**EDUCATION**, including the quality of public education, school busing, bilingual education, school violence, and the quality of college and adult education.

October:

- 10/03/12 GMSA – This weekend, KSAT 12 is teaming up with the Children's Hospital of San Antonio to host the South Texas School Expo. Several schools and universities will be on hand to show people interested the possibilities of returning to school, or even looking at training for a new career. Visitors got a chance to meet KSAT reporters and anchors. The School Expo being held at North Star Mall.
- 10/03/12 4PM NEWS –Special Needs advocate, Pamela Espurvoa, says nothing has been said as to how many children with special needs will be serviced by the Mayor's proposed Pre-K program. She says there are many special needs children who could be eligible for free, full day Pre-K classes if the Mayor's proposal passes on November 6. What's been lacking so far in the campaign is what accommodation will be made given the children would be chosen through a lottery.
- 10/04/12 NOON NEWS – Tuition freezes are not on the radar of the A&M system or most state schools. A&M SA won't have underclassmen until 2015 at the earliest, but this fall started offering what they call their affordable degree program in cyber security. About 200 high school students have sign up, already earning college credit. The overall cost will be right around the Governor's target of a \$10,000 education and benefits students that may change their mind.
- 10/09/12 4PM NEWS – A new study released today shows a significant number of San Antonio children starting school are not prepared. The study shows that in Physical Health and Well being, only 34% are very ready while 11% are vulnerable. In Communication Skills and General Knowledge, they get the same scores, 34% very ready and 11% vulnerable. In Language and Cognitive Development, only 30% are very ready while 15% are vulnerable. Kindergarten teachers assessed students in the San Antonio, Edgewood and Harlandale ISDs to come up with the results and poverty was blamed for some of the poor scores. Educators say the study is a clear indication that more early education is needed.
- 10/18/12 GMSA – Student loan debt among college seniors has hit a record high. Last year, the average college student graduated with nearly \$27,000 in outstanding loans, up 5% from 2010. The Institute for College Access and Success Project blames rising tuition and a tough job market for the bump in student loan debt among new graduates. Tuition, fees, the availability o financial aid and the cost of living also factor into the amount of debt students pile up.
- 10/23/12 6PM NEWS – Hundreds of school districts are suing the state over the funding of public education. Attorneys for the school districts told a judge during opening arguments yesterday in Austin that state funding is "hopelessly broken." They say the current funding scheme means wealthy districts get about \$2,000 more per student. The state argues that between 2006 and 2011, schools were funded beyond the rate of inflation and growing enrollment. The trial is expected to last into January.
- 10/30/12 10PM NEWS – Superintendents from four local school districts met today as part of a discussion on school funding. During the last legislative session, lawmakers cut school funding by \$5.4 billion. Many school districts say those cuts have created quite a challenge. Today's panel discussion, hosted by the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, brought together superintendents from Northside, North East, San Antonio and Southwest ISDs to talk about the impact of those cuts.

November:

- 11/05/12 GMSA – The Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) career fields have always had trouble attracting women. But now a group of cheerleaders is challenging stereotypes and inspiring young women to consider science and technology careers. The group, called Science Cheerleaders, is made up of 200 former NFL and NBA cheerleaders who also have careers in STEM fields. While women make up only 24% of those in the STEM fields, Erin Donnelly, former St. Louis Rams cheerleader, is challenging girls to change that.
- 11/07/12 NOON NEWS – Both supporters and opponents of the Pre-K for SA initiative expected this to be a close race. Earlier on Election Night, Mayor Castro said it looked like voters are going to approve the initiative. The initiative raises sales tax 1/8 of a cent to fund full day, Pre-K and the Mayor says roughly 5,700 kids aren't getting that now. The Mayor says those who voted for the measure are investing in San Antonio for the long term.
- 11/22/12 A Northside ISD student and her family are suing the district and John Jay High School over the district's smart ID badges, which track students while they are on campus. That lawsuit, filed in Bexar County by Andrea Hernandez and her father Steve, says requiring her to wear the ID badge infringes on her religious



freedom. Her father says Andrea is being retaliated against for refusing to wear the badge. According to the suit, Hernandez says submitting to the authority of a secular entity is the same as idolatry or submitting to a false god.

11/28/12 6PM NEWS – A hearing that was scheduled today to determine whether a John Jay high school student could transfer has been cancelled. A temporary injunction allowed Andrea Hernandez to return to school after being reassigned to another one last week after she refused to wear the new ID tags with locator chips in them because of her religious beliefs. Northside ISD put the chips in the ID badges of high school and middle school students so they could receive additional state funding if the technology enables more accurate attendance counts. The family's attorney says the hearing was cancelled after the school district asked that the case be moved to a federal court. A new hearing hasn't been set.

11/28/12 10PM NEWS – According to the U.S. Department of Education, Texas has one of the highest high school graduation rates in the country. The preliminary information released today shows that in 2011, Texas had a graduate rate of 86%. Iowa led the nation with 88%, followed by Vermont and Wisconsin. Texas was the top in the nation for on-time graduation rates for white and Asian students, and tied with Montana for the highest graduation rates among African-American students. Texas Education Commissioner Michael Williams says the data shows that public schools are delivering a high quality education.

#### December:

12/03/12 GMSA - Five states will announce today that they will add at least 300 hours of learning time to the calendar in some schools starting in 2013. They are Colorado, Connecticut, Massachusetts, New York and Tennessee. The initiative is intended to boost student achievement and make U.S. schools more competitive on a global level. The three-year pilot program will affect almost 20,000 students in 40 schools. Schools will decide whether to make the school day longer, add more days to the school year, or both.

12/07/12 NOON NEWS – KIPP, a dual language magnet elementary school that opened its doors to students couple of months ago, opened up to the public this morning to show off its unique way of learning. KSAT 12's Jenna Hiller was at KIPP "Un Mundo's" Open House and tells us the program is not just about teaching a new language, it's about making it easier to learn.

12/18/12 NOON NEWS - There's one Texas town where teachers already carry guns, Harrold, near Wichita Falls. School districts across the nation are looking at Harrold ISD. In 2007, the district adopted a policy called "The Guardian Plan." The policy allows teachers who have concealed handgun licenses to carry a gun with them to school. Harrold ISD's superintendent believes teachers armed with a gun will prevent school shootings and many students and parents agree with him.

12/19/12 10PM NEWS – A threat was phoned in disrupting Cambridge Elementary and other schools in Alamo Heights. Then Judson High School assured parents that rumors on social media of a possible incident were just that, and Somerset ISD's Facebook page also lit up with similar rumors. District Attorney Susan Reed says false alarms in general are Class A misdemeanors, but threats made against a school become a state jail felony. Somerset ISD spokesman Maury Vasquez says threats have been growing in number since the tragedy in Newtown last Friday.

12/19/12 4PM NEWS – An East Central High School student is facing criminal charges after being arrested at school for making threats. A school district spokesperson says what the 16-year-old boy tweeted was "offensive and threatening" though it's still unclear exactly what was said in that tweet. Besides facing criminal charges in Juvenile Court, the teen faces disciplinary action from the district.

12/20/12 5PM NEWS – While they may wear different uniforms, San Antonio Police Chief William McManus wants fellow Chiefs in all of the city's school districts to all be on the same page. McManus brought them all together in response to last Friday's school shooting in Connecticut which left 20 children dead. He says they need to share more than feelings. They have to be ready to work together if something like that should happen here. It's a goal he had already been working toward long before Connecticut's tragedy. McManus says he held a meeting with some of the Chiefs last month. This time he also brought university police into the loop.

12/28/12 6PM NEWS – The tug of war between Governor Rick Perry and state universities is going strong heading into the upcoming legislative session. Perry wants schools to lock in four year tuition rates, offer cheaper degrees and graduate more students more quickly. And he wants schools to earn some of the funding they get by tying at least 10% of the money to how many students graduate. University leaders are asking the legislature to pump more money into higher education instead of making cuts.



**ENVIRONMENT, ENERGY, and TRANSPORTATION**, including natural disasters, pollution (especially air and water), the water crisis, and the effect of urban sprawl.

October:

- 10/01/12 4PM NEWS – Bexar County is the 19th largest county in the U.S. And according to the Sierra Club, Bexar County sits at number 10 in total gas consumption, at 328 gallons per person per year.
- 10/05/12 GMSA – The Draining of the Riverwalk is a no-go for next year. The City elected not to drain the river last year after completing a two-year project to improve water quality and clarity by removing silt. That allowed the City to keep the Riverwalk full all-year long. The City's Public Works Department and Downtown Operations will continue to work together to determine when and if draining is necessary.
- 10/11/12 NOON NEWS – According to a new government report from the Energy Information Administration, a colder winter is expected to cost consumers more in heating bills this year. Colder temperatures are predicted this winter for states east of the Rockies and that includes Texas. As a result, bills for homes using heating oil are estimated to hit a record high, 20% higher than last year. Bills for homes heated with natural gas are expected to go up 15%.
- 10/11/12 GMSA – It's possible your car's airbag is unsafe if it was replaced during the past three years. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration issued a warning this week stating that counterfeit airbags pose a danger to drivers. They say you could be at risk if you had airbags replaced within this time period at a repair shop that is not part of a new car dealership. The agency also warns airbags purchased over the internet may also be unsafe.
- 10/12/12 5PM NEWS – U.S. airlines ended the summer travel season without posting any lengthy tarmac delays in August, a sharp turnaround from a month earlier. There were more long delays in July on airport tarmacs than in the previous eight months combined. Additionally, almost four in five flights were on time in August. Hawaiian and Alaska Airlines held the top spots in the rankings, with United Airlines ranking at the bottom. Additionally, fewer travelers complained about lost or damaged bags in August.
- 10/12/12 NOON NEWS - The new portion of State Highway 130 will be opening sooner than expected. Seguin Mayor Betty Ann Mathies announced that the new stretch of road will open on October 24. The new portion will be the first highway in the country with an 85-mile-per-hour speed limit, and it will be toll free until November 11. After that, it will be 15-cents per mile for toll tag holders.
- 10/17/12 4PM NEWS – SAWS crews spent the night at a massive sewer spill on the city's far north side. The clean-up is set to continue through the day today. The spill happened near the Encino Rio subdivision near Bulverde Road, north of Loop 1604. This is over the Aquifer Recharge Zone. SAWS says more than 50,000 gallons of sewage spilled into a dry creek bed after a pipe broke at sewer lift station off Santa Lucia Road. Crews pumped the waste out of the creek bed and hauled it away.
- 10/22/12 5PM NEWS – Airline pilots were just cleared to trade their clunky flight packs for iPads, so now that raises some questions for passengers. These new FAA approved iPads contain the pilot's aircraft manuals, procedures, airport diagrams and much more information needed in the cockpit. But many people have asked if pilots can use iPads on taxi, take off and landing, why can't the passengers? Airlines have responded saying the pilot's iPads are always in "airplane mode," and there are concerns about the number of passenger tablets being used back in the cabin. American Airlines estimates it will save \$1.2 million each year in fuel costs by getting rid of the extra pounds from the flight packs.
- 10/23/12 6PM NEWS – Prices at the gas pump are expected to continue to fall as the holidays get closer. AAA reports that prices have fallen over the past 11 days to a national average of \$3.69 a gallon. The price may also drop 30-cents by November 22, Thanksgiving Day. Analysts say this decline happens every year because Americans are driving less than they were during the summer and also refineries are making a cheaper, winter blend of gasoline.
- 10/25/12 10PM NEWS – Federal officials are considering fining U.S. airways for allegedly flying a jet 916 times without performing required tests and an inspection. The Federal Aviation Administration says the airline discovered a leaking fuel pump in the right engine of a Boeing 727 2S7 and replaced the pump, but didn't test or inspect it. The FAA says that plane in question was put back into service and it wasn't airworthy. U.S. Airways says it is responding to the FAA's proposed fine of \$354,000 and believes the rules were followed.
- 10/30/12 10PM NEWS – At least 33 people are reported dead and more than seven million homes and businesses are without power due to Super Storm Sandy. Mass transit is shut down across widespread portions of the northeast. New York City is nearly isolated, but off by car, train and air. President Obama has declared New York and New Jersey major disaster areas.



