MOST SIGNIFICANT ISSUES - RESPONSIVE PROGRAMMING

ISSUE: HISTORY

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIRS January 7th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 28:50 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Dr. Chris Nichols. When history books are written, what will they say about the year 2024? I got some help on that question, from historian, professor and author, Dr. Christopher McKnight Nichols, who reflects on the year's most significant events for the 3rd year in a row on our show. Topics include COP 28 and climate change, the Israel Hamas war, Donald Trump, Speaker McCarthy's rise and fall, India overtaking China in population, the Russia-Ukraine war, and the passings and legacies of Senator Diane Feinstein, U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, First Lady Rosalyn Carter, and Secretary of State Henry Kissinger. We also talked about the legacy of President Jimmy Carter. Dr. Nichols is a professor of history and the Wayne Woodrow Hayes Chair in National Security Studies at the Ohio State University's Mershon Center. We discussed that on January 10th he's presenting the latest episode of an event called "Historians and the News," for the Oregon Historical Society.

Guest: Carrie Bates, Olympic Gold Medalist. Dry January. Sober Curious. What do they mean? We can find out from a long-time Portlander who happens to be a champion gold medal Olympic swimmer who suffered against addiction herself. And now, Carrie Bates works for the Hazelden Betty Ford Center, which has services available in Newberg and Beaverton. We discuss how she started drinking heavily after losing a spot on the U.S. Olympic team, how getting treatment in Oregon saved her life, how she sees fentanyl as a dangerous problem, and how she overcame addiction and helps others do it too.

ISSUE: ADDICTION

January 14th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 5:04 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Dr. Sharon Meieran, Multnomah County Commissioner. She says she thrives on information as a doctor, and believes the county needs more good information about how many people are living unsheltered on our streets, in the forests, or other places unfit for human habitation. She says some are so disabled by their mental health or addictions conditions that they can't engage and even give you information. She says the people we need to most serve who are most vulnerable aren't on these lists. We need to be proactively going out and finding out who people are and what they need and understanding this, in order to be able to invest our money wisely to get them the services and supports they need to be successful. Who has serious behavioral health issues. How many people are justice involved? How many people are survivors of domestic violence? How many families are actually out there? Then we can start to actually Get the answers we need and build what they need.

ISSUE: WINTER STORM

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 21st, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 3:31 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Maijah Washington. A winter storm that refused to loosen its icy grip, causing tens of thousands of us to lose power. The freezing rain, snow, wind, linked to at least thirteen deaths, from suspected hypothermia, fires, and falling trees. The winter storm made national news. In this episode we hear from Maijah Washington who Portland Police credited with saved a toddler's life during the storm from a downed power line. It came down on a vehicle and killed two adults and a teen. But Washington describes how it happened so fast, she grabbed the baby and walked up a hill, holding him until she could hand him off to someone who could check him, and he survived.

January 21st, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 4:37 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Oregon State Representative Dacia Grayber. Graber is both a lawmaker and a firefighter/emergency responder. She says this storm spawns a much broader question about community resilience about infrastructure reliability and how prepared we all are. She says this week of snow, cold temperatures and ice is absolutely nothing compared to what it would be when we have a Cascadia megathrust earthquake. She says it's a wake up call for all of us, herself included, to really think about what we're doing individually and personally, because there's a lot that we can do to build infrastructure. She plans to hold a hearing about what the state needs to do, and how it responded to this ice storm.

ISSUE: POWER OUTAGE

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 21st, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 2:50 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Portland General Electric's Barry Thompson. Since last weekend, Portland General Electric workers, by the hundreds, have been working to restore outages to thousands of people, Barry Thompson is an Eastern Line Manager for the company and describes why this has been a tough fight. He says the elements are a problem , the amount of damage from the trees and the wind that are down and, the scattered debris that's all over the place and the mass destruction. It's been a very big storm that's caused a lot of problems. The winds blew for such a long period of time that the crews would assess the damage, and then by the time they got back there, there was more damage. "We put it up, it falls down again. And then we're waiting on tree crews to get out there and cut the stuff out of the way. And sometimes the roads are blocked or the access is completely blocked for us."

