animals living**

**in urban environments. While they might have ancient wild backgrounds, these crafty creatures have expertly adapted to the man made world around them using their natural instincts and some modern modifications.]**

First, custom molds are shaped out of clay, and once the mold is dry, it's sealed by hand before it's wrapped in wax. After details are added, it is wrapped again in clay and ash and hardened in a kiln to melt away the wax before the bronze is added. Pho is an aromatic soup that's served topped with thinly spiced beef, seasonings, flavorful herbs, and rice noodles. Finally, Josh ventures into the area's lush rice fields where he learns to harvest rice by hand one grain at a time. He learns that rice harvesting isn't easy and requires much time and careful work, spanning across about three cropping seasons per year.

First up, we'll visit the plains to find one of the most iconic animals of Africa, the cheetah. We'll learn that cheetahs have a field of vision that's incomparable at 280 degrees. We'll also learn that cheetahs have spectacular night vision that is eight times superior to that of humans. Similar to a bird, we'll find out that a cheetah makes a chirp noise that can be heard up to a mile away. We'll also discover that a cheetah has its signature black tear marks to protect its eyes against the sun's glare. Next, we'll meet with a herd of buffalo to find out what makes these beefy bovines special. We'll learn that buffalo are a cousin of the antelope and have one of the most highly developed senses of smell. We'll also discover that buffalo have no scent glands unlike other antelope species. Here we'll witness how buffalo use their keen sense of smell to detect predators, find food, or to track down their young in the middle of a large herd. We'll learn that smell is the most commonly used and surest way to identify another animal within a group or family.

Next, we'll visit the lush forests of Vietnam to learn about a rare old-world monkey, the red-shanked douc. Red-shanked doucs are nicknamed the "costumed ape" as they are one of the most colorful primates in existence. Rarely seen on the ground, red-shanked doucs prefer being higher up in the canopy and move amongst the tallest branches. We'll learn that the diet of the red-shanked douc consists primarily of tender leaves, but they are also known to eat flowers, fruits, and seeds.

More than a decade ago, Harlem Lacrosse started with 11 students and just ten lacrosse sticks and have been helping to provide representation and create more diversity by making the stick-and-ball sport accessible to everyone. Today, it's a nationwide, school-based, nonprofit organization that helps change the lives of youth through academic support, mentorship, leadership training, college readiness and admissions counseling, and lacrosse instruction.

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll be watching along with first cousins Damon and Patty as they reflect on when they learned about a historic free Black community living side by side with Quaker abolitionists in New Jersey. Damon and Patty first went to Evesham Township, New Jersey where they discovered more about the Cropwell Friends Meetinghouse. Built in 1809, this church was established by the Quakers as a place to gather for worship each Sunday. We'll discover that Quakers, also known as the Religious Society of Friends, have been in America since the 1650's. In 1688, Quakers were the first religious body to condemn slavery in the English colonies. Finally, Damon and Patty visited an historic chapel built in 1799 that played an important role in the Underground Railroad. We'll learn that the Underground Railroad included a series of safe houses providing refuge for enslaved people. Here, Damon and Patty discovered their own family's unique connection to the Underground Railroad.

**[Educational Message: Connecting with our past helps us connect to parts of ourselves that we didn't know existed. In this episode, we looked back at Damon and Patti's incredible family connection to the Underground Railroad. Better understanding their family history has provided both Damon and Patty with a new sense of pride in their roots.]**

