Topic: Torchbearer's Boys Club Projects

Guests: Rick Jackson, CEO, Boys & Girls Clubs

**Amanda Moyer, Member of Torchbearer's 7th Graduating Class, and
Alabama News Network Promotions Manager**

Leadership Montgomery's Torchbearers 7th Graduation Class has a project that it is coordinating with the River Region Boys and Girls Clubs. Mr. Jackson explained the club's functions, what all they do, etc. He said their major function is to provide services to kids who need them the most. They provide services for academic success, healthy lifestyles, and character and leadership skills. They serve 113 kids from 3 – 9 P.M. after school, and an average of 400 kids each day that comes into the club. Ages range from 6-18 and there are 4 clubs in the area. They are a mentoring agency, and are open from 3-9p during the school year, and from 9-8 during the summer. They help with homework, tutoring, and have art, games, social recreation, healthy P.E., coaching, and activities for special groups. Torchbearers chose the Boys and Girls Club as their community outreach project to help them raise funds for the club. So, they are throwing them a marketing party for the club that will be catered, serve beverages, have music from a live local band, and they are recruiting others to volunteer or contribute to the clubs. Membership is only \$5 per year, and everyone is accepted. Mr. Jackson gave out numbers and ways that he can be contacted. They serve hot lunches in the summer (partnership with the YMCA), and snacks in the fall. The party will be on October 8 from 6-8 p.m. at the Sanctuary. Torchbearer's main target is young professionals from 22-40 years old who will not just give money but to interact with the club and be a part of their lives and have a hands-on approach with the people.

Topic: Domestic Violence

Guest: Nathan Cook, New Executive Director, One Place Family Justice Center

Having grown up in a domestic violent home until adulthood, Mr. Cook said domestic violence is his primary emphasis and is very personal with him. The issue in Montgomery is a commonality, just the community has decided to do something different about it. The Center has been around for 50 years and has served 4,000 victims. They offer a lot of services at the Center. They have 10 partners in the Center and another 15-20 partners in the community – the police, forensic medical unit, legal attorneys, at the Center, and advocates to access their needs to make sure they get to the right place. Normally, a victim would have to go to 7 different places to get all of the services that are offered at One Place Family Justice Center. He said that women usually stay in domestic situations because of power and control, and when children are in the home it makes it very complicated. They don't leave because they don't know anything else. As abused as they may be, they still want to be with their parents. At One Place they talk to police, prosecutors, counselors, and they get a sensitive voice to talk to. Once they arrive at the Center, they don't need anything else.

Topic: HIV/AIDS

Guest: Jeff McCloud, Educator, Medical AIDS Outreach

Many people just forget about AIDS or HIV virus . . . mainly because it has been around for 30 years or so. A lot of people need to be educated, as it is still prevalent in our society. MAO is a private, non-profit Agency with 2 office, one in Montgomery and one in Dothan. They serve those that are HIV positive or living with AIDS, and their families as well. Theirs is a full medical clinic that provides education, referenced mental services, food bank, social services, and tele-medicine, a new innovative way where doctors can now see patients in house without leaving the office. They also have a nurse practitioner out in rural areas with clients who will be there and Telemedicine can see clients via television to help with their needs. Some rural patients can't get to various places to get the help that they need. The number of people living with AIDS is the state is very high, and cases are even higher locally because people are not being tested, and are not educated. They need to be educated and not be afraid to be tested and know their states – whether they are positive or negative; and to get into preventive care. Technology has advanced so much since MAO was founded in 1987. People are living longer, are taking less pills, and healthier and more involved. Every sexually active person should be tested for this and other diseases, and there are not different ways to go about it. Testing is free and can be done privately in homes. MAO will come to you –

they test private groups, at schools, parents, fraternities, sororities, etc. People still believe a lot of myths about the illness. He encourages everyone to get tested and educated because you can be a “spreader” if infected and unaware. Call 334-280-3349 as it is better to call them.

