Description of the issue: The lead up to and the repercussions of the Supreme Court's overturning of Roe versus Wade – the federal case that guaranteed a woman's right to abortion. The high court's decision to send the matter back to the states triggered a law passed by the General Assembly in 2019 that outlawed virtually all abortions in Kentucky. That development sparked protest among pro-choice advocates and lawsuits by Planned Parenthood and the ACLU of Kentucky.