## **THE VOYAGER WITH JOSH GARCIA**

### **COSTA RICAN ADVENTURES [VJG310]**

Host Josh Garcia sails to the Central American country of Costa Rica, known as one of the most visually stunning and ecologically diverse places on Earth. First, Josh visits a mask-maker who crafts larger-than-life masks called mascaradas, adopted from an old Spanish colonial tradition. They now appear at all sorts of Costa Rican celebrations, including on the holiday El Día Nacional de la Mascarada Tradicional Costarricense, celebrated on October 31st. "Gigantes y cabezudos" or "giants and big heads" were popular throughout medieval Europe. Then, Josh meets a guide who explores and documents waterfalls, and he leads Josh into the Bajos del Toro region, located between the Poás and Viejo volcanoes. In the nearby cloud forest, Josh learns about Costa Rica's unique micro-climates. A microclimate, or climate zone, is an area where the atmospheric conditions differ from the surrounding areas. Here, different rivers come from different volcanoes, and the vegetation and animals along each of these rivers adapt differently to their different mineral composition. Rio Agrio, for example, has a high acid pH level due to a mix of sulfur, iron, and silicon, among other chemical elements. Next, Josh visits a ranch where Spanish Horses are raised and trained in the discipline of dressage. Purebred Spanish Horses are called PRE, which stands for Pura Raza Espanol, and are from Andalusian bloodstock. The first registration dates back to the early 1300s. Many principles of dressage training today evolved from The Imperial Spanish Riding School of Vienna established in 1572. Josh gets into the arena and has a lesson from an equestrian in how to move three horses at one time by communicating with some simple verbal and signal cues. Finally, Josh meets a chef and learns to prepare a tuna dish that has ingredients only found in the region, leaving him with a very happy and delicious taste of the country.

**formations, whether formed by volcanic activity or water flow.]**

Today on Earth Odyssey, host Dylan Dreyer takes us under the sea to explore the alien world of crustaceans. First up, we'll learn about a fascinatingly deceptive crustacean, the spider crab. These elegant crabs owe their feathery appearance to anemones on their bodies. Spider crabs have developed a unique behavior of allowing different anemones to graft to their bodies. We'll witness how this camouflaged lifestyle takes on many and varied forms for these crustaceans. We'll see that there are no creative limits as each crab takes on its own unique and totally wild look. We'll also learn that the Japanese species of spider crabs are the largest crab species on Earth and can reach up to twelve and a half feet from one claw to another. Next, we'll discover how other crustaceans use their environment, and even the animals living alongside them, as a form of protection. We'll witness how some crustaceans have chosen the nomadic life living on the backs of sea cucumbers. Crustaceans such as crabs and shrimp will use a host sea cucumber as protection to hide from potential predators. We'll also learn about a specific predator that feeds on crustacean larvae, the pipefish. We find out that pipefish can devour great amounts of larvae at once, sucking them into their mouths like a straw.

**[Educational Message: The way each animal adapts and thrives in the wild is entirely unique to the species. But crustaceans take their individuality to extremes. Adapting and even becoming a part of their environment has ensured their survival on our planet for millions of years.]**

**FURRY FAMILIES [WLC314]**

Today on Wild Child, host Sheinelle Jones takes us around the world to find the furriest baby animals on our planet. First up, we'll visit the coastal cliffs of New Zealand to visit with a colony of fur seals. Female fur seals give birth almost every year of their adulthood. Here we'll spend the morning with fur seal pups while their mother goes hunting for breakfast. We'll learn that pups start to feed on solid food after about one year. Fur seal pups spend a large proportion of time playing with other pups and objects such as seaweed and reef fish, attaining skills they'll need later in life. We'll find out that fur seals are most at home in the water, spending months away from land at a time. Next, we'll get a closer look at the national animal of Finland, the Eurasian brown bear. Native to Europe, Asia, and North America, the brown bear has the largest geographical distribution of any bear species. Bears are omnivores, meaning they can enjoy both plants and meat in their diet. We'll find out that Eurasian brown bears can weigh up to 780 pounds. Brown bear cubs have about two years to enjoy their mother's care and learn the ways of the wild before they venture out on their own.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we traveled the globe to find the world's most remarkable baby mammals. It's amazing to see how each of these versatile animal families thrive in their unique part of the world. Whether in oceans, on ice, or in dense forest, mammals have shown that sticking**



**together is a tried-and-true survival tool.]**

As he struggled through grueling treatments, Notre Dame invited Rudy to attend an Irish home game. When the team received word that Rudy had been declared cancer-free, Notre Dame won on a night when the greatest victory belonged to their most loyal fan. Next, Olympic legend Jordan Burroughs makes one last run for gold. Considered to be one of the greatest freestyle wrestlers of all time, he has won every kind of championship the wrestling world has to offer: NCAA titles, Pan Am medals, world championships, and even a gold medal in the 2012 Olympic games. With his sixth gold medal at the 2022 world championships in Belgrade, Serbia, Burroughs now has a combined seven total golds in world championships and Olympic games. That's the most ever for an American wrestler, breaking a 30-year-old record set by John Smith in the '92 Barcelona games.