November:

- 11/08/12 NOON NEWS – Airline flights will be more crowded and more expensive this year. According to Airlines for America, nearly 24 million people are expected to fly between Friday, November 16 and Tuesday, November 27, about 150,000 more than last year. And worse, there are fewer planes flying because of skyrocketing fuel prices. Flights could be close to 90% full on the busiest travel days of the year.
- 11/09/12 10PM NEWS - Up in New York, gasoline is difficult to come by in the wake of Super Storm Sandy. So police are at gas stations enforcing a new fuel rationing plan. Motorists are allowed to fill up every other day. Many stations are running out of gas before people even reach the pump. North of the city, an Orange County man was charged with running down a police officer after he was told to move his car from a gas line because it was blocking traffic. More than 500,000 energy customers are still living without power and many of them need the gasoline to keep generators running in the ice cold nor'easter.
- 11/15/12 NOON NEWS – Passengers are stranded at airports across the country because of another major computer outage affecting United Airlines. This is at least the third outage United has experienced since June. The airline is working to resolve the issue.
- 11/15/12 GMSA – BP has agreed to pay the largest criminal penalty in U.S. history. It's going to pay \$4.5 billion for the 2010 oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico. A source says BP will plead guilty to obstruction for lying to congress about how much oil was pouring out of the ruptured well. BP has also agreed to plead guilty to 11 felony counts related to workers' deaths in the explosion at the Deepwater Horizon Oil Rig, which led to the giant spill.
- 11/15/12 5PM NEWS – The Mayor says it's like sticker shock when talking about the 9.9% rate increase proposed by SAWS for next year that would increase rates on average a little less than \$5.00 a month. Over the next few weeks, the proposal will get close scrutiny. The city is experiencing sewer system backups and break downs. There is also the rising demand for water.
- 11/16/12 4PM NEWS – Mayor Julian Castro announced the City's "Bike Share" program is expanding. San Antonio "B-Cycle" will now have six new stations along the Mission Reach. They'll provide cyclists with a new way to access and experience our City's Missions National Historical Park and the San Antonio River Improvement Project.
- 11/19/12 6PM NEWS – Gas prices have dropped more than seven cents over the past two weeks, but have risen in some areas affected by Super Storm Sandy. The national average for a gallon of Regular Unleaded gasoline now stands at \$3.47, down more than 36-cents over the past six weeks. Here in Texas, the average is \$3.13, and in San Antonio the average has dropped 1.9-cents over the past week to \$3.16.
- 11/20/12 5PM NEWS – Ford is set to unveil its smallest engine. It's all part of the race to meet stricter government fuel efficiency standards. The 2014 Ford Fiesta will be the first North American vehicle to get a new 1-liter, three cylinder eco-boost engine when it goes on sale next year. Automakers say it will be the most fuel efficient non-hybrid and should see mileage of well over 40-miles per gallon.
- 11/20/12 10PM NEWS – A local judge ruled not to dismiss a case involving more than 400 tickets issued by Bexar County Towing. The case will go to trial. The towing company is facing fines for consistently charging over \$250.00 for towing a vehicle from private property, far above the city's \$85 cap. Earlier this year, the City started to actively enforce the fee cap ordinance put in place in 2002. The case is scheduled to go to trial on November 27. Bexar Towing will have to pay up to \$1,000 per violation if found guilty.
- 11/22/12 4PM NEWS – A new report shows that the nation's worst drought in decades is getting worse. The weekly U.S. Drought Monitor Report shows that 60.1% of the continental U.S. was in some form of drought as of Tuesday, up from 58.8% the previous week. A large portion of the lower 48 states is in extreme or exceptional drought.
- 11/27/12 10PM NEWS – VIA is proposing regular bus services fees to increase from \$1.10 to \$1.20, with regular half fare going up to 60-cents. The Month Big Pass would go up from \$30 to \$35, with the half-fare Pass going up to \$17.50. Some riders say if the price goes up, they want better service.

December:

- 12/03/12 GMSA - Ford is recalling more than 89,000 Escape SUVs and Fusion sedans because the engines can overheat and cause fires. The automaker is working on a fix and is telling owners to contact dealers who will arrange for loaner cars until repairs are done.
- 12/03/12 NOON NEWS – Despite collecting an estimated \$36 billion in revenue this year from food, drinks, Wi-Fi and checked bags fees, the airlines are looking for more ways to generate revenue. At an airline information conference last week, representatives met with various businesses to discuss ways to maximize airline passenger fees. Among the ideas were new forms of travel insurance and giving travelers the chance to pre-order premium meals for their flight.



- 12/04/12 5PM NEWS – Texas is said to lead the nation in the DWI fatalities, many of those in San Antonio including the high profile death of a San Antonio police officer and the crash that cost another officer his leg. One of their academy classmates, working radar was hit from behind by an alleged six-time offender. Texas is one of the few states without sobriety checkpoints. Earlier efforts rejected by state and federal courts are not keeping lawmakers from trying again. MADD's Executive Director, Jennifer Northway, says it's not like every person that is stopped has a standard field sobriety test as they're going through a checkpoint. They would need probably cause first. However, civil liberties groups worry what's next, are they going to go to profiling? They say educating the public, even from an early age, would be better.
- 12/07/12 4PM NEWS – "Airplane Mode" may soon be a thing of the past. According to the New York Times, the chairman of the FCC is urging the Federal Aviation Administration to allow more electronics aboard planes. The article says the head of the FCC sent a letter to the FAA requesting the use of tablets, e-readers and portable devices from take-off to landing. Right now, the FAA requires passengers to turn off their electronic devices during takeoff.
- 12/12/12 6PM NEWS –The National Transportation Safety Board has issued a recommendation to try and stop wrong way driving, drunk drivers. The Board recommends that all states require ignition interlock devices for convicted drunk drivers, even first-time offenders. Drunk driving deaths account for about a third of the nation's 32,000 traffic deaths each year.
- 12/12/12 VIA trustees gave the green light last night to much talked about fare increases. Fares for regular bus service will increase by 10-cents. Via-Trans services will go up 20-cents. The biggest increase will be to the monthly Big Pass, which will go up by \$5.00. VIA says even with the increases, their fares are still lower than other major cities in Texas. If approved by the local governmental approval committee, the new fare will go into effect on February 1, 2013.
- 12/14/12 GMSA – American Airlines rolled out new fares. The airline company will charge \$68 or \$88 per round trip for economy-class passengers who want a ticket that lets them check baggage or change the reservation without another fee. The carrier says the move is in response to customer complaints about fees.
- 12/18/12 NOON NEWS – Toyota has been served a hefty fine by the U.S. government. The auto giant will pay a record \$17.4 million for failing to report problems quickly and delaying a safety recall. That hefty fine comes from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and is the maximum allowed by law. The NHTSA said Toyota failed to report acceleration problems in the Lexus SUVs in time.
- 12/19/12 5PM NEWS – Monica Caban is paralyzed from the waist down due to a cycling accident, and is now a huge advocate for bike safety. She was on hand as city and law enforcement officials announced a new initiative. Soon public service announcements and a social media campaign will remind drivers and cyclists about the rules of the road. There will also be a big SAPD crackdown enforcing the Safe Passage Ordinance. The ordinance requires drivers to allow at least a three-foot safe passage clearance for cyclists. For commercial vehicles, the safety zone is six-feet. Violation of the ordinance is a Class C misdemeanor with up to a \$200 fine.
- 12/20/12 6PM NEWS – Some kind of substance has been found in the waters of the Gulf of Mexico near where the oil spill was capped more than two years ago. The Coast Guard says the substance is not oil. It was found during an exploratory mission at the sunken Deepwater Horizon platform wreckage. Officials say tests will be done on the mysterious substance.
- 12/23/12 4PM NEWS – This morning, the ramps connecting Loop 1604 to Highway 281 are open. The work wrapped up sooner than expected. That's welcome news for the estimated 40,000 drivers who will use the ramp. But work in the area isn't complete. Crews are still working on bridges on Loop 1604 at Stone Oak, Redland and Gold Canyon, as well as the access roads.
- 12/27/12 10PM NEWS – After two brush fires in just two days, the Commissioners' Court is putting a burn ban into effect in Bexar County. At an emergency meeting they voted in favor of a 90-day burn ban effective immediately. The Fire Marshal sounded the alarm after the latest brush fire flared up yesterday off Mathis Road in south Bexar County. Officials say it was started by children popping fireworks. The Fire Marshal says the increase in fireworks activity this time of year, coupled with dry conditions prompted him to take action.



**ECONOMY**, including inflation, economic development, economic opportunity, welfare, unemployment, job training, labor relations, and consumer issues.