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 21st, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 5:52 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Multnomah County Chair Jessica Vega Pederson. Multnomah County's top elected leader warned about the dangers of the cold. She asked people to step up and help others survive, pleading with them to volunteer to staff shelters. She said for too many people in Multnomah County, there is no other safe place to go, which is why the emergency shelters that they have open are so vital. She says things are not going to get easier as freezing temperatures and power outages will continue across the county. After starting at 77% capacity the first night they had our shelters open, they reached full capacity the next night, serving 821 guests in shelters across 10 different sites.

Guest: Lincoln County's Kenneth Lipp, Public Information Officer. To find out how some of the smaller counties fared during the ice storm, we were checking things out with Kenneth Lipp Lincoln County's Public Information Officer. He said it's been very difficult for a lot of people. Approximately half of their residents have been without power at some time during this storm. He expect some people to continue to be without power. Lincoln County has been working all weekend, to establish shelter options, and check on people with durable medical devices or are on oxygen to make sure they have the resources that they need.

Guest: Portland Water Bureau's Ty Kovach. The cycling between freezing and thawing caused lots of problems with broken pipes and water mains. Ty Kovach says it's been very busy for the Portland Water Bureau. So far they have responded to 1334 calls for service, a result of people having frozen pipes, leaks and main breaks and other system issues that people have called in about. He expects In the coming days, as we unthaw, we will see people have leaks on their property that are the result of the expansion of ice, causing pipes to break. He describes how homeowners can leave a trickle of water running to avoid many of these problems.

Guest: Morgan Olsen, Columbia Gorge Discovery Center. Morgan Olsen talks about bald eagles and other animals she cares for at the Columbia Gorge Discovery Center. Liberty and Ferguson are bald eagles rescued by the center, after they were severely injured. They now live as display birds for the educational program. Their Raptor program was originally established in 2007, with the assistance of local rehabilitators and raptor educators to create a dedicated place within the Gorge for raptor-based education. There are other places in Oregon where you can meet and see raptors, but in terms of animals living in and an educational program, the Discovery Center is the only one that you'll find between the Blue Mountain region and Portland.

Guest: Elizabeth, a Passenger on Alaska Flight that Lost Window. We're seeing a lot of heat directed at one of the Pacific Northwest's major employers. Boeing is caught in political cross hairs. It all started when a panel called a door plug blew off an Alaska Airlines 737-9 MAX as it flew e miles above Oregon on January 5th. That blowout left a hole in the side of the plane. In this episode we hear from Elizabeth, a passenger on the plane. She describes seeing a hole by a window, and that people in her party on the plane are safe.

Guest: U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg. Buttigieg describes how the administrator at the F.A.A., Mike Whitaker, is leading a process for the manufacturing overall being restricted to a level that they can be absolutely sure Boeing can meet with the right quality of assurance for safety

Guest: Boeing CEO Dave Calhoun. Calhoun says this time his company is going to approach this number one acknowledging their mistake with 100% and complete transparency every step of the way. He says they're going to work with the N.T.S.B. which is investigating the accident to find out what the root cause is.

Guest: Alaska U.S. Senator Dan Sullivan. Senator Sullivan was among those who spoke to Boeing C.E.O. Calhoun on Capitol hill this week. He said they're working with the NTSB, FAA, and Alaska Airlines to make sure these aircraft will be a hundred percent safe. He talked about, in terms of the timing, which also matters to Americans, days or weeks, not months for this to be fully resolved.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 28th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am :20 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Wisconsin U.S. Senator Tammy Baldwin. Senator Baldwin, a Democrat from Wisconsin is demanding that the FAA deny Boeing's request for safety waivers on a future version of the 737 MAX. She says it is a bold attempt to put profits over the safety of the flying public, and it astonishes her that they would try to do this.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 28th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am :45 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: United CEO Scott Kirby. He says on the MAX when it's flying, he's 100 % sure it'll be safe. He says they have a pretty good handle on what happened, and what the right remediation is. United's tech ops team has been working 24 7 on this. The FAA, to their credit, has been in there with them. He thinks they're near the endgame on that, and the airplane will be safe. But he's disappointed that the manufacturing challenges do keep happening at Boeing, and that isn't new.

