The following represent some of the key issues facing the broadcast area of KIDK during the current filing period. They are referenced on the accompanying programming summaries.

Unless otherwise noted, all programs aired as part of EYEWITNESS News at 5:30 p.m. and/or 10 p.m.

- A) EDUCATION: Issues relating to public school and university education in our community.
- B) HEALTH / ENVIRONMENT: Issues related to our environment and health of our community.
- C) GOVERNMENT/POLITICS: Issues facing local government including taxation and political moves in an election year.
- D) ECONOMY: Tracking trends affecting our community's business base as well as the rise and fall of industry in the community.
- E) LAW ENFORCEMENT: Tracking trends in neighborhood crime and the legal progress of criminal cases.

SECTION 2:

RESPONSIVE PROGRAMS

A. EDUCATION

Title: SCHOOL BOUNDARIES

Broadcast Date: 1-18

Duration: 2:44

Description: The Pocatello/Chubbuck School board is taking steps to adjust the boundaries of high schools and other schools. Its first controversial step was to drop is previous policy allowing parents to make a "school of choice". Some students said they were opposed to the change, while others felt it bothered their parents more than it bothered them. New middle school boundaries were approved, but the high school boundaries are still under review.

Title: SCHOOL THREATS Broadcast Date: 3-1

Duration: 3:10

Description: In wake of the Parkland, Fla. School shooting there have been numerous threats made to local schools. Threats closed schools in Idaho Falls, Blackfoot, Aberdeen, and Challis. In Idaho Falls, police tracked down who mailed a threat to random families in the school district. In the meantime, county prosecutors point out that those threats will be treated very seriously. Any person who threatens a school is guilty of a misdemeanor. If violence results, those charges can become more serious.

Title: BONNEVILLE CONSTRUCTION BOND

Broadcast Date: 3-12

Duration: 2:11

Description: The Bonneville School Board will ask patrons to approve a \$35 million construction bond to build a new middle school. Administrators said the project would not raise property taxes. Bonneville is already the fourth largest school district in the state and is currently growing at a faster rate than any other district of its size. Market growth will offset the need for any increase in property tax. If approved, the middle school would open in 2021.

Title: PRESTON TEACHER---PUPPY & TURTLE

Broadcast Date: 3-13

Duration: 2:21

Description: A Preston woman has pressed charges of animal abuse against a high school science teacher. She claims the teacher fed a sick puppy to a "pet" snapping turtle. The Franklin County Sheriff and Preston Police launched an investigation. The county prosecutor referred the case to another county for investigation because of a potential conflict of interest. Many students in the community voiced support for the teacher.

Title: STUDENT WALKOUT Broadcast Date: 3-14

Duration: 2:51

Description: As part of team coverage, students across the region walked out of their classrooms in support of students in Florida. While most of the participants focused on preventing gun violence, some students participated in counter protests in favor of 2nd amendment rights. School administrators had a variety of positions, but most supported the walkout because it gave students a rounded education in "self-expression".

B. HEALTH/ENVIRONMENT

Title: FLU "EPIDEMIC" Broadcast Date: 1-18

Duration: 2:10

Description: The spread of flu is hitting the nation and has killed 20 children so far. Some regional school districts are taking days off in an effort to stem the spread. Eastern Idaho Public Health is encouraging everyone to get a flu shot, stay home if they're sick, and wash their hands frequently. Most school districts are seeing near-average cases of flu this year, while some others are higher.

Title: SUICIDE PREVENTION

Broadcast Date: 1-23

Duration: 3:01

Description: Idaho currently ranks 9th in the nation for the number of suicides and suicide attempts. There has been a growing trend affecting youth. The number is not increasing, but awareness is. Warning signs include isolation, apathy, low energy, and depression. Those with similar feelings are encouraged to talk to a counselor or, at least, someone. Help lines are available for those who need them.

Title: HEMP CBD
Broadcast Date: 3-5
Duration: 2:24

Description: A new Idaho Falls business is selling THC-free Hemp Cannabidiol...also known as CBD. Snake River Solace calls it a legal health alternative. It is, technically, from the cannibas sativa ale plant, but it is excluded from the Controlled Substance Act. They claim the product is beneficial to people who suffer from seizures or Alzheimer's and those with chronic pain. The business is opening in the wake of a legislative decision rejecting cannabis oil as a legal treatment.

Title: OPIOID SHORTAGE Broadcast Date: 3-21 Duration: 1:40

Description: Hospitals nationwide are experiencing a shortage of opioid pain medications. Eastern Idaho Regional Medical Center said it was dealing with the situation through careful management. To begin with, they said they are preserving stronger medications for those with particularly dangerous needs. In fact, EIRMC said it had prepared months in advance for the shortage and had started conserving early in the process.

Title: MADISON COUNTY FLOODING

Broadcast Date: 3-23

Duration: :55

Description: The governor's office has declared an emergency in Madison County because of road damage caused by sheet flooding. About 200 miles of county roads were impacted. The county has a budget of \$25,000 per year and spent the first funding repairing the roads.

However, additional floods destroyed that work. Crews have been ordered to stay out of the area until it dries, while making plans for another round of work. Its estimated they'll have to go through the entire process again.

C. GOVERNMENT/POLITICS

Title: CRYPTOCURRENCY Broadcast Date: 1-4 Duration: 3:56

Description: The Idaho Department of Finance is advising people to be cautious about investing in cryptocurrencies like Bitcoin. Financial Advisors said it is a form of exchange that is created and stored electronically in block chains and block chains are public databases that keep a permanent record of digital transactions. The problem...they are not backed by anything with value. And, they add, there is no regulation, which could leave investors open to theft.