October:

- 10/02/12 10PM NEWS – Good news for CPS Energy rate payers, no rate increase in 2013. The utility company says that CEO Doyle Beneby told the Board of Trustees today that due to streamlined business practices and improved efficiency that the utility will not seek a rate increase next year. CPS Energy says it last raised rates in February 2010. Beneby did tell the board that he doesn't expect this trend to continue, but added that his staff is doing its best to reduce costs before asking for higher rates.
- 10/04/12 GMSA – Last year, the average college graduate left with a degree and \$27,000 in debt. A big reason Governor Perry this week called for state universities to freeze tuition for freshmen and create \$10,000 degree programs. Local universities are taking different approaches to that goal and they all don't include lowering tuition. Texas A&M SA this fall started offering what they call their affordable degree program in Cybersecurity. UTSA wants to lower students' overall costs by having them spend less time in school. Less than 10% of students there graduate within four years.
- 10/05/12 NOON NEWS – Mortgage rates have fallen to yet another record low for the second straight week. The rate on a 30-year loan has dropped to 3.36%, down from last week's 3.4%. The declines have led more homeowners to refinance, a trend that could help boost the economy. Rates have declined since the Federal Reserve's announcement that it would buy \$40 billion of mortgage backed securities a month to help support the housing market and stimulate the economy.
- 10/11/12 5PM NEWS – After years of layoffs, it looks like teaching jobs are making a comeback. According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics, local school districts added close to 80,000 jobs between July and September. It's the strongest summer hiring since 2006. One reason for the hiring boom is government budgets have started to recover. The Census Bureau says local and state tax revenues have been gradually increasing since 1010. Economists say it's not enough to keep up with the growing number of students though.
- 10/12/12 GMSA – The Labor Department reports about 339,000 people filed for first-time jobless benefits last week. That's 30,000 fewer than the week before, and the lowest number of weekly claim filings since 2008. The agency believes California did not submit all its unemployment claims so that low number could go back up next week.
- 10/17/12 6PM NEWS – Target stores recently announced that it will match prices from Amazon.com, BestBuy.com, Toys-R-Us.com, and Babies-R-Us.com, according to news reports. This move comes just days after rivals Best Buy and toys-R-Us said they would match prices of their competitors like Amazon, Wal-Mart and Sears. Retailers are changing their tactics because online holiday sales are expected to increase 12% this year to \$96 billion.
- 10/22/12 NOON NEWS – Gas prices dropped more than eight-cents over the past two weeks. According to AAA, the national average for Unleaded gasoline is down to \$3.66 a gallon. Texas' average is at \$3.44 a gallon and in San Antonio, the average is \$3.40 a gallon.
- 10/24/12 10PM NEWS – The age of retirement has steadily been moving up, but a growing number of middle class Americans are planning to postpone their golden years until their 80s. Wells Fargo surveyed 1,000 adults with income of less than \$100,000. The survey found 30% of them plan to work until they are 80 years old or older, up from 25% a year ago. A Wells Fargo spokesman says it's very tough to save for retirement and the answer seems to be to keep working later in life.
- 10/25/12 5PM NEWS – Young adults are making big moves in the fledgling economic recovery, leaving college towns and parents' homes and heading out of state at the highest rate since the height of the housing boom. New census data offers a detailed look at U.S. migration, which fell to a record low in early 2011. The latest numbers show that adults ages 25-29 had the biggest gain in interstate migration in 13 years. They are striking out on their own to test the job market in such urban, high-tech Meccas as Denver, Seattle and Austin.

November:

- 11/02/12 6PM NEWS – Cheaper gas, rising home prices and lower unemployment have all given consumers the confidence to spend more money. Retailers, auto dealers and manufacturers are all benefiting from this increased spending. However, employers remain anxious about the economy leading to a forecast of only moderate hiring gains when today's Job Report for October is released.



- 11/06/12 5PM NEWS - Trimming some costs right now can help consumers stash some cash before Black Friday. To find extra cash in your budget, 1) stop paying for text messages and potentially overage fees with a variety of free texting apps, 2) Dig in your wallet to find and sell unwanted gift cards. An online gift card exchange won't give the full value of the card, but it's better than nothing. 3) Adjust your tax withholding instead of waiting for the usual fat refund in the spring.
- 11/13/12 GMSA – The government is on a path to another \$1 trillion plus deficit. The Treasury Department says the October deficit was 22% higher than the same month last year. The budget year began on October 1 with a \$120 billion deficit. The government has run deficits in excess of \$1 trillion each of the last four years.
- 11/14/12 4PM NEWS – The our week days following Thanksgiving weekend are probably the best time for you to shop if you're not one of those shoppers who wants to deal with the Black Friday crowds. According to Retail Analyzer Shopper Trak, those are the days you are likely to find the lightest crowds, better customer service, as well as some remaining discounts at the mall.
- 11/14/12 NOON NEWS – A special job fair is taking place tomorrow. It's designed so Texas veterans can connect with employers who are looking for military experience. Veterans will be able to apply starting at 10AM. It will then open to the public at Noon and will go on until 3:30PM at the Freeman Expo Hall. There will be more than two dozen employers including Holt Cat, Haliburton, and the Texas Department of Public Safety.
- 11/16/12 10PM NEWS – The Federal Housing Administration's savings account is tapped out. Officials say the agency has exhausted its reserves, which are used to back up many home mortgages. That means the FHA will have to institute another round of measures to shore up its finances. In a report released today, the FHA said it is facing losses of \$16.3 billion and may require taxpayer support.
- 11/19/12 5PM NEWS – San Antonio Mayor Julian Castro continues his visit in the United Kingdom today. He's on a trade mission for economic development. He and some representatives from local companies, like CPS Energy, Rackspace, and Valero, were invited by the British government. The Mayor's visit runs through Wednesday.
- 11/19/12 5PM NEWS – More than 300,000 homeowners have received \$26 billion in relief under the terms of the Foreclosure Abuse Settlement. The government says five of the country's largest banks have modified home loans, reduced interest rates, and forgiven debt as part of the settlement. The deal was reached last February between Bank of America, JP Morgan Chase, Wells Fargo, CitiBank and Ally Financial.
- 11/28/12 GMSA – San Antonio Water Systems is asking for feedback on its proposed rate hike. Two community meetings are being held tonight. One is from 6:30-8PM at SAWS Headquarters, Tower II, and from 6-8PM at the Westfall Library at 6111 Rosedale Court. SAWS' proposed rate hike would increase the average monthly bill by about \$5.00. Several more meetings will be held throughout the next month.
- 11/28/12 10PM NEWS – Both Republicans and Democrats agree, no one wants the country to go over the so-called "fiscal cliff." President Obama seems optimistic that a deal will be reached soon. Today the President is urging Americans to use social media to push Congress to act. He wants to focus on the \$2,000 tax increase that would go into effect next year for the average family of four. House Speaker John Boehner said Republicans are committed to a compromise and reiterated his party's willingness to put revenue increases on the table.

#### December:

- 12/03/12 6PM NEWS – Bank of America has shelved plans for new checking account fees that could have affected some 10-million customers. The Wall Street Journal reports the decision to put off new fees, at least until late next year, comes amid a review of the bank's business. Many other big banks, such as JP Morgan Chase and Wells Fargo, have also come up with plans to raise fee revenue or push customers to do more business with them as low interest rates, slow economic growth and tough new rules are limiting bank profits.
- 12/05/12 GMSA – Home prices saw the largest yearly gain since July 2006, rising 6.3% in October. The increase may be one of the reasons behind growing consumer confidence. A home is often a person's biggest investment.
- 12/11/12 5PM NEWS – The economic impact of the Eagle Ford Shale in Bexar County has been very substantial according to former San Antonio Mayor Henry Cisneros, Head of SA Economic Development Foundation. Three major points of impact from last year alone include adding 4200 jobs, taking the county gross product to over \$422 million, and bringing in a payroll of \$186 million. If that benefit of jobs and income is



- going to continue, the City and County have to direct operations more towards the oil industry, like education. It also means infrastructure. The County extended water lines to Halliburton's new complex. The roads also need to be repaired and maintained. County Judge Nelson Wolff secured \$26 million from TXDOT for the area but more is needed to keep this economic impact pumping.
- 12/18/12 4PM NEWS – Six million credit card customers are getting refunds for the holidays. Discover, American Express and Capital One will be paying out \$435 million to customers because of a crackdown on deceptive credit card practices. The deal was announced a few months ago, but payments are just now going out. The refund will show up as a credit on the account. Former customers will receive checks in the mail.
- 12/19/12 NOON NEWS – Tax season is already right around the corner. In San Antonio, the AARP is gathering volunteers to assist the elderly with filing their tax returns. The program is called Tax-aide, and more than 157,000 tax payers used it last year. They will be open once more in 2013, February 1 through April 15. For information on how to volunteer at one of San Antonio's 13 Tax-aide sites, visit [AARP.org/taxaide](http://AARP.org/taxaide).
- 12/20/12 5PM NEWS – This holiday shopping season, many retailers did not offer the same types of blockbuster deals they did last year. Instead they offered things like free shipping and no layaway fee to entice customers. But in this final weekend before Christmas, shoppers can expect to find many 70% off or buy one/get one free signs as stores are trying to salvage what has so far been a disappointing season.
- 12/27/12 NOON NEWS – The average number of people seeking unemployment benefits over the past month fell to the lowest level since March 2008. The Labor Department says weekly applications dropped by 12,000 to a seasonally adjusted 350,000 last week. The average for the past four weeks fell to a nearly five-year low, just under 357,000.
- 12/27/12 10PM NEWS – Ford is investing millions of dollars to create thousands of new jobs. The American automaker announced it is investing more than \$773 million on new equipment and production capacity in half a dozen plants in southeast Michigan. Ford says the investments will create more than 2,300 new hourly jobs and help keep more than 3,200 others. It's all part of Ford's plans to add 12,000 hourly jobs in the U.S. and invest more than \$6 billion in American plants by 2015.
- 12/31/12 6PM NEWS – Ten states are boosting minimum wage in the New Year, but Texas isn't one of them. According to the non-profit advocacy group The National Employment Law Project, workers in Rhode Island will see the biggest paycheck increases, an average of \$510 a year for the average worker. Arizona, Colorado, Florida, Missouri, Montana, Ohio, Oregon, Vermont and Washington State will all see minimum wage go up by 10-cents to 15-cents an hour.
- 12/31/12 10PM NEWS – Today Congress said it won't meet the midnight deadline to avert the "fiscal cliff." Within the last hour, the House has said it will not vote tonight, but it could still vote tomorrow and save the day at the very last minute.

October:

- 10/02/12 4PM NEWS – Azalea Gallon is the organizer for the Eastwood Neighborhood National Night Out, which is being held at W.W. White Elementary School. The plan is to highlight the good that area has to offer. She and her neighbors want to make this a neighborhood that their grandkids can live in, but they understand the temptations. Gallon's neighborhood has been a consistent rough spot for police with shootings, stabbings and robberies. She says it's frustrating and that everyone in the neighborhood needs to get involved and National Night Out is a great way to do it. Dozens of volunteers will help out not only with fun and games, but practical things too like finger printing kids for the National Lost Children Database.
- 10/04/12 GMSA – A 7th grade student is finding herself in some serious trouble after making a bomb threat to a Northside ISD middle school. The student admitted to district police that she made the threat to Briscoe Middle School yesterday. Police made a sweep of the school this morning and found nothing. The school's robo-call system called the parents of the 1,200 students to let them know what happened. The student was arrested in the school's office and now faces a felony charge.
- 10/04/12 NOON NEWS – A federal grand jury today indicted five men on drug charges. They were involved in a chase that ended with two children dead. David Rodriguez, Michael Gomez, Brock Lassiter, Joseph Whitley and John Salinas were all indicted on charges of possession with the intent to distribute marijuana. Police started following Rodriguez and it ended when he collided with another vehicle, killing Three-year-old Walter Maspero and his one-year-old brother Wesley. Rodriguez has also been charged with capital murder.
- 10/04/12 4PM NEWS – Police arrested 20-year-old Sean Burke and he's been charged with vehicle burglary. Sheriff's detectives were investigating a case where one of their patrol cars had been burglarized outside a deputy's home last month. Items were stolen and pawned. While detectives were looking at surveillance video from the pawn shop, they noticed another man pawning a GPS system. They checked out that GPS too and found it belonged to a man who lived across the street from the deputy that had his car burglarized. Burke was the man in the surveillance video.
- 10/09/12 GMSA – More than a dozen assault rifles and thousands of rounds of ammunition were uncovered at a southside home. The San Antonio Police Narcotics Unit was executing a search warrant around 1AM today when the discovery was made in the 300 block of Stonewall. They think the rifles were headed to Mexico. A 36-year-old man, a Mexican citizen, was arrested at the home. Police suspect he was part of a group that was providing weapons for a drug cartel. They also think others in the group were getting drugs from Mexico and distributing them here.
- 10/11/12 5PM NEWS – The man accused in the ambush murder of Sheriff Deputy Kenneth Vann now has a court date for his capital murder trial. Sheriff's Deputy Vann was shot and killed as he stopped at an intersection in his marked patrol car. Fifty-four-year-old Mark Anthony Gonzalez is accused of killed Vann. Judge Mary Roman set jury selection for August 2, 2013 with testimony to begin on September 3. Gonzalez's lawyers "re-urged" their motion to have the trial moved out of San Antonio due to extensive publicity the case received. Roman said she would consider the request if finding qualified jurors becomes a problem.
- 10/12/12 6PM NEWS - The man suspected of killed former Atascosa County Commissioner Tommy Shearrer has now been found dead. Today the body of 19-year-old Manuel De Los Reyes Galeas was found just a short distance from where commissioner Shearrer's body was uncovered. On Wednesday Shearrer was found shot to death in his pickup truck. Atascosa Sheriff Investigators say it looks like Galeas took his own life.
- 10/15/12 NOON NEWS – A 26-year veteran of the Bexar County Sheriff's office remains on administrative leave after shooting and killing a 19-year-old man. The shooting happened on the northwest side early yesterday. According to the Sheriff's office, Sergeant Frank Bellino stopped to investigate a suspicious man near the intersection of FM1560 and Culebra Road. After talking with the 19-year-old, Bellino says the man lunged at him and tried to push the Sergeant into traffic. The department says Bellino was forced to open fire on the man, shooting him several times. Witnesses say the man killed might be the same person seen acting strangely at a Valero nearby before the shooting.



