Title: BENGAL BRIDGE

Broadcast Date: 7-5

Duration: 1:55

Description: Dozens of ISU students joined a beautification project in Old Town Pocatello. The seven-week program is intended to help new students learn the

ins and outs of the college campus. In addition to a head-start, it also provides students a tuition break. Students learn the process of class registration and financial aid. The beautification project was aimed at making students a part of the community.

Description: The popularity of DNA based genealogy searches is growing across the country. The local directors of the Rexburg Family History Center said the research is helping people seeking connections or a sense of belonging. One woman found a DNA test revealed a background she suspected. But the result was different for her sister. Experts said the DNA background checks should be used as one piece of evidence in family history work, although they believe the science is solid.

Broadcast Date: 8-13

Duration: 2:00

Description: A group of Pocatello volunteers are pulling together to make sure local students have the school supplies they'll need this year. In addition to basic supplies, the group has also worked to include other needs, including everything from back packs to medical services and, lately, food. Now, the baskets include 20 to 30 essential resources for local families.

Description: The Pocatello/Chubbuck School Board is looking for public input into two design plans for improvements at Pocatello High School. School officials say the \$5 million project is primarily aimed at improving student safety beginning with an effort to connect two separate buildings, so students don't have to walk outside to reach them. The project will also enlarge the school cafeteria to serve a growing number of students. A public meeting was set to give the public opportunity to meet with competing architects and learn more about different approaches to the project.

Title: D-91 SECURITY

Broadcast Date: 9-19

Duration: 2:10

Description: The Idaho Falls school district is taking steps to ensure the safety of students. All district and school employees have been issued standardized

badges. The badges show that a person works in the school. Now, all visitors will be required to sign in and receive a visitor sticker, all designed to help control access inside school buildings. Buildings are also being fitted with entrance doorbells. A letter to parents asks for cooperation and patience. Parents are also urged to sign up for emergency text message alerts.

Title: IMMUNIZATIONS

Broadcast Date: 8-29

Duration: 2:10

Description: Regional health district officials are reminding parents to make sure their children are adequately immunized before they head back to school. The state allows some exceptions, including religious or health and/or medical reasons. Young children should have had ten immunizations prior to starting school. There are 13 required vaccinations for students prior to starting kindergarten.

Title: FALL EVALUATION

Broadcast Date: 9/12

Duration: 2:39

Description: Emergency medical technicians say falls are one of the leading causes of injury for people aged 65 and older. Idaho Falls paramedics responded to 1,066 calls involving falls since January. They said older populations are at particular risk of injuries to the hip, which can create long term recovery or rehabilitation procedures. An Idaho Falls assisted living center offered free fall-reduction evaluations to assess a person's strength, flexibility, and balance. The surveys determine steps people can take to make sure they're less of a fall risk.

Title: GRIZZLY BEAR SAFETY

Broadcast Date: 9-21

Duration: 2:05

Description: One man was killed and another injured after a grizzly bear attack while hunting. Wyoming Game and Fish personnel hunted down the animal and killed it. In recent weeks, other problem bears were hunted down and moved. Idaho Fish and Game officials say there are several issues to be considered before euthanizing an animal. Those include their level of interaction with

humans and aggressive behavior. To avoid issues, officials ask people to keep food and garbage away from the animals.

Title: FLU VACCINATION

Broadcast Date: 9-27

Duration: 2:05

Description: Health officials are advising all people to consider getting a flu vaccination this fall. While there are steps, like hand-washing, covering coughs, and avoiding sick people helps, flu virus particles can survive for extended periods of time and a very transmittable. Last year, the Centers for Disease Control estimated over 80,000 deaths were caused by the flu. It was the worst flu season in over 40 years. A new vaccine became available in August. Babies, young children, and the elderly are most vulnerable. There were 400 cases of flu at Portneuf Medical Center last year. There have been none, so far, this year.

Title: ACID SPILL

Broadcast Date: 9-28

Duration: 2:20

Description: Maintenance crews worked through the night to neutralize a chemical spill. A truck from Soda Springs was carrying 83 gallons of sulfuric acid, which sprung a leak. 60 gallons of the chemical were spilled on the highway between Soda Springs and Pocatello. Hazardous Materials handlers credited JR Simplot Company for stepping up to help clean up the mess. The public was cautioned to avoid touching the material. People were advised to wash cars immediately if they came in contact with it.

