Topic: The City of Montgomery

Guest: Todd Strange, Mayor of Montgomery

Our first guest of the year is Mayor Todd Strange who came on once again this year to take about the State of the City. He said there were fewer crimes in 2016 but crime was up overall. There was also some good news – the Mayor said 2016 was the best financial year the city has seen in nearly a decade, so the city is in pretty good shape financially. Sales tax went up 1%, and hotels paid off big for Montgomery with guests making up a 3.5 increase in city revenue that added up to about \$3.5 million dollars. He said the city would start seeing changes with new development projects that are set to start soon. He said the city is gearing up for several upcoming events in and around the city. The Mayor maintains a good working relationship with the Montgomery City Council.

Topic: Scaleback Alabama

Guest: Teresa B. Fair, MA, RD, LD, Alabama Department of Public Health

As she did on last year, Ms. Fair came back today to talk about health, specifically health issues related to nutrition and physical activity. The Scale Back Alabama weight loss program will start back this month, and focused heavily on promoting program awareness and participation in the program. She and Tim talked about this yearly program where teams compete to see who can lose the most weight. In the 11th year of this statewide weight loss competition for adults, the contest starts in January and ends in April. The goal is for participants to lose at least ten pounds and is a safe, gradual weights loss of 1 pound a week. The hospital participates so they can be healthy and encourage others to be healthy also. Participants are encouraged to be mindful of what they eat, what they drink, to get more exercise, and to get the adequate amount of sleep. Teams were larger in the beginning, and the winner would be the person who lost the most weight. Monetary prizes are given to the winners, and there are individual prizes as well. Health tips are given to contestants weekly. In its 11th year, it is still Scaleback Alabama's goal to educate and empower participants to get, and stay healthy.

Topic: Steam Expo
Guest: Zaron Johnson, Founder A.S.E of Ages, LLC

Mr. Johnson talked about the upcoming expo, touched on statistical data, his previous experience in STEAM related fields, and the expectations for plans after this expo. According to The Alliance for Science & Technology Research in America it has been shown that approximately 30% of students are interested in S.T.E.M related careers. This is more than 1.6 million students right now in 2016, nationally. When comparing the statistics over the past 8 years, here in the state of Alabama, we can see that males have increased from 40% to 45.5%, but females have decreased from 15.7% to 13.2% in interest. When we look at African Americans particularly there has been a decrease in S.T.E.M interest from 27.4% to 24.4%. Although, these values have fluctuated it is important for us to focus on how to increase. Here in Alabama based on Afterschool Alliance they have identified that 19% of K-12 are responsible for taking care of themselves after school. That is an approximate 148,052 students. However, 41% of youth who are not in afterschool programs want to be in afterschool programs if they were available. And of the students who are in afterschool programs, 94% of the parents are satisfied with the outcome of the afterschool programs their child attends. He also discussed funding for the program.

Topic: Homelessness in Montgomery
Guest: Molly Stone, Mid Alabama Coalition For The Homeless

Ms. Stone discussed Montgomery's homeless community, and programs in the city and State of Alabama that coordinate service for those locally. One may not see a large number of this population walking around, but they are here nevertheless, and it is a problem. There are different areas in the city where the homeless tend to go, and it is up to everyone to reach out and try to help them. Now-a-days a person can be just a check or two away from becoming homeless, and have to live in shelters, on the streets, or in some cases in their cars. Some local churches provide places of shelter for those without homes during the winter months. An annual street count of homeless people last year in Montgomery found some 800 people; later this month the Coalition for the Homeless will go out into the streets for this year's count. Volunteers will go all over the city, east, west, north, south, and even downtown Montgomery looking for homeless residents. The number will be released in the coming weeks. Last night an organization hit the streets again for an update. From North to South, east to west, and even downtown Montgomery, volunteers canvassed city streets looking for our homeless residents. The new numbers will be released in the next few weeks.