- 10/17/12 10PM NEWS – According to the U.S. Bureau of Justice Statistics, the nation is seeing a spike in the number of violent crimes for the first time in 20 years. Its National Crime Victimization survey was just released today. The government says violent crimes rose by 18% last year. Property crimes were up 11%, the first increase in a decade. Authors of the survey say the increase is largely the result of the historically low crime rate from 2010. The Department of Justice says its annual report looks at interviews with 75,000 Americans about personal and property crimes such as rape, robbery, burglary, assault and vehicle theft.
- 10/18/12 10PM NEWS – the San Antonio Police Department is fighting back against domestic violence by hosting its first ever Violence Intervention Conference. It's being held today and tomorrow at Our Lady of the Lake University in observance of National Domestic Violence Month.
- 10/19/12 10PM NEWS – The "Move Over" or "Slow Down" law is designed to protect police and emergency personnel working along the side of freeways. Even though it's been in place since 2003, it hasn't been adhered to very much, so now police all across the region are cracking down on violators of this law.
- 10/24/12 4PM NEWS – Two soldiers, formerly based at Fort Sam Houston, are in federal custody today, arrested on accusations of producing child pornography. According to the FBI, 26-year-old Sergeant Wade Allen Perkins, and 24-year-old Sergeant Kimberly Epperson, filmed the molestation of a three year old boy during their time at Fort Sam Houston. The alleged abuse happened last year.
- 10/25/12 10PM NEWS – Chief Bill McManus is pleased with the recent crime statistics that show a drop in crime over the past 36 months, but he's not declaring victory. Right now city-wide violent crime is down 5.2% from a year ago, property crimes are down by 1.7% and narcotics arrests increased by nearly 26%. The Chief credits his substation commanders and the officers for the drop. After a series of deadly shootings on the city's east side, SAPD increased crime fighting efforts, helping drop violent crime by nearly 6%, property crimes rose by 2%, and drug arrests were up by 19.6%. Today, the San Antonio Housing Authority announced it was being awarded a \$600,000 grant from the Justice Department for safety improvements on the east side. McManus says partnerships like this are more effective than just trying to arrest the problem away.
- 10/26/12 5PM NEWS – The Presa and Roosevelt corridor on the city's southside is a stretch plagued with drugs, prostitution and abandoned homes. But Councilwoman Leticia Ozuna wants to change that with the help of those who live in the neighborhood. A public meeting was held last night. Councilwoman Ozuna heard from several residents and says this area needs to turn things around along with broad support from those who can bring in money, create partnerships between the businesses and the neighborhoods.
- 10/30/12 6PM NEWS – Skipping school is not just a delinquency problem, it's a criminal act for both the student and the student's parents. That's why the Truancy Court in San Antonio is launching a "Truancy Roundup." Truant kids and their parents are put on notice that they can be picked up starting November 12 for failure to appear in court. Justice of the Peace Roger Lopez says about half the students called to his court for truancy don't bother to show up there either. Judge Lopez strongly suggests school and court "no shows" come forward now and get the matter cleared up before the constables begin the Roundup on November 12.
- 10/31/12 6PM NEWS – San Antonio's expanding system of greenway trails has helped our city get in shape, but they've also created an opportunity for criminals looking for an easy score. In recent months, several park users have returned to their cars and found they were burglarized. San Antonio Parks Police Captain Raymond Castro says the majority of the break-ins have happened in the O.P. Schnabel Park parking lot, but other trailheads have also been targeted. Last night, Castro briefed the Linear Creekway Parks Advisory Board about the efforts to reduce the crime.

#### November:

- 11/02/12 4PM NEWS – Seventy-year-old Frank Navarijo is facing his accuser for the first time in 13 years. She was five-years-old when she testified that Navarijo, a retired police officer, had sexually assaulted her. She testified at the trial in 1999 that Navarijo, a relative, had inappropriate sexual contact with her. He was convicted of aggravated sexual assault of a child and sentenced to 20-years in prison. In the summer of 2011 this victim, now an adult, came forward to recant her testimony. Her motivation was guilt she said. The next step is for Judge Maria Teresa Herr to make a recommendation to the Court of Criminal Appeals. They will decide whether to overturn Navarijo's conviction or let it stand.
- 11/09/12 GMSA – Two local men are headed to prison for their roles in a bogus military recruiting scheme. Grant Bibb of Eagle Pass, and Paul Escobar of San Antonio, pleaded guilty to collecting referral bonuses on



- enlistees who joined the military. The pair, and at least three other men, allegedly raked in nearly a quarter of a million dollars. Bibb was sentenced to a year and a day in federal prison. Escobar received a six-month term followed by six months of community confinement.
- 11/09/12 5PM NEWS – Auto burglary is an epidemic. Basically, if you don't want it stolen, don't put it in your car. Strong words from KSAT Crime Specialist Eddie Gonzales. In the KSAT parking lot, he tells us thieves go by what they see. Walking around our parking lot, a good chunk of the cars are easy targets to get broken into. So the advice, don't make yourself a target. Tinted windows are good, as is not leaving any valuables inside your vehicle to tempt burglars.
- 11/09/12 5PM NEWS – A team of Palo Alto College students has a deadly mystery to solve. The only person who is playing is 10-year-old Elijah Parker, covered in fake blood and role playing as a murder victim. The forensics students are collecting clues – dusting for fingerprints, and poring over blood splatters. Throughout the semester, they've been learning the process for collecting evidence and investigating different kinds of crime scenes. This was their first chance to actually put it all into action.
- 11/12/12 NOON NEWS – A 16-year-old is in jail today after he was caught tagging city property. The teen was caught just after midnight on Michigan Avenue. The suspect was tagging basketball goal backboards at a city park. Neighbors spotted the teen climbing the fence and called police. He was quickly caught with paint all over him. The park, which just opened a month ago, has about \$500 worth of damage. the teen will now be charged with a felony since the park is city property.
- 11/12/12 6PM NEWS – Phone scammers are costing Americans Two billion dollars a year in unauthorized charges. Kristi Pena with the Better Business Bureau says the top three scams are identity theft, skimming, and over charging you and pocketing the cash.
- 11/13/12 10PM NEWS – David Germer's return home Sunday afternoon took a bad turn when a neighbor called to say his front door was wide open. The Beacon Hill resident found his home had been broken into. While police investigated, news of the break-in traveled much faster than word of mouth by cyberspace on Beacon Hill's Association website. Everett Ives, Beacon Hill Neighborhood Association, says while fighting crime wasn't the intent of the page, it's slowly become another weapon to keep their neighborhood safe. He feels it's because they communicate with their greater community through Facebook and meet face-to-face once a month in their meetings. Gilbert De La Portilla, KSAT Crime Expert, says good communication will prevent a lot of things, especially communication within the associations.
- 11/21/12 10PM NEWS – Yesterday, the Sabinal Police Department assisted the U.S. Marshal and Attorney General's offices in arresting 35-year-old Jason Villasana on charges of child pornography. Sabinal Chief of Police Jesus Reyes says Villasana had been with his Police Department full time since August and that they did administer a criminal background check, but nothing came up. Along with some items from his house, investigators also confiscated a laptop from his patrol car and he was fired from the department.
- 11/26/12 6PM NEWS – Two Bexar County men have been arrested for human trafficking. Police say it appears Diontay Sherrod and Joshua Laluz, both in their mid-20s, forced a 17-year-old girl to work as a prostitute and then hand over the money to her captors. The men were caught when police got a tip that the victim's debit card was being misused. Officers found Sherrod Laluz and their 17-year-old victim at a motel along I-10 West. When police knocked, the girl answered the door and told them what was going on.
- 11/28/12 10PM NEWS – It's the day after Thanksgiving and for Police Explorers, that means it's time to get to work, from patrolling the parking lot at Ingram Park Mall, to keeping an eye out for suspicious activity, and making sure the shoppers are safe. For 15-year-old Lisanna Castillo, this is her second year in the San Antonio Police Department's Explorers Program. The program allows young people between the ages of 14 and 21 to explore a career in law enforcement through classes and some hands-on training. Training today includes checking parked cars for unlocked doors, or for exposed valuables and leaving warning cards behind. But most importantly, program directors say the cadets in training are a visible deterrent against crime.
- 11/28/12 GMSA – The arrest of a southeast side man may have helped to prevent bloodshed at a local mosque. Police say he threatened to shoot and kill worshippers at the religious building.
- 11/29/12 4PM NEWS – Thirty-eight-year-old Jose Farias is charged with continuous sexual abuse of a child. Farias is the son of San Antonio Representative, Joe Farias. According to the indictment, the younger Farias sexually abused the young boy repeatedly between July 1 and September 23, 2012. The alleged victim was younger than 14-years-old at the time of the abuse.