We'll find out that Mary and Kevin's ancestors were previously enslaved and fought for their freedom in a series of court cases prior to the Emancipation Proclamation. We'll discover that since most African Americans were enslaved in the decades prior to 1870, the majority were not recorded in the censuses before that year. Kevin and Mary relive their journey of discovery as they reflect on the details of their family's hard-earned journey to freedom.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, Mary and Kevin reflected on the passion and dedication of their relative Charlotte Pyles as she fought for her family's freedom. We learned that Charlotte became an anti-slavery activist and befriended notable people such as Susan B. Anthony and Lucretia Mott, who were fighting for the rights of women to vote. Reflecting on these incredible stories brings Mary and Kevin closer to their past than ever before.]**

First up, we'll learn about the feathered architects of the wild, the sociable weaver bird. We'll learn that weavers create intricate apartment-style nests with hundreds of mated pairs

building their nests next to each other. The spectacular tangles of dried grass have remarkable insulating properties that protect the birds from the extreme heat. Known as the largest nests on the planet, weaver bird nests can be home to as many as 100 pairs. Continually maintained by the entire colony, we'll discover that these nests can be used by weaver birds for decades. Next, we'll learn about a bird that's a highly skilled angler, the pied kingfisher. We'll find out that pied kingfishers can hover expertly and fly up to thirty-two miles per hour while hunting. Here we'll witness how kingfishers catch their prey by skimming the water with their long beaks at high speeds. When the kingfisher thrashes its prey to make it easier to swallow, the bird's feathers get covered in mucus. Once it has finished its meal, the kingfisher will return to the water for a quick bath. We'll learn that birds are great bathers as it's a good way to stay cool and keep their feathers clean.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we learned that more than 2,000 species of birds call Africa home. Beautiful, unique, and ingenious, the feathered flyers of Africa will always keep us looking up to the skies.]**

### **WATCH ALONG WITH JIMMIE & KATIE [RLT405]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll be watching along with siblings Katie and Jimmie as they reflect on their journey to Fresno, California to learn about their Japanese roots in America. Katie and Jimmie were first taken to a farm in Fresno to find out how their ancestors were an important part of the local community. We'll learn that in 1915, Katie and Jimmie's great-grandparents owned and operated a vineyard in California's Central Valley. However, in 1941 when Japan attacked the U.S. at Pearl Harbor, President Roosevelt ordered all Japanese Americans on the west coast to be relocated. We'll learn that President Roosevelt's executive order deemed Japanese Americans a national security risk. Katie and Jimmie relive their sobering visit to the Fresno Assembly Center Memorial, which stands in remembrance of the 120,000 Japanese Americans made to leave their homes and imprisoned in assembly centers during World War 2. We discovered that this was an extremely difficult time for Katie and Jimmie's ancestors as detainees were only allowed to bring as many belongings as they could carry to the assembly centers. However, in the face of hardship and humiliation, we'll learn that many in these camps worked to maintain a sense of normalcy. Detainees wrote newsletters in both Japanese and English, and even elected representatives. We'll discover

that Katie and Jimmie's ancestors received awards in 1960 and 1967 for founding Japanese American community groups.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, Katie and Jimmie reflected on the incredible hardships faced by their Japanese American relatives during World War 2. Despite the challenges and humiliation, we learned that Katie and Jimmie's ancestors maintained an incredible sense of determination to retain their culture and traditions. Better understanding our past can give us more confidence in our future.]**

