## **CURRENT EVENTS**

**October 17** - Alabama is a state rich with music history from blues to country music but it also has another genre of music that often gets overlooked, jazz. One group in Mobile is looking to increase awareness about Alabama's place in jazz history through a more culinary outreach.