Topic: Mental Illness Awareness Week

Guests: Wanda Laird, Executive Director, National Alliance on Mental Illness

Jane Nichols, Board Member, National Alliance on Mental Illness

The Alliance’s mission is to educate, advocate, and support individuals and family members whose lives are affected by a brain disorder, and mental illness is a brain disorder. Mental disease is a physical mental, illness that is treatable just as cancer or some other physical health conditions. They want to educate people during this special week. 1 in 5 people will be affected in some way by mental illness, and it can happen to anyone at any age. Programs are offered for family members; individuals living with mental illness, professionals, etc. Family to Family is a 12 week course for family members; they have family support groups; classes for parents with children diagnosed by the age of 13. They have several programs, even for teachers and parents as allies; adolescents, etc., about the stymies attached to mental illness. They discussed their inaugural walk that will become their annual fund raiser. They are a non-profit agency, and are funded by writing grants, and the block-Samsa grants through the Department of Mental Health. They run about 8 different programs – all are trained through the state office, then implemented throughout their 18 affiliates in the state. Topic: Health in Alabama

Guest: Dr. Don Williamson Out-Going Health Officer, State of Alabama

Dr. Williamson discussed his years/roles with Public Health (working with people), and will now work with the Hospital Association (industry), and said he would try to advocate the same issues as he always has for the state – access to healthcare, healthy babies, healthy moms, less obesity, less hospitalization, less of all bad things. He knows and will deal with the challenges as they happen. He talked about board meetings, budget meetings, etc., during his time with Public Health. The citizen of Alabama is his patient – in individual doctor offices patients may be non-compliant, may have problems, and may have anxiety. The citizens of Alabama are sometimes non-compliant, we don't always drive the speed limit, we won't always wear our seat belts, we eat way too much, sometimes we have anxiety, H1N1, and Ebola being examples of anxiety that affected our population, He had a patient, now just a different patient, a bigger patient. His job is still to try to move the state forward. He said he did his best, he did what he could. Alabama didn't get the funds that other states got – Alabama didn't the funds for population medicine, Alabama had to deal with individualized medicine. Our funding stream is from Medicaid and Medicare, and Alabama is still a very large direct service provider. Many other states do almost no direct services, but get more substantial state money. So, we don't have the resources to do population medicine, we end up having individual medicine, which is great for the patient, but limits our ability to go out and do a mass obesity campaign, or a mass tobacco campaign, or any other of these mass intervention programs. Dr. Williams went on to discuss his last day on the job (10/30, and will start at the Hospital Association in November), Medicare, Medicaid and the progress that he thinks they made during the transition. He also talked about Legislature sessions, meetings with the Governor, covering the working poor, Alabama being the first state to do the Child Health Insurance Program in 1996, top problems facing Alabama, etc. His potpourri has been about trying to expand access, as he believes people who have access have better health outcomes. He went on to discuss the top health problems facing the state which he thinks is obesity, and smoking, with obesity being the worst. There was 20% obesity 13 years ago, 30-35% now; and will be somewhere between 65-100% in 2030. He said he left his excellent with Dr. Ted Miller, who will be the new Health Officer for the State of Alabama. We wished him well, and asked him to return once he is settled in at the Hospital Association.

Mrs. Amos shared her adoption experiences with the viewers. They only went through two agencies, and once they started the paperwork, it only took them a year. The procedure is different for some, but it went well for them. Agape's adoption Celebration is on Saturday, November 7, and it is for people interested in adoption; families that have already adopted, and to say that this is their "normal". She, along with many of the adoptive families that she knows home school their children. Her adoption costs were lower because Reyn had special medical needs. Mrs. Amos gave the phone number and email address for the event. Tim talked to Reyn in depth about being adopted and how it affects her (it doesn't, this life is all she knows). They discussed difficulties some parents have because of the age of the child up for adoption, medical, special needs, different races, etc. Mrs. Amos uses "Rescue", a softer word, rather than adoption. Topic: Child Protect and Upcoming Events

