Topic: Hyundai Half Marathon & Organizations it Benefits” – Krista Hawkins

Ms. Hawkins discussed Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama and the company’s fundraising effort against Pediatric Cancer. She told the viewers about the upcoming 5th Annual Montgomery Half Marathon presented by Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama that is quickly becoming one of the premier running events in the south. This is the 5th year and the race is growing. They will also have The Hyundai Hope on Wheels 5K, 1mile run and The Publix Mayor's Challenge. There's something for everyone at this community event and the best part is according to Ms. Hawkins is proceeds from this race will benefit UAB’s Children’s Hospital in Birmingham, AL, and Child Protect here in Montgomery. Hyundai raises awareness and donates funds for the research of the chronic and degenerative disease. Ms. Hawkins said that since 1998 every Hyundai dealer has contributed \$14 from the sale of each vehicle to Hope On Wheels for an aggregate total of \$72 million to children’s hospitals and organizations nationwide. They are very proud of their efforts to give back into the community.

Topic: Child Protect and Annual Fundraising Run – Jannah Bailey, Child Protect, and Stephanie Walker James, Local Marathoner. Ms. Bailey and Ms. James discussed the upcoming half marathon, and their appreciation to Hyundai Motor Manufacturing of Alabama for putting on the race each year and blessing local organizations with the benefits from the race. Ms. Bailey told the viewers what Child Protect is, and what it does. Their Mission is to interview, counsel, and be an advocate for children when there are allegations of abuse. The organization was incorporated in November, 1989 as the Children’s Advocacy Center serving Montgomery, Autauga, Elmore, and Chilton Counties. The agency was established to assist the Department of Human Resources and Law Enforcement in their investigation of child sexual abuse and child physical abuse. The evidence that is gathered during the forensic interview is turned over to the District Attorney’s Office for prosecutions, and the neat thing is, everything is done at Child Protect. Child Protect serves two judicial circuits; the 15th, Montgomery County, Ellen Brooks, District Attorney and the 9th, Autauga, Elmore and Chilton counties, Randall “R.H.” Houston, District Attorney. Proceeds from the race will allow the organization to purchase material that is needed to continue to make the

children comfortable at Child Protect and to put more programs into place. Everything that is needed is here . . . children and their parents do not have to go to the police station . . . everything takes place here in an environment that is comfortable for the child. Ms. James discussed her love of running, the number of marathons, including Boston, and “ultras” that she has run in, and what the Hyundai Half means to her. She is so proud that a marathon of this caliber, and that gives back to the community, now calls Montgomery “home”.

Topic: Red Ribbon Campaign – Regina Walker, United Way Senior Vice President for Community Impact, and Daryl Bailey, Montgomery County Chief Deputy District Attorney - Today's guests discussed the Annual Red ribbon Campaign. The Montgomery Public School System is celebrating Red Ribbon Week with a variety of fun activities aimed to empower students to say no to drugs, learn about the consequences of using drugs and how they can make healthy lifestyle choices. Events range from wacky dress days, school assemblies on drug use, educational presentations, signing a pledge wall and reciting the Drug Free Pledge. Chief Deputy District Attorney said the annual event started with one man, known to his friends as "Kiki". Special Agent Camarena had been in Mexico for more than four years on the trail of Mexican marijuana and cocaine drug traffickers. Kiki was due to be reassigned in three weeks because he had come dangerously close to exposing the top leaders of a multi-billion drug pipeline. He was captured and killed and because he gave his life in the fight against drugs, the public wanted to do something to remember his actions. Red Ribbon Week started in 1985 in Kiki's hometown of Calexico, California, and soon gained momentum across California and then the rest of the country. The event was formalized in 1988 when President and Mrs. Reagan served as the Red Ribbon Week honorary chairperson. All Montgomery public middle schools participate in this annual campaign, so when you see people wearing red ribbons this week you will know what this means – Say NO To Drugs. The event will come to a close at Alabama State University with a county-wide pep rally.

