KTRE's Neighborhood WeatherNet Program is an educational program in partnership with the University of Texas Health Center and numerous Independent School Districts in the East Texas area designed to raise the level of awareness of math and science in school students ages Kindergarten through grade 12.

The program consists of computers and individual weather stations that are installed in schools around East Texas. The equipment enables students and professionals to access real time weather data. A report from a school weather station is given within our daily newscasts with data taken from a different site for each weathercast.

**AIR DATES: 4/2-4/8/20**

**ISSUE: Government & Business**

As we continue to deal with various shelter-in-place type orders coming at us from all directions, we have seen the federal government try to step up and provide financial relief through several stimulus bills. These are designed to give the economy an infusion of cash for individuals while protecting and propping up businesses to get everyone through the Covid-19 crisis. Congress has passed and President Trump has signed 3 of these stimulus bills – each providing a response to the impact of Covid-19. The biggest bill was the 2-trillion dollar one that will trigger the checks for taxpayers and loans for businesses. In all, they look good but there are a couple of provisions – pork if you will – that were included in this most recent bill. Lawmakers allowed these to be included in the bill to ensure they had an overwhelming majority of votes to get the bills passed and passed quickly. But some of these are still a little embarrassing – and both Democrats and Republicans are to blame. Included in the bill is 25-million dollars to the Kennedy Center for Performing Arts. Additionally, there is 75-million dollars for the Corporation for Public Broadcasting. 100-million total in just those 2 items in an emergency spending bill that classified those two areas as essential spending. The average price for a ventilator tops out at around 20-thousand dollars. That 100-million could have purchased 5-thousand ventilators. Wow. No doubt, they are noble causes, but they are not essential – not when lives are at stake. I think everyone is grateful for the stimulus but our leaders still need to be responsible with our money.

**ISSUE: Business**

Many of us are expecting the stimulus checks and they will help individuals and families bridge the gap between paychecks as we all work to rebuild after Covid-19. The amount of the checks will vary depending on marital status and income but do know that the checks will affect the local economy regardless of whether you get one or what the amount is. And while these will help, they are not lottery wins and will not last forever. So, we need to be smart with the checks. **ISSUE: Health/Medical & Business**

It is easy to see that everyone is tiring of the stay-at-home orders related to the Covid-19 pandemic. Most of us have some kind of social wiring and isolation is difficult for a long period of time. Likewise, many people know that they would be taking a risk by getting out, so they are weathering the storm. There has been continuous talk of restarting the economy because it is a reality that every day we are idle is another step down into a ditch that will be increasingly difficult and lengthy to get out of economically. Our leaders will need to coordinate the economic restart but as individuals, we shouldn't wait on them to have a personal plan to be ready when the restart happens. **AIR DATES: 4/23-4/29/20**

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

Hopefully we are past the highwater mark for Covid deaths in Texas and especially in East Texas. But the relaxing of rules and orders could result in a new spike. As Texans we are, thankfully, in control of much of that. President Trump and the federal government have largely left the return to work plans up to individual states. Even within the states though, there will be big variations in the plans moving forward. For everyone the novelty, if there ever was any, has worn off in our virus scorched world. But as I said at the beginning of this segment, regardless of what rules, provisions, guidelines are put in place, we as individuals have the largest control of how and even if the virus spreads. We must take that responsibility seriously. Considering the health of others – mainly people that we don't even know – before our own health will be the difference maker. We will need to be honest with ourselves, when there is no one there to check for a temperature, or check the viability of a homemade or aging face mask. We will need to remember if we encountered anyone that was coughing and evaluate how we are feeling and if that run to the grocery store for one or two items is worth it. Ultimately, this will be a character test on the largest scale in history. And how we respond as individuals will decide how soon and

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how effectively we recover from this. So, let's all decide now how we will protect others in a post-Covid world and that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 4/30-5/6/20**

**ISSUE: Business**

Texas begins to re-open as the U-S moves past the one million mark for confirmed infections of Covid-19 and moves past the 60-thousand mark for deaths connected to the virus. But we are re-opening, which is good – but still take a breath. Governor Greg Abbott has outlined in phases how our capitalist economy gets out of the ditch. But there are some things worth noting. First, most business will not be at full capacity. Many can only operate at 25 percent capacity so, in service businesses, such as restaurants, we need to show some patience. Some may not offer a full menu or be open for less than normal business hours. They may have too little waitstaff or maybe even too many. So, again, patience is needed. Workers and business owners need to know their options with the Governor's plan. If workers refuse to go back to work, they may not be eligible for unemployment benefits. And business owners will need to deal with workers that are in high-risk categories. Businesses will need to install procedures that will be costly and will affect product flow. So while Texas is back open for some business, it is not business as usual. Everyone, business owners, employees, and customers must work together or this re-entry will not work and the virus will be out of control again. Again, patience, a little forgiveness, and a literal spacing respective walk, not run will get us going again, and that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 5/7-5/13/20**

