Topic: Department of Corrections, Documentary

Guest: Julian McPhillips

Mr. McPhillips came on today to discuss Alabama's prison system, overcrowding, violence, a guard that he represents who has been cleared of the crime that he was charged with, the legislature's failure to budget for new prisons, etc. He said that he doesn't see it getting any better until something is done. Mr. Phillips also discussed the Capri Theater's refusal to show the documentary "Atticus v. The Architect", that is about the prosecution and imprisonment of former Alabama Governor Don Siegelman. The theater rented it to a group but the board of directors canceled the agreement saying a Capri board member is portrayed in a falsely and defamatory way. It is shown in other cities around the country. Mr. McPhillips plans to ask the President to pardon Siegelman.

Topic: The Annie E. Casey *KIDS COUNT Data Book*

Guests: Rhonda Mann, VOICES

Ms. Mann came on today to give an overview of The Annie E. Casey *KIDS COUNT Data Book*, which is an annual glimpse at data measuring the overall well-being of the nation's children. This report, along with our *Alabama Kids Count Data Book*, gives policymakers insight into how children are faring in the state and in what areas policymakers should focus their efforts to help improve child well-being. Alabama improved in 11 of the 16 indicators the Annie E. Casey Foundation 2017 *KIDS COUNT Data Book* measures to determine a state's overall child well-being, and in 6 of those indicators the state was equal to or better than the national average. For the first time since the Annie E. Casey began measuring the current economic well-being indicators, Alabama showed improvement in all four indicators. Alabama also ranked very well in the *KIDS COUNT* health indicators. The state ranks 5th in the country in providing health insurance to children. According to the Annie E. Casey *KIDS COUNT Data Book*, 97 percent of all kids have health insurance in the state. Overall, the state is ranked 44th - two spots higher than last year's report. This improvement shows that Alabama is making great strides in improving the overall well-being of Alabama's children and that many of the programs policymakers have put in place are working. However, the ranking also shows that we still have a long way to go.

Mr. Sherman came on today's show to reflect on his years as Artistic Director of the Alabama Shakespeare Festival, and to talk about his many accomplishments, and highlights of his career. He told Tim the process that they would go through in order to get plays staffed and produced, and how many of the actors are the same ones that had roles in the same play in other states. He talked about his retirement, even though he won't be fully retired. He will still be involved in the theatre though it will be in his home town in upstate New York. He said that his years in Montgomery were some of the best of his life, and he will most definitely visit as he has several close friends in the area.

Topic: Alabama Department of Archives and History

Guest: Georgia Ann Hudson, Alabama Department of Archives and History

On today's show Ms. Hudson talked about the Summer events at the Archives : Alabama in the Movies – free movie nights on Thursdays in July featuring movies filmed or set in Alabama; Genealogy workshops – August 12 – African American Genealogy: The Basics and Beyond; also 2 upcoming workshops in October and December; Food For Thought programs on the 3rd Thursday of the month, and book talks scheduled periodically; They also discussed general info about the Museum of Alabama and how to visit this summer (hours, parking, etc.). Ms. Hudson gave an update about Alabama Bicentennial events, specifically a series of teacher professional development institutes that are being held across the state this summer. Topics include: early statehood, Indian removal, voting rights, agriculture, music, etc. She mentioned the upcoming WWI theme nights at the Birmingham Barons and the Montgomery Biscuits in August sponsored by the U.S. WWI Centennial Commission, the Alabama WWI Centennial Committee, and the Alabama Archives. They are still seeking donations for their Alabama Boomer Project, an effort to collect and document the decade after 1965 when the Baby Boomer generation came of age. The Archives will be undergoing some exterior painting and roofing repairs over the next few months. There will be scaffolding up around the building but they will remain open during regular hours.

Topic: VOCAL
Guests: Janette Granthum, Director, VOCAL

Ms. Granthum discussed VOCAL (Victims of Crime and Leniency) and the services that they provide to those in the River Region. They help crime victims and have helped to get laws changed in the state for many years. She told how the organization got its start in 1982 after the founder of the organization's (Miriam Shehane) daughter was murdered. The movement that Ms. Shehane started reshaped Alabama's Judicial System. They got several laws passed including one that allows victims to be in the courtroom even if they are going to testify; also one that allows crime victims or their families to be at the prosecutor's table during a trial; one that requires victims of violent crimes to be notified of parole hearings, and one that created a state fund to compensate victims and their families. Ms. Granthum has a sibling that was murdered so she is very passionate about what she does at VOCAL. She makes it a point to attend every parole hearing, and every appeal that she can. It is her wish that those that commit a crime, truly pay for the crime that they commit. She talked about how her organization will go to the home or other place of a crime and clean up the area after they are cleared to do so, so that the victim's family doesn't have to come back and see the blood where the crime was committed. VOCAL is a non-profit organization, and Ms. Granthum talked about their annual fundraiser

