So, we thought we'd take a look at how it will work and find out what you need to know to vote early in-person.



A great resource through the Michigan Parkinson Foundation is the Ann Arbor Parkinson Support Group, and something new in the fight against Parkinson's - boxing and the Rock Steady Boxing Program.
