On an ongoing basis, we maintain contact and confer with local government, civic, and business leaders, as well as members of the general public, about what they perceive as top-of-mind issues important to the communities we serve.

Recurring priority topics:

- Health care, particularly COVID-19 related
- Education, particularly related to the disruptions caused by COVID-19 accommodations
- Low 2020 Census participation
- Opportunities for young people, and perhaps related neighborhood crime
- Employment opportunities, the labor pool, and availability of quality housing
- Health of the local retail economy
- Drug and alcohol abuse

Area community leaders have expressed concerns relating to challenges associated with municipal population decline, which is additionally affecting local school system enrollment; rural healthcare; workforce development and related industrial needs; infrastructure such as roads and bridges; substance abuse; tax revenue and public services; and voter registration along with participation in upcoming local and national elections.

We strive to provide responsive and helpful programming. Further, we also work to educate and inform the people we are privileged to serve through a variety of public service announcements, local news coverage, community calendars, and other programs.

We have continued to focus programming and messaging on health, education, and economic issues related to the COVID-19 pandemic with public service announcements supporting Alabama Gov. Kay Ivey's "Safer at Home" mandates, including messages from the governor, the Alabama Department of Public Health, Coosa Valley Medical Center, Sylacauga City Schools, and, from a national perspective, the Centers for Disease Control and the National Association of Broadcasters.

Issues and Responsive Programming

WYEA broadcast programming dealing with various issues important to the community.

 <u>Stuff the Studio Food & Toy Drive</u>: Our fifth annual award-winning *Stuff the Studio Food* & *Toy Drive* from Nov. 16-Dec. 11 again benefitted Alabama Childhood Food Solutions (AFCS) and the Sylacauga Alliance for Family Enhancement (SAFE). Sponsored by Heritage South Credit Union, Affordable Heating & Air, Coosa Valley MRI, and Chick-Fil-A, toys were provided for 225 children in 95 area families, and more than a ton of food was collected to help feed children in about 800 families. The project included heavy onair promotion, interviews, and public service messages explaining the issues and seeking contributions.

Stuart N. Brotman, executive policy adviser, legal analyst, author of "*Privacy's Perfect Storm: Digital Policy for Post-Pandemic Times*"

He found that while social factors like family problems and homelessness can predict suicide, they are not the cause of it -- mental illness is. He said the results of the study were a surprise. He added that the social isolation that accompanies COVID-19 has been a major factor in increasing suicide rates overall.

He recommended that patients contact their doctor via email or phone if they suspect they have the coronavirus, to avoid spreading it in waiting rooms or emergency rooms.
