The price of everything is going up including financing a home which has increased from 2.65% to 5% since last year for a 30-year fixed home loan rate. While this is not ideal for those looking to buy, it may be a much needed cool down for the competitive real estate market for those who want to take their time and have the resources to pay a higher interest rate.

For the past five years, the city has been working on the 7INK building, which will offer dormstyle housing where adults will have their own rooms but share living and dining spaces with other renters. The price point of these units starts at \$1,700 which includes furniture, utilities, and internet. This is a thousand dollars cheaper than the average one-bedroom in Boston at \$2,700.

Cogan had been saving money up for college when his entire savings of over \$1,000 was wiped out. The family says the scammers deposited fake checks totaling \$3,000 then transferred it back out using the Bank of America app on Cogan's phone. However, the bank has refused to refund Cogan as they said face ID was used to make the deposit—a safety feature on smartphones which can be easily manipulated. In 2020, a study found that over 18 million people were scammed using payment apps.

Despite gas being as high as \$5.19 a gallon, families are still determined to enjoy their long weekends with over 39 million Americans who plan to travel by car for the holiday. AAA predicts the heightened travel will drive gas prices up even higher going into the busy summer season.

The Starbucks Workers United claim water was leaking from the ceiling of the store onto the light fixtures, counters and floors. Over a dozen workers gathered outside the front of the store to protest their dissatisfaction with the water leaks, an issue that has persisted over the years and which management has failed to fully address. The workers are demanding catastrophe pay and the necessary maintenance to be completed to ensure safety for workers and customers.

Prices of everyday essentials and gas are skyrocketing which may hint at an oncoming recession but Boston College economics professor Peter Ireland says not to panic yet—stock market prices go up and down all the time for reasons no one can explain. Ireland advises hanging onto your stock portfolio and to reconsider taking a big summer vacation this year to save money.

Maksim Sigal, a Ukraine native who will be running his second Boston Marathon, called for the ban with his Change.org petition which received over 1,400 signatures in two days, prompting the BAA to take action. Russian and Belarusian citizens currently living in Russia will not be allowed to compete but citizens who are not current residents of either country will still be permitted to run, just not under the flags of the two nations.
WBZ News at 8 on TV38	5/3/22	8:01pm	2:30	Ken MacLeod reports on protestors rallying outside of the State House opposing the leaked draft opinion from Politco suggesting the Supreme Court will strike down Roe v. Wade. Many protestors are unhappy and angry at the road the Supreme Court is seemingly going down, saying this is a step back for women's rights. If Roe v. Wade is overturned, the right to abortion will fall on the States to decide with half of the States ready to outlaw them.

Neighboring blue states, Connecticut and New York, have also suspended gas taxes without damaging bond ratings and a national poll in March reports 70% support for a temporary gas tax break.

State education officials will have to make a decision in the coming weeks.

The controversial comments were made about a book called "Gender Queer," a graphic novel about teens and young adults struggling with their sexual identity. Jon debunks this by talking with director of Newton-based organization Partners in Sex, who says the comments Campbell made were off the mark and parents have the option to opt out of any school curriculum they are not comfortable with. Keller believes this rhetoric is a way for Republicans to capitalize on the uproar caused last year with how schools handled the pandemic shutdowns and remote learning by adding sexual health to the mix.

Many towns are struggling to keep up as fuel prices continue to rise. Attleboro DPW has had to request an additional \$80,000 to help with fuel costs to make it through the fiscal year. Attleboro budget director Jeremy Stull says there has been a 50% allocation increase for gas for the next year which is also driving up other citywide budgets as well.

The narrative comes after the murder of George Floyd in which Healey made an emotional speech on June 2, 2020, at the Greater Boston Chamber of Commerce saying, "America is burning, but that's how forests grow"—a statement which Republicans claim says Healey is tolerating the destruction of America in favor of leftist mobs. Healey's campaign spokesperson has come forward saying the statement is misconstrued and its obvious Healey is expressing optimism for the future and the need for a fundamental change in America's mindset and ingrained assumptions.

The children's section of Tuft's, which hosts 41 beds, is set to close by July to make more room for adult care. Boston's Children Hospital put out a message on social media on Monday about the high volume of patients and increased wait times, asking the public to only come to the emergency room if medically necessary. Nurses at Tuft's Children's Hospitals worry the closure of the pediatric unit may affect the children's ability to have access to the treatment they need.
WBZ News at 8 on TV38	4/20/22	8:35pm	2:24	Cheryl Fiandaca reports on the I-Team learning that the state did not provide the CDC recommended second booster to veterans at Chelsea Soldiers' home following an outbreak at the beginning of the pandemic where 30 veterans lost their lives. This discovery comes after a new COVID outbreak at the home where 13 veterans tested positive for the virus. After the I-team investigation and angry reactions from residents' families and veteran advocates, action has been taken in opening new vaccine clinics inside the state-run facility.

