Mr. Forrister came on today to talk about 1.) The Judicial Override: Alabama Arise is celebrating the 30-1 Senate cote and the 78-19 House vote to end judicial override in Alabama, the last state to allow the practice. 2.) Predatory Lending: The Alabama Senate is considering Senator Arthur Orr's bill to allow payday loans at the current fee of \$17.50 per \$100 borrowed, but only for 1 month. If you don't have money to pay off the loan at the end of the month, you would automatically go on an "off ramp" to a 3 month installment loan at 3% per month. The Alabama House is considering an entirely different approach; Rep. Bob Fincher would ask voters to approve a constitutional amendment to limit consumer loans to 36%. 3.) Grocery Tax Task Force: Mr. Forrister was named by Governor Bentley to the grocery Tax Task Force, which had its first meeting last Tuesday, April 4. Alabama is one of four states that tax groceries fully with no rebate. Removing the 4% state portion of the sales tax on groceries would reduce school budgets by more than \$350 million statewide. He discussed how that revenue could be replaced. He also discussed Medicaid's transition to regional managed care (RCOs); Medicaid expansion; minimum wage increase, "ban the box" on job applications to give people with criminal records a fresh start, and the proposed Public Transportation Trust Fund.

Topic: Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention

Guest: Sallye Longshore, Executive, Alabama Child Abuse and Neglect Prevention

Ms. Longshore talked about “the Children’s Trust Fund” – that was created by an Act of the Legislature in response to the Federal Child Abuse Prevention and Treatment Act (CAPTA). They work to strengthen families and ensure children grow up in nurturing, supportive families. She said the sole mission of the agency is to prevent child maltreatment from ever occurring. They blend and braid different funding sources to grant funds to community-based organizations throughout the state that deliver programs focused on preventing child abuse and neglect. They are currently funding 145 programs in the state, and the types of programs include parent education and support, home visiting, fatherhood, respite, mentoring, school based, and public awareness. The program staff at the agency provides on-going training and technical assistance to grantees. April is Child Abuse Prevention Month, and their agency also serves as the Alabama Chapter of Prevent Child Abuse America. Grant applications for 2017-2019 (2 years) are currently available on-line. The agency’s Board of Directors makes the funding decision during a review of applications in June. This and more information can be found on their website at ctf.alabama.gov.

Ms. Rayburn came on today to tell the viewers what the Alabama Organ Center is, what the significance of April is for the Alabama Organ Center, how to register to be an organ, eye and tissue donor, and to tell them everything else that they need to do. They are the federally designated organ procurement organization for the state of Alabama, and serve as the link between the donor (and their families) and the recipients of the gifts. April is National Donate Life Month and serves as an opportunity to raise awareness about the importance of organ, eye and tissue donation. To be an organ, eye and tissue donor, most people register at the DMV, but you can also register on-line through their website by completing a form and submitting it to the Alabama Organ Center. Ms. Rayburn said they encourage people to have a conversation with their family about their donation wishes. Those conversations can be very impactful for the family and give them confidence in the donation decision. She and Tim also discussed how donations work. She said first everything is done to save the life of the individual, but when those efforts are not successful, the Alabama Organ Center is called. They screen every hospital death for donation opportunities and approach families about donations and discuss their options. They coordinate the donation process for those families who say yes, and after the donation is complete, they follow-up with the family so they know the outcome of their generosity and how the recipients are doing. A \$500 million theme park being built near the beach, a national monument for civil rights in Birmingham, and the reopening of a legendary recording studio in the Shoals are just a few of the new summer travel destinations in Alabama. Several well-known attractions in the state have new additions including a \$16 million facility at the Huntsville Botanical Garden, an exhibit honoring the centennial of WWI at the USS Alabama and “tiny house” cabins built at Roland Cooper State Park. The summer tourism season is good for the state’s economy with families spending money in hotels, gas stations, shops and restaurants across the state. Mr. Brennan said the department suggested the following destinations for summer vacation trips: OWA, a 520 acre (\$500 million) family friendly tourist destination just seven miles from Alabama’s popular Gulf coast beaches; the Birmingham Civil Rights District designated national monument; Muscle Shoals sound Studio; Huntsville Botanical Garden (with a new \$16 million venue); Carnival Cruise Lines; USS Alabama; Mardi Gras Park; “Tiny House” stays at Roland Cooper State Park; Pizitz Building Food Development; and Dash of the Unexpected Geo Tour;

Like Mr. Brennan, Mr. Lein told the viewers about Alabama’s beautiful state parks, where you can explore the great outdoors and enjoy many activities. Director Greg Lein said budget woes have caused some of our park funds to be transferred to other public programs. A study shows state parks have a \$375 million economic impact on the state. About half of the visitors to Alabama State Parks are out of state, and bring new money that is infused to our economy. Mr. Lein also said most of our money comes from the customer’s coming in to the parks and using the parks. He said if they can’t hang on to that money, it’s almost impossible to be able to serve the public and be good partners. At the end of last year Mr. Lein said that they earned about \$32 million of guest revenue coming in to the state park system. Mr. Lein reminded the viewers of events, summer kick off deals, and last minute deals, during the summer at some of the state parks. Enjoy fishing, golfing, zip lines, trails, camping, etc. Many weddings are also held at event facilities.