December:

- 12/05/12 GMSA – According to the New Braunfels Herald-Zeitung, New Braunfels police say someone broke through a window at the New Braunfels Ninth Grade Center late Sunday and took off with about 30 iPads, several laptops and computer accessories. School officials say six classrooms and several offices were affected. Parents were alerted to the break-in via the school district's new alert system.
- 12/05/12 NOON NEWS – A grand jury indicted a former teacher who is accused of telling her kindergarten students to line up and slaps a classmate for being a bully. Forty-three-year-old Cynthia Ambrose was indicted on a charge of official oppression. The incident allegedly happened at Salinas Elementary in the Judson ISD. An investigation revealed that at least seven children allegedly slapped the six-year-old child. Ambrose is no longer employed with the district and faces one year in jail and up to a \$4,000 fine if convicted.
- 12/06/12 GMSA – The Seguin-Gazette reports that more than 800 clients of the Seguin EMS may have had their information stolen by a computer hacker. The hacker was gathering data from Advanced Data Processing, a billing company that does business as Intermedix. The company determined an employee illegally accessed billing information. That employee was immediately fired. Besides Seguin, five other Texas entities are affected.
- 12/06/12 NOON NEWS – An Appellate Court has overturned the manslaughter convictions of a Schertz couple accused of the 2008 death of an eight-year-old girl. Eight-year-old Sarah Brasse died in 2008 from complications of appendicitis and a Guadalupe County jury found that the couple didn't get her the medical attention she needed. In 2011, David Brasse and Samantha Britain Brasse were each sentenced to three year terms for manslaughter and injury to a child by reckless omission. However, the Fourth Quarter of appeals handed down opinions reversing the manslaughter convictions.
- 12/10/12 4PM NEWS – Charmain Barcenas, also known as Charmaine Cortez, is wanted on three warrants including "exploitation of the elderly," and "theft from the elderly." Anyone with information about her whereabouts can call Crime Stoppers at 224-STOP. They could be eligible for a \$500 reward.
- 12/11/12 5PM NEWS – College and parties, the two always seem to go together, but too much of a fun thing is creating a growing concern in the area around UTSA. Its population of students is growing and so is the noise and some say crime in neighborhoods where they live.
- 12/12/12 4PM NEWS – San Antonio police need help in tracking down some stolen car batteries, some 700 in fact. On December 1, someone broke in through the back of Exide Technologies on Loop 410. Once inside, they managed to take off with more than 18 pallets of batteries. The cost ranges from \$20,000 to \$100,000 worth of merchandise. Anyone with information about this crime should contact Crime Stoppers at 224-STOP.
- 12/13/12 6PM NEWS – The Department of Public Safety's CODIS Database reaches a major milestone this week. It's a DNA comparison system used throughout the country where felons give DNA that can be tested against evidence from other crimes. It's helped solve thousands of unsolved crimes.
- 12/14/12 5PM NEWS – A fugitive who fled from a trial in Caldwell County last week is finally back in jail today. The Lone Star Fugitive Task Force arrested 22-year-old Pedro Javier Quintero in the 400 block of Heimer Road on the northside yesterday. Quintero was on trial for the 2009 aggravated sexual assault of a 15 year old along with three other defendants. The trial went on without him. It resulted in a guilty verdict and a 48-year state prison sentence.
- 12/18/12 10PM NEWS – Immigration and Customs Enforcement, or ICE, works daily to bring fugitive immigrants to justice but the six day operation, Bear 3, cast a wider and stickier web. The operation covered 54 counties in Texas. Of the 90 people picked up, 25 of them were in San Antonio, and the Rio Grande Valley hauled in more than a third of them. Seven countries represented those arrested, with 83 from Mexico. The majority of them are already in immigrations proceedings waiting to be deported.
- 12/20/12 10PM NEWS – SAPD reports they arrested 22-year-old Aliesha Sams yesterday afternoon. According to an arrest affidavit, Sams told police she noticed injuries on her son, Jaden William Sanders, after leaving him alone with her boyfriend, Anthony Arista, but never sought medical attention. In July 2012, paramedics found her nine-month-old son unresponsive in a room at the Rodeway Inn on Austin Highway where they lived with Arista. The child had what looked like a cigarette burn on his back and blood in his mouth. The Bexar County Medical Examiner determined it was abuse and ruled the cause of death as head trauma. Arista was named as suspect. Sams admitted to police she knew Arista had a violent temper and suspected he had beaten the baby.
- 12/20/12 10PM NEWS – Sergeant Lisa Castellano says when she went to work on Sunday night, it was just an ordinary day, but when a man opened fire at the theater she was working at, she knew she had to stop



him, which she did. Today, the Bexar county Sheriff's Office is recognizing her for her quick actions and for saving a lot of lives. Castellano saw the shooter run into the bathroom. When he walked out still armed with a gun, she demanded he drop it. When he ignored her commands, she fired several shots. Off duty SAISD Officer Armando Olgin ran over to help Castellano detain the shooter. He was also honored today.

12/27/12 GMSA – An affidavit says 56-year-old Horace Drewry was in a work release program where he's allowed to leave jail to work during the day, and then report back at night. Instead, Bexar County Jail officials say he left last Monday and kept going. Although Drewry was involved in the work release program here, his crime happened in Georgia. He served seven years there in connection with a 1994 case of indecency with a child. According to the affidavit, he transferred his case to Bexar County in September.

12/31/12 4PM NEWS – Funeral arrangements have been made for Officer Edrees Mukhtar. His memorial service will be held at Porter Loring Funeral Home downtown on McCullough. Mukhtar died Saturday from injuries suffered in a crash on December 10. Police say Mukhtar was responding to a non-emergency call when he hit a wet patch and lost control. He skidded into the other lane and hit an on-coming truck. Mukhtar had been with the Department for about a year and a half.

October:

- 10/03/12 GMSA – The U.S. has started flying illegal immigrants from Mexico back to their home country. The pilot program started yesterday with the departure of 131 Mexicans. The flights are set to run twice a week out of El Paso through the end of November. These flights are not voluntary and are paid for by the U.S. government. The Mexican government is paying for the immigrants to get to their homes from Mexico City.
- 10/03/12 NOON NEWS – Tonight is the first of two debates between Republican candidate Ted Cruz and Democrat candidate Paul Sadler, both looking to replace outgoing Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison. Sadler says the debate will let him expose what he calls Cruz's extreme values. Cruz's campaign says this debate will allow him to express what Texans want, a change in Washington.
- 10/03/12 NOON NEWS – Mayor Julian Castro took part in an exercise today that showcased the city's ability to prevent a cyber attack from shutting down our city. Cyber Day SA is a collaboration between the City Office of Emergency Management, the city's Information Technology Department and UTSA. The purpose of today's exercise is to improve on a plan to protect the city's networks. The Mayor says cities like San Antonio rely on networks to control everything from electricity to traffic lights and that an attack on those network would be chaotic.
- 10/04/12 4PM NEWS – According to a CNN/ORC International Poll, Wednesday's Presidential debate had a clear winner and it was Mitt Romney. Sixty-seven percent of registered voters who watched the debate said the GOP nominee won. Twenty-five percent said President Obama came out the winner. For the survey, 430 adult Americans were interviewed by telephone after the end of the debate.
- 10/04/12 5PM NEWS – Texas Attorney General Greg Abbott today agreed to stop purging names of people believed to be deceased from the voting rolls after it turned out some are actually alive. Officials will continue to remove the names of those who are confirmed to be dead, but if it isn't confirmed, they will stay on. The agreement between the State and Civil Rights attorneys comes a day before both sides were to go to court. Four voters who were notified they were dead, but are alive challenged the move saying it should not be on them to prove they are alive.
- 10/10/12 6PM NEWS – Social Security benefits are expected to go up next year, but not by much. the American Institute for Economic Research estimates recipients can expect a bump of 1.5% to 1.7% in their benefits. That's less than half of the 3.6% cost of living increase recipients received earlier this year when inflation was higher. The Labor Department will release its September inflation reading next week. It's used to calculate the cost of living adjustment made annually to benefits.
- 10/10/12 10PM NEWS – Pre-K 4 SA signs are sprouting everywhere and now we know who's contributing to the plan to increase the sales tax to pay for more early childhood education. HEB has given \$100,000, Rackspace another \$50,000. Toyota is also giving \$50,000 and USAA is giving \$25,000. That has left Mayor Castro feeling confident. Mayor Castro says some opposed to Pre-K 4 SA are spreading misinformation about what he says is a worthwhile project.
- 10/12/12 GMSA – Yesterday the City Council approved an amendment to the City Code that will require caregivers to register with the City. District 5 Councilman David Medina introduced the ordinance in response to the death of 61-year-old Elma Sartuche. She was stabbed to death allegedly by her caregiver, 35-year-old Paul Dominguez. The amendment now requires any caregiver to pay a \$50 fee, which includes a background check and registration fee with police. Family members would not have to register. Violators would face a \$500 fine for each offence. It takes effect January 1.
- 10/12/12 GMSA – Last night's debate was the only one between Vice President Joe Biden and Republican challenger, Congressman Paul Ryan. Ryan and Biden sparred over a wide range of topics in a fast-paced opening 30-minutes. They covered everything from the Libyan Embassy attacks, Iran's nuclear ambitions and the war on terror, to the economy, unemployment, Medicare, and Presidential leadership.
- 10/16/12 NOON NEWS - Secretary of State Hillary Clinton is taking responsibility for security failures at the U.S. Consulate in Libya that left U.S. Ambassador Chris Stevens and three other Americans dead. She says ensuring the safety of U.S. diplomatic staff abroad is her job, not the job of the White House. Secretary Clinton's comments come as Republicans use the attack to criticize the Obama Administration ahead of



the election. Clinton says the U.S. now has Special Forces standing by to strike the suspected terrorists once they've been targeted.

- 10/21/12 10PM NEWS – The Homeowner Taxpayer Association of Bexar County is telling San Antonio voters to say “no” to the City’s Pre-K 4 SA initiative. The group held a news conference at the Bexar Appraisal District office this afternoon to make a final push against the measure. Pre-K 4 SA includes a roughly \$31 million per year tax increase that the HTA says will hit people with lower incomes harder than those who make more money.
- 10/22/12 - 4PM NEWS – Early voting starts today and runs through Friday, November 2. A list of early voting locations, a calendar and sample ballot can be found on KSAT’s website, ksat.com.
- 10/23/12 - 5PM NEWS – It wasn’t as heated as their second match-up, but this final Presidential debate did have plenty of fireworks and fiery exchanges. The debate focused on foreign policy and there was one topic both candidates agree on, the taking out of Osama bin Laden and going after the leadership in Al Qaeda. The sparring points ranged from Libya to Afghanistan to Syria, and the strength of the U.S. military.
- 10/26/12 - 6PM NEWS – Calling it ethically wrong, Republican candidate for Sheriff, Susan Pamerleau weighed in on a KSAT Defenders investigation into the Sheriff’s use of reserve Bexar County Deputies at campaign events. After KSAT’s investigation, the Texas Rangers have opened up an investigation into Bexar county Sheriff Amadeo Ortiz. They will decide whether he abused his power by requiring Reserve Deputies to work at his political campaigns. Pamerleau said the practice needs to stop.
- 10/31/12 10PM NEWS – Bexar County has seen a record number of voters coming out to the polls to vote early this week. Early voting started on Monday and so far, more than 150,000 people have voted. Yesterday, more than 28,000 went to the polls. Early voting ends on November 2.

