Topic: Alabama Kids Count, Data Book

Guest: Rhonda Mann, Voices For Alabama's Children

Tim and Ms. Mann discussed the recent findings of the latest Kids Count Data Book. The book is a guide for setting policy. There is some good news – 96% of our children have some type of health coverage, 28% of four-year-olds are participating in Alabama's First Class Pre-K program which has shown to close achievement gaps by as much as 25%, the rate of child deaths has fallen slightly by 2% and the rate of teen deaths has dropped by 22%, birth to teens 15-17 years of age decreased by 48%. However, there are some areas that still need work. Alabama still has a high rate of poverty – around 27% - which affects nearly 300,000 children. Of the nearly 300,000 children in poverty almost half live in extreme poverty. Additionally, with 2/3 of our children in families where both parents are in the work force, child care becomes critically important. We need to make sure that all child care is safe care in Alabama.

Topic: Cancer Wellness Center

Guests: Wendy Anzalone, Director, Cancer Wellness Center

Ms. Anzalone told Tim about the Center's mission which is to provide supportive services, educational services and assistance to cancer patients throughout Central Alabama including those patients who lack the resources necessary to otherwise comprehensive health care. Annually the foundation that is a 501c3 non-profit organization will serve almost 1,000 clients from more than 30 counties across Central Alabama. They address the needs for financial assistance in obtaining transportation to and from life-saving chemotherapy and radiation treatments; obtaining prescription medications for free or at low cost and guiding and advocating on behalf of patients while they negotiate insurance issues or government programs such as social security, disability, Medicaid and others. Ms. Anzalone told Tim about their annual upcoming "Beat The Odds" fundraiser at Wynlakes Country Club on October 19th. All of the money raised will benefit the Foundation. Ms. Anzalone said their small budget doesn't completely reflect the value that they offer patients. She asked everyone to come out and support the Foundation during this back-by-demand casino themed event.

Topic: Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education Guests: Dr. Tracey Strichik, Director, Office of School Readiness

Mr. Lee Johnson, III, Office of Early Learning and Family Support

Today's guests told Tim and the viewers all about DECE. They talked about a pilot program that is managed in partnership with the State Department of Education to improve student success by aligning effective teaching strategies in early elementary school grades. Also, Alabama's First Class Pre-K program is a state funded, high quality and voluntary pre-kindergarten program for four year olds. For 11 years in a row, the program has been named the nation's highest quality pre-kindergarten programs by the National Institute for Early Childhood Education. For 11 years, he Pre-K Program has met or exceeded all ten quality benchmarks that NIEER measures to determine the quality of pre-K programs. Mr. Johnson talked about Alabama's First Teacher Home visiting Program. Through this program, The Alabama Department of Early Childhood Education provides voluntary, in-home support to parents with young children up to kindergarten entry. Currently they support home services for more than 1,500 families in 43 counties across the state. The goal of the program is to help parents be more engaged in their child's lie from birth through the start of school.

Foundation

The Gift of Life foundation discussed their Annual Candlelight Memorial event on this segment. They invited community members who've been impacted by the loss of a pregnancy or an infant to this event. In 2015, 494 babies in Alabama died before their first birthday. Another 517 were still born or died in the womb. Alabama is the 3rd highest infant mortality rate in the U.S. The problem is particularly concerning the African American community where black babies are dying at a rate that is 3 times greater than that of other children. This is contributed to lack of prenatal care or access to care early enough in pregnancy; stressors like domestic violence, lack of adequate housing, good nutrition, and the health of the mother prior to becoming pregnant; unhealthy lifestyle choices and behaviors – smoking, drug use, STDs; safe infant sleep practices. They talked about their visitation programs that send RNs and Licensed social workers into the homes to provide support and education until the child reaches age 2.