Guest: Alaska Airlines CEO Ben Minicucci. Minicucci says it makes him mad that they're finding issues like this on brand new airplanes. The Alaska Airlines leader says many of its Boeing 7 37 MAX9 aircraft were found to have loose bolts, since the incident on January 5th, when a flight took off from Portland and had to make an emergency landing because the door plug on the plane blew out about 15 minutes into the flight. He says they had a guardian angel on that airplane, and says he's sorry to the guests on Flight 1282 for what they experienced; just a terrifying flight. He also thanked the crew.

Guest: Katelyn Bicknell. Vancouver Sinkhole Survivor. KXL's James Shippy interviews Vancouver's Katelyn Bicknell, who survived when a sinkhole swallowed the car she and her boyfriend were in during heavy rain of a winter storm.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 28th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 3:52 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Washington U.S. Senator Patty Murray. We hear Washington U.S. Senator Patty Murray asking questions of several Long COVID-19 sufferers, about what the government should do to help them. She asks them about doctors not taking their symptoms seriously or misdiagnosing them, and what it took to get treatment that worked.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR January 28th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 11:23 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Oregon State Senate Majority Leader Kate Lieber. She is previewing her goals for the February Oregon legislative session on homelessness and drugs. She talks about the addiction crisis that Oregon's facing and how what's happening on the streets of Portland is unacceptable; that we cannot continue to have open air drug markets, allow people to openly use drugs on the streets of Portland, and need to have urgent and immediate action. One of the steps that the legislature is taking is to put a joint committee together that has already prior to the start of the session has already held hours and hours worth of hearings and meetings, on addressing Measure 110.

ISSUE: DRUGS

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 4th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 5:24 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Multnomah County Chair Jessica Vega Pederson. They joined forces to fight fentanyl in Oregon, declaring a 90-day emergency. The top elected leaders of Oregon, Multnomah County and Portland announced it together. Multnomah County Chair Jessica Vega Pederson, Mayor Ted Wheeler, and Governor Tina Kotek say they have been working on it for months. And this week, Multnomah County leaders and experts held a hearing about what exactly this emergency order means, and what will it do. Vega Pederson explains the statement of emergency authorizes the county to act as an emergency management agency, and the emergency exemption coordinates the purchase of goods and services to address this emergency under Chapter 25 of the county code. The recommendations to declare a 90 day tri- governmental fentanyl emergency came from the Governor's Central City Task Force.

Guest: Jonna Papaefthimiou, Oregon's State Resilience Officer. Papaefthimiou was appointed by Governor Tina Kotek to be Oregon's State Resilience Officer, and a policy advisor on emergency response. She adds to this conversation that there is so much suffering in the world and fentanyl and its impacts on communities are often such a discouraging topic. She says this offers promise and hope, and thanks Multnomah County for their partnership and their willingness to invest in additional collaboration even at a time that your systems are stretched. She says it's exciting to see people walk up and say okay, what's working? And start to write out,where can we focus? Where can we build? And it was just that sense of problem solving together with the state, the city, and the county all in the same room looking for gaps and looking for hope. There was a lot of energy to ensure the declarations are in alignment, that we have shared commitment to employing our resources collectively in a coordinated way to get the maximum benefit out of all the energy and people, time, and money that we're already putting into it I know an important outcome of this work that we've established and practiced. She stressed they're building systems of operational coordination that can extend far beyond the 90 day declaration. The other important element is going to be a focus on data, on having measurable outcomes, about sharing and using data that goes across platforms, across employers to inform decisions and help us see progress.

Guest: Rachel Banks, Multnomah Health Department Director. Rachel Banks is also involved in this fentanyl state of emergency as Multnomah County's Health Department Director. She describes it as an approach that really engages every corner of the health department and the county, including clinical services, community-based services, corrections, behavioral health, criminal justice and public health, knitting them together for maximum impact. She says they know that this crisis will not be solved in 90 days, but they're moving forward with a sense of urgency, and will be In this for the long haul. She says there are probably very few people who have not in some ways been touched by the impacts of fentanyl, overdose or other addiction issues. It is an issue that touches people that we love in all sorts of systems that we work in.