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

We continue to get daily updates on the progress in fighting the Covid-19 virus. It is easy to get chart fatigue with many presenters holding up charts and assuming everyone can see them and then follow their interpretation of the data. They may be familiar with the information, but the audience is neither familiar nor can we, oftentimes, even see the chart clearly. A general distrust for authority and the fact that charted data can be picked apart have led to numerous criticism and conspiracy theories. We get feedback regularly that we don't report recoveries enough in some of our data on the virus. Well, that information is largely delivered through counties and the health district and they don't update those numbers as often as new cases. Additionally, it is not a requirement for patients to report when they have recovered. So these numbers are partial totals at best. But there is no conspiracy to keep the data from looking better than it is. There is also the theory that hospitals are coding the cause of most deaths as Covid-related to get a higher payout from the federal government. Well hospitals do get reimbursed a bit more in those instances but there are a load of watchdog groups on this and, to-date, no confirmed reporting abuses. There are always those that will try to game the system but falsifying records is a high crime and is usually uncovered. Lots of data from all over, no conspiracies, but if nothing else, perhaps reporting authorities will start using better charts, which will breed a little confidence and that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 5/14-5/20/20**

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

We have all heard the saying – Don't shoot the messenger. It seems that some in our country have forgotten the meaning behind it. We have also seen the regular briefings by the President's Covid Task Force featuring Dr. Anthony Fauci. Fauci has also become the ultimate messenger, delivering frank and honest opinion from a medical perspective. But while that sounds like his reports would be immune from political criticism, they are not. The President has disagreed with him, if not directly, certainly indirectly in offering contrasting medical opinion. But Fauci has stayed consistent. He was called before a Senate committee recently and while he is highly respected, some senators questioned some of his recommendations. And with all the elevated presence, he has also received death threats. People don't like the messenger. But his popularity is a result of all the political factions elevating him to his current high profile – the media, Congressional Republicans and Democrats and the President. He seems to truly desire to deliver an opinion based on medical fact. While that clashes with what some want to hear, it is ultimately up to and the responsibility of the President and State Governors to open the country back up. And they should all take in medical information as well as economic and social information and make the decision. Dr. Fauci doesn't have responsibility for that decision – he is just the medical messenger - but he should be listened to. Ultimately, our elected leaders need to continue to come together to deliver the next rallying point for all of us and that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 5/21-5/27/20**

**ISSUE: Government**

The State and Local governments have largely done a solid job during the Covid public health response. There may be some strategy points that can be debated but that is largely a result of being able to look back and armchair quarterback the situation. Now it is time for these same entities and others to prepare economically for the next Covid response. Texas will be facing a state revenue, tax generated, shortfall in the coming legislative session. Local governments – city and county - will also be faced with reduced and changing tax bases. The Texas Legislature will meet in 20-21 and work is casually beginning now to plan the state's budget for the next two years after that session. So, state leaders must find a way to be nimble and meet a dynamic financial situation that will be present for some time to come. No one knows how long but planning for the worst will soften the impact. Enter the Texas Rainy Day Fund that has nearly nine billion, with a B, dollars in it. A portion of this must be used to fill in the gaps in revenue. Then local governments must find a way to balance revenue and expenses and it cannot be business as usual. Taxing entities cannot just use existing methods to generate revenue through property taxes and appraisals, notices of which are being delivered now. There will be no stimulus impact if tax increases wipe out stimulus payments and savings. So now is the time for state and local leadership to emerge and find a way to reduce the tax burden, which will lead to a stronger economy and Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 5/28-6/3/20**

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

I am not sure if you are like me or not but it is difficult, if not impossible, to keep up with the business opening percentages associated with our economic re-entry during the Covid pandemic. The pandemic is still here, as the U-S surpasses one hundred-thousand deaths associated with the virus. Thankfully, Texas has been lower than the U-S average on many metrics but there are still some hot spots where the virus is spreading. And the economy has been re-started with a stair stepped approach. But I am not sure what businesses are at twenty-five percent or fifty percent or even open at all. What is known is that regardless of current or future guidelines and restrictions, managing the spread of the virus is still a largely personal decision. There are a few knowns in that area as well. And it starts at home - we should be taking our own temperatures to make sure we are free of any potential infection before heading out to work or play or any environment that puts others at risk. Constantly washing our hands and eliminating touching our faces are new practices that need to be followed as well. When in small groups, give some space. There are other practices that are unique to other situations but what I just described are indeed, very personal decision points that we must all reckon with each day. This is a character check. Wherever you stand on this, know, at least, that your action or inaction impacts others. If we all display a little unselfishness, we will all be here to enjoy tomorrow. And that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 6/4-6/10/20**