Title: Small Town Problems: Lewisville

Broadcast Date: 7-16

Duration: 3:39

Description: There are less than 500 people living in Lewisville and the Mayor has taken on much of the responsibility for keeping it running. He has lived in the town for 16 years and has been Mayor for 5 years. He said one of the biggest challenges is finding people to work part-time. Road maintenance is one of the biggest parts of the town's budget and the city has purchased some basic equipment to help do it. The town library uses a small building that used to house a jail.

Title: 3D GUNS

Description: Before an appeals court stepped in, blueprints for printing guns were scheduled to be made available on this date. Even so, many of the blue prints had already been released on line. ISU has installed 3D printers, but program managers are concerned about the potential mis-use of the technology. ISU officials do not expect to have an issue with people "printing" guns. Even so, some are concerned that the technology may be an easy way to get lethal weapons into hands that shouldn't have them.

Idaho Falls voters rejected two bond proposals, aimed at updating Skyline High School and replacing Idaho Falls High School with a new building. Jefferson School district voters, meantime, supported a building bond proposal for new elementary schools. Support levies were approved in Madison, Bonneville, and Aberdeen school districts.

Title: DMV DRIVERS' LICENSES

Description: The Shelley City Council voted to terminate its participation in the Idaho drivers' license program after weeks of difficulties with a new provider. The action came after most county sheriffs voiced concern over the state's new vendor and closed their offices in the wake of citizen complaints about long delays. In Shelley, the mayor said the delays were not only creating problems for drivers, but also for citizens who had to wait through the crowds to conduct city business. The city will continue to provide vehicle registration and licensing.

Description: A local pastor was awarded a \$5,000 check from Bingham Memorial Hospital to help her purchase and remodel a Pocatello home as a homeless shelter. The hospital has supported the effort to develop a 3-building apartment complex. The city of Pocatello rejected the first effort to develop a property because it violated zoning restrictions. Pastor Jacqueline Thomas calls that a blessing, because it set up the opportunity to develop a better and larger property. It will move the project to a 100 rather than 15-bed facility.

Public tours were also provided to give farmers a look at how their product was processed. Half of the bottles of Budweiser sold in the United States have malting barley in them that was produced in eastern Idaho. The day put a special emphasis on growers who are 35 and younger, to demonstrate a need to keep those farm operations running.

Description: The Governor came to Victor to break ground at Kate's Real Food. The small company got started after its founder was asked by fellow skiers to cook up some of her energy bars. Description: An Aberdeen man was arrested by Bingham County Sheriff's deputies and charged with first degree murder for the shooting death of his wife. Deputies found the woman dead when they arrived at the house. The suspect could face up to life in prison or the death penalty. Even though the man has little criminal record and has lived in Aberdeen for 40 years, the judge still set his bail at \$1 million. A preliminary hearing was sent July 19.

Title: BANNOCK COUNTY JAIL RIOT

Description: A riot broke out in the Bannock County Jail overnight. The Sheriff's Office said 22 to 26 inmates were involved in the incident, although one "instigator" led the disturbance. The inmate broke a fire sprinkler, setting off the system. He then started kick the door and demanding to be freed. That got other inmates involved and they began to push clothing into toilets in the disciplinary pod of the jail. The area was locked down and inmates were made to come out one at a time to help clean up. All but the instigator were cooperative. He was being held in "administrative segregation" pending a decision on future charges.

Description: A man, wanted for shooting and killing his wife in Nevada, was found dead in a car in Lava Hot Springs. The Bannock County Sheriff's Office determined the cause of death was suicide. Nevada officials said one of his wife's children reported finding her mother dead in their Nevada home. The man's car was reported to authorities, but callers thought it was abandoned. Deputies found his body in it. He had no connections to Bannock County, so authorities suspected he drove until he ran out of money.

Description: Among the numerous fires striking eastern Idaho this summer, the Indian Creek Butte fire posed a direct threat to the community of Spencer. At over 13,000 acres, red flag level winds were expected to create more concern. Several camp sites, filled with campers in preparation for upcoming fall hunting seasons, were ordered evacuated and trailer owners were given limited time to remove them. There was smoke visible in Dubois and Spencer to the east as fire crews worked to keep the fire from spreading into wooded forest land to the north. Two additional roads were closed. *Firefighters ultimately contained the fires and again protected a nearby community from serious damage*