Topic: Family Promise of Montgomery
Guest: Jayme Teague, Case Manager/Assistant Director

Family Promise of Montgomery is one of 200 affiliates across the country, and is 10 years old. They have 15-25 families in their program each year, and there are 15 host churches in their rotation. She talked about their donation drives and fundraisers. For their Summer of Giving Tuesdays, this week's needs are school supplies. In September they will have their big fundraiser which is their Bid, Bang, Boom Online Auction. Their Sign Up Genius involved furniture and home goods donations (when families move out). She told the community how they can help by hosting a donation drive through their school, church, or community. She said they always need pajamas, pillows, and blankets. People can also volunteer at one of their host churches, and this allows churches to do local mission work right here in their own community.

Topic: Tourism in Alabama

Guests: Grey Brennan, Deputy Director, Alabama Tourism Department

Mr. Brennan talked about travel destinations across Alabama. A \$500 million theme park being built near the beach, a national monument for civil rights in Birmingham, and the reopening of a legendary recording studio in the Shoals are just a few of the new summer travel destinations in Alabama. Several well-known attractions in the state have new additions including a \$16 million facility at the Huntsville Botanical Garden, an exhibit honoring the centennial of WWI at the USS Alabama and “tiny house” cabins built at Roland Cooper State Park. The summer tourism season is good for the state’s economy with families spending money in hotels, gas stations, shops and restaurants across the state. Tourism is big business in Alabama with more than 26 million people visiting the state annually and spending more than \$13 billion. Mr. Brennan said the department suggested the following destinations for summer vacation trips: OWA, a 520 acre (\$500 million) family friendly tourist destination just seven miles from Alabama’s popular Gulf coast beaches; the Birmingham Civil Rights District designated national monument; Muscle Shoals sound Studio; Huntsville Botanical Garden (with a new \$16 million venue); Carnival Cruise Lines; USS Alabama; Mardi Gras Park; “Tiny House” stays at Roland Cooper State Park; Pizitz Building Food Development; and Dash of the Unexpected Geo Tour;

Topic: Alabama State Parks

Guests: Greg Lein, Director, Alabama State Parks

Like Mr. Brennan, Mr. Lein told the viewers about Alabama’s beautiful state parks, where you can explore the great outdoors and enjoy many activities. Director Greg Lein said budget woes have caused some of our park funds to be transferred to other public programs. A study shows state parks have a \$375 million economic impact on the state. About half of the visitors to Alabama State Parks are out of state, and bring new money that is infused to our economy. Mr. Lein also said most of our money comes from the customer’s coming in to the parks and using the parks. He said if they can’t hang on to that money, it’s almost impossible to be able to serve the public and be good partners. At the end of last year Mr. Lein said that they earned about \$32 million of guest revenue coming in to the state park system. Mr. Lein reminded the viewers of events, summer kick off deals, and last minute deals, during the summer at some of the state parks. Enjoy fishing, golfing, zip lines, trails, camping, etc. Many weddings are also held at event facilities.

Secretary Merrill discussed the upcoming special election for the Senate Seat that was vacated when Senator Jeff Sessions was made Attorney General of the United States, and Alabama's Attorney General Luther Strange was appointed by former Governor Robert Bentley to fill Senator Session's Seat. The election was first scheduled for December of 2017, but when Kay Ivey became Governor, she moved the election date up. Many people felt that Luther Strange got the appointment because he was supposed to investigate Governor Bentley for an indiscretion, but never did. A U.S. Congressman From North Alabama, and former Judge Roger Moore are the main Republican challengers, and Doug Jones is the favored Democratic challenger. Secretary Merrill discussed absentee ballots, and the 2016 Presidential elections. Tim asked if he thought Russia had a hand in the election, or if millions of people voted illegally.