#### **COOL CABO [VJG302]**

Host Josh Garcia spends the day ashore in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico. First, he visits an artisanal glass factory and tries his hand at this art form with the help of a master glassblower. Glass can be recycled to produce new glass. Once the recycled glass is washed and crushed, it's melted by 2,000 degrees of heat until it takes on a pliable state. Glass is an amorphous solid, neither a solid nor a liquid. Josh observes as the hot, pliable glass is blown, shaped, and cut into art. Next, Josh kayaks with a guide to the famous El Arco landmark that sits on top of an underwater mountain range that contributes to marine life. The Sea of Cortés supports more than 900 varieties of fish. Five hundred years ago, El Arco became an important navigational tool for ships traveling from the Far East running low on their water supply. Sailors knew that finding the arch was an indicator that fresh water was near. Finally, Josh visits a chef at his organic farm where he learns how to prepare a traditional salsa molcajete. Molcajete is a traditional stone mortar and pestle. Josh picks the ingredients himself from the farm, including onions and vine-ripe tomatoes. Salsa can be traced back to Aztec marketplaces as early as the mid 1300s. Josh prepares the ingredients once they are roasted to be ground in the molcajete, and then the salsa is ready to eat. Josh then shares in preparing a full, traditional Oaxacan meal. Oaxaca is a state in southern Mexico known for its indigenous cultures.

**[Educational Message: Trying an outdoor activity for the first time might seem intimidating, but if you learn correct form and safety from a professional, you'll have the tools to get started.]**

First up, we'll join a herd of elephants in Africa as they begin their morning routine. We'll learn that these oversized champions are always happy so long as there is water nearby. We'll find out that elephants can drink up to fifty gallons of water per day. During the dry season, elephants will use their tusks to dig up dry riverbeds to access water. Known as the largest terrestrial animal on the planet, we'll discover that elephants can grow to weigh over 10,000 pounds. Next, we'll learn more about another iconic African animal that towers above the rest, the giraffe. We'll discover that a newborn giraffe is roughly six feet tall at birth. While adult females grow to about fifteen feet, we'll find out that males can grow up to nineteen feet tall. We'll also discover another unique way of differentiating male and female giraffes from one another.

We learn that female giraffe's horns have hair while the male's horns are hairless. Also, we'll discover that giraffes possess an incredibly dexterous tongue that can grow over two feet long.

**[Educational Message: Whether for their height, their helpfulness, or their horns, the wild animals we learned about today are unlike any other. In this episode, we discovered how the individual attributes of these fascinating creatures makes them true icons of our planet.]**

#### **A WILD ZOOTOPIA! [WLC308]**

Today on Wild Child, host Sheinelle Jones takes us across the world to find our planet's most incredible zoo residents. We'll learn that when it comes to creating comfortable home zones, most zoos design their living spaces to be as close to an animal's natural environment as possible. First up, we'll discover more about a unique animal from down under, the grey kangaroo. We'll learn that at birth, joeys are only about the size of a jellybean. Grey kangaroo joeys will use their mother's pouch for about eleven months, even after growing to be about three feet long. In the wild, grey kangaroos like to browse open grassland and woodland areas. We'll find out that when feeding, kangaroos move with all four feet on the ground using their tail as support. Next, we'll learn about a fascinating but endangered species, the red panda. Red pandas are excellent tree climbers with semi-retractable claws like a cat. Red pandas and giant pandas share a love of bamboo, but their species are not actually related. We'll find out that studies show red pandas are most closely related to raccoons. We'll also learn that red pandas have been identified as both nocturnal and crepuscular, sleeping for up to 17 hours a day.

**[Educational Message: Endangered animals are so rarely seen in the wild, their daily lives and habits can be a complete mystery to us. Studying them in protected sanctuaries gives biologists an incredible opportunity to understand them in ways we never could before, helping us protect and ensure their survival into the future.]**

Here we'll find out how Hotshot's struggles growing up helped motivate him to work even harder to become the skilled basketball player he is today. We'll also spend some time with Hotshot's mother and brother as they reminisce on their childhood and discuss the challenges of living with dwarfism.

