The following represent some of the key issues facing the broadcast area of KIDK during the current filing period. They are referenced on the accompanying programming summaries.

Unless otherwise noted, all programs aired as part of EYEWITNESS News at 5:30 p.m. and/or 10 p.m.

- A) EDUCATION: Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.
- B) HEALTH / ENVIRONMENT: Issues related to our environment and health of our community.
- C) GOVERNMENT/POLITICS: Issues facing local government including taxation and political moves in an election year.
- D) ECONOMY: Tracking trends affecting our community's business base as well as the rise and fall of industry in the community.
- E) LAW ENFORCEMENT: Tracking trends in neighborhood crime and the legal progress of criminal cases.

SECTION 2:

RESPONSIVE PROGRAMS

A. EDUCATION

Title: JASON FLATT ACT Broadcast Date: 4-2

Duration: 2:35

Description: Idaho was the 20th state to pass the Jason Flatt Act. The law provides training for school personnel to help them spot signs of depression and suicidal thoughts in their students. Local school staff are fully supportive. They indicated that students probably spend more time in school than they do at home during the week and more eyes and ears on them can help spot difficulties. A group of kids has also been formed to support their peers.

Title: ISU PRESIDENT SELECTED

Broadcast Date: 4-5

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Description: The State Board of Education announced the selection of Kevin Satterlee as the

13th President of Idaho State University. Satterlee is the Chief Operating Officer and special counsel to Boise State University and begins his tenure July 1, with the retirement of ISU President Arthur Valais. Satterlee said he would focus on open communication, innovation, and transparency. Initially, he said he would work to build relationships with faculty, students, and the community.

Title: SOURCES OF STRENGTH

Broadcast Date: 5-31

Duration: 1:40

Description: The Blackfoot Charter Middle School is one of a half-dozen Idaho schools to win "Sources of Strength" grants. A school counselor said it was focused on providing messages of hope, health, and strength for students. It will help students understand they can rely on trusted adults during difficult times in their lives. Idaho surveys indicate 21.7 percent of Idaho students in grades 9 thru 12 have experienced suicidal thoughts. The program aims to head that off.

Title: POCATELLO LUNCH PROGRAM

Broadcast Date: 6-4

Duration: 2:05

Description: The annual "Lunch and Play" program launched its first day in Pocatello. The Pocatello/ Chubbuck School District and Portneuf Wellness Complex sponsor the program to provide kids with nutrition and an opportunity for outdoor activity. It's especially important to a large number of children who don't have access to well-balanced meals.

B. HEALTH/ENVIRONMENT

Title: FLOOD ISSUES
Broadcast Date: 4-3
Duration: 2:30

Description: Eastern Idaho was struck by a wind storm that caused significant damage. Trees were being removed from houses and power lines while homeowners assessed damage. Many people were without power while lineman worked to restore electricity. At one point, all of Bonneville County's fire engines were on emergency calls. One woman described how a large tree limb crashed through her home.

Title: MIGRAINE BREAKTHROUGH

Broadcast Date: 4-17

Duration: 2:10

Description: Many people celebrate from often-debilitating pain caused by migraine headaches. An Idaho Falls expert says science indicates migraine is a genetic disease caused by neuronal hyperactivity in the brain. One successful treatment is botox therapy. Many patients say that without them, it becomes difficult to cope with daily life. Experts say it is also important to make lifestyle changes to ensure that treatment is comprehensive.

Title: WILDLIFE CROSSINGS

Broadcast Date: 5-11

Duration: 2:35

Description: Some Island Park residents are objecting to an Idaho Transportation Department proposal to construct fencing or wildlife crossings in the Targhee Pass area of Highway 20. It is one of the most active wildlife areas in the region and the site of multiple wildlife-vehicle accidents. Five alternatives are being considered including those options and the use of an animal detection device. Some residents favor a simpler approach...lower speed limits. Work would also include reconstructing the road, widening shoulders, and new drainage systems.

Title: TETON CREEK CORRIDOR

Broadcast Date: 6-8
Duration: 2:50

Description: Teton County, Idaho non-profit organizations are teaming to restore and protect the Teton River Corridor. The waterway environment was destroyed by an illegal development many years ago. Since 2006, it has created a flooding threat to downstream property, including the city of Driggs. Now, volunteers have worked to restore creek banks and habitat to protect the ecosystem and downstream property.

Title: OPIOIDS

Broadcast Date: 6-11

Duration: 2:40

Description: Law enforcement is making a full-out effort to control the abuse of opioid drugs and the side effects their addiction creates. Some local physicians are also stepping up. Bonneville County prosecutors say federal resources are helping them prosecute drug cases. One side effect of higher opioid drug costs has created new crimes of theft and also a push to cheaper drugs, like heroin. A local physician is breaking ground on a new injection surgery, that reduces the need for follow-on pain medications.

C. GOVERNMENT/POLITICS

Title: GROUNDWATER RECHARGE

Broadcast Date: 4-18

Duration: 2:25

Description: The Idaho Water Resource Board is implementing a plan to recharge 250,000 acrefeet of water per year into the Eastern Snake Plain Aquifer. The board has been steadily improving recharge levels since 2013 and will set a record in 2018 by recharging over 500,000 acre-feet. Cooperation between irrigations, municipalities, and other users is credited for the improvement. That will be critical in the future as cities look for secure drinking water resources.