Although the pill has been approved by the federal government for emergency use for high-risk patients, the drug is reportedly underused. Some doctors are not aware that Paxlovid is available and the process of obtaining the drug requires the doctor to call a hotline which must put the client's name on a registry to see if they qualify for the pill. The Biden administration has announced they will push to make Paxlovid more readily available and easier to access at pharmacies.

WBZ News at 8 on TV38	5/11/22	8:18pm	1:57	Brandon Truitt reports on the nationwide baby formula shortage and Massachusetts parents scrambling to find alternative ways to feed their infants. The formula shortage is a result of supply chain issues from the pandemic as well as the closure of a large baby formula production company in Michigan. Datasemby reports nearly 40% of the nation's baby formula supply is out of stock which is up 11% from November of 2020. Dr. Christopher Duggan of the Center for Nutrition and Boston Children's Hospital advises parents to consult their pediatrician before making any changes to their infant's diet.
WBZ News at 8 on TV38	5/18/22	8:00pm	2:47	Kristina Rex reports on a man being treated at Mass General Hospital for monkeypox—the first case reported in the US this year. Monkeypox is so rare that it took six days for doctors to diagnose the man. Symptoms of the disease include flu-like symptoms that develop into a rash, usually lasts 2-4 weeks, and is not easily spread. The disease originates from West or Central Africa and is usually transmitted by animals or travel, but the man has reportedly only traveled to Canada recently. Similar reports of cluster outbreaks have come from Europe leading medical experts to believe there is a new method of transmission for the disease.
WBZ News at 8 on TV38	5/30/22	8:39pm	2:34	Dr. Mallika Marshall reports on a virtual reality video game Mightier that is helping kids and adults with ADHD and mental health issues. The game helps players manage their emotions by using a heart rate monitor worn on the wrist. When the player's heart rate goes up, the game prompts the player to do a simple exercise such as moving their arm across their chest or taking deep breaths. These stress coping mechanisms are done hundreds of times eventually becoming muscle memory which players can use in times of distress or frustration in real time. These types of video games were first used to help children with ADHD but are now being used for a wide range of mental health issues.

With pollen season lasting from April through September, it is currently peak allergy season. Tree pollen season starts at the end of March then goes into grass pollen in May and weed pollen in August and September. Allergies may seem worse this time of year since pine pollen grains are one of the largest pollen grains, almost three times the size of grass pollen. The conditions may also be worse this year due to drier conditions and the moderate drought Massachusetts is currently experiencing.

The contrast dye, which is injected into the patient's bloodstream to identify blood clots, is needed to perform CAT scans but the General Electric factory in Shanghai that produces it has had to pause production due to COVID. This is causing hospitals to have to conserve the dye or postpone CAT scans despite the high influx of patients they are currently experiencing.

Neighbors claim that the commotion coming daily from McKee's yard is scaring their families and children and causing them anxiety as they are afraid to go outside in their yards in fear someone may get hurt. Newton police say McKee is not doing anything illegal but are now looking into ways to amend Newton's firearms ordinance to include the discharge of air guns, pellet guns and BB guns.

The man claimed he dropped his phone then fled on foot when confronted by neighbor Caylie Basnett who was outside with their dog. The man was later arrested when he came back to retrieve his pickup truck from the apartment complex and police confirmed he was the same man who had stalked the complex back in December. Dracut Police intend to seek criminal charges against the man.

His K-9 Nero was also injured at the scene and had to be transported by police car to the local animal hospital. Nero's Law will allow K-9s who are injured in the field to be immediately treated by EMTs onsite. The bill was passed unanimously in the statehouse in hopes that one day, it will save a life.

Templeton Police are leading an investigation into the incident.

The Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) has started an investigation into the incident and Suffolk plans to conduct a safety review and evaluation of its safety standards and procedures during the construction pause.

Allegations were first raised with Hakim in 2018 – although the initial investigation proved "not prosecutable" at the time, another student came forward in 2021 which prompted other students to do the same, and Salem Police were able to arrest Hakim with new charges on June 14. Hakim is facing 32 counts of aggravated indecent assault and battery on a child under 14.

Dr. Robert Sheridan says the easy part is caring for the victims—the hard part is the logistics of getting the victims halfway across the world. The usual time to transport patients is six days but due to restricted air access due to the war in Ukraine, this time it took 20 days. The Ukrainian children will remain in the care of the hospital for the next three months while they undergo intensive care and rehab. Shriners has been taking care of Ukrainian burn victims for the past 15 years through a partnership with the country and will continue to do so to help alleviate the overwhelmed hospitals tending to war victims.

Cape Cod marine debris artist Sarah Thornington has been working on a new exhibit called "Hope is Not Passive" to bring awareness to single-use plastic. The majority of the exhibit is made from over 21,000 pieces of washed-up plastic garbage, toys, and shoes that Thornington collected over the course of a year. In honor of earth month, Thornington's artwork has been displayed in Lawrence Library in Pepperell.