Topic: Rehabilitation Services
Guest: Jane Elizabeth Burdeshaw, Commissioner, AI Department of Rehabilitation Services

The Alabama State Department of Rehabilitation Services (ADRS) serves children and adults with disabilities. Services are provided through 25 community-based offices that reach residents in all 67 counties. In 2016, the department served almost 50,000 Alabamians which includes Alabama's early Intervention System (birth to age 3); Children's Rehabilitation Service (birth to age 21); Vocational Rehabilitation Service (teens and adults). VRS is their largest division and provides specialized employment- and education-related services and training to assist teens and adults with disabilities in becoming employed. In 2016 they served 30,292 Alabamians with disabilities and assisted 4,607 in becoming successfully employed. Commissioner Burdeshaw told Tim all about the department and its services, where services are available, and how many of those served were in the River Region (Autauga, Elmore, Lowndes, and Montgomery Counties). She discussed the importance of the services that they provide, as well as the role the department play in helping students with disabilities do well in school. Tim asked, and she told him about the importance of technology for people with disabilities. She also discussed how ADRS partner with other state agencies and community organizations to serve people with disabilities throughout the state.

Topic: Alabama Shakespeare Festival

Eve Loeb, Development Director, Alabama Shakespeare Festival

Mr. Dildine was named the Artistic and Executive Director of the Shakespeare Festival after Mr. Geoffrey Sherman resigned. He will oversee and operation that produces 10 productions in two venues that is set in the 250 acre park with an annual budget of \$8.1 million and more than 230 employees. He is the fourth Artistic Director in 40 years at the Festival. Mr. Dildine comes to Montgomery from St. Louis and said he is very excited to be here, and to be working with Eve and everyone else at the festival. Eve discussed their annual Benefit The Bard Fundraiser that will be held on August 19th. Gladys Knight will be the performer this year, and they have many tickets left ranging from \$99 - \$125. Ms. Loeb told the viewers how they can purchase tickets by calling, going online, or visiting the box office at the Festival. The money that the event raises supports the State Theatre of Alabama's cultural programming and educational efforts. This is the Festival's only fundraiser. The Shakespeare Festival has a \$20 million impact on the River Region and is responsible for the creation of about 1,000 jobs.

Topic: Upcoming Election
Guest: Darryl A. Parker, Director of Elections

Mr. Parker came on today to talk about the special primary election. He told the viewers about the overall voting integrity of elections and machines, and talked about the role of the Probate Court in the community. He talked about the deadline to register in the upcoming election, and reminded the viewer what identification they would need when they go to the polls. He gave them a number to call if they had any problems when they got to their polling place, and how to go on line to find where they are supposed to vote if they were not sure of where to go. He gave the times the locations would open and close. Tim and Mr. Parker discussed the 2016 Presidential elections, and the President's claim that millions voted illegally at that time. Mr. Parker doesn't know about the rest of the country but is sure that illegal votes were not cast in Montgomery County. He and Tim also discussed absentee voting, the primary runoff election on September 26, and the General Election on December 12th. He gave the last day to register whether walking in, mailing, or on-line; the last day to apply for an absentee ballot; the last day to hand-deliver or postmark an absentee ballot; and the last day for military and other UOCAVA voters in the primary runoff to postmark an absentee ballot returned by mail to Absentee Ballot Manager

Dr. Faison and Mr. Darrington discussed all of the services that Health Services, Inc. provide in their outpatient locations in 10 counties. HIS is a medical home that provides access to affordable primary, preventive and wellness services distinguished by compassion, quality, integrity, and respect in all of their locations. Their services include general wellness and primary care, pediatrics, dentistry, optometry, OB/GYN, family planning, family care, counseling, Psychiatry, various treatment & disorders in children and adults; military and veterans resources, the WIC program, and many others. They are proud to be able to serve those who do not have insurance as well as those who are covered. They offer memberships to their Wellness Center in order to promote healthy physical, nutritional, and social well-being. Those wishing to join can apply online. Dr. Faison and Mr. Darrington talked about the National Health Center Week on August 14-18, and the HIS's participation. They also told the viewers about their new health center opening – the Gateway Health Center, and the ribbon cutting for the center that was held on August 18th. In total they have 10 facilities and 2 wellness centers. Mr. Darrington discussed their Reach Out and Read Program that is very popular with the youth they serve.

Guest: Paige Mitchell, Assistant Director of Family Coaching, Gift of Life
Jessie Yates, Fatherhood Coordinator, Gift of Life

Ms. Mitchell and Mr. Yates talked about their new fatherhood initiative, “Fathers In Action”, and its primary goal to improve the well-being of children through the promotion of responsible and involved fathers. Both are seasoned professionals in the field of social work, and have done a lot of impressive work that cover areas such as maternal child welfare, family coaching, male engagement, corrections, and trauma. Currently they have 40 fathers in the program and all are connected to women who are already enrolled in their Nurse Family Partnership, parents as Teachers, or Mobile Family Coaching Programs. Gift of Life is investing in Fathers because of the 24 million children in America, one out of three live without their biological father in the home, and have 4 times a greater risk of living in poverty. 7 times more likely to become a teen parent, more likely to face abuse and neglect, more likely to abuse drugs and alcohol, twice as likely to drop out of high school and be incarcerated. Fathers in Action support can offer women and children in the GOL's program to increase their family's success.