The Montgomery Museum of Fine Arts is showcasing several winter exhibitions to entertain and educate visitors of all ages throughout the season. From examples of hand-made quilts of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries, to a thought-provoking look at contemporary Japanese ceramics paired with nature photographs, there will be plenty of diversions to help dismiss the cold-weather blues. On January 26, Jennifer Swope, Assistant Curator, David and Roberta Logie Department of Textile and Fashion Arts at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, will present the 2017 Fleischman Lecture, From Bed to Wall: Quilts as Art. Swope will explore the work of Alabama and other American quilters in the context of quilts' transformation from bed covers to art. The 28 quilts in Sewn Together: Two Centuries of Alabama Quilts are presented as "exemplary pairs," demonstrating and illustrating comparisons of the varied techniques, themes, and traditional patterns as seen in 200 years of Alabama quilt making. This exhibition is organized from the collections of the Alabama Department of Archives and History and the MMFA. Ms. Ausfeld and Ms. Blocker gave the viewers dates and times of upcoming events at Museum and the Department of Archives and History.

Guests: Enrique Lang, Executive Officer, The Fair Housing Agency of Alabama

Mr. Lang visited us again to tell us about this year's symposium that will be held at Carver High School on January 24th. He talked about his work at the Fair Housing agency and generally and specifically what the agency does. The Allstate Foundation is again a partner, and he told the viewers about their involvement and their role in the project. He told Tim how the information from this symposium will help attendees achieve their American dream of home ownership; and additional ways it will be beneficial to attendees. He discussed in-depth the financial capability symposium and how it will provide the information, resources and technologies that will help improve the financial and economic viability of individuals and families by enabling attendees to: increase personal assets and financial options, improve credit reports, home purchase foreclosure prevention. Information will also be provided relative to the Alabama Tenant/Landlord Law and new renter rights. Mr. Lang gave the viewers contact information for the symposium, and how they could get in touch with him as well.

Topic: Healthy Minds Network – Mental Health Training

Guest: Lynn Beshear, Envision 20/20

Alana Barranco, Consultant with SummaSource at Auburn Montgomery

Ms. Beshear and Ms. Barranco told the viewers about the Healthy Minds Network and the upcoming Mental Health Training that will be available on Tuesday, February 28. The Healthy Minds Network announces the availability of training in Mental Health First Aid. Mental Health First Aid is a public education program that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental illnesses, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common supports. This 8-hour course uses role-playing and simulations to demonstrate how to offer initial help in a mental health crisis and connect persons to the appropriate professional, peer, social, and self-help care. The program also teaches the common risk factors and warning signs of specific types of illnesses, like anxiety, depression, substance use, bipolar disorder, eating disorders, and schizophrenia. The River Region now has 12 certified instructors in the adult and youth versions of Mental Health First Aid. Mental Health First Aid is an 8-hour training that takes the fear and hesitation out of starting conversations about mental health and substance use problems. It teaches participants how to identify, understand, and respond to a variety of atypical behaviors and mental health situations. The training gives participants the skills needed to reach out and provide initial help and support to someone who has a mental health or substance use problem or is experiencing a crisis. They also discussed the growth of the program, and gave viewers contact information.

Topic: Hope Inspired Ministries

Guest: Michael Coleman, Director

Mr. Coleman told Tim and the viewers how this ministry got its start by going over the history and success of Hope Inspired Ministries. It is a faith-based, local non-profit designed to train chronically unemployed men and women to obtain and maintain employment. Each student has to participate in a rigorous 11 week job training program as well as participate in over 400 hours of training which includes life skills, employment skills, character building, unpaid internships with local businesses, and GED preparation. He discussed their approach to alleviating poverty among their community members; told why their approach to getting chronically unemployed people into the workforce has been so successful; talked about the primary challenges of taking someone from the margins of our society and into the workforce; and gave ways the community assists them in efforts to create self-sufficiency among students. Their "Over The Edge" Fundraiser (people will rappel off the 40 Four Building) in Montgomery will be held on March 31 and April 1. Cost is \$1,000.00.

Topic: Confucius Institute – Chinese New Year

Dr. Yang discussed the upcoming Chinese New Year Celebration (Lunar New Year, also called the Spring Festival) that will be held on February 11 at the Alcazar Shrine Temple. They will have traditional Chinese New Year delicacies and entertainment; and he went over Chinese New Year traditions and their meanings. He talked about the Confucius Institute's mission which is to increase community interest in connecting with China and its people. He said this celebration is a great way for them to accomplish their mission of sharing Chinese Culture with the community. They also teach classes in Chinese culture and Chinese language since 1/5 of the world's population speak Chinese. He even taught Tim some Chinese a minute ago, and said learning the language is easier than people think. He said that all of their efforts are supported and made possible by Auburn Montgomery's commitment to diversity of people and perspectives with a culture of inclusiveness. He gave a list of other events at the Institute. Ms. Yang performed a beautiful traditional Chinese dance, one that will be featured at the New Year Celebration.