ISSUE: AUTHOR / BOOK

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 4th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 13:23 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Dr. Kelly Lytle Hernandez, Oregon Historical Society Hatfield Series Speaker and Author. I talk to an award-winning author and professor who's making a special appearance in Portland on February 6th to speak for the Oregon Historical Society's Hatfield lecture series. Dr. Kelly Lytle Hernandez is a history professor at U.C.L.A. She wrote the book, "Bad Mexicans, Race, Empire, and Revolution in the Borderlands." She explains the title of the book comes from language used by the dictator in Mexico at the turn of the 20th century, who disparaged dissidents against his regime by calling them "malos Mexicanos," or bad Mexicans. She ties this to current events, and dangerous rhetoric that is used to target people who challenge regimes, whether they're migrants looking for a better life, or they're political dissidents trying to change the political and economic arrangements of the world.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 11th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 3:31 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Oregon Governor Tina Kotek. Oregon's Governor Tina Kotek told lawmakers they should not end their session without passing her housing plan. She says, it's the number one issue for people across the state. Senate Bill 1537 includes \$400 million for moderate-income housing and things that support it like roads and sewers. It would create a Housing Production and Accountability Office.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 11th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 2:00 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Mark Meek, Oregon State Senator. Meek represents Senate District 20, Oregon City, Glastonbury, and Happy Valley. He strongly supports Senate Bill 1537, which he says will make life more affordable and accessible for many Oregonians. He says there's no more urgent need this session than to pass than this legislation, Oregon needs over a half a million new homes by 2040, and to hit that mark the state must double its annual rate of production. He says builders and landowners need more land for housing, including affordable options for low to moderate income families.

Guest: Julia DeGraw, Oregon League of Conservation Voters. Her group opposes SB 1537 as it is currently written because of because of its Urban Growth Boundary expansion sections. She says her group decided to name Sb 1537 as a major threat to a healthy Oregon. She agrees Oregon has a housing crisis, and urges lawmakers to amend the bill.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 11th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 5:37 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Lucetta Elmer, Oregon State Representative. Elmer says she and other lawmakers are working on House Bill 4134, which they call "Housing Oregon's Workforce." It would give grants to cities for infrastructure projects, to benefit housing developments with developers pitching in by making at least 30% of their units affordable for workforce income households. She says we all recognize there's a problem of housing shortage in Oregon. And we have a problem with infrastructure. So this bill is looking to address both of those. She says Oregon ranks 47th nationally for housing production.

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR February 11th, 2024 7 am to 7:30 am 2:02 minutes of a 30-minute show

Guest: Beth Castor, Realtor. People with average incomes in Oregon, struggle with the high cost of housing. Castor is a realtor from McMinnville who has worked in the field since 2000. She supports HB 4134, because as a realtor, she witnesses every single day the fact that our community is in a housing shortage crisis right now. It's a stumbling block for companies that want to bring in workers. This ongoing crisis contributes, in her opinion, to driving the prices of rents and properties up, often out of reach, for teachers, firefighters, medical personnel, and tech workers. In order for our community to grow new jobs, this means providing middle housing has become imperative. HB 4134 provides a vehicle for an already approved subdivision to move forward with the infrastructure needed.

Guest: Michelle Nieves, DHM Research. DHM's polling of 500 people in the three counties of the Portland metro found the top issue they think needs to be addressed in the region, is homelessness at 40%. She says it has been the top concern, for the past several years. And that's true statewide. Public safety is the second highest priority. And then this year they found that 16% percent mentioned drug use or addiction.

Guest: John Horvick, DHM Research. Also analyzing results from the DHM Research poll in December of residents in the Portland metro; he's describing a very partisan divide when it comes to help people in the three counties view the city of Portland and their taxes. Democrats and Republicans are living in two different worlds. 84 percent of Republicans are saying that their taxes are too high relative to the services that they receive, but it's a clear majority of Democrats too, at 62%, and non affiliated voters, at 67%.

In this year's election, McLeod Skinner is vying for a rematch. She and Oregon State Representative Janelle Bynum will face off in May's primary for the right to represent the Democrats in November's general election against Republican Congresswoman DeRemer. So in this episode, we take a closer look at McLeod Skinner. She describes her rural roots and upbringing, and how they inform her choices and leadership goals and style.