Title: STATE OF THE CITIES
Broadcast Date: 1-31
Duration: 2:30

Description: Madison County, Sugar City, and Rexburg presented their first-ever "State of the Cities and County" breakfast meeting with the Rexburg Chamber of Commerce. Rexburg's Center Street remodel and the impact of the solar eclipse topped highlights of the year. Rexburg also completed a costly remodel of the city's wastewater treatment plant. Sugar City is working to complete a \$3.7 million water project. Madison County is planning an upgrade of the courthouse.

Title: WATER SUPPLY CONCERNS

Broadcast Date: 2-21

Duration: 2:21

Description: Planners in multiple eastern Idaho communities are focusing on how to develop and protect municipal water resources. Leaders recognize that if their communities seek to grow they will need water for both people and industry. Aquifer recharge has been identified as one key step. While the potential impact may not be immediate, planners are meeting to ensure that water resources are well-managed.

Title: NuSCALE

Broadcast Date: 1-22

Duration: 2:29

Description: Idaho Falls will soon host a new brand of nuclear energy technology. NuScale Power has created a new safety technology that has been approved by federal regulators. Under current plans, the company will build 12 50-megawatt power reactors. Utah Associated Municipal Power Systems is contracting with NuScale to purchase the electricity. The new

reactors are much easier to manufacture and can be added in increments. NuScale hopes to have its first plants online in 2026.

Title: POCATELLO CITY HALL

Broadcast Date: 2-21

Duration: 2:42

Description: A new Portneuf River plan could bring an entirely new look to Pocatello. One proposal includes moving city hall into the "Old Town" in the downtown area. While a decision hasn't been made yet, supporters said it would be one way to begin to revitalize the area. City development specialists believe it would be a positive step that includes an expansion of Simplot Square and river development along Center Street. Officials said the project could be 5 to 15 years down the road.

D. ECONOMY

Title: SOUTHSIDE DEVELOPMENT

Broadcast Date: 2-27

Duration: 1:59

Description: Idaho Falls Realtors and Idaho Smart Growth are polling the public to determine the best way to approach renovation of the "southside" of Idaho Falls. The area includes Idaho Falls Power, the Idaho Falls Library, and Art Gallery. Initial ideas include housing, a plaza, parking structures, improved connectivity for biking and walking, and a possible recreation center. People will be invited to submit ideas at several listening posts over the next several weeks.

Title: SNOWMOBILE ECONOMY

Broadcast Date: 2-7 Duration: 2:19

Description: The Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation reports snowmobiling contributed

\$184 million to the state's economy in 2016. Officials said Idaho has more than 35,000

registered snowmobiles, which contribute to over 4,000 jobs. The industry brought 5.5 million

visitors to state from across the country.

Title: INTERNET CRIME
Broadcast Date: 2-7
Duration: 2:26

Description: Rexburg Police have assigned an officer to internet crime. The focus is on exploitation of children. The department is part of the Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force which cooperates in identifying predators in eastern Idaho. Nationally, statistics indicate children were involved in more than 10.2 million reports of on-line enticement.

Title: POTATO FIELD QUARANTINE

Broadcast Date: 3-27

Duration: 3:00

Description: A federal judge has ruled the U.S. government illegally quarantined potato fields it determined had been infested by potato cyst nematodes in 2006. The owners of the fields challenged the quarantine because it took their fields out of production. They claimed they were never given a chance to review regulations. The judge's decision primarily focused on the process used by the government in setting regulations and ordered the Animal Plant Health Inspection Service to re-do that procedure. The old rules remain in place.

E. LAW ENFORCEMENT

Title: STRANDED MOTORIST

Broadcast Date: 1-2

Duration: 2:23

Description: An Idaho Falls woman is calling for installation of new cellular phone towers in remote areas of Bonneville County. The woman said she became stranded after an accident on the Bone Road and had to walk 4 hours before finding help after finding her phone had no service. She said it was a frightening and dangerous walk and hoped officials would take action before anyone else faced similar issues.

Title: POLICE SHOOTING Broadcast Date: 1-24

Duration: 2:00

Description: Idaho Falls Police said a man shot by officers near the Common Cents convenience store died in the hospital shortly after the incident. Police responded after receiving calls about suspicious activity. He came out of an apartment building displaying "some sort of weapon", but police did not identify what that was. Two officers fired on the man. Both have been placed on administrative leave pending further investigation. The Mayor's office asked people to hold judgment until the investigation is complete.

Title: RAPE KITS
Broadcast Date: 2-23

Duration: 2:33

Description: The Idaho Legislature enacted standards in 2016 to track forensic evidence in sexual assault cases. Part of that required "preservation" of evidence kits for 55 years. The kits include a "head-to-toe" assessment, looking for any sort of injury. Storing that information is a challenge for local police. In Idaho Falls, police currently store about 14 thousand forensic items of evidence, which must be refrigerated or frozen. For the present, at least, there's no way to expand the secured evidence room.

Title: IFPD DRONES Broadcast Date: 3-8

Duration: 2:33

Description: The Idaho Falls Police Department is introducing drone technology in an effort to stay current with technology. Till now, the department has not used the devices, but one officer bought one of the drones for himself in an effort to get the program started. The process will require creation of operating policies and procedures, officer training, and figuring out a budget. Police suspect several different models and sizes will be required for different missions. Police said there are already statutes in place to protect people from illegal warrants or searches.

Title: SGT. MARLEY LEADS DIVISION

Broadcast Date: 3-22

Duration: 2:00

Description: Idaho Falls Police Sgt. Jessica Marley was selected as police officer of the year. Now, the Idaho Falls department has put her in charge of her own division. The officers involved have high praise for the first female platoon leader. The concept is to allow officers to motivate and look out for one another, both on the job and in private life. She has served with the department for 16 years.