#### November:

- 11/01/12 10PM NEWS - The Dream Act taking center stage today in the battle over the Congressional seat currently held by Francisco Canseco. Supporters of Pete Gallego today condemned Canseco for opposing the Dream Act, which would give young people who were brought to the U.S. as children a path to citizenship as long as they get an education or join the military.
- 11/01/12 NOON NEWS – a hearing has begun for an Air Force training instructor at Lackland AFB to decide whether he’ll be court-martialed for having sex with trainees. Staff Sergeant Eddy Soto is accused of sexually assaulting two female trainees and having an unprofessional relationship with another woman. Investigators say more than 40 women at Lackland AFB in the past year had inappropriate contact with instructors or were sexually harassed or raped. Five instructors have been convicted since July.
- 11/02/12 NOON NEWS – Sandy Oaks Volunteer Fire Department says it’s not being paid enough money by the Emergency Services District to stay operational. But the ESD says it overpaid the fire department and now has to get that money back. This ongoing dispute could leave this area of Bexar County without a fire department.
- 11/06/12 GMSA – After months of campaigning, Election Day is finally here. Polls are open and Americans are deciding whether to re-elect President Obama or make Mitt Romney the next President.
- 11/06/12 10PM NEWS – Early voting has wrapped up, and more than 300,000 people in Bexar County went to the polls. When early voting started last Monday, it wasn’t uncommon for voters to wait in line for 45-minutes to cast their ballots. But yesterday, the wait was down to about five-minutes. The County’s Election Administrator told us there haven’t been any formal complaints, but there has been some confusion among voters.
- 11/07/12 GMSA - American voters have spoken. They’ve given the Commander in Chief four more years. Returns put President Obama at a projected 303 electoral votes to Romney’s 206, giving the incumbent the 270 electoral votes needed to secure a second term. The President rode a wave of broad support from minorities, women and moderates to win re-election.
- 11/07/12 4PM NEWS – Republican Susan Pamerleau ousted incumbent Democrat Amadeo Ortiz for the office of Bexar County Sheriff. Pamerleau wins with 52% of the vote. She becomes the very first female to head the Bexar County Sheriff’s office.
- 11/07/12 4PM NEWS – Although it was a close race, San Antonio voters approved Mayor Julian Castro’s Pre-K 4 SA initiative. With 100% of the precincts reporting, 54% supported the initiative, 46% opposed. Mayor Castro says those who voted for the measure are investing in the Alamo City for the long term. The initiative raises sales tax on-eighth of a cent to fund full-day Pre-K. The Mayor says roughly 5,700 children are not getting that now.



- 11/07/12 - NOON NEWS – In the race for U.S. Senate, Republican and Tea Party favorite Ted Cruz defeated Democrat Paul Sadler. Cruz will head to Washington as Texas' first Hispanic U.S. Senator.
- 11/08/12 5PM NEWS – Puerto Rico is one step closer to statehood. For the first time, a majority of Puerto Ricans voted in favor of statehood. The Election Day vote was non-binding but marks a shift in attitudes. Puerto Ricans first voted on their desire to reject their current status as a U.S. Commonwealth, and that passed 54% to 46%. In a separate questions, 61% supported statehood. Critics say the results may have been skewed because not all of the options for Puerto Rico's political status were listed in the questions.
- 11/12/12 6PM NEWS – According to a new report from the International Energy Agency, the U.S. is on track to be the world's largest oil producer in less than 10 years. The U.S. is set to beat out Saudi Arabia for the top spot around 2020 and should be energy independent 10 years after that. America's rise to the top is credited to a recent resurgence in oil and gas production and more fuel efficient vehicles.
- 11/13/12 6PM NEWS – Yesterday was the first day lawmakers can pre-file bills in Austin for the upcoming legislative session. Among the bills being filed is one that would provide public schools the funding to have full-day voluntary Pre-K for eligible four-year-olds. Local Representative Mike Villarreal filed the bill and it builds on the Pre-K Initiative passed by San Antonio voters last week. Under state law, children are eligible for Pre-K if they don't speak English, come from low-income families, have been in foster care, or have active duty military parents.
- 11/13/12 6PM NEWS – President Barack Obama is set to turn up the pressure on Congress today to cut the federal debt and avoid the so-called "Fiscal Cliff." Today the President is kicking off a series of meetings with labor officials, business executives and Congressional leaders. The goal is to find agreement on a plan to prevent more financial hardships next year. Analysts have said if the tax hikes and budget cuts go into effect, it could spin the economy back into a recession.
- 11/13/12 10PM NEWS – The FBI is answering questions from members of Congress today who are wondering why they weren't told about the investigation into CIA Director David Petraeus' extramarital affair. Minority Leader Nancy Pelosi said today, while the agency is only required to notify intelligence committees if national security is at risk, it would have been nice to know what was to unfold before seeing it on TV.
- 11/19/12 NOON NEWS – San Antonio Mayor Julian Castro continues his visit in England today. He's on a trade mission for economic development. He and representatives from local companies were invited by the British government. Some of those companies include CPS Energy, Rackspace, Valero Energy, Tesoro and Denim Group. The mayor's visit runs through Wednesday.
- 11/28/12 5PM NEWS – South Texas Congressman Henry Cuellar's bill to beef up border security is on its way to the President's desk. the bill, also known as the Jaime Zapata Border Enforcement Security Task Force Act, was created to target criminal organizations that threaten border security. Zapata was an ICE agent that was killed in 2011 by a cartel gunman on a Mexico highway. Cuellar says the bill will help enhance border security by continuing the practices of Border Enforcement Security Task Force units.
- 11/28/12 10PM NEWS – Governor Rick Perry has appointed another person from San Antonio to be his Secretary of State. The Governor today appointed San Antonio attorney John Steen to the post. He replaces Hope Andrade who is also from San Antonio. She stepped down last week after four years on the job. Besides being the State's Chief Elections Officer, Steen will also serve as the Governor's liaison on border and Mexican affairs.

#### December:

- 12/05/12 NOON NEWS – Here in the U.S., the battle over the looming Fiscal Cliff is intensifying. President Obama pitched his plan to raise taxes on the top earners to the business community this morning. For the first time, the President said raising the debt ceiling, which is the limit on the government's credit card, should be a part of any deal. While the White House and congressional Republicans are still not budging, House Speaker John Boehner said today that Republicans are ready to sit down with the President if he's ready to step up and lead.
- 12/06/12 4PM NEWS – San Antonio's City Council this afternoon approved a one-million dollar expansion to the City's Bicycle Program. The program will add 15 new bike stations, expanding the current 30 stations to 45, and adding 150 new bikes to kiosks. The kiosks will go as far north as the San Antonio Zoo. Work will begin on the expansion in January 2013 after Mayor Castro signs the new ordinance.
- 12/07/12 5PM NEWS – Economists predict the government's monthly Jobs Report will show that employers added fewer than 100,000 workers in November. If so, that would be far below the 171,000 jobs created in



- October. Super Storm Sandy may be part of the reason job creation slowed. But worry over the Fiscal Cliff may have also had an impact.
- 12/07/12 GMSA – Sexually oriented businesses in San Antonio will face stricter rules from now on. City Council has unanimously approved amendments to the City's ordinance regulating sexually oriented businesses. Police Chief Bill McManus says that the changes clarify many things, from what entertainers are allowed to wear, to upping the penalty for violating the ordinance to a Class "A" misdemeanor. The clubs are unhappy with the changes and say they were not consulted. It is possible that the changes will be contested in federal court early next year.
- 12/12/12 GMSA – Governor Rick Perry threw his support behind a ban on abortion after 20 weeks. In Houston Yesterday, Perry said he believes a fetus feels pain at that stage and lawmakers have an obligation to end that kind of cruelty. Perry also says doctors who perform abortions should partner with hospitals for check-ins "in case of emergency." The legislature reconvenes on January 8.
- 12/12/12 6PM NEWS – The City Council is expected to approve a contract for up to \$175,000 with an east coast executive recruiting firm on Thursday. It's a big step in implementing the \$31 million program aimed at providing high quality education for San Antonio children. The Mayor said the search firm's first task is to find what he called "a top notch executive director" to oversee the program. The council is also expected to appoint a Board of Directors tomorrow. The Pre-K 4 SA program calls for the establishment of Pre-K centers in all four quadrants of the city.
- 12/14/12 NOON NEWS – The city's eastside is getting a huge boost today in the effort to revitalize the neighborhood there. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development is awarding the San Antonio Housing Authority a \$30 million grant.
- 12/18/12 4PM NEWS – It's been six weeks since the Presidential election, but Texas' electors are just casting their votes. The State's electors met at the capitol in Austin yesterday. All 38 of the state's electoral votes went to the Mitt Romney/Paul Ryan ticket. Romney won handily in the Texas popular vote back in November. President Barack Obama won 332 electoral votes to Romney's 206.
- 12/18/12 10PM NEWS – In Washington, senior GOP Senator Charles Grassley called for a stud of both gun violence and mental health issues. He made his suggestion yesterday as formerly pro-gun Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said it's time to place gun control on the table.
- 12/18/12 10PM NEWS – Governor Rick Perry says he supports letting teachers and school administrators carry concealed handguns. Governor Perry says it's a policy that should be decided by local school districts. He called the school shooting in Connecticut evil, but said knee-jerk gun control legislation is not the answer.
- 12/19/12 4PM NEWS – A proposed bill to ban assault rifles has the support of President Obama. A White House spokesman says President Obama supports Senator Dianne Feinstein's plan to introduce such a bill. President Obama supported a similar ban in 2008, but didn't press for it in his first term. The President is also expected to announce today that Vice President Joe Biden will lead an inter-agency gun task force. White House Press Secretary Jay Carney says the President also supports closing the gun show loophole for buying guns and would consider a ban in high capacity ammunition clips.
- 12/21/12 6PM NEWS – The House of Representatives passed a bill that would give all American service members a raise. A Congressional committee in charge of combining the House and Senate versions of the bill agreed on a final version that includes a 1.7% across the board pay raise. The compromised bill authorizes more than \$633 billion in funding for the Department of Defense for fiscal year 2013. It also proposes an additional 1,000 Marine security guards to serve at U.S. consulates and embassies around the world. The bill must be passed by the Senate before going to the President for his signature.
- 12/28/12 10PM NEWS – The tug of war between Governor Rick Perry and state universities is going strong heading into the upcoming legislative session. Perry wants schools to lock in four year tuition rates, offer cheaper degrees, and graduate more students more quickly. And he wants schools to earn some of the funding they get by tying at least 10% of the money to how many students graduate. University leaders are asking the legislature to pump more money into higher education instead of making cuts.
- 12/28/12 GMSA – Despite several attempts to stop it, a controversial mandate from the Affordable Healthcare Act requiring companies to provide contraceptives, will go into effect next week. Supreme Court Justice Sonia Sotomayor turned down a request to block that mandate from taking effect on January 1. Several companies filed suit, arguing contraceptive mandate interfere with their religious beliefs against pre-marital sex and abortion. They say they would be damaged if forced to choose between paying fines and complying with the requirement. But Sotomayor says the companies failed to meet the standard for exemption.



12/31/12

NOON NEWS – After a frustrating weekend on Capitol Hill, it looks like negotiators are closing to closing in a possible deal. The mini-deal would extend the current tax rates for households making up to \$450,000, keep the Estate Tax at its current level, extend unemployment benefits, and put off automatic spending cuts to the Pentagon and domestic programs for three months. It does not deal with the debt ceiling.