Topic: Central Alabama Aging Consortium,

Surest: Sandra Whatley, SHIP Director, Central Alabama Aging Consortium

Ms. Whatley returned this year to remind the viewer of Medicare's Open Enrollment Period – it is the time that changes can be made to Medicare coverage. Open enrollment runs from October 15 through December 7, and changes that are made will take effect on January 1, 2018. She told the viewers to know the changes you can make during the enrollment period – adding, dropping or changing how you receive benefits, etc. She said to review your current Medicare health and drug coverage, and to consider access to providers you want to see; access to preferred pharmacies; access to benefits, services, and prescription drugs that are needed, and the total costs for premiums, deductibles, and cost-sharing amounts that you pay. Ms. Whatley advised the viewers to protect themselves from plan marketing violations and enrollment fraud. Medicare has rules about how plans can communicate with you during Open Enrollment. Plans can market themselves by sending mail, but are not allowed to call, email, or visit you in person without your permission. Anyone needing additional information can contact her, or visit their website.

Ms. Weir came on to talk about Montgomery's ZooBoo that is a family friendly and safe alternative to trick or treating for the 26th year. It's fun for the entire family, with scary and non-scary hayrides, treats, costumed characters, inflatables, and children's games. Several of the zoo's creepiest and most elusive nocturnal animals will be featured during the new Creatures of the Night' Maze. The Pumpkin Pull is a kid-friendly ride through whimsical scenes including a ghost party, super heroes, and a pirate on the high seas. For those who really want to be scared, they can take a trip around the zoo on the Haunted Hayride that is filled with screams, fright, and chills as they face their greatest fears and phobias in the dark. All major animal exhibits will be closed during ZooBoo, and animals will be in their night quarters. Select education departments animals will be featured during the "creatures of the Night" maze offered each evening. A Zoo volunteer came along with Ms. Weir, and brought a surprise guest – an Eagle that didn't like being on set. The 11 night event will be held October 3-15, October 20-22, and October 27-31. A doctor scheduled to come in to discuss Breast Cancer Awareness Month cancelled at the last moment, and Margaret Lynne Ausfeld from the Museum of Fine Arts filled-in at the last notice. She discussed current exhibitions at the Museum - Hans Grohs and the Dance of Death and Frank Stella. Ms. Ausfeld also told the viewers about upcoming events that are scheduled, (Earth's Heart, College Night, Family Art Affair and Jazz Jams). She talked about Saturday Brunch, Sundays at the Museum, and the Museum's plans for Christmas.

Topic: One Place Family Justice Center

Guest: Kaye Harris, Director, One Place Family Justice Center

On today's show Ms. Harris talked about Domestic Violence Month and reminded the viewer that domestic violence is not a singular incident, but is an insidious problem that is deeply rooted in our culture. She gave domestic violence stats - on average nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equals to more than 10,000,000 women and men. Both women and men have been victims of severe physical violence by an intimate partner in their lifetime. She gave numbers on stalkers, and said that on a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide. She said the presence of a gun in domestic violence situations increased the risk of homicide by 500%, and intimate partner violence accounts for 15% of all violent crime. She talked about the Center's Mission and Purpose - they believe everyone has the right to live without violence or the rear of violence. They aim to be a comprehensive service and support center which provides greater safety, access to services, and confidentiality for victims of intimate partner violence, sexual assault, stalking and child and elder abuse. The U.S. Justice Center identified the Family Justice Center model as a best practice in family violence intervention and prevention. She talked about their partners onsite and in the community; the services that they provide onsite and in the community; and what the viewer can do to help - VOTE (support candidates that take a firm stand against domestic violence, Advocate, Educate, Volunteer, and Contribute. She said they cannot do the work without the financial support of our community. She invites the viewers to join One Place in imagining world without violence.

Topic: State of the State and Country

Guests: Mark Potok

Mark Potok spent the past 20+ years at the Southern Poverty Law Center fighting for equal rights and justice for people all over the United States. He has now retired from the center, and is in the process of writing a book. He said the past election was something that he has never seen, and he doesn't see the situation getting any better anytime soon. The climate of the country has changed, and people feel like they say and do whatever they want to do since we have a President that makes racist remarks, and cater to racists, skinheads, haters and trouble makers. Tim and Mr. Potok discussed the upcoming special election. Roy Moore defeated Senator Luther Strange, and is now running against Doug Jones, the Democratic Candidate. Roy Moore has been removed from two political positions for failing to obey the law. The racial undertones of the country were discussed, as well as a recent opinion that he wrote ("Is This The Nation's Nastiest Monument?") that was published in U.S. News. They also discussed an article that he wrote for the Daily Beast.

