A court in Washington ruled health care subsidies can only be paid in states that have set up their own insurance exchanges. Later, a court in Virginia came to the opposite conclusion. Though Michigan, it is still run on the federal level. That means, if the Washington court's ruling stands... around 240-thousand people here could lose that extra help to pay for health insurance. In just two weeks, the number of Americans infected with a virus called chickungunya {chicken-gun-yah} has nearly doubled and it has appeared here in Michigan, one near Cadillac and one near Midland. A majority of people who have it traveled in the Caribbean but the CDC says it is showing up in mosquitoes in the US. The American Red Cross is facing a shortage in the blood supply & urge people to donate, especially o, b & a-negative blood types. Now to your pets... and a couple of studies giving us a look into how they think and feel. Researchers in Atlanta are looking to prove dogs may actually be more like us and smarter than we think. Another study found the dog that can love you unconditionally... can also feel jealousy if your attention is given to something else. Researchers say it looks like the dogs felt a basic form of jealousy and wanted to protect the social relationship with their owner.</p>
Healthy You	8/3/14 at 11:00am	<p>Hand Foot Mouth Disease, Tanning Call to Action, Running Reduces Death Risk, Caffeine & Hot Flashes, Facial Recognition, Friend's DNA</p> <p>We're talking about 'Hand, Foot and Mouth' disease. The Kent County Health Department says area pediatricians are seeing an unusually high number of cases... and they don't know why. Now to skin cancer... and a message from the U-S surgeon general. "Stop tanning... and save your skin." Skin cancer cases are on the rise... with more diagnosed every year than breast... prostate... lung and colon cancers combined. Researchers in Iowa spent 15 years studying more than 55-thousand people. They found people who ran had a 30 % lower risk of death from all causes and a 45 % lower risk of death from heart attack and stroke. Researchers say for postmenopausal women... there seems to be a link between the caffeine they drank and more bothersome hot flashes and night sweats. A computer system designed to mimic the human brain identified which facial features most influence your decision. Researchers found friends share more genes compared to strangers. Right now, they're not entirely sure why. One possibility is similar genes nudge people towards similar environments, which gives them a chance to meet.</p>

It's a traumatic brain injury, usually caused by a blow to the head that alters your brain functions. Common signs include headache, confusion or loss of memory. A Grand Rapids physical therapist thinks concussion therapy needs to go beyond just the effect on</p>

		<p>the brain. In fact, her new approach attracted the attention of Detroit Red Wings player, Justin Abdelkader. The American Academy of Neurology says it wants doctors to cross the doctor-patient confidentiality line, if it can help keep a young athlete safe. Dr. Ed Kornoelje, a sports medicine physician with Metro Health is a real advocate about concussions & West Michigan's young athletes. The state law just backs it up and says that you have to do this, it's not optional because we want to keep our young people safe. Researchers found the practice of heading the ball can cause repeat concussions or sub-concussive blows, which don't cause any symptoms. One study revealed 62-percent of varsity soccer players had concussion symptoms during their career but only 19-percent realized it.</p>

Police say, Jamarion Lawhorn fatally stabbed a nine year old on a Kentwood playground one week ago. According to court records, the suspect told police, If he killed someone he hoped he would be sentenced to die in an electric chair or by lethal injection. That matches what neighbors observed shortly after the stabbing.

The latest numbers come, as Grand Rapids police continue to investigate a credit union robbery yesterday on the "Mercy Health - St. Mary's" campus. The bank robbery yesterday at a Lake Michigan Credit Union was one of just four in Kent, Ottawa, and Muskegon Counties this year.