**ISSUE: Government/Crime**

Equal justice demonstrations continue across the land. One thing is for certain, looting and rioting won't bring about change and blurs the true message. Thankfully, we have not had those types of actions in East Texas and thus, the opportunity for substantial dialogue remains and it is being acted on. But this is the most complicated question of our lifetimes. Diverse groups across America see the situation surrounding George Floyd's death and the deaths of others differently. Interpretations, causes, remedies cannot be farther apart. So, how can we, collectively, start the steps towards a solution? There is the call for equal treatment of African – Americans by police and many claim that there are systemic issues in the criminal justice system. If that is the case, then there needs to be adjustment, legal adjustment, but one that ends with all persons being treated equally with the expectation that they will all abide by the revisions. Law enforcement must do even more to win over the trust and hearts of those in minority communities. We must answer the question – What can be done to build equality and trust? Talk is always cheap so leaders from all sides must agree on some type of measurable actions with tangible results and then constantly deliver those results publicly. This cannot be about feelings or emotions or there will be no real progress. A measurable plan with tangible results and making this cause a top priority beyond today is what is dearly needed – and that will make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 6/11-6/17/20**

**ISSUE: Business**

Sports fans across the globe have been weathering a drought from fresh sporting events and television programming. The Covid response by professional and amateur sports alike has created a wasteland of sports repeats on TV and non-spectator events that just aren't the same. I suppose it is good that we are getting some sports back and that some professional leagues have postponed and shortened seasons but it is unknown what sports popularity will be like. Psychologists say it takes a month or so to create or break a habit. Obviously, there are variables, but we have been without sports for nearly three months. And people have largely moved on and engaged in other activities. Some of those moves will become permanent. We have seen it with numerous department stores and other retail merchants where a two month pause was just too much for their financial engine to weather. So, the road back for sports, especially professional sports may be a long one. Sports junkies may have to decide which sport in their life is preferred as they won't be able to go to or watch everything, creating some more casualties. One thing that might help some sports is if players present images that show they do care and actually appreciate fans' support. It is not a time for players to hold out or come across as insensitive to the average American. Ultimately, it will be each sport's connection with the fan base that will make or break this very strange year. If there is connection, there will be support. If not, some sports risk withering into the history books.

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

Covid-19 concerns continue across the United States – Texas and East Texas. Governor Greg Abbott reported on increased hospitalizations recently and blamed increased Covid cases on restaurant and bar patrons that apparently are relaxing or disregarding the specific capacity guidelines, resulting in increased infection rates in many areas. And he blamed a specific demographic of thirtysomethings as being lax on social distancing and other guidelines. But one drive around any city in East Texas and you can see that the economy is back – at least traffic is – and that all demographics are a mixed bag of responses to distancing and masking up. And with the next holiday – July 4<sup>th</sup> – fast approaching, numerous municipalities across our area are advertising fireworks shows. But one aspect of some of them is these cities and chambers of commerce have details on their websites but few list any Covid practices at these events. Nothing about social distancing, wipe downs, sanitizing practices – nothing. In fact, some are promoting water slides, bounce houses, rock walls and live music. Now I understand that we all want a return to normalcy but there absolutely needs to be some large group Covid preventing practices at these events and the organizing bodies need to let the citizenry know what they are. So as you prepare for the July 4<sup>th</sup> weekend, please conduct an information deep dive on any activities and make sure that organizers have protections in place. We are getting through this gradually and a few protective practices will protect us for tomorrow and make for a Better East Texas.

**AIR DATES: 6/25-6/30/20**

**ISSUE: Health/Medical**

There have been scores of victims in the Covid-19 pandemic. We hear about deaths each day and, honestly, some of the current analytics are difficult to place relevance in. But it is easy to see that cases are increasing in Texas, along with testing, resulting in more hospitalizations. And while we all feel that a return to normal cannot happen soon enough, there are more victims on the horizon that suggest we may not have normal for a very long time. One of those current and future victims are team sports - in particular college and high school competitions. While the pros are negotiating return-to-work agreements, student athletes are being caught in the middle of the massive business of college athletics and concern for athlete's personal safety. On the high school end, cities across the state rally around high school football and other sports. It is something we hold onto dearly and they represent that normalcy that we all cherish. But it is being proven almost daily that normalcy is still missing with summer workout programs that are suspended because of Covid-19 infections in teams at the college and high school levels. Thus, we must all start preparing for the probable worse case of no college or high school sporting events in the Fall. The safeguards that are in place are proving unreliable and gatherings of student athletes and supporters will become petri dishes for spreading the virus further, extending the pandemic. Perhaps there will be some breakthrough but for now, those of us placing hope in a return of these age-old traditions, need to prepare for the possibility of life without football.

#### **The Case of the Missing Lovebirds**

The young couple disappeared in 1987 after taking a ferry from Vancouver to Seattle and were later found miles apart, gagged, bound and brutally murdered. With a smattering of clues, but no real lead, the case was cold for 30 years. The episode includes interviews with Jay's parents, Gordon and Leana Cook; Tanya's brother, John Van Cuvlenborg; Snohomish County law enforcement retired Sherriff Rick Bart and Detective Jim Scharf, and radio reporter Hanna Scott.