Topic: Montgomery Junior League Holiday Market, Allison Bonds – The 26th Annual Holiday Market will be on October 16-18, 2014. The Holiday Market consists of four shopping days, special events, live entertainment and merchants from across the United States. Proceeds support the various community projects that the League supports. Ms. Bonds discussed the organizations that benefit the Junior League's fund raising efforts, and talked about upcoming events. She said that their mission is tied to the donations that they receive, and she told the public how they can make contributions to the League. She discussed the league's recent job fair and some of the activities that they have planned that are coming up - 12th night of giving in December (that will benefit the Christmas Clearing House), A Shamrock Run in March, and a rummage sale in February. They have been in service in Montgomery for 87 years, and Baptist Health is their title investor for the 2013-2014 year. Ms. Bonds told how members are chosen, and told the viewers how interested people can become members of the League. Money raised at each Junior League Event goes back into the community to support different charity organizations.

Topic: “River Region Rocks Campaign”, Mona Davis, Montgomery School System, Melanie Beasley, Montgomery Family Sunshine Center; Laura Hicks, Stamps – There is a coalition of non-profits and businesses joining together with public and private schools to launch the River Region ROCKs Campaign. ROCK stands for Respect Others, Create Kindness and it was formed in response to the rise in violence and a seemingly growing lack of respect and kindness for people that is growing in our community and world. The ROCK campaign will work to create a kinder community, increase respect, and also raise awareness about bullying in schools and the community and how it can be prevented. Family Sunshine Center, several local churches, public and private schools and community groups are all working together on this. The campaign will officially kick off on Oct. 18. ROCK stands for Respect Others Create Kindness and it originated last year with LWT (now STAMPS) when the marketing firm selected the Family Sunshine Center as the recipient of its Create-A-Thon Campaign. Non-profits that are selected during Create-A-Thon receive free marketing/design services for a specific program. So the Sunshine Center said they wanted some materials that they could disseminate in schools that empowered students to report bullying. As a result LWT came up with the ROCK logo, a rap that students could recite and fun posters. MPS kicked off a PR campaign with Family Sunshine Center and sent the posters and ROCK stickers for kids to wear to all elementary school.... it soon took off like a rocket. Kids learned the rap and would recite it in the morning or at PBS (Positive Behavior School) events. These events rewarded kids with prizes for being respectful, responsible and resourceful (the 3R's of the PBS Program) and for showing courage or leadership by reporting bullying or being an “upstander” rather than a “bystander” when they saw someone else being bullied. Topic: River Region Prayer Walk – Brook Wilson, and Vicki Dendis - These two ladies discussed the upcoming 2nd Annual River Region Prayer Walk. They discussed their mission statement, and what they hoped they walk will achieve. Times, dates, and events were discussed. Ms. Dendis say their mission is to spiritually unite our community through prayer under the Lord our Banner, in the name of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, to seek His favor, His protection, and the restoration of His people and His land. Their vision: The premise for the River Region Prayer Walk comes from the book of Nehemiah, who was called to rebuild the city walls of Jerusalem for God, but how he went about it is the key. He involved the inhabitants of the city and charged them with the primary and personal responsibility of rebuilding the wall in front of their own homes. It is the primary responsibility of the inhabitants of this land to take responsibility for our homes and our lives. A united front will spiritually connect the protective walls of our city one home, one church at a time. A secondary influence comes from the book of Ezra, whose calling was the restoration of the temple and the

spiritual, moral, and social restoration of Jerusalem. We believe Father God is calling for a rebuilding of His established land and a restoration of His people to Him. The purpose of this gathering is to bring together the citizens of the River Region to pray over our cities, government leaders, schools and teachers, uniformed heroes and servants, pastors and ministry leaders, businesses, and all of the people that make up the River Region. First, we will gather at the Union Station Train Shed for a praise concert and time of preparation for the walk. Next, we will walk a 5K route through downtown Montgomery using guided prayer focused on the above-mentioned groups. For those who are unable to walk the route, there will be prayer stations set up under the train shed. Finally, we will conclude the prayer walk at the train shed for refreshments and fellowship.