Title: LEGISLATIVE FORUM Broadcast Date: 4-24

Duration: 2:00

Description: Blackfoot hosted a forum for legislative candidates, Incumbent Julie VanOrden and challenger Julianne Young. The hot topic was a proposed sex education bill introduced by Van Orden to the legislature this year. Young and other opponents feared it would wrest control of sex education from parents. Van Orden said the proposal was aimed at updating the bill to modern standards and would only apply if local school districts adopted a sex education program.

Title: ELECTIONS
Broadcast Date: 5-15

Duration: KIDK: 10 PM TO 10:35 PM

Description: Coverage of the 2018 primary elections included reports on key issues and candidate races in eastern Idaho. Reporters were established at republican and democratic party headquarters in Boise and at selected locations in Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Blackfoot, and

Rexburg.

Title: NATURALIZATION CEREMONY

Broadcast Date: 5-23

Duration: 1:45

Description: 19 people became U.S. Citizens during a ceremony at the U.S. District Courthouse in Pocatello. The applicants came from all over the world including Mexico, East Africa, and South Korea. All were tested and educated on U.S. history. Most of the new citizens had to wait at least five years for the opportunity. Each year, around 700,000 people become naturalized citizens.

Title: BLACKFOOT POOL Broadcast Date: 6-5 Duration: 1:40

Description: A special city council committee presented the Blackfoot City Council with its final recommendations on what to do about the city's swimming pool. A \$3 bond designed to help pay for repairs failed in November. Now, the committee is recommending a new bond of just over \$1.8 million. The committee hopes to include a water slide or splash pad, but the first priority is the pool liner. The committee hopes the improvements would draw more people and improve the overall revenue stream. A final decision will be made later.

D. ECONOMY

Title: ZOMBIE LOTS
Broadcast Date: 5-9

Duration: 3:32

Description: Teton County, Idaho is working to deal with undeveloped subdivisions left abandoned by developers after the recession. Valley Advocates for Responsible Development calls them "Zombie" lots because they exist as platted developments, but cannot be developed because they lack basic infrastructure. There are currently over 7,000 such lots in Teton County and some are in partially developed subdivisions. Many are owned by banks. Planners are working to deal with administrative barriers to resolving the problem.

Title: STORM CHASERS Broadcast Date: 4-16

Duration: 2:20

Description: Long-established roofers ae warning residents to be wary of so-called "storm-chasers". They are largely con men who follow major hail storms and offer below-par or empty contracts for home repair. In one case in Idaho Falls, a would-be contractor represented himself as an established local company. The Better Business Bureau advised people to make sure they check background records before entering into contracts, especially with unsolicited companies.

Title: PREMIERE TECH Broadcast Date: 6-6 Duration: 2:05

Description: Premiere Technology in Blackfoot broke ground for a \$15 million expansion. The new project will create 100 to 150 new jobs. The company will expand its high-tech processing equipment, adding about 70,000 square feet to their existing facility. The \$15 million project includes automated metal processing equipment. City officials expect 100 jobs when the facility is complete and more high-paying jobs down the line. The Governor, on hand for the event, said it demonstrates the need for Idaho to expand its education system.

Title: RECYCLING
Broadcast Date: 6-14

Duration: 2:00

Description: Changes of policy in China are having a big impact on the effectiveness of local recycling efforts. China announced it would ban the import of 56 varieties of solid waste. Western Pacific, which serves Pocatello, says it is China's biggest customer. As a result of the changes, Western Pacific sorting costs have risen dramatically. Now, 15 percent of its collections are ending up in landfills. The company says people must learn to sort what they put into collection barrels and lean towards renewable products.

Title: TOURISM
Broadcast Date: 5-7
Duration: 2:15

Description: Idaho Falls area businesses are gearing up for the summer tourist season. Since 2010, the tourism industry has grown from \$2.7 to \$3.3 billion in Idaho. In eastern Idaho, that translates to 4,400 jobs and 41,600 statewide. The Greater Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce is anticipating an even larger turnout of visitors this year.

E. LAW ENFORCEMENT

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Broadcast Date: 4-4

Duration: 1:49

Description: A retired, prominent, Idaho Falls doctor was subject of a lawsuit filed by a Washington woman. After an Ancestry dot com DNA analysis, she learned she was a direct relation to the doctor. Her mother had originally consulted him for artificial insemination, but no one had any suspicion he had used his own sperm as donor. The federal court lawsuit seeks a minimum \$75,000 in damages.

Title: JEFFERSON COUNTY CHILD ABUSE

Broadcast Date: 4-30

Duration: 2:28

Description: Rigby and Jefferson County law enforcement are working to put a stop to child abuse. The police agencies are also working closely with the Family Crisis Center in Rexburg and Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Center in Idaho Falls, as well as the Jefferson County prosecutor's office. While continuing to focus on prosecution, the team is also going to focus on means of preventing child abuse.

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Description: A Victor woman fell victim to a confidence game, after becoming involved with a man she met on an on-line dating service. She lost \$55,000 in cash before it was through. He convinced the woman he had to fly overseas and purchase some equipment for his electrical engineering business. Having grown to trust him, the woman dipped into her savings to help him pull his deal together. The Better Business Bureau said scammers are very good at what they do. Although reported to various law agencies, there is little to be done to reclaim her money.

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Duration: 2:04

Description: Growth is having positive and negative impacts on the city of Idaho Falls. The police chief said drug arrests have doubled since 2013 and a growing number of "cold" criminal cases. Heroin and methamphetamines are the biggest drug problem. Overall emergency calls are up and police are being asked to intervene in more and more mental health issues. The chief hopes to use modern technology to begin to put a dent in the more than 600 cold cases on the books this year.