Guest: Jannah Bailey, Executive Director, Child Protect

Child Protect was incorporated in 1989 as a 5013C9 non-profit in Montgomery. Before that, the first one was established in Huntsville, Alabama by Bud Cramer, a Prosecutor of child abuse who later became a Congressman. He saw children being mistreated and traumatized over and over again. He established the first center in 1985 where children could come to a place that was neutral, child friendly, and had a trained special staff that could talk to them about allegations. They worked very closely with DHR and law enforcement in those investigations, and numbers are increasing. Last year they conducted 589 forensic interviews. Child Protect serves Montgomery, Autauga, and Elmore Counties, but most of the cases are in Montgomery because of the population. Of those that they see, 98% are child sex abuse, severe physical abuse, murder, or domestic violence. The numbers may not have gone up, she thinks people are more apt to report now, and there is a lot more awareness. Morally we should all report abuse if we see it. Always err on the safety of the child, and we all have the obligation to "Rescue" children as Mrs. Moyer says in the previous interview. Sometimes when young children witness traumatic episodes, it is like a permanent scar in their lives. They have to have follow-up counseling to make sure they are healing right. Counselors know the signs on when a

child has been coached, or trained to lie. Their biggest fund-raiser of the year, “Swinging For Kids” will be held on November 6 at Robert Trent Jones Golf Trails. Call 262-1220 or visit childprotect.org for more information.

Topic: Veterans Day Activities

Guest: Clyde W. Marsh, Rear Admiral, U.S. Navy, Retired

Rear Admiral Marsh discussed the upcoming annual Veterans Day Activities. The parade will kick off around 11 A.M. in Montgomery, and there will be speakers, dignitaries, etc., to thank the veterans for their service. A pre reception for veterans, officials, state leaders, and others will be held before the parade, and the concert afterwards will be in City Hall. Alabama has 414,000 veterans in the state of Alabama. Per capital, we have one of the largest veteran’s populations for the size of our state and have the largest number of veterans that participate in wars, combat, so forth, than any other state. Rear Admiral Marsh said Alabama abounds, and is a very patriotic state. They talked about the nature of the vets coming back from previous wars, and said that more are now coming back alive that would have died and not survived in previous wars . They come back with brain injuries and missing limbs, and we have to take care of them and their families for the rest of their lives. Veteran’s facilities need to be upgraded because we are still using 1950s and 1960s facilities. More doctors and medical personnel are needed. He talked about the new facility in Chantilly. His office works hand in glove with his Federal counterparts. They counsel veterans to inform them of what they qualify for – benefits, education scholarships, post 9/11 Insurance, home loans, etc. Alabama has four veteran homes that provide long-term care, and a state owned cemetery. They upgraded the facility in Alexander City – that have four floors and spaces have been extended from 900 to 3,000 square feet. There is a dependent scholarship bill for widows, spouses, and children. A person has to serve from 90 days in the military and have an honorable discharge in order to receive Veterans benefits. His department assists veterans by getting and filing any information that they need.

Topic: FOCAL – Child Care, Early Childhood Education

Guest: Tiame Barnes

The Federal Association of Child Care Centers of Alabama is 40 years old. Over the years they have provided technical assistance and raining across the state to child care providers and early education and advocacy. The majority of their members (child care centers) are licensed – all are not, as no one is turned away, but all are encouraged to be licensed as they want the programs to be inspected. A licensure is not required, not difficult; it's more about going through the process. It was explained how this is done. It may cost if improvements to the center are needed, but there is no cost to the state. Ms. Barnes also discussed their relationship with Alabama's well reviewed Pre-K program. Child care is a great place for children to learn. It teaches them to explore, socialization, how to be potty trained, how to sit at a table and eat with a fork. Pre-K allows for community based child care programs to apply for grants and to have their Pre-K program in the centers. Children get to learn the foundation for Pre-K from 0-3 before they even get there. Education starts at birth; 0-3 are very critical points of life. A child that starts learning at 4 is already behind. She told parents how to select a child care center. They can call DHR and the Family Sunshine Center for recommendations, what to look for, etc. A parent should also ask around. She discussed several events, workshops coming up and gave out the information on how to contact them on their website for information at focalfocal.org.