Topic: Domestic Violence – Steve Searcy, One Place Justice Center; Melanie Beasley, Family Sunshine Center – When Mr. Searcy took over as director of the One Place Family Justice Center this year, he said it was an extension of his life’s work. He commanded the domestic violence unit when he retired after 35 years of service with the force. This center that he now directs brings together several different agencies under one roof to assist domestic violence, and it is the first of its kind in the Southeast. He said that since he was a young policeman, he had the vision of sending victims to a single place instead of sending them here and there to different places for different things. Because October is also Domestic Violence month, Ms. Beasley of the Family Sunshine Center appeared on today’s show to discuss how her center helps victims deal with the problem. They both said that there is a beginning, a middle, and an end to domestic violence. They said it usually starts off very subtle, and can start as emotional abuse, then move to verbal attacks, then to actually being physically attacked. They said domestic violence can be emotional, psychological, sexual, and financial as well. It is taking someone’s human rights and is all about power and control. Both Mr. Searcy and Ms. Beasley recommend reporting domestic abuse as soon as it happens. They also discussed the young people who are becoming victims and told everyone where they can go, and what to do to get protection. The Center just received an \$899,994 grant from the U.S. Department of Justice’s Office on Violence Against Women to allow for One Place Family Justice Center to expand its services. The Center is a one-stop shop where victims can come for assistance; report violence to police; get places in the domestic shelter; get legal advice or seek counseling. All services are free. Through a partnership with the city of Montgomery Emergency Communications Center, police officers will have more information when they respond to a domestic violence call.

Topic: Making Strides Against Breast Cancer – Lucy Sims, American Cancer Society – October is Breast Cancer Month as well as Domestic Violence Month, so we invited Ms. Sims to come on today to talk about the annual walk that will be held on November 2 of this year. Montgomery has a lot of walks to support breast cancer, and Ms. Sims said that all of them are beneficial, and each walk “holds their own”. Their goal is to do the most they can in every community to help people with breast cancer today and to strive to find cures to end the disease tomorrow. By walking, people are investing in cutting-edge breast cancer research to better understand, prevent, find, and treat the disease. One in every two women newly diagnosed with breast cancer turns to the Cancer Society for free services and support, and by walking participants are helping to ensure access to mammograms for women who need them so more lives can be saved. Ms. Sims discussed the number of women diagnosed each year, and the approximate number of deaths that occur because of the disease. She also discussed new techniques, and the advancement in treatment. Breast cancer cases are appearing in younger women

and in some men as well. Everyone was invited to come out and participate in the walk on November 2nd.

Topic: U.S. Postal Service, Mobile Postmaster Reginald Capers – Mr. Capers appeared on today's show since Montgomery's Postmaster is out sick. He discussed what is going on with the Postal Service in general. Tim asked about the cost of stamps, the hours of operation and locations of post office in the city, and if it is feasible to have offices that are manned by one employee. Tim wanted to know about times mail had to be dropped off in order to be picked up at a certain time and wanted to know why this happens if it isn't sent out until late at night anyway? Mr. Capers said that the Post Office does not directly receive taxpayer dollars and haven't since the early 1980s. The Post Office is the 3rd largest civilian employer in the United States behind the Federal Government and Wal-Mart. Mr. Capers discussed the workers at the post office and the jobs that they do – mail carriers, rural carriers, mail handlers and processors, and clerks. They talked about door-to-door services that could end soon, and how it would affect the public, and also the possibility of the end to Saturday delivery which would hurt jobs and harm the elderly and shut-ins who have difficulty receiving mail. The financial impact this would have was mentioned. They also discussed UPS delivery and the affects it has on the postal service.

