Researchers at Colorado State University are predicting 13 named storms, with 6 of those reaching Hurricane status. Of those 6 hurricanes, 2 are predicted to reach major hurricane strength: a category 3 storm or greater.  A new hike and bike trail is coming to Harlingen. The project is currently on its second phase of the four-phase process, which connects McKelvey Park to Dixieland Park with the use of three new bridges. The funding for the new 1.7-million-dollar trail is a partnership between the City of Harlingen and Valley Baptist Legacy Foundation.  A bill that would ban hairstyle discrimination is one step closer to becoming law. The CROWN Act, is an acronym for Creating a Respectful and Open World for Natural Hair. The
				bill protects men and women from hair discrimination based on hair texture and a protected hairstyle commonly associated with race. Protected hairstyles in the bill include braids, locks and twists. The bill passed the house and now goes to the Senate.
				The White House announced a plan to expand eligibility for Medicaid and the Affordable Care Acts health insurance exchanges to participants in the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals program, or DACA. The plan is expected to go into effect by the end of the month and will affect hundreds of thousands of immigrants brought to the U.S. illegally as children.
				PM News: A Massachusetts Air National Guard member was arrested in connection with the disclosure of highly classified military documents about the Ukraine war and other top national security issues.
				The Supreme Court allowed a roughly \$6 billion legal settlement to go forward that will cancel student loans for hundreds of thousands of borrowers who say they were misled by their schools. The settlement is unrelated to President Biden student loan forgiveness plan which is still waiting for a court decision.
				Apple announced that by the year 2025, it will make major changes to how it constructs its devices, as it has vowed to use 100% recycled cobalt in all Apple-designed batteries. This is an ongoing effort by Apple to use recycled materials in their products.
				There are a growing number of Chinese Migrants arriving at the southern border seeking Asylum. According to U.S. Customs and Border Protection, 4,366 migrants from China encountered Border Patrol officials after crossing the

					southern border without authorization from October 2022 to February 2023.