Since her retirement from soccer, Foudy has worked nonstop to increase opportunities for young girls by opening leadership academies, holding training camps across the world, and serving on a department of education committee dedicated to Title IX reform. Next, Declan Farmer's love for the sport of sled hockey fuels his competitive fire, keeping him the hottest player on ice. Born without legs and growing up on prosthetics, Declan never saw limitations when he looked at himself in the mirror. At the age of 14, Declan Farmer earned a spot on team USA’s sled hockey team and helped them win gold at the 2014 Sochi games. Farmer was a key part to team USA’s gold medal at the 2022 Beijing games and led all Paralympic scorers with 18 points.

## **ROOTS LESS TRAVELED**

### **WATCH ALONG WITH GWENDOLYN & GABRIELLE [RLT406]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we’ll be watching along with mother and daughter Gwen and Gabrielle as they reflect on their trip to Rockville, Maryland where they learned about their incredible family history. Gwen and Gabrielle first relive their visit to the Lincoln Cottage in Washington, DC, a home the president used as a retreat from the heat and politics of Capitol Hill. We’ll find out that President Lincoln would ride three miles on horseback from the cottage to his office at the White House. Here we’ll discover that Abraham Lincoln signed a bill in 1862 that freed all the enslaved persons in the District of Columbia, eight and a half months prior to the Emancipation Proclamation. Gwen and Gabrielle learned that this was the document that freed their ancestor from slavery. Inside the Lincoln Cottage, Gwen and Gabrielle had the chance to reflect on the history that changed their ancestor’s lives. We discovered that the Act of Congress that freed their ancestor in 1862, set the stage for President Lincoln’s Emancipation Proclamation of 1863. This executive order changed the legal status of three and a half million people in the secessionist states. Finally, Gwen and Gabrielle visited an actual battlefield to learn the significant role the U.S. Colored Troops played in the Civil War. Gwen and Gabrielle discover that following the Emancipation Proclamation, their ancestor volunteered at the age of twenty-one to join military service. We also learned that approximately two hundred thousand African American men joined the Union Army to fight for their freedom.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we looked back on Gwen and Gabrielle’s journey to discovering their family’s unique connection to the Emancipation Proclamation. They learned that their formerly enslaved ancestor voluntarily joined the military after he was granted his freedom. Reflecting on this incredible resilience and determination has instilled Gwen and Gabrielle with a greater sense of pride for their family roots.]**

First up, we’ll join a group of fox cubs as they leave their den and begin to explore the outside world. We’ll discover that foxes are fantastic parents, avidly caring and providing for their young through their adolescence. Foxes also have incredible hearing and can pick up the sound of prey moving underground. Here we’ll witness as the fox cubs’ father goes hunting for breakfast. We’ll discover that one fox can catch over forty voles or other small rodents in one day. Next, we’ll visit with a pair of unique mammals exploring the watery banks of the Loire River, beavers. Also known as Europe’s largest rodent, male beavers can grow to weigh up to sixty pounds. We’ll find out that beavers are highly territorial and will defend their home against outsiders with scent marking. We’ll learn that beavers mark their territory with a pungent substance that’s secreted from the base of their tail. Also, we’ll discover that beavers must constantly groom because it keeps their fur water-repellent. We’ll learn that mutual grooming is an intimate ritual for beavers that helps them strengthen their bond.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we learned more about the fascinating creatures that call Europe home. The Loire River is a lush, unique environment and the wild animals that live there are as much a part of the beauty and wonder of France as the Eiffel Tower or the baguette.]**

Bears are omnivores, meaning they can enjoy both plants and meat in their diet. We'll find out that Eurasian brown bears can weigh up to 780 pounds. Brown bear cubs have about two years to enjoy their mother's care and learn the ways of the wild before they venture out on their own.