Topic: Central Alabama Aging Consortium – Sandra Whatley – Miss Whatley appeared on today's program to remind our elderly citizens of the sign up dates and places for Medicare and to discuss other needs that the elderly have. Ms. Whatley said that her organization is an aging program that provide information and services on a range of assistance for older adults and those who care for them. Her organization provides information on available services in Autauga, Elmore and Montgomery counties and can help with mobility assistance programs, meal planning and housing. They also advise on assistance in gaining access to services, individual counseling, support groups and caregiver training. She discussed respite care, and supplemental services that are available on a limited basis. She also discussed elderly abuse, how to recognize it, and how to stop it; how to get paid to take care of an elderly parent, how to prepare your family when you have to bring your elderly parents into your home, and how to help the elderly with their finances. She spoke about a recent case where a caregiver had been convicted of swindling a senior citizen out of millions of dollars. She spoke about different agencies in the River Region area that supports our elderly, and how they all work together. She gave a number and email address for anyone who needs more information on her agency.

Topic: Veterans – W. Clyde Marsh, Rear Admiral, Retired - Admiral Marsh wished all veterans and other military personnel a Happy Veterans Day. He spoke about the huge debt that we all owe our veterans, and those that are continuing to fight for our rights and freedoms. He also talked about our need, our duty to step up and support our veterans when they are no longer in positions to support themselves. He said that there are so many homeless veterans now, because of the number of wars our country has been engaged in. More and more of our young people are going off to war, and more and more are coming home in need . . . whether it's because of being wounded in the war, or being wounded psychologically. Because of injuries sustained in the war, some are not able to get jobs or hold down jobs once they are discharged, and this is a cause of homelessness. Admiral Marsh encouraged business owners to hire our vets, and to reach out to them. He talked about the \$6,334,000.00 homeless prevention grant that was awarded to Alabama Counties. He also discussed the 4th Annual Montgomery River Region Veterans Day Parade that will start in front of the State Capitol on November 2nd. It will feature Troy University's Marching Band, several other marching bands, ROTC units, veterans groups, scout groups and a huge contingent from Marion Military Institute. The Capitol Sound Band will hold a concert at City Hall auditorium after the parade.

Topic: Poverty – Veterans Housing – Evette Hester, Executive Director, Montgomery Housing Authority – Ms. Hester talked about the \$6,334,000.00 homeless prevention grant that was presented to Baldwin, Jefferson, Mobile, Montgomery, Shelby, and St. Clair Counties. The grants will serve approximately 2,360 homeless and at-risk Veteran families as part of the Supportive Services for Veteran Families program. She discussed the amount Montgomery County received how it will go to help the veterans in our area. She also told how those in need could apply for assistance. Ms. Hester discussed the new housing areas in Montgomery. With the closing of area projects, and replacing them with affordable new housing, the city has a completely different look to it. Low-income public housing provides to eligible persons affordable, safe decent, and sanitary housing. Public housing attempts to insure a social and economical mix of low-income residents in order to foster social stability and upward mobility. Eligibility requirements were discussed, she talked about those who could apply, and documentation that must be presented. Section-8 Housing and how it works was discussed in detail. New apartments as well as new homes have been built on the West Side of the City, and they are holding rentals to very high standards. They have to show pride and take care very good care of their homes.

Topic: Help for the Hungry and Homeless, Jaime Robards, Marketing and Fundraising Supervisor, Montgomery Food Bank – With the Thanksgiving holidays approaching, we invited two guests that are involved with feeding the hungry and the homeless. Jaime Robards told our guests about the Montgomery Food Bank and how it helps people in the River Region Area. It has been in operation since 1986, and has fought hunger and poverty by distributing food and other necessities to over 800 agencies in 35 of Alabama's 67 counties. They currently reach out to more than 330,000 individuals every year, providing more than 30 million pounds. They serve children, seniors, the unemployed, low-pay working families, the homeless and disadvantaged, and disaster victims, among others. Through this network other agencies provide free food to individuals and families in need by distributing groceries, hosting on-site feeding programs or Meals on Wheels programs. They take food that otherwise would have gone to waste and provide it to people who struggle to make ends meet, often times choosing between food and other basic necessities such as medications and utilities. Ms. Robards said they serve some of the most impoverished counties in the nation. According to 5-year census averages, nearly 12% of all individuals in the United States live in poverty. Across Alabama, that number increases to 17%. She is particularly concerned with our children who are hungry as hunger and poor nutrition can affect a child's ability to learn. It can also stunt their physical and emotional development, and impact their employability as adults, which is a factor in multigenerational poverty. She wants to make sure the next generation grows up with access to nutritious food. She told where the agency gets its donated food from, and told those in need how to go about getting it. She also encouraged the viewer to take a look around their kitchens, and to pass along that which they are not using.