Topic: EAT South's Capital Fund Drive

Guest: Liz LaRoche, EAT South

Liz told the viewers about EAT South and its #FinishTheFarm Capital Campaign. The #FinishTheFarm project is seeking to raise money to double production at Montgomery's Downtown Farm, create a complete seed to plate program for visitors, and improve the accessibility of the farm for public-use. More specifically, the project will add twenty production beds at the farm; expand EATSouth's children's garden; complete the demonstration kitchen; add a blackberry patch; and, make other improvements to the farm including additional seating, lighting, walkways and permanent restrooms. The urban farm operates downtown. It took 8 seasons of planting different kinds of plants that leeched heavy metals out of the soil – sunflowers are good for this, and they did a couple of seasons doing this before planting vegetables. They hope to increase the expansion of the farm through education as well as hosting community events. It is a non-profit educational facility, and is the only urban teaching farm in Montgomery. They

host “Good Food Day” where children get the whole seed to plate experience. They go into the Greenhouse, and they get to see, taste, touch, and smell; they go into the children’s garden and then they get to go in the main production field and help harvest. Their goal is to get people to make better decisions about what they put in their bodies. They are planting seeds for good health. They now have chickens, and boxes are close to the coop where the children can sit and see them. They want people to get our doors more. “Veg Out” Pot Luck dinners are held every 2nd Tuesday of the month. People prepare and share their favorite vegetable dishes. Please donate through their website at www.eatsouth.org, or become monthly donors – only \$5 or \$10 per month is a big help and will allow EAT South to continue to grow.

Topic: Delta Sigma Theta Book Tour,

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority Incorporated’s National Commission on Arts and Letters promotes the Delta Authors on Tour which provides a venue to promote national and regional authors, help local chapters raise money to supporting arts in their communities; help Delta authors sell and promote their books and encourage literacy on a national scale. This year’s tour will featured authors: 6 authors including Mrs. McCall will be in Montgomery. A portion of the money from book sales goes back to Delta Sigma Theta to promote their programs. Public Service is one focuses of their mission. They function what they call 5 point programmatic thrust that include economic development, education development, physical and mental health, political awareness and involvement, and International Awareness and Involvement. They take these 5 areas throughout the community and help to educate those in the communities on being more literate in certain areas of financial gain, and bring different programs (they have signature programs for youth) to those areas. They invite the communities to participate in these activities. Delta is a National as well as an International Sorority that was started in January, 1913. They have initiated 250,000 members in the organization, and there are 500 members here in the Montgomery Chapter. They discussed Mrs. McCall’s book, *The Penalty for Success: My Father was Lynched in Lowndes County*. It is an inspiring story of a daughter's quest to reconcile the past and find justice for her father by telling his story. Proceeds from the book will go toward scholarships for area youth. The Crimson and Crème Ball, their annual fundraiser will be held on December 19 from 9 P.M. – 1 A.M.. Proceeds are used for scholarships for local students. People can request information about it on their website. The Montgomery Chapter won overall Chapter of the Region, and won awards for the 5 programmatic areas. They are the largest chapter in the state, and the 7th or 8th largest in the Nation.