In 1993, the LPGA tour became the first sports league in the world to offer a free traveling daycare to players and staff and allowed players to freeze their status for up to two years to focus on family. Next, Tracy Perlman began working in the NFL offices in 1992 and 30 years later, climbed the ranks to become Senior Vice President of Player Operations. In that role she's made it her mission to help every single NFL veteran who wants to improve themselves and their community find their path. The Legends Community was created to build that brotherhood among retired NFL players. Players are people too, with causes that are near and dear to them, and Tracy is in support and service to players to empower them to lead on and off the field. In 2021, over 900 players participated in My Cause My Cleats, a vehicle that raised money for charities.

### **WATCH ALONG WITH FARUQ [RLT208]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll join host Faruq Tauheed and take a look back at some of the most memorable family moments. In this episode, Faruq will reflect on his experiences guiding families through their life-changing journeys of discovery. First, we'll look back at Al and JR's trip to Havana, Cuba. Al and JR discovered that Al's grandfather, Joseph Barlow, owned and developed thirty-four blocks of downtown Havana. We learned that Joseph Barlow once owned the Barlow-Cuba Company of Havana, an extremely successful business. Here we discover that the entrepreneurial spirit runs deep within their roots, as Al and JR are both entrepreneurs themselves. Next, Faruq looks back on his time with Michelle and Rob in Mexico City. Their journey included a trip to the ornate National Palace where they learned that their second cousin Ernesto gave the keys to Mexico City to President John F. Kennedy. Michelle and Rob also discovered that their third cousin, Manual Uruchurtu, died on the Titanic after giving up his seat on a lifeboat to a woman in need. Finally, we'll revisit Sharee and DeVonn's incredibly significant discoveries in Tennessee. On a visit to the Tennessee Supreme Court, Sharee and DeVonn discovered that their four-times great grandfather Larkin Ford was a part of an 1840s landmark Tennessee court case. In 1840, Larkin Ford was a slave living in Washington County and was owned by American Revolutionary war veteran, Loyd Ford. That year, Loyd Ford drew up a will that would give his slaves their freedom and his land after his death. Although it would be contested, we'll learn that Larkin Ford eventually prevailed and was awarded the very same farm that he worked on as a slave. Here we'll witness Sharee and DeVonn emotionally reflect upon the incredible resilience and perseverance of their enslaved ancestors. We'll learn that this experience also profoundly affects Faruq, who takes time to reflect on his own ancestral roots as well.

Of the five species of salmon, there are three that require an extra year in freshwater, which are king, silver, and sockeye salmon. When salmon make the transition from the freshwater to saltwater, they undergo smoltification. Once this process is complete, they are released back into the wild. Then, Josh goes out on the water with a local fisherman to deep dive into crab fishing. Finally, Josh ventures out with a glaciologist. They kayak to the great Mendenhall Glacier and learn more about Juneau's ecosystem. The Mendenhall Glacier stretches about thirteen miles before it merges into the Juneau Icefield, which is about fifteen hundred square miles. Josh visits an ice cave inside the Mendenhall Glacier and is blown away by how much light reaches the cave through the dozens of feet of glacial ice above them.

**[Educational Message: Taking time to explore nature's beauty can improve wellness and encourage a better understanding of Earth's ecosystems.]**

First up, we'll journey to an African watering hole to learn about a unique reptile, the terrapin. Also known as a sharp clawed turtle, terrapins are an aquatic species that loves to bask in the sun. We'll find out that female terrapins are larger than males and can grow to weigh up to fifteen pounds. Terrapins typically feed in the water where they find snails, small fish, crabs, and frogs. But it's when it's around buffalo that the terrapin stands out for one very original feeding habit. We'll discover that these terrapins will eat the ticks that they find on the buffalo's backs. While turtles may not mind the presence of other turtles, we'll learn they are not generally considered social animals. We'll also discover that the earliest known turtles walked the Earth about 220 million years ago. Next, we'll find out more about another African animal with a peculiar adaptation, the zebra. We'll learn that each zebra's coat is completely unique. Their stripes can be thick or thin and they are always of different designs. We'll discover that scientists do not fully understand the purpose of zebra stripes but suspect they may help keep away heat and insects.