Topic: Aids To Inmate Mothers

Guest: Carol Potok

Ms. Potok discussed AIM and how it helps women that are incarcerated. She said it is very important for the children and their mothers to stay in contact with each other. She talked about their Mission with Tim and said their emphasis is on enhancing personal growth and strengthening the bonds between inmate mothers and their children, and to fight for the rights of the children whose mother is in prison. AIM was founded in 1987 by church women, the Alabama Department of corrections, the Alabama Prison Project, and a group of volunteers that came to know that many incarcerated women never got the opportunity to see their children. Ms. Potok talked about visitation, how the visits are arranged, how long they last, and the children's reactions when they see their parents. She also talked about AIM's Storybook project. The Moms have the opportunity to record a storybook for their children and give them messages of love. Families say the children love to get the books and see their moms on video. Tim asked what happens if the mother doesn't know how to read, but it is always worked out somehow. Carol talked about "Fly Me To The Moon", AIM's 30th Year Anniversary Celebration that will be held on November 14 from 6-8 P.M. The tickets are \$30, and all money raised will benefit Aid To Inmate Mothers.

Topic: Joint Collegiate Health Forum on Sexual Health Guests: Dr. Joye Barber-Owens, Medical Outreach

Dr. Teresa Brown, Local Physician

The forum is being held for collegiate men and women to educate them on the prevalence of HIV and STDs in our community and how they can make responsible choices when it comes to sexual health. Montgomery County, Alabama has the highest rate of gonorrhea, chlamydia and syphilis of any city in the country, based on the CDC's 2013 data. Montgomery has a population of just over 200,000 and had an STD infection rate of 1,899 per 100,000 people. Of the more than 1.1 million people in the U.S. are living with HIV today, and 1 in 7 of them don't know it. Of the groups most affected, gay and bisexual men, particularly young African American gay and bisexual men, are the most affected. Southern states bear the greatest burden of HIV, accounting for 50% of new infections in 2014. The forum will also cover sexual assault, because much of it is still not reported. We are seeing examples of this played out with Hollywood producer Harvey Wienstein who has been accused of sexually assaulting actresses who for years kept silent about what happened to them because of his power and influence in the industry. The doctors said they will explore why women don't report this, and what community resources are available to them when they report sexual assault.

Topic: Montgomery Friendship Mission

Guests: Tammy Middleton, Executive Director, Montgomery Friendship Mission

Friendship Mission houses homeless men, women and women with children with approx. 100 staying per night. It offers many classes and programs to assist the residents with obtaining permanent housing and remaining self-sustaining. Friendship Mission has a soup kitchen that feeds anyone experiencing hunger. The men's shelter is open to the public seven days a week for lunch and dinner. Ms. Middleton said that due to the continuing need in the community, the mission opened a thrift store in 2016 with hopes of filling the financial gap that is needed to not only run the shelters but expand and offer more beds, programs, case management and make improvements to the shelters. She discussed what has made the difference in their success - (IE case managers, ministry, mandatory volunteer hours, etc.); what we need to make the thrift store profitable in our community; their top two needs from the community; and how churches and the community can provide donations to Friendship Mission. She said it is very important to point out that they have a large amount of mental health patients in the shelter if possible.