October:

- 10/10/12 NOON NEWS – A new study on religion in the U.S. shows that fewer people are counting themselves as "believers." The study shows Protestants are no longer the majority and those who say they have no religious affiliation are on the rise.
- 10/10/12 NOON NEWS – Today is the day the Supreme Court will take up Affirmative Action at universities. The high court is hearing arguments over a University of Texas program that uses race as a factor in a quarter of its incoming classes. The case involves a student who sued UT after her college application was rejected in 2008. She says she was turned away because she's white. Opponents say the University is practicing illegal discrimination by considering race at all. The case could mean new limits on Affirmative Action at universities or roll it back entirely.
- 10/12/12 4PM NEWS – Close to 200 employees from NuStar Energy spent part of their day volunteering at the San Antonio Food Bank. It was part of the company's annual United Way Days of Caring. Employees helped build food boxes for children and seniors and sorted food donations that came into the Food Bank.
- 10/15/12 GMSA – Those who receive Social Security will not be getting big benefit increases next year. Preliminary figures show the annual benefit boost will be about 1.2%, which would be among the lowest since automatic adjustments were adopted in 1975. The typical retiree can expect an extra \$12 to \$24 a month.
- 10/17/12 5PM NEWS – A dream has come true for Staff Sergeant Kyle Malin, a mortgage free home. On his fourth tour in Afghanistan, Malin stepped directly on an IED while on a rescue mission for men in his unit. It left Malin a paraplegic. Now he has a place to call home, courtesy of "Helping a Hero," a non-profit who pairs with builders to make dreams like this come true for wounded warriors and their families. The entire house is built specifically for Staff Sergeant Malin, including the bathroom.
- 10/19/12 GMSA – A judge in Hardin County has sided with a group of high school cheerleaders, allowing them to include religious phrases on their signs and banners at football games. The cheerleaders from Kountze High School were granted a temporary injunction which prevents the school district from restricting the language used on the banners and run-throughs at football games. In his order, the judge called the district's policy prohibiting religious expression unlawful, adding it would violate the cheerleaders' Constitutional rights.
- 10/26/12 6PM NEWS – Planned Parenthood has been around since the 1930s and the president of the South Texas organization says it will remain, even if the state doesn't continue funding it. The loss of state funding for its services does change a few things; Planned Parenthood is using a sliding scale according to a woman's income. Despite all the controversy, there is still a state run program online. Texas Women's Health Program provides low income women with family planning services, related screenings and birth control.
- 10/30/12 10PM NEWS – Choosing to smoke these days will mean not being hired by the Baptist Health System. Its "no nicotine" policy began last August. Smoker Sam Mandelbaum says that he would like to hide the fact that he smokes, except he would be tested for nicotine before he could be hired. Baptist Health System reports less than a handful of prospective employees have been affected so far. Current employees are not, but must smoke off-site.
- 10/31/12 4PM NEWS – At Children's Hospital of San Antonio today, hospital staff lined the hallways, some in costume, to give out candy to their little patients. It is all to give the little ones a chance to go "Trick-or-Treating" as if they were at home. Over at University Hospital, a smaller, yet no less enthusiastic crowd was doing the same Trick-or-Treat ritual.

November:

- 11/02/12 NOON NEWS – In honor of the Mexican holiday, Dia De Los Muertos, residents on the city's westside are celebrating by honoring their families and their neighbors. The Esperanza Peace and Justice Center is unveiling 20 new photo banners today. The pictures are from the past, which organizers hope they will shape the future.



- 11/02/12 4PM NEWS – The Milam Building, built in 1929 in downtown San Antonio, is 22 stories high. The building is the host for the first Special Olympics Texas “Over the Edge” event. For raising or donating \$1,000, thrill seekers will get a chance to rappel down the side of the Milam Building. Special Olympics Texas has hosted “Over the Edge” events in Dallas, Houston, and Austin and now it’s a chance for the extreme athlete of San Antonio.
- 11/05/12 5PM NEWS – If you are in the giving mood and want to help someone locally, Meals on Wheels is looking for volunteers. They need 1,000 volunteers to help deliver turkey dinners on Thanksgiving morning. Registered volunteers will pick up the meals at the main offices, but the volunteer must be able to provide his own coolers. Along with delivering meals, volunteers will also be delivering flowers provided by HEB. For information call Christian Senior Services at 210-735-5115.
- 11/07/12 GMSA – About 50 people are waking up in their cars this morning. It’s all part of the “One Night, One Hope” event hosted by the Alamo Area Mutual Housing Association. The group helps homeless veterans and their families. Members of the group are camping in their cars at Woodlawn Lake to mimic the experiences of veterans who have fallen on hard times. They hope their actions can help raise awareness of the problems facing war veterans. They were joined by City Councilman Diego Bernal and Councilman Cris Medina.
- 11/13/12 6PM NEWS – The San Antonio Food Bank has a brand new mobile food pantry. More than 15% of residents in our community face food insecurity and one in four children are at risk of going hungry. The mobile pantry will help bring food directly to where it’s needed most, like on the southside of town. The truck was donated by Kraft Foods, along with a \$10,000 donation to help stock it. Distribution is set up in farmers’ market style and stocked with fresh fruits, veggies, milk and meat.
- 11/14/12 4PM NEWS – The Benjamin Moore Paint Company kicked off a new program to help veterans and their families. Volunteers are going state to state to repaint the homes of wounded servicemen and women.
- 11/14/12 10PM NEWS – In the O.P. Schnabel Apartments south of downtown, a San Antonio Housing Authority project, 75-year-old John Joseph Bannon lives in one of the units. His neighbors say he’s a messy packrat. They asked KSAT’s Defenders to find out why SAHA won’t do something about getting him to clean up. But the Housing Authority has its own problems. Bannon owes back rent so they evicted him, but he won’t leave. They say they have to follow federal policies or protocol and are tied to the fact that he does have a right to due process. That due process brought Bannon and SAHA to the Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 Court where in front of a jury, Bannon admitted he didn’t pay and Judge Monica Caballero ruled in favor of SAHA. But Bannon is now appealing, meaning he’s staying put for now. j He says he didn’t pay rent because the San Antonio Food Bank stopped providing him with food. The Food Bank says he wasn’t cut off but that he stopped picking up his food. Bannon’s appeal in County Court will be heard next month.
- 11/17/12 10PM NEWS – More than 100 people were treated to a hot Thanksgiving meal today thanks to the Dream Center. Today’s event was called “Adopt-A-Block, Give thanks” and in addition to the hot meal, volunteers also gave away blankets, coats and Thanksgiving meal kits for families to make their own meal. The center is a faith-based, non-profit organization that provides various social services on the eastside of town.

#### December:

- 12/06/12 GMSA – Thousands lined up outside a Washington State courtroom to get their same-sex marriage licenses. Last month, voters in Washington approved a referendum that legalized same-sex marriage. The licenses were issued at midnight. Two women, who have been a couple for the past 35 years, had a church wedding in 2005, but never thought their marriage would be legal until getting their marriage license today.
- 12/18/12 NOON NEWS – A Northside ISD student squaring off against the school district in federal court today. The student claims wearing an ID badge that contains a micro-chip violates her religious beliefs. The district says the badges, part of a pilot program, help them better maintain attendance records. The judge heard arguments from both sides, and then promised a ruling before the end of the week.
- 12/18/12 4PM NEWS – Students and staff at John Jay High School raised \$7,000 to take 140 kids from seven schools on a shopping spree. Each kid gets \$25 at Big Lots and \$25 at Payless to spend on whatever they want. This is the 45th year the high school has taken children Christmas shopping and the event is always a favorite for both the little and big kids.



- 12/21/12 10PM NEWS – HEB's "Feast of Sharing" provided 3,500 turkey dinners to Meals-On-Wheels so those who rely on them can have a traditional Christmas dinner. Meals-On-Wheels is asking for short-term volunteers to help deliver these meals. Sharon Baughman, Christian Senior Services, suggests if your kids are home from school and you want to volunteer, bring them with you. That's even better because some of the senior citizens don't really get the opportunity to interact with young people.
- 12/28/12 5PM NEWS – American parents wanting to adopt from Russia will not be able to anymore. Today Russian President Vladimir Putin signed a bill banning Americans from adopting Russian children. American families that were in their final stages of adopting from that country have had their adoptions frozen. Russian authorities will now begin the process of placing children with Russian families. Human rights activists are upset saying that Russia is using the children as a political play, all in retaliation against the U.S. for a new law imposing human rights sanctions.



**YOUTH/FAMILY**, including issues regarding marriage, the changing role of the family, parenting, and child rearing and abuse.

October:

- 10/01/12 4PM NEWS – A new study published in the journal, "Pediatrics," finds children are exposed to more TV than you might think. The study involved more than 1,400 parents with children between eight-months and 8-years-old. It found that children younger than eight spend an average of nearly four hours, each day, with television on in the background. Children eight-months to two-years-old are exposed to nearly six hours each day. Researchers say TVs in the background can be a distraction to children and have been linked to taking focus away from problem solving and communicating.
- 10/03/12 GMSA – A new report from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention says fewer teens are drinking and driving. It says 10% of students 16-years-old and older admitted to drinking and driving last year, compared to 22% in 1991. The decline is attributed to all states raising the minimum drinking age to 21, and zero tolerance laws.
- 10/05/12 GMSA – For now, cheerleaders from a southeast Texas high school will be allowed to continue to use biblical verses on banners at football games. A judge says he needs more time before issuing a final ruling on whether the verses violate U.S. Supreme Court rulings barring prayer from school. Kountze High School cheerleaders have used run-through banners at football games with scripture verses like, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." An activist group says the ban violates the cheerleaders' free-speech rights. A ruling is expected within the next couple of weeks.
- 10/10/12 NOON NEWS – Nickelodeon announced President Obama will appear in a special called "Kids Pick the President: The Candidates." Kids across the country will ask questions, then President Obama answers them from the White House. Mitt Romney will not be answering questions, but the show will include file sound from the Republican candidate. The show airs October 15. After the show, kids will have a chance to vote.
- 10/12/12 NOON NEWS – Trouble at school leads to even bigger problems at home for a 14-year-old northeast Bexar County boy. The boy says his dad beat him up and choked him. Now his father is charged with injury to a child. The son spoke out to a counselor at his middle school yesterday, saying 43-year-old Reginald Brown punched and kicked him for talking too much at school and for lying about attending football practice. School employees called the Sheriff's office. Brown was arrested yesterday.
- 10/25/12 5PM NEWS – Students sometimes hear in the cafeteria or in the classrooms "fat talk." "Fat talk" is when someone calls themselves or someone else "fat," and today representatives from the Eating Disorder Center at San Antonio are teaching students the harmful impact it can have on someone. Through some interactive activities, the students are learning to cut out all "fat talk" and to stop others from talking bad about themselves as well. Instructors say the negative effects of "fat talk" are serious. Aside from low self-esteem and a negative body image, it could lead to an eating disorder or worse, death.
- 10/25/12 6PM NEWS – About 160,000 kids miss school every day due to fear of bullying, but it doesn't just stop at school. By age 23, children who were bullied in middle school were more depressed and had lower self-esteem than their peers who weren't bullied. And of those young bullies, one in four will go to jail by age 30. Experts suggest parents practice with their kids what he or she can say if they're bullied, or how to report a situation to an adult. Parents should also be aware of cyber-bullies. They should save all evidence of cyber-bullying and tell their kids not to respond to rude messages and share personal picture or information online or through texts.
- 10/25/12 10PM NEWS – Area schools are observing Red Ribbon Week this week. Red Ribbon Week encourages kids to make good choices, like saying no to drugs, gangs, graffiti, and bullying. Kids take a pledge to make those choices every day, not only this week.
- 10/29/12 10PM NEWS – Each year, 750,000 teen girls become teen moms. Thirteen-percent of all girls are having sex by age 15. By age 19, that number skyrockets to 70%. Studies show babies born to teen moms are at higher risk for low birth weight and premature delivery. And the younger the mother is, the higher the chances of her baby dying during its first year of life. Many teen girls don't understand they have a 90% chance of getting pregnant every time they have unprotected sex. Experts believe the problem is girls are too embarrassed to ask for birth control.