Topic: Medicare, Medicaid, Health Care Enrollment, Senior Services

Guest: – Sandra Adams-Whatley, Central Alabama Aging Consortium – Ms. Whatley came back on the show to tell the viewers about the importance of getting enrolled for health care before the deadline. She told the viewers about the ABCs of Medicare – what each alphabet stands for, and at what age you should enroll. She also told them about the amount that it would cost for each plan, and how you can pay for it, or have it deducted from social security if you receive it. Other major questions/topics she and Tim discussed are listed: Why should I have an advance directive? An advance directive makes your wishes clear to your family, friends, and health care professionals while you are still able to do so. It helps prevent disagreements about what treatment you should receive if you are incapacitated. If you appoint someone to make your health care decisions, you will still be able to make your own decisions as long as you are capable. What if I don't have an advance directive? If you do not have an advance directive, and you are incapacitated, your decisions might be left to your spouse, adult child, adult sibling, close friend or court-appointed guardian who may not know or carry out your wishes. In any event, those persons may want to consult with your physician. If you have not designated a health care proxy, loved ones may need to spend time and money going to court in order to make decisions on your behalf. When should I prepare an advance directive? Now, while most people first think about preparing an advance directive when they are admitted to a hospital or nursing home, it is a good idea to do it now, while your health permits you to do so. Which document is right for me? The Health Care Durable Power of Attorney (Section 2 of the "Advance Directive for Health Care" form or a separate document prepared by your attorney) may avoid costly guardianship proceedings in court. The Health Care Durable Power of Attorney is a powerful and flexible document. A Health Care Durable Power of Attorney can include specific treatment preferences. However, if you do not have someone to act on your behalf or your proxy becomes incapacitated or dies, the Living Will is your other option. If you have both a Living Will and a Health Care Durable Power of Attorney, be sure they are consistent. What is a Health Care Durable Power of Attorney? This document allows you to appoint an agent to make health care decisions for you and it gives your agent authority to consent, to refuse consent, or to withdraw consent to any care, treatment, service, or procedure to maintain, diagnose, or treat a physical or mental condition. You must indicate at the end of Section 2 of the "Advance Directive for Health Care" form whether your proxy is given power to make decisions that are different from the provisions of the "Living Will" in Section 1.

Topic: Healthy Minds Network, Caring for the Mentally Ill, Upcoming Conference
Guests: Lynn Beshear
Anthony Glenn, Post Incarceration Case Manager, Montgomery Area
Mental Health Authority

Lynn Beshear and Mr. Glenn discussed all aspects of mental illness, and the effects that it has on those with the illness, their families, employment, their needs, laws, etc. They said that prisons are the largest providers of mental services in the U.S., and gave a background of this service. In 2014, the Healthy Minds Network created a demonstration project - Post Incarceration *Mental Health Case Management* - to identify individuals in State Prison being released on Community Corrections supervision, as well as Montgomery Municipal Jail and Montgomery County Jail detainees being released, either under supervision or directly to the community, who have continuing (post incarceration) mental healthcare needs. The collaborating partners in the agreement are: Envision 2020, The Montgomery Area Mental Health Authority, Montgomery County Community Corrections Department, Montgomery Police Department, Montgomery Department of Public Safety, The Montgomery County Sheriff's Office, The Office of the Probate Judge of Montgomery County, and The Office of the Probate Judge of Lowndes County. The case manager works directly with his clients to meet their needs for: housing, food, job placement (according to each client's ability to work), appointments at the Mental Health Authority, psychotropic medications and personal hygiene (haircuts). Of the 40 consumers who have participated in the program in the first year, there have been only 2 re-arrests and 1 re-incarceration, which is a recidivism rate of 3%. The average recidivism rate for the first year after release is 56.7%. Average daily savings of keeping 40 consumers out of jail = \$2,288.40, Average annual savings of keeping 40 consumers out of jail = \$795,266. The Montgomery Area Mental Health Authority has secured funding to add 1 new case manager per quarter for FY 2015-016 until a 300-400 client capacity is reached. Investment per case manager = \$40,000 (self-sufficient after full case load), time to full case load (30-40 clients) = 6-12 months; average annual savings from 4 case managers keeping 40 consumers out of jail = \$3,181,064, after 3-4 years, 400 client capacity = \$7,952,660. They also discussed the Business Breakfast at AUM on March 30, 2016 when Patrick J. Kennedy, soon of Senator Ted Kennedy will discuss his own journey toward mental health and recovery, and many reasons why we need to invest in innovation.

Sheriff Cunningham came on to discuss outreach that his department is involved in, community activities that they sponsor and participate in, and especially crime and how to prevent it during this time of the year. He is in constant contact with Montgomery's Police Chief, and other law enforcement in the area as they all have the same goals – keeping the city and county safe, and locking up those that commit crimes as a way of life. He talked about new technology that helps them in their fight against crime, new data bases, and other technology. He talked about a registration program that is a tool to assist the citizens of Montgomery County in housing the serial numbers of their valuable possessions. In addition, it will assist in identifying stolen property by allowing citizens immediate access to their serial numbers and to the property they have listed in the database. The information a citizen stores in the database is the sole property of the citizen and is the sole responsibility of the citizen to keep the information up-to-date. It is your responsibility to provide accurate information and update your contact information when appropriate. He asked the public to be careful and aware, and to report anything that is the “norm” around their neighborhoods. He talked about several different programs and camps that they sponsor each year for our youth, and the annual Christmas Toy Drive. He and Tim mentioned the D.A.R.E. program, which stands for **Drug Abuse Resistance Education**, by teaching about substance abuse and prevention. One of his Officers was named the 2015 DARE Officer of the year.