Topic: Chemical Addictions Program for Youth

Guests: Dollene McLeMore, Adolescent Program Coordinator, Chemical Addictions Program, Inc.

Ms. McLemore said the Chemical Addictions Program (CAP) is a substance abuse treatment agency that serves adults and adolescents in Alabama. The CAP Adolescent Program serves male and female youth at the Air Base Boulevard Campus in Montgomery. Adolescents receive an assessment, individualized treatment plan, drug screens, individual and group counseling, psychoeducation, family counseling, gender specific treatment, case management, activities therapy and help with transportation, if needed. The CAP Adolescent Programs provides Level 1 Outpatient Services, and Level II.1 Intensive Outpatient services to youth regardless of their ability to pay. 299 adolescents were enrolled in Chemical Addiction Programs in 2016 – 108 Adolescent Outpatient and Intensive Outpatient at Air Base Blvd., 92 at the Department of Youth Services, Mt. Meigs Campus, and 99 at the Department of Youth Services, VAAC Campus in Birmingham. CAP core services include family counseling, therapeutic groups, psychoeducational groups, basic living skills, individual counseling, activities therapy, case management, gender specific programs and materials, and drug screening. Ms. McLemore said they partner with other community organizations to provide the youngsters with a variety of activities that engage and enhance their treatment experience. The Alabama Department of Public Health and Montgomery AIDS Outreach regularly provide their clients services and education.

The Family Guidance Center of Alabama (FGC) is a non-profit organization that has provided quality services designed to strengthen families since 1959. The agency's annual Walk/Run has involved the community in a fun, healthy activity for adults and children since 2009. The event supports the services of the agency and benefits Alabama families. Ms. Berry said the Center's 9th Annual Walk/Run will be held on Saturday, September 9th at 7:30 A.M. at the Shoppes at EastChase Mall In Montgomery. There will be a 5K and 10K walk/run. Proceeds support the many programs and services of the Family Guidance Center including counseling services, parenting education, marriage education, job training, Pre-K Child Development Programs, and Child Care Training Services. She also mentioned the postrace party that has been a big hit with the participants.

The Human Rights Campaign is the nation's largest lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer (LGBTQ) civil rights organization. HRC started Project One America in 2014, when the organization launched permanent state-based campaigns in Alabama, Arkansas and Mississippi. Ms. Kendrick said these particular states were chosen because they have often been viewed as the "finish line" of civil rights fights, and rather than waiting around for LGBTQ rights in Alabama – and the two other states – to catch up to the rest of the country, HRC decided to make a significant investment to speed up the process. Each of our states doesn't have statewide protections in housing, workplace, or public accommodations; or legal state recognition for their relationships and families. Interestingly, the states in the Project One America effort have disproportionate rates of LGBTQ-headed families raising kids, according to data from the Williams Institute. Yet, at the same time, there have been coordinated attacks on LGBTQ parents' rights in the same states. Here in Alabama, one such attack came in the form of H.B. 24, a bill that enshrines discrimination into Alabama law by allowing some state-licensed adoption and foster care agencies to reject qualified prospective LGBTQ adoptive or foster parents based on the agency's religious beliefs. Through their work, they are hoping to stop bills like this from becoming law in the future, and educating the public about the effect that legislation like this can have on LGBTQ people and their families in Alabama.

Topic: Honduras Mission Trip
Guest: Dr. Jon Dailey

Dr. Jon said that this mission has been a 15 year partnership between St. John's Episcopal Church and the Episcopal Church of the Holy Spirit in Tela Honduras. The Mission team is made up of North Americans and Hondurans. There are medical professionals, but the majority of the teams have been lay people that are "flash trained" to do whatever work that is required. He said that the Mission has involved to one degree or another over the years components of medical, dental, construction, and Bible school. The short term effects – they provide several months of medications for 1,200 to 1,500 patients. The long term effects are by going to the same communities over a 15 year period, they have developed a lasting relationship with their partner church and many of the patients. Dr. Jon said that he recognizes some of his patients there, just like he does those that are here in Montgomery. He said some of the Honduran team members are high school students from the local Episcopal Church school who function as translators and in other roles. Of this group, he said they've had several to enter the medical fields, and already a gynecologist, psychologist, and dentist are in practice. Three are currently in medical school, and five or the rising seniors in the high school plan to enter the field of medicine. He said that this is really how you make a long term difference.