**[Educational Message: From the beautiful to the bizarre, every species on our planet has their own way of thriving in the wild. As they've evolved and adapted, their habits have given them special tools to ensure their survival and pass along their knowledge to younger generations.]**

First up, we'll visit the coastal cliffs of New Zealand to visit with a colony of fur seals. Female fur seals give birth almost every year of their adulthood. Here we'll spend the morning with fur seal pups while their mother goes hunting for breakfast. We'll learn that pups start to feed on solid food after about one year. Fur seal pups spend a large proportion of time playing with other pups and objects such as seaweed and reef fish, attaining skills they'll need later in life. We'll find out that fur seals are most at home in the water, spending months away from land at a time. Next, we'll travel to the South Pole to discover more about one of their most iconic residents, the gentoo penguin. Here we'll witness the birth of a gentoo penguin chick after thirty-nine days of careful incubation by both mom and dad. Gentoos are unusual compared to other penguins in that they raise two chicks instead of just one. We'll also learn that gentoo penguins can swim over twenty miles per hour and to depths of six hundred feet. Researchers believe that their speed in the water, plus the fact they fish close to home, means that gentoo youngsters get fed more often.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we took an adventure into Earth's wintery wilds to see the baby animals that make the cold look cool. These young winter warriors must learn fast when it comes to battling the harsh conditions of the coldest season. But armed with the skills and traits passed down from their parents, they are ready to take on whatever winter has in store.]**

Today on Roots Less Traveled, we'll be watching along with first cousins Damon and Patty as they reflect on when they learned about a historic free Black community living side by side with Quaker abolitionists in New Jersey. Damon and Patty first went to Evesham Township, New Jersey where they discovered more about the Cropwell Friends Meetinghouse. Built in 1809, this church was established by the Quakers as a place to gather for worship each Sunday. We'll discover that Quakers, also known as the Religious Society of Friends, have been in America since the 1650's. In 1688, Quakers were the first religious body to condemn slavery in the English colonies. Next, we'll watch along with siblings Mary and Kevin as they revisit their journey of discovery to the Bluegrass State, Kentucky. Mary and Kevin first reflect on their visit to the Washington County Courthouse in Springfield, Kentucky, which is just up the road from the birthplace of Abraham Lincoln. Completed in 1816, we'll learn that the Washington County Courthouse is the oldest courthouse in use in Kentucky. We'll find out that Mary and Kevin's ancestors were previously enslaved and fought for their freedom in a series of court cases prior to the Emancipation Proclamation.

**[Educational Message: In this episode, we looked back on two fascinating stories of family discovery. As we've witnessed, these families uncovered incredible connections to our country's history that they never knew about before. By better understanding our past we can gain more confidence in our future.]**

Using a hana, a traditional mortar and pestle, they make hudut, mashed plantains customarily served with Belizean coconut stew, made with coconut, herbs, and fish. Next, he ventures into the jungle and discovers Mayan ruins that date back more than 3,000 years. The High Temple at Lamanai reaches a height of 108 feet from the plaza floor. The Maya built their temples to house their deities and bury their kings. The name Lamanai was recorded by the Spanish in the 16th century. The structure goes back as far as 100 B.C, but the beginning of the city goes back as far as 1,500 BC. Lamanai is the longest continually-occupied site in Mesoamerica. Finally, Josh enjoys a breathtaking underwater adventure swimming with sharks. The Hol Chan Marine Reserve was established in 1987, and is a protected area for nurse sharks and other wildlife. Nurse sharks have teeth set further back, so they eat with a sucking motion. Nurse sharks are important to the fragile marine ecosystem and reefs.

**[Educational Message: Venturing safely into wildlife to witness the majesty of creatures in their natural habitat can be both an educational and also an enlightening experience, and can leave you in wonderment.]**

Similar to a bird, we'll find out that a cheetah makes a chirp noise that can be heard up to a mile away. We'll also discover that a cheetah has its signature black tear marks to protect its eyes against the sun's glare. Next, we'll meet with a herd of buffalo to find out what makes these beefy bovines special. We'll learn that buffalo are a cousin of the antelope and have one of the most highly developed senses of smell. We'll also discover that buffalo have no scent glands unlike other antelope species. Here we'll witness how buffalo use their keen sense of smell to detect predators, find food, or to track down their young in the middle of a large herd. We'll learn that smell is the most commonly used and surest way to identify another animal within a group or family.