- 10/30/12 NOON NEWS – Skipping school is not just a delinquency problem, it's a criminal act for both the student and the student's parents. That's why the Truancy Court in San Antonio is launching a "truancy roundup." Truant kids and their parents were put on notice today that they can be picked up starting November 12 for failure to appear in truancy court. Justice of the Peace Roger Lopez says about half the students called to his court for truancy don't bother to show up there either.
- 10/31/12 4PM NEWS – The Southside School District wants parents to make sure their kids aren't in any danger after six students were exposed to rabies. It happened last Friday when a student took a dead bat into one of the school's restrooms. District officials say at least six students admitted coming into direct contact with the bat. That bat later tested positive for rabies. Parents received a letter on Monday telling them what happened. The district says any children exposed to that bat should get rabies shots. So far this year, there have been 12 confirmed rabies cases in Bexar County, all of them found in bats.
- November:
- 11/12/12 4PM NEWS – There are more than 1.3 million child caregivers in the U.S. Many children are too afraid or embarrassed to tell teachers or their peers. Seven-year-old Ann-Marie was forced to care for her mother after a car accident and stroke left her partially paralyzed. Plus she also had to care for her sick sister. Enter Connie Siskowski. She founded the Caregiving Youth Project after she had to assume duties for caring for her sick grandfather at the age of 11. Siskowski says the first step is letting kids know they're not alone. The project offers in-home help and classes at school. It also makes teachers more aware of the student's situation. The project also provides families with practical resources ranging from home computers to clean water systems. The program is completely funded by grants and donations.
- 11/12/12 NOON NEWS – At 6:45am on a dark, rainy morning, a school bus' yellow lights flash. It pulls onto the shoulder off U.S. 281 north of Marshall Road to pick up a little boy in front of a storage company. Some cars stop, some don't though the bus has its red lights flashing and door open. The weekday stop is a recipe for disaster says drive Elisa Best. She complained to NEISD. The child waiting for the school bus at this location lives nearby and there's no other school bus stop closer to his home. His parents agree with the concerned driver. They think it would be safer for the bus to pull into the parking lot of the storage company instead of the shoulder of the road. But NEISD says this year's bus is longer than the one last year and that location is not considered a hazardous route because there are traffic lights nearby. Aubrey Chancellor, NEISD spokesperson says the danger comes from drivers, and that KSAT's story is a great reminder to drivers that when a school bus has its red lights flashing they are supposed to stop, otherwise they are doing something that is illegal.
- 11/13/12 5PM NEWS – Inspired by a program known as Slow Food, fourth grade students at Lamar Elementary School are in the planning stage of planting a school garden. The name of the program is a play on words about being the opposite of fast food. By having students raise foods that vary season to season, like cabbage in the fall, they also learn how to savor what's grown. Not only do they get to see and smell the food, they get to taste it too. The hope is that someday these students will enjoy fresh food they grew and harvested themselves.
- 11/20/12 10PM NEWS – A southside man is accused of burning the skin off a four-year-old boy's foot and ankle and is now charged with injury to a child. Police say 25-year-old Louis Jaramillo spanked his girlfriend's son last month and then took him into the bathroom and apparently made him stand in extremely hot water. The boy's mother told detectives she heard her son screaming. She told detectives she tried to treat the burns at home, but eight days later when the boy had developed a serious infection, she called EMS. The boy's foot still has not healed. He's had to undergo several surgeries and skin grafting.
- 11/26/12 GMSA – A new study says injuries from the use of inflatable bounce houses have soared. The study in the Journal, "Pediatrics," suggests 30 children a day are treated in emergency rooms for various injuries from minor to broken bones and concussions. Most injuries involve children falling inside or out of the inflated playthings, or colliding with other bouncing kids.
- 11/28/12 6PM NEWS – Friday is World AIDS Day and the Center for Disease Control has released a new study documenting a rise in HIV infection among America's young people. The CDC collected data on 13 to 24-year-olds and found that youths accounted for 25% of the new cases in 2010. Also according to the report, more than half of young people infected with HIV were unaware of their infection. Despite recommendations that young people get tested, the report found that only 13% of high school students actually have done so.



December:

- 12/06/12 - 5PM NEWS – It looks like students gathered for a bike safety seminar, but it was all a ruse orchestrated by the principal of Herff Elementary School to surprise one very special little boy. Seven-year-old David Cortez was born with no arms, but he can do quite a lot with his feet. He has wanted to ride a bicycle for a long time so today, Herff Elementary School Principal Traci Smith gathered all of the students who were in on the surprise, and did a pseudo random drawing raffle for a bike helmet, and guess whose name was drawn? David, but there was one catch -- David didn't need a bike helmet because he doesn't have a bike, or at least he couldn't until today. The school surprised him with a special bike built especially for him. This very special little boy took his very special new bike for a ride in front of a few hundred of his close friends and classmates who were all very happy for him. The lesson they learned is to do what you can to help other people.
- 12/07/12 10PM NEWS – As of this morning the families in this Bexar County courtroom are no longer foster families, they're Forever Families as their adoptions were made official by Bexar County Associate Judge Charles Montemayor today, just in time for the holidays. More than 40 children were adopted into 23 different families at this morning's Adoption Day ceremony. The sisters and brothers adopted by Traci Holmes are half-siblings to two of her adult daughters. After raising the trio for three years, Holmes says she didn't want to see them back in a shelter or with people they don't know. Meanwhile, the Espinosa family grew by four, keeping a group of siblings together.
- 12/07/12 NOON NEWS – KIPP, a dual language magnet elementary school that opened its doors to students couple of months ago, opened up to the public this morning to show off its unique way of learning. KSAT 12's Jenna Hiller was at KIPP "Un Mundo's" Open House and tells us the program is not just about teaching a new language, it's about making it easier to learn.
- 12/19/12 4PM NEWS – An East Central High School student is facing criminal charges after being arrested at school for making threats. A school district spokesperson says what the 16-year-old boy tweeted was "offensive and threatening" though it's still unclear exactly what was said in that tweet. Besides facing criminal charges in Juvenile Court, the teen faces disciplinary action from the district.
- 12/19/12 5PM NEWS – A second student has been arrested for making threats against a school. According to Northside ISD, Jacob Baker made a bomb threat against students at Taft High School. Fellow students turned Baker in to police yesterday. The first teen, 17-year-old Lateef Anderson, was arrested on Friday for allegedly threatening to shot up Taft High School. The district says if NISD students hear of a threat they can tell a school administrator or anonymously report it. There is a 24-hour safe line, 397-SAFE. Police warn that they will arrest and prosecute anyone for spreading rumors or for making threats against a school or students.
- 12/20/12 6PM NEWS – A new survey finds the most popular illicit drug for many teenagers is marijuana. The National Institute on Drug Abuse released its annual monitoring the future survey yesterday. Researchers surveyed more than 45,000 eighth grade students and high school students. For the first time, the survey asked teens about bath salts. It found use of the amphetamine-like stimulant is low among those surveyed.
- 12/21/12 10PM NEWS – In elementary schools today was the day for holiday parties and pajamas. But attendance was down because some parents took their kids out for early Christmas trips, because they're scared of school violence, or because of illness. North East ISD had about 1,500 extra students out today. At Kuentz Elementary School in the Northside ISD, 46 kids were absent today. The average is around 25. Kuentz Elementary School Nurse Nancy Fox has been kept busy with sick children with the flu, strep throat, and stomach virus.
- 12/22/12 NOON NEWS – If the unimaginable happens and your child is abducted, there is an app to help which was developed by the FBI. It's called Child ID. This app stores your child's picture, description, and information on your phone. That way, you have all their details at the tip of your fingers to show a police officer or security guard. You can also email your child's picture and information to authorities. Child ID is a free app and is available on the iPhone and Android.

#### **Pre-K 4 SA** (Duration - 1:10)

Polls are opening soon, and San Antonians will have a chance to vote for better early childhood programs. If approved, the 1/8 cent sales tax increase will raise about \$31 million a year to help more than 22,000 kids start on the right track. The state's shortfall has left our schools hurting, and early childhood programs have suffered. So local officials have taken the initiative to set that right. We know tax money alone won't fix everything about children's education. But, it does go a long way. And it's not just kids who benefit from better pre-k programs. Some of San Antonio's largest employers also support a yes vote on pre-k in San Antonio because they need a well-educated workforce. And that's good for everybody. At less than \$8 a year for the average household, we think it's money well spent. (Issues: Education & Government)

#### **Streetcars** (Duration - 1:05)

San Antonio leaders have been pushing for a light rail system for a while. In 2004, voters approved a tax for an Advanced Transportation District to pay for better highways and transit services. The money was not supposed to be used for light rail. Now, officials want to use \$92 million collected from that tax to build a \$190 million rail streetcar project. Some say streetcars and light rail are about the same, and others think they're different enough to be able to use the money. The Texas attorney general says this is a local matter for us to decide on our own. Local officials are supposed to make tough decisions like these and find ways to get things done. Tourism makes up a huge part of our local economy. If streetcars can help boost that experience and get more people downtown, then we're all for it. #### **Children's Hospital (Follow-up)** (Duration - 1:20)

San Antonio has only so many charitable dollars to go around. Plus, these systems have complained about fractured care that patients, families and doctors have had to face before. What's going to be so different now with three children's hospitals in the same market? These hospital systems need to remember what they said and do right by the kids and families in this community. Divided care and shuttling kids from one system to another is not the solution anybody has in mind. We can't afford to let our children get caught in the crosshairs of competition. **281/1604 Interchange** (Duration – 1:05)

It's a new day for transportation in San Antonio. The connectors linking 281 North to 1604 have opened, freeing up some of the congested traffic that's plagued the area for years. In spite of all the attempted hold-ups, lawsuits and delays, this interchange is finally moving full speed ahead. We're pretty sure the people who drive 245,000 vehicles through that area every day couldn't be happier. Now, they won't have to wait in long lines at stop lights just to get onto a different highway. Plus, businesses that have lost traffic and commuters who've been stuck in it will all be rolling right along. The next important milestone will come in February, when the connectors that link 281 South to 1604 should open. We're glad to see this kind of progress despite some people's attempts to stop it.

After that, the letter will have to go back to its permanent home with the Texas State Library and Archives Commission. That just seems wrong. The Travis letter is an important part of Texas history. It came from the Alamo, and we think it should stay here for good. The Land Office is making progress on restoring the Alamo to its full potential. Now we need to keep working to make the Alamo a place that can be a permanent and more fitting home to relics like this.