Topic: Valiant Cross Academy

Guest: Anthony Brock, Principal

Valiant Cross's Principal, Mr. Anthony Brock was today's guest. He and his brother, Fredrick Brock started Valiant Cross, an all-male private with a Christian emphasis here in the city in 2015. They wanted to start a school for all males to fill a gap and a void in some of the young boy's lives. They started with only 6th graders, added 7th graders in 2016 who stayed on for their 8th grade year. They will add a grade each year until they reach the 12th grade. In 2016 they added 30 more scholars, two instructors, and additional staff. They are now fully accredited and also AISA accredited. They have longer school days that include financial literacy, coding, robotics, and music programs. Their goal from the beginning was to combat the challenges of a single parent, low-income homes, drugs and violence. They stress discipline and structure for the at risk boys specifically from the Washington Park Area. They offer tuition assistance based on the financial needs of the families of the boys. They believe that with love, discipline, and a dedication to high expectations, all scholars can achieve. Their moto is "Rise Above". And they are taught that with honor, integrity, discipline, and love they will rise up to lead, to serve, and to inspire. Mr. Brock expects great things to happen this year.

Topic: Black History

Guest: Richard Bailey, PhD, Historian

Our guest today is an Alabama historian, and a frequent lecturer and consultant on black history. February is Black History Month, and today Dr. Bailey reminded everyone that it is important for them to know their history, regardless of their race. He talked about local Civil Rights leaders, their struggles, and their participation in the Civil Rights Movement. He talked about early educators, and how they were different from educators of today. The accomplishments of blacks today are due to those who came before, and fought for them. He told Tim about how blacks would come up with ideas, design and create things, and their "master" would then get a patent for what he had made, and get the credit for making it and benefit financially. He told Tim about Horace King, an African American born into slavery and was well known for designing roads, houses, and doing carpentry work. Mr. King designed and built the elegant circular staircase in the Alabama State Capital. He will be honored later this month when his portrait will be unveiled in the entrance way of the rotunda by the same staircase that he built. Dr. Bailey also talked about the historic Preservation Commission, and his work at the Alabama Department of Archives and History. He again stressed the importance of people knowing their own family's history first, and then following that up with local, state, national, and world history. One should never stop learning.

Topic: American Heart Month/Red Dress Dash/Go Red

Guest: Elizabeth Williams, Community Events Co-coordinator, Baptist Health

February is also American Heart Month. Ms. Williams said that Go Red For Women encourages awareness of the issue and action of women and heart disease, and also to save lives. Heart disease is the #1 killer of women; stroke the #5 killer of women in America (#4 in Alabama). Cardiovascular diseases and stroke cause 1 in 3 women's deaths each year, killing approximately one woman every 80seconds which is more than all cancers combined. 80% of heart disease is preventable through lifestyles changes like diet, exercise, high cholesterol, blood pressure and blood sugar management. Alabama is ranked 2nd in the nation for the number of deaths related to cardiovascular disease, and ranks #1 in the nation for highest rates of stroke related deaths. Alabama loses over 12,600 people to heart disease each year, and 3,400 to stroke which is 30% of all deaths in the state. That's 1 death every 80 seconds. Since Go Red was founded, 293 fewer women are dying each day of heart disease. The American Heart Association raised more than \$1.8 million in Birmingham in 2014-2015. The Red Dress Dash will be held on February 25 at the Baptist East Campus. Registration is free; t-shirt is \$25. Register today Heart.org/CentralAlabama.

Topic: City of Selma
Guests: Darrio Melton, Mayor, Selma, Alabama

During Black History Month, the black Mayor of the historic city of Selma, Alabama was featured on this segment. Darrio Melton won the run-off election to be Selma's new Mayor in October of last year defeating former Mayor James Perkins. Incumbent Mayor George Evans was defeated in the elections last August. Selma was the focus of the Southern Christian Leadership's Conference to register black voters in 1965. The demonstrations and violence gained the attention of the world as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. led this valiant, triumphant fight. The March Across the Edmund Pettus Bridge draws thousands of visitors each year, some returning each year along with politicians, celebrities, and other notable people individuals to re-enact the crossing of the Bridge. Mayor Melton discussed crime in Selma (the violent crime rate is one of the highest in the nation); the balanced budget; and building a legacy together. Tim asked about the City's refusal to pay for the Civil War re-enactment that is a big draw each year. Because of this, the event will not be held this year. Also, he is against the funding of the Bridge Crossing Jubilee this year as well.