Topic: VOICES For Alabama's Children
Guest: Rhonda Mann, Police and Research, VOICES For Alabama's Children

Ms. Mann came on today to talk about the new data book just released about the condition of Alabama's children. The *Data Book* is the state's most comprehensive source of child well-being data and has been among the most trusted sources on the quality of life of Alabama's children for more than 20 years. The annual publication measures child well-being across the state in four domains or issue areas: health, safety, education and economic security. Almost a quarter of the state's children live in poverty and nearly half of those children living in poverty live in extreme poverty where their families make less than \$12,000 a year, according to the *2015 Alabama Kids Count Data Book* released today by VOICES for Alabama's Children. She said Economic security serves as a lynchpin, whether good or bad, for all other areas of a child's life which is reflected in the *2015 Data Book*. Intensifying the outcomes of increased child poverty is

the added challenges that fewer parents have secure employment, a significant amount of children and families have low access to fresh, healthy food options and a growing number of child care providers refuse to meet the basic floor of protections for children while their parents work and/or attend school. "Poverty permeates across all measures of child well-being, and while it doesn't equate to destiny, research shows growing up in poverty places children at increased risk for a wide range of problems that may impair brain development and negatively impact social and emotional development." According to the *Data Book*, children under five years old have the highest number – 31.2 percent – of all age groups for all children under 18 living in poverty. This period of a child's life is the most critical because 90 percent of the brain develops by age five. When children face opportunity gaps during this period of time, such as hearing 30 million fewer words within the first three years of life, they may have trouble meeting educational milestones throughout their school age years. Children in poverty also frequently live in areas with low access to fresh, healthy food. The result is children who are overweight or obese and are on a path to develop other chronic diet-related diseases such as Type II diabetes. Despite the grim economic situation for children and families, Ms. Mann said births to all females aged 10 – 19 years old decreased by 34.4%; high school graduation rate rose from 80% (in the 2012 – 2013 school year) to 86% during the 2013 – 2014 school year. The juvenile violent crime court petition rate has declined by 43 percent since 2005.

Topic: Domestic Violence, CARES Project

Family ties should not leave scars, but in millions of American families, women and children are killed or injured every year. Each day, at least three children die of abuse or neglect. Domestic Violence is the number one killer of women. Fortunately, prevention and intervention are possible. The Family Sunshine Center exists to end family violence and sexual assault and foster hope and healing in seven Alabama counties: Autauga, Butler, Chilton, Crenshaw, Elmore, Lowndes, and Montgomery. One of our strategies is to provide life-saving information via our website. The Family Sunshine Center has been serving victims and survivors of family violence for 30 years in Autauga, Butler, Chilton, Crenshaw, Elmore, Lowndes and Montgomery counties. Since 1981, they have grown to incorporate services not only to victims with immediate crisis needs but also those ready to move out of emergency shelter and into self-sufficient lifestyles. They also provide a non-residential counseling center and a community outreach program for prevention education. Most recently, we have added sexual assault counseling to the services we offer. The staff works diligently to raise awareness about domestic violence and sexual assault and the services that are available to victims. They strive to ensure a network and positive communications among law enforcement, legal services, the court system and other agencies a victim might encounter while exiting the cycle of violence. She discussed danger signs, and what to do and how to get out of dangerous situations. She touched on the Cares program as children are the victims of domestic violence as well. She talked about symptoms to look for when abuse is suspected in a child and described the symptoms. It is best to call CARES and report any abuse on their crisis line at 334-263-0218. They have several programs, shelters, and counselors as well. During this time of the year, they make sure that those in their shelters have a nice holiday just like everyone else, they give gifts and presents to the mothers and children as well.