Topic: Faith Rescue Mission – Amy Ken Turner – Mr. Turner discussed the Rescue Mission's presence in Montgomery. With the upcoming winter season, they are preparing to provide food and shelter to those in need. To all those who aren't aware, not only does Faith Rescue Mission serve a hot meal in our soup kitchen daily, but they also give out food assistance to families in need through a food box filled with much needed groceries. They give these boxes out all year around, but for Thanksgiving and Christmas they give out additional 40 lb. food baskets filled with everything needed to prepare a hearty holiday meal. These food baskets are very special to those who receive them, because they otherwise couldn't afford to buy the groceries needed to have a holiday meal with their family. Along with non-perishable food items, the baskets contain a large turkey or ham. Perhaps you would like to have a part in providing for these needy families? If so, you may drop off food items at any of the Mission's locations. For large food donations you may also call (334) 262-6024 to schedule a pick up. Mr. Turner advised the viewer that they could also donate household items to the Mission, and told

them how to do it. If you have household items that you would like to donate, it's simple to give to Faith Rescue Mission! You can call (334) 262-6024 to schedule a pick up for large appliances, furniture or large quantities of items, or you may also drop the items off at their thrift store closest to you. The Prattville location is currently accepting large appliances that are not working. He asked everyone to support their local rescue mission. Donate to Faith Rescue Mission! Mr. Turner thanked the viewers for their support!

Topic: K-12 Education – Ms. Margaret Allen, Montgomery County Interim Superintendent – Ms. Allen who is a veteran educator was named to serve as the interim superintendent for the Montgomery County School System after the departure of Barbara W. Thompson. She said that she really appreciated the Board's confidence in her. She started working as a special education teacher in the school system in 1976, and has taught at Bear Elementary, was an assistant principal at forest Avenue elementary, was a principal at Garrett Elementary, and served as an executive director of elementary schools. Ms. Allen talked about all phases of education and the importance of instilling educational values in our children. She said that her parents weren't by any means wealthy, but they made sure she and her siblings received good education and continuously told them to give back to their communities. She talked about the grade changing investigation and said the Montgomery Public Schools has increased oversight of its grading and credit recovery system. Because of these charges, grading is now monitored more closely. Ms. Allen also discussed the project to revamp a portion of the old Montgomery Mall and the end of the High School graduation exams in Alabama. The exams are not longer required and if students pass their courses, they will graduate from high school. Ms. Allen said that she does not have any interest in holding this position permanently.

Topic: K-12 Education – Dr. Jeff Langham, Superintendent, Elmore County School System - Dr. Jeff Langham is the Superintendent of Education for Elmore County Schools. Now in his eighth year as the system's leader, he has a total of 27 years of experience in the field of education. He said that all of Elmore county's high schools are involved in the A+ College Ready Program this year. He said that thanks to this initiative, they continue to see steady gains in the qualifying scores on advanced placement exams that translate to major savings on college tuition. Elmore County has one of Alabama's largest school systems with over 11,000 students and 1,399 certified and support professionals in the heart of one of Alabama's fastest growing counties. He said that his school system works continuously to improve their mission to provide exemplary experiences of their students. He said that during the last school term his seniors across the district received approximately \$6.5 million in scholarship offers. Dr. Langham was recognized as the 2013 Alabama State Superintendent of the year. Student services, graduation rates, drop-out rates, child nutrition, transportation, and professional learning communities were also discussed.