Topic: City of Tuskegee
Guest: Tony Haygood, Mayor, Tuskegee, AL

Like Selma, Tuskegee Alabama is a historic city in Macon County Alabama. It is well known for Tuskegee University (Tuskegee Institute) where Booker T. Washington, and George Washington Carver served as Presidents of the University, and where the famed Tuskegee Airmen trained. The former Mayor, Johnny Ford, served for a total of eight terms. He is also an African-American. Tony Haywood, a former City Councilman defeated Johnny Ford in the elections last August, winning 62% of the votes. Like Mayor Melton, Mayor Haygood discussed crime in his city; their budget; education, and employment. He said that the people spoke when they elected him, and said it is time for a change, and it is time for the city to improve things. He said they are working with the people and making improvements to rebuild Tuskegee. He is working on financial stability. Revitalizing downtown, strengthening the relationship between the city and Tuskegee University, and working on economic development. There are a lot of tourist attractions in the city that could benefit them financially, and one of them is the Tuskegee Airmen Museum. Mayor Haygood also hopes to strengthen the police department by hiring more officers and buying more police cars. He talked about several other things that he would like to get done in the city. He will return later and give us an update.

Tonight is Oscars Sunday, and Mr. Fell visited with us once again to talk about the filming industry, and movies that were made in Alabama. Mr. Fell said that the atmosphere in Alabama is so diverse that filmmakers find it hard to resist to be captivated by its charms. Alabama has nurtured giants of literature, music, art and theater, and is a stunning contrast of environments that is the most biologically diverse place in America outside of California. You can drive through some of our cities and towns that seem not to have changed much in many years. He said Alabama has catered to everything from small independent shorts to massive Hollywood film productions. Two of the state's most famous actors are from the area and have close relatives in the area, and they are Octavia Spencer who is up for another Academy Award tonight, and Channing Tatum. Octavia is from Montgomery, graduating from Jefferson Davis High School before going to Auburn University. Alabama has filmed some very successful movies in the state including 42 (the story of Jackie Robinson, Birmingham, AL); Borat, filmed in Birmingham; Tom and Huck, Mooresville, AL; Sweet Home Alabama, some filmed in Eufaula, AL; Talladega Nights, Talladega Super Speedway; Space Camp, partially in Huntsville; Selma, Selma and Montgomery; Big Fish, Wetumpka, Montgomery, Prattville, and Tallassee along with several other movies.

Topic: Wetumpka Crater Lecture and Tours
Guest: Marilee Tankersley, Treasurer, Wetumpka Crater Commission
Shannon McDonald, Vice Chairperson, Wetumpka Crater Commission

Ms. Tankersley, and Ms. McDonald came by today to tell the viewers about the annual Wetumpka Crater Lecture and tour. We have all heard that "Stars Fell on Alabama". In fact, one very large meteor made quite a hit, 85 million years ago, near the end of the "Age of Dinosaurs". The greatest natural disaster in Alabama history happened near the city of Wetumpka. First discovered in 1969, an astrobleme, meaning "star wound" was confirmed and registered in 1998 by Dr. David King Jr., Professor of Geology, Auburn University, as the Wetumpka Impact Crater. Because the location was covered by a shallow sea at the time of impact, scientists have declared it to be one of the "best preserved marine impact craters in the world". Each year the Wetumpka Impact Crater Commission and the City of Wetumpka sponsor several Crater events, a Thursday evening public lecture by Dr. David King Jr., Friday school tours and Saturday public tours of the Crater. The Friday March 3 tours will be open to a limited number of school students on a first reserved basis. Teachers can call Ms. Tankersley at 334-567-4637.