**[Educational Message: An animal's instincts are the most essential tools to ensure its survival. Facing the challenges of finding food, avoiding danger, or navigating our wild world are only possible because these incredible creatures have remarkable senses.]**

**WILD LATIN LIVING [WLC311]**

Today on Wild Child, host Sheinelle Jones takes us on a trip south of the border to meet the baby animals of Latin America. First up, we'll journey to the Amazon to learn more about a monkey with a fashionable facial feature, the emperor tamarin. Emperor tamarins were given their name because of their similar facial hair to Emperor Wilhelm II of Germany. Emperor tamarins are famous for their dazzling white mustaches, a flamboyant trait that is passed along to their offspring. While they're known for their good looks, emperor tamarins are also incredibly agile and skilled acrobats. We'll learn that emperor tamarins typically give birth to two babies and have a lifespan around twenty years. Emperor tamarins love company, and they even form social groups with different monkey species. Next, we'll visit with one of South America's most vibrant residents, the Caribbean flamingo. We'll discover that the Caribbean flamingo fossil records date the species to about 10 million years ago. Flamingos have a truly humble start as a single egg being laid in a muddy mound. Here we'll follow a baby flamingo in its first days of life as mom and dad take turns caring for the vulnerable chick. We'll discover that flamingos develop their pink color over time through pigments in their diet.

Next, the game of lacrosse is helping change children's lives and outfit them for success on and off the field. More than a decade ago, Harlem Lacrosse started with 11 students and just ten lacrosse sticks and have been helping to provide representation and create more diversity by making the stick-and-ball sport accessible to everyone. Today, it's a nationwide, school-based, nonprofit organization that helps change the lives of youth through academic support, mentorship, leadership training, college readiness and admissions counseling, and lacrosse instruction.

Tammy and Julian's journey begins when they learn that they are related to undertaker John Baisley, who helped the city bury its dead during the Yellow Fever epidemic in 1856. We'll learn that while many were fleeing the city, John Baisley stayed in Brooklyn to help nurse the sick and dying, in most cases rendering his services without expecting or receiving any pay. Next, Faruq takes brother and sister Ashley and Elliott back to their grandparents' hometown of Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts. Ashley and Elliott soon discover that their three-times great-granddad, Samuel Osborn, went from debtor's prison to owning a fleet of whaling ships. Not only did Samuel Osborn represent an incredible "rags to riches" story, but we'll also find out he was hailed as a local hero in 1871. Finally, Faruq takes father and daughter Paul and Kalina to the Civil War battleground of Port Republic, Virginia. Here they will discover Paul's great grandfather, Austin D. Springer, was a drummer boy for the Union Army. In order to better understand the conditions soldiers faced during this time, Paul and Kalina will join a Civil War re-enactment group to learn what it took to live as a soldier in the Union Army at that time.

Host Josh Garcia arrives in Genoa, Italy where he explores the rich culture and cuisine of this historic Mediterranean city. First, Josh takes to the foothills with the help of some Italian donkeys who share the load. He arrives at a basil farm where he learns the secret to the most famous herb grown in the region. Under the guidance of a world champion, Josh helps make a truly authentic version of pesto that won the Pesto World Championship. Pesto is a Genovese staple traditionally made from a strict list of 7 ingredients: basil, pine nuts, parmesan and pecorino cheese, garlic, olive oil, and salt. Then, Josh heads to a local factory where he learns the traditional process of candying fruit. Candying fruit dates back thousands of years to Genoa's maritime culture when candying was used to preserve fruit for long journeys. Finally, Josh sets sail with some local sailors on the same waters as Genoa's famous son, Christopher Columbus.
