City Manager Mark Gifford said concerns raised was about the potential for contact or contamination of the water from the birds or their droppings. "There is no potential for contamination of the water. The water tower is an enclosed structure to prevent contamination from any source. There is a vent on the top but it is shrouded in a way that does not allow contact with birds or bird droppings. Schroeder says there are a few options that include replacing Engine 2 with a new rescue truck that could provide more cabinet space for needed equipment, while reducing the demand on Engine 4. However, it would be an expensive option based on customization, with a possible cost between \$475,000 and \$510,000 based on recent deliveries of other trucks. Or for the city to wait for future funding. It would provide a cost savings to the city and more time to save for a large purchase.