Topic: Severe Weather

Guest: Art Faulkner, Director, Alabama Emergency Management Agency

Mr. Faulkner discussed severe weather in the state and natural disasters that can occur at any time. Severe Weather Awareness Week in Alabama was February 19 – February 24, and we have had some severe thunderstorms, but nothing like the tornadoes a few years ago in Tuscaloosa. Mr. Faulkner again talked about weather patterns, and the need to be prepared for them. He discussed paying attention to tornado warnings, shelters, and what to do when you are under a tornado watch or warning. He also explained the difference between a watch and a warning but said both should be taken very seriously. He advised the viewers to be prepared and to have a kit on hand at all times to be ready in the event bad weather approaches. This kit should include water, batteries, food, medicine, and important papers in waterproof bags. It is also advisable to have a weather radio on hand as well. Because of the heavy rains and flooding in some areas, he talked about how dangerous flooding can be. He said it is very dangerous to drive in flooded areas, and it is best to turn around when approaching water that you can't determine how deep it is. Mr. Faulkner advises those who live in trailers as well as those to live in houses to see a safe place when severe weather approaches.

The Wellness Coalition is unique in that its board is made up of local hospitals and community agencies (not people) who form a health care safety net. Treasurer Boozer came on today's show to talk about a new plan that will offer tax-free savings accounts to Alabama residents with disabilities. The Enable Savings Plan Alabama was launched on February 26 for Alabama residents with disabilities. The plan allows eligible Alabamians to save for their future and everyday disability-related expenses tax-free without jeopardizing their public benefits. Enable Alabama offers five investment options for savers - growth, moderate and conservative mutual funds, and two FDIC-insured, interest-bearing investment options - a bank savings investment option, and a checking investment option. Account owners can save up to \$14,000 annually in their own names, and their total assets can grow to \$100,000 without impacting resource-based benefits. Prior to the ABLE Act, people with disabilities generally became ineligible for federal benefits such as Medicaid or Supplemental Security Income if they had more than \$2,000 in assets in their name. Mr. Boozer said their focus has been to serve the needs of Alabama residents. We are excited to offer individuals with disabilities an affordable, simple and straightforward savings option that will help them achieve greater financial independence."

Spring Break is all about relaxation and recreation, but the Alabama Law Enforcement Agency (ALEA) urges everyone to play it safe. Between now and the end of April, Alabama motorists should expect busier roadways and waterways across the state as families and high school/college students head to the beach, lake or other warm-weather attraction for a little spring break fun. Whatever the plans, ALEA will work to ensure public safety, with Alabama State Troopers enforcing state laws and assisting motorists and boaters. "Spring break should be fun. We do, however, ask everyone to move safety to the top of the to-do list when planning road trips," He reminded parents to sit down with their children, particularly those who will travel with friends, and review Alabama's traffic and boating laws. He said to remind them to buckle up, to obey speed limits, to avoid texting and other distractions while driving and to use life vests while boating. Parents should also remind their children who are younger than 21 of the state's law pertaining to underage drinking, and should closely monitor teens to prevent underage consumption of alcoholic beverages. This piece of advice applies to prom season, as well.

Ms. Wright and Mr. Hasan talked about students and substance abuse and the dangers of drinking, taking drugs, and driving distracted. Ms. Wright said that those they council seem to learn more by seeing, and example than what you tell them. They have glasses for the students to put on that simulates being drunk. They then have the students pretend that they are driving, and are given a drunk driving test. Students see how an accident can happen and what all drivers go through when driving under the influence. They discussed their upcoming "No Grey Area" Campaign in Dallas, County that promotes Underage Drinking Awareness. According to the Alabama Department of Mental Health, in Dallas County, 26 % of 9th graders and almost 30% of 10th graders drink. For 11th graders the drinking rate is 34%. It jumps to nearly 54% by the students' senior year. They also discussed signs of drugs or alcohol problems; what parents can do if they suspect their teen is drinking, and the ways teens disguise alcohol use.

Mr. Paschal and Attorney Isaak discussed the problem with the child custody law practices – who the winners are losers are, the fairness, or lack thereof of the 80/20 custody arrangement, and the impact the law has on children. They talked about groundbreaking research on shared parenting: 40 studies show and 112 experts agree that “shared parenting should be the norm for parenting plans for children of all ages. Mr. Paschal talked about the Senate Bill 186 – the Children’s Equal Access Act, and hopes the Senate will vote yes on it. He gave a summary of SB 186. Existing law specifies that it is the policy of this state that parents who are divorced or separated have frequent and continuing contact with their children, but existing law established no statutory definition of frequent and continuing contact which results in an unequal application of law for parents and children across the state. Child custody determinations are predicated more on which judge hears the case rather than the actual circumstances of the case. This bill would establish uniform guidelines to be used in all child custody determinations and create a rebuttal presumption that both parents are fit to make parenting decisions. It would also require the parties to submit parenting plans in all cases.