Today's guests talked about The River Region United Way and its impact on our community; and how the public can help by supporting the 2017 Campaign. The United Way has served this community for 94 years and their key focus areas are Health, Education, Financial Stability and Basic Needs. Currently they fund more than 80 programs at 40+ agencies (in those focus areas). They serve the five-county River Region (Autauga, Elmore, Lowndes, Macon and Montgomery counties), and through the programs funded and projects like the annual "United Way Day of Action," the lives of nearly 135,000 people are impacted every year. Indirectly, the lives of everyone in the River Region are impacted. What sets the River Region United Way apart from so many other nonprofits is that they assess the needs in our communities; they acquire the resources to address those needs; allocate donated funds for programs that meet these needs; and account for those donations to ensure they are used effectively and efficiently. All of this is accomplished with about 150 volunteers from the very communities they serve. Mr. Hill and Ms. Dennis told the viewers how they can support the United Way through workplace giving campaigns, individual contributors, etc. United Way's annual fundraising campaign takes place every fall, and this year they are not announcing a big public fundraising goal. Cynthia visited today to tell the viewers that The Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts is two weeks away from the highly anticipated *Artist Market* and the opening of *Uncommon Territory*, an exhibition commemorating Alabama's Bicentennial. Both events will showcase art created by the hands of living Alabama artists. The Artist Market will feature works for sale by 30 artists from Alabama and Georgia. Topic: Early Childhood Education

Guests: Jenna Ross, Secretary, Alabama Department Early Childhood Education

Since the Department just gave a general overview of the state pre-k program a few weeks ago, Sec. Ross talked about the First Class Pre-K program's outcomes. In particular research from the Public Affairs Research Council of Alabama. PARCA has analyzed student achievement through the sixth grade and found that those who participated in Alabama's First Class Pre-K program consistently outperformed their peers in reading and math on state assessments. PARCA also found that the typical achievement gap between low-income students and their higher-income peers was closed by 29% through the sixth grade for students that participated in First Class Pre-K. Secretary Ross also discussed the program's funding levels and the infrastructure that her team has put in place to ensure quality as the program continues to expand. Currently, the Alabama First Class Pre-K program receives \$77.5 million in state appropriations. This is enough funding for 938 classrooms across the state. However, this is only enough classrooms to enroll approximately 28 percent of four-year-olds, and there are long waiting lists at nearly every pre-k site. For the current school year, more than 30,000 four-year-olds signed-up to participate. However, of that total, more than 13,000 fouryear-olds were left without a spot. She said if Tim tell her what counties are in the viewing area, she will bring more specific numbers.

Topic: Book, "There Must Be A Witness"
Guest: Sue Bell Cobb, Retired Judge, Author

Judge Cobb's book "There Must Be a Witness" profiles a group of advocates in Alabama who have devoted themselves to fighting to help children thrive. This collection of stories, compiled by Judge Cobb, the state's first female Chief Justice and former juvenile court judge, draws back the curtain on what drives such reformers. She said own life of advocacy stems from personal experiences in courtrooms across Alabama. As a jurist she was bound to serve the law; as an advocate she championed some of the state's most sweeping child policy reforms in recent decades, including a toe-to-toe fight with back-slapping tobacco company lobbyists. Along the way she was humbled by the inspiring group of child advocates she met digging firebreaks against poverty, child abuse and neglect, inadequate medical care, and shortcomings in education. Collectively, the stories included in this volume call us to stand witness and testify to policymakers on behalf of children—to insist that government be used as a force for good. Judge Cobb gave her opinion on the Roy Moore sexual allegations, and talked about running for Governor in 2018.

Mr. Mielke talked about the Habitat For Humanity's ReStore, and told the viewers what it is, and what it does. They establish a relationship with the people getting the homes, and stays in touch with them to make sure things are going well for them. they don't give them money for any upkeep or repairs on the houses, but often recommend plumbers, roofers, and others who they have used, and know that they are seasonable. They are currently remodeling 2 donor houses that have been donated to Habitat, will have applications opening up during the first of the year for future homes. Mr. Mielke said Children of parents who have gotten homes usually apply for Habitat homes as well.

Topic: Family Sunshine Center, Sexual Harassment Program Guest: Robert Pasley, Sexual Assault Program Coordinator, FSC

Mr. Pasley talked about the Sunshine Center's newest client service, Sexual Assault Counseling and Emotional Support. Corporal Thornton came on today to tell the viewers what they can expect at times on Alabama roadways during the holiday season.