Topic: Crime/Law Enforcement, Kevin Murphy, Montgomery, Alabama Police Chief - On today's show Chief Murphy discussed the overall crime rate in the Capitol City. He talked about the high number of murders in the city (45 so far), how it compares to other cities with similar populations, what he thinks causes it, and what the department is doing about it. He said that they were doing the same initiatives in 2003 when they had a low homicide rate as they were in 2007, and even the present day. He said that it makes you do a greater focus on the problem when you are having a year like this. Two other cities that compare in size to Montgomery have not had as many homicides. Shreveport, LA has had 24 and Columbus, GA has had 29. Chief Murphy said that 85% of this year's murders have been solved and there are other criminal activities underlying the homicides. He said that trends show most murders in our area start with drugs, robbery, prostitution, or domestic violence. The Columbus, Georgia police department believes its murder rate is lower because of its D.A.R.E. Program where police educate hundreds of students about drugs and gang involvement. In Shreveport, police have more of a presence at most businesses and thinks that trickles down to a lower murder rate. Chief Murphy discussed the drug problem in Montgomery, and how the Department has partnered with pastors in Alabama to fight crime with Christianity (Operation Good Shepherd). This program was modeled after the Police and Clergy Working Together (PACT) program in Dayton, Ohio. Pastors will accompany police at crime scenes as well as counsel and pray with those present, and will attend monthly meetings to discuss areas of concern in regard to criminal activity in the city. Police training includes gang awareness and how to spot illegal drug activity. Nearly 40 area clergy have completed the training, and were all recognized during a recent ceremony at City Hall

Crime/Community

Topic: Montgomery Fire Department – Chief Miford Jordan – Fire Chief Jordan discussed the day to day operations of the Montgomery Fire Department. He talked about training, different fire stations in the River Region Area, employment, and what all it takes to become a Fireman. He discussed how long it should take and how long it takes to respond to a fire and told the viewers what they should do long before a fire occurs. He said that everyone should have a plan for escape in case of a fire, and to practice that plan several times until everyone is familiar with it. Chief Jordan said the main cause of fire death is smoking materials, and cooking equipment is the leading cause of home structure fires and home fire injuries. He promoted fire alarms in the home, recommended changing the batteries twice a year when the time changes. He reminded people of the dangers of using space heaters and extension cords with some products, and went over several things people can do to keep their homes safe from fires. He told the viewers to have their furnaces inspected by a qualified professional, and to use dry seasoned wood for stoves and fireplaces, and to have chimneys and vents cleaned and inspected. With Christmas coming up, he told everyone to be sure and not let their tree

(if it is a live one) become dry and brittle as it will then become a fire hazard. Chief Jordon also discussed the Fire Department's Rescue units and Rapid Intervention Training. He told the viewers about annual events that the department participates in – the Annual 911 Ceremony to honor those who lost their lives in September of 2001, and their support of the Annual Joy to Life Breast Cancer Campaign where the Firefighters wear and sell Pink MFD Tee-Shirts to help raise funds for those underserved in the River Region Area, and the Department's support of Muscular Dystrophy. He mentioned also their participation in the 4th Annual Dragon Boat Festival and the 2013 U.S. Nationals Firefighter Combat Challenge that was held in Montgomery on October 10-12.

