Exposé: America's Investigative Reports June 24, 2007 11 PM ½ hr

In 2006, PITTSBURGH TRIBUNE-REVIEW reporter Carl Prine resumed his investigations of chemical safety in the United States, this time focusing on the nation's railroad transportation system. Prine discovered that trains loaded with toxic and explosive chemicals pass through major metropolitan areas with inadequate or no security, and in some areas present a target extremely vulnerable to terrorist attack. EXPOSÉ also spoke with Senator Joseph R. Biden, Jr. (D-DE) who discusses the rail security bill inspired by Prine's reporting.

Scott Fitzgerald's *The Great Gatsby* and John Steinbeck's *The Grapes of Wrath*; in Ann Petry's *The Street*, in Gish Jen's *Typical American* and in Saul Bellow's *Seize the Day*. Passages from each book, as well as later novels that reflect more diverse voices, were dramatized through haunting still photography, woven together with original and archival footage to form an evocative, intimate tapestry.