Karen Baggett, Stroke Coordinator, The Jackson Clinic

Dr. Salazar, and Ms. Baggett want people to be aware of strokes and to know what to do if one happens. They gave the definition of a stroke – a stroke occurs when blood flow to the brain is interrupted - and told how brain cells die without oxygen. They listed three kinds of strokes and said a major cause of two of them (ischemic and hemorrhagic) is un-controlled hypertension. Along with ischemic and hemorrhagic, a TIA is transient ischemic attack that is a warning or a mini stroke. They went in depth describing what these strokes do. Nearly 800,000 people in the United States have a stroke every year, and stroke is the #5 cause of death in the United States killing nearly 130,000 people a year. It is the #4 cause of death in Alabama, and is the leading cause of long-term disability. Someone in the United States has a stroke every 40 seconds. They told the viewers about the warning signs: **BEFAST** – **B**, sudden loss of *balance*; **E**, sudden trouble seeing out of one or both *eyes*; **F**, sudden weakness on one side of the *face*; **A**, sudden weakness in one *arm* or leg; **S**, sudden slurring of *speech* or loss of *speech*; **T**, **Time** to call 911. They also discussed treatment, stroke risk factors, and stroke prevention.

The River Region United way directly impacts 135,000 lives every year (that's 1 in every 3 people). On June 19th-22nd United Ways around the world will provide meaningful, impact-oriented service opportunities that advance their goals in education, financial stability and health through the annual Day of Action. The purpose on this day is to mobilize the caring power of volunteers to make a meaningful impact in the River Region. This year's focus is summer reading proficiency. Davis Elementary School is their partner organization this year, and Ms. Cooper said that volunteers are needed to make the event a success. Mrs. Anderson Finley-discussed community schools and how parents can become involved to make the schools even more successful. She talked about "summer learning loss" where young people lose academic skills over the summer. She said it is one of the most significant causes of the achievement gap between lower and higher income youth, and one of the strongest contributors to the high school dropout rate. Every summer, lower income children lose two to three months in reading while their higher income peers make slight gains. She said most children lost about two months of math skills in the summer, and these reading and math losses add up. By the 5th grade, summer learning loss can leave low income children 2 ½ to 3 years behind their peers, and this is the main reason they decided on the Summer Reading Camp at Davis Elementary School. She also talked about types of activities at the program.

Mr. Marable discussed the rich history of Tuskegee, and Selma, Alabama. He told Tim and the viewers about the Selma Interpretive Center's expansion – the 2nd and 3rd floors are now open. He talked about the Annual Memorial Day Fly-In at Moton Field sponsored by Negro Airmen International. It will feature the history of the Tuskegee Airmen who were the first black pilots to fly during World War II. Dr. Reyes-Sacin discussed HIV, STDs, and antibiotic use in the community. He is concerned about the high rate of HIV and STDs among minorities in the city as well as the state. He said that Montgomery has a higher rate of STD infections than the nation, and is the most sexually diseased city in the Nation, ranking higher than large cities such as Philadelphia, Baltimore, and New Orleans with chlamydia, gonorrhea, and syphilis. He also said that our city has a higher rate than some states. He doesn't think people are getting tested for these diseases. Dr. Reyes said HIV infections are also still on the rise in the south, and especially in rural areas. It is so important for people to be tested for HIV as people can now live a very long time with proper treatment. He again gave an overview of the disease in the U.S., the South, and in Alabama, and stressed the importance of getting tested and practicing safe sex. He talked about treatments, and prevention methods that are used in combating the diseases, and gave the phone number and website for Medical AIDS Outreach of Alabama where viewers can go for any questions that they may have

He discussed gangs, and how they arrested and convicted 26 violent gang members who controlled one of their communities, and were so bold that they managed an open-air drug market place. When he first went to the community he was greeted with five gallons buckets of diesel fuel lit on fire rolling down the street. The gang members were trying to explain to them that these were their streets and the sheriff needed to go somewhere else. Sheriff Franklin also talked about his department's investigation into the murder of a 51-year-old Wetumpka woman. The suspect who lived with her has been arrested. Sheriff Franklin knew the victim, and went to school with her, and even graduated with her. He also discussed the mental health dilemma, and how those jailed and in the prison system are affected, and Elmore County's citizens irate over Alabama's soft on crime stand.