Topic: “Salvation Army Red Kettle Campaign” – Captain Mark Gilliam – Captain Gilliam said the Army’s most successful campaign started over 100 years ago in the San Francisco – Oakland California area. He said that people donated food first, and then started giving money. The efforts of the campaign are helped by church groups as well as school groups. He said that last year’s campaign was a huge success and this year’s campaign is on the road to becoming successful as well. Over 500 families will benefit from the drive, and 1,000 children will receive Angel Tree gifts. The Salvation Army has a feeding program where they feed from 50 to 100 people every day at the shelter from 11 A.M.-12 P.M., and the number is higher when the weather is colder. They also have a housing program where the homeless come when it is cold. The ratio between men and women is equal, but they are seeing an increase in men at the shelter. Women and children usually come in together and are housed together. The Salvation Army has the role of emergency Shelter in the city, and other shelters work with the emergency shelter in the area as needed. The Captain and his wife have been in the area for 1 ½ years. He said that people who give seem to be those who can’t afford to give. He told of an elderly couple who bring in food to the shelter every week because the Salvation Army helped them at one time. He said that there are fewer days to ring the kettle bells this year because Thanksgiving came late this year. They always discuss a better way to hold their drives at a convention that is held each year. There are 29 locations in the River Region area where volunteers will ring the bell this Christmas season. The drive is going well, and people are giving also by sending checks through the mail. The community supports all of Salvation Army’s efforts very well. Every year, a story is reported of someone who drops \$50,000 in the bucket. Captain Gilliam said their most important mission is to share Christ with everyone they come across and to love them with the love of Christ. He said all of the money from the Salvation Army’s Thrift Store goes into the programs at the Shelter. The Red Kettle Campaign is the Army’s most successful fund raiser.

Topic: Montgomery City County Public Library – Tim Berry, Head Librarian Juliette Hampton Library, Rebie Morris, Administrative Assistant – Mr. Berry said that they are experiencing challenging and exciting times at the library. Tim asked, and he explained how the library has adapted to changes with all of the technology that is now available. He said that they are now getting many books in digital format, and can now download e-books. With all of the technology he went on to explain why a “building” is still needed when Tim asked. He said that all libraries in the area have become technology oriented, they have different computers, audio equipment, video equipment, and more digital resources. They have reference material that you can’t get anywhere else. He said that they have I-Pads at the library for staff members right now but will be available for the public later on. Coming up in February, there will be a new

program where they will show Civil Rights films each day. This information will be listed on their website. Ms. Morris said that they will have a continuing education program that will be a life long learning program that will originate out of the University of Alabama. A preview will be held December 16 at 1 P.M. She discussed the RFID System and how it can be used to remind people to check out and return books. Mr. Berry said that success of any library is gauged by how many books are checked out. He said that resources at the library are more dependable. If you search "Google" you don't know what you are getting but if you use resources at the library, you know exactly what you are getting.

Topic: Montgomery – Michael Briddell, Director Public Information, City of Montgomery – On this morning’s program, Mr. Briddell touched on the growth the city is enjoying in tourism. He spoke of upcoming events - The Alabama-Mississippi All Star Football Game, and a competition in 2014 that will bring thousands to the city. Our top-rate athletic facilities like the new Cramton Bowl Multiplex, and talented sports events managers are attracting national attention and will make it possible for many events to take place in the city. Mr. Briddell and Tim also discussed the impressive increase in the valuations for building permits in the city, the local housing market, jobs, and of course Mr. Briddell’s run for Mayor of Montgomery. They provide counseling for couples and family, group counseling, premarital counseling, and have consultation services with their client’s physicians. They refer people to doctors when necessary, provide substance abuse assessments, family mediation services, private school admission testing, and workshops and educational presentations as well. As clinicians working with individuals, couples, families, groups, adults, children, adolescents, single-parent families and stepfamilies struggling with a variety of issues, they match the right mental health counselor to the client’s specific needs. Their center is accredited and has a standard fee for service, and they accept payment from most insurance companies and employee assistance plans. The center provides assistance for services for those who lack coverage or resources to pay the

standard fee. They provide mental health educational programs to businesses, churches and community agencies by presenting workshops and consultation designed to heal, inform and empower to schools, colleges and universities, businesses, clergy staff, government agencies, etc. She talked about the ongoing financial support from local congregations, and told the viewers how they can help. She said they are now accepting nominations for the 2014 River Region Ethics in Business and Public Service Awards through January 10, 2014 and told how to make nominations on line by going to their website or calling the Center at 334-262-7787.