Guest: Maxine Dexter. An Oregon doctor and lawmaker describe seeing a teenage boy, the same age as her son, overdosing in a hospital. The teen accidentally took a pill laced with fentanyl. Dr. Maxine Dexter said that the incident inspired her to work on Oregon's opioid harm reduction policies that passed in the state legislature. And now, she wants to take the same ideas, to the national level. Dexter is running for Congress in District 3, among the democrats competing in May's primary, for the chance to represent the party in November's election. The winner will replace the retiring Earl Blumenauer, who's held the job in Congress for almost thirty years. So in this episode, we are focusing on Dr. and State Representative, Maxine Dexter: and what she wants to do if elected to Congress.

As we continue our series on candidates running in the May primary election for Congress in Oregon, Susheela Jayapal hopes she can win the right to represent Democrats in November's election for Oregon's 3rd Congressional District. It's significant because it's the first time in about 30 years the position's open, with longtime Congressman Democrat Earl Blumenauer not seeking re-election. Jayapal's sister, Pramila, was elected to Congress from Washington state in 2016. Susheela Jayapal describes her service as a Multnomah County Commissioner from 2019 to 2023, when she resigned to focus on her run for Congress. We hear about her origin story with her family, an immigrant, originally from India. She came to the U S when she was 16, to go to college. She says her parents really believed in the American dream and they stayed behind in India. She says like millions of people around the world, they genuinely believed that in order to give her and her sister a fair shot opportunity, they needed to send them to the U.S., wiping out all of their savings to send them here. She talks about her work as a corporate attorney, then community volunteer, and her work on issues including health care and pay equity.

She says this is an emergency, which is why they need every single shelter bed we currently have. We need to add 1, 000 more beds, and we need to fill each bed every night. Other things that make it different this time: they have more and better data. This data is collected over time through outreach and a by-name list. This plan is more specific about how, when, and who will need to do this work. And this is about meeting people in their most vulnerable moments, whether it's at a point of behavioral health, crisis response, shelter, housing, or through the justice system.

Guest: Ted Wheeler, Portland Mayor. He says the homeless crisis is the number one issue facing Portlanders. And the new plan with the county is not the beginning point. During his time as Mayor, he says City Council has reinvented local government to address the homeless crisis. They've shifted dollars, created and funded new programs, developed new partnerships, established the task sites, the SRV sites, associated services, and created hundreds of new full service shelter beds. He says they've significantly increased the impact reduction program, created the Portland Office of Environmental Management, launched the Portland Street Response Program, and did five emergency declarations to move the work more expeditiously.

Guest: Ann McInerney Ogle, Vancouver Mayor. She says Vancouver residents have shared that addressing the impact of homelessness in the community is important so in 2023, the city declared a state of emergency to respond to the growing crisis of homelessness. With the contributing and deadly factor of fentanyl, she says it was clear they needed more tools and the ability to act quickly. So far, they have closed five areas to camping, cleaned up camps, expanded mental health response teams, and opened their third and fourth safe stay villages. Within a year, they're opening a 100 to 150-bed bridge shelter. In 2023, voters passing Proposition 3 for creating and maintaining affordable housing stock and helping those who are most vulnerable. That levy will raise 10 million annually for 10 years.

Guest: Chris Hoy, Salem Mayor. Hoy says 58% of Salem residents listed responding to homelessness as the number one issue they wanted the city to address. He explains that cities have no funding mechanism to address homelessness. Cities are set up to provide infrastructure and public safety: water, wastewater, streets, parks, police, and fire. Counties are funded to provide social services to residents. They're responsible for Salem residents behavioral health treatment, addiction treatment, and public health. And they receive money from the state to address these issues. But in cities like Salem residents expect action. He explains the city used one time grants and COVID relief funds to step up and address homelessness, but Salem's revenue system has never been adjusted to fund these services annually. He says the residents' expectations have pushed him and other city leaders to explore new partnerships and develop new strategies the reach beyond the capacity of Salem alone.

Blackhawk includes the history of indigenous people in the Pacific Northwest, such as the oldest continuously operating Native American boarding school, which is in Salem, Oregon. Blackhawk will be visiting Reed College and also speaking for the Oregon Historical Society's Hatfield lecture series at the Arlene Schnitzer auditorium during his visit to Portland.
