Topic: Upcoming Blood Drive; Severe Weather Preparedness - Helen Carroll, American Red Cross Central Alabama - The American Red Cross of Central Alabama provides programs and services to the citizens of a 13-county area including Autauga, Barbour, Bullock, Chilton, Dallas, Elmore, Lowndes, Macon, Marengo, Montgomery, Perry, Pike and Wilcox counties. The American Red Cross offers a wide range of programs, services and educational opportunities that help individuals, families and communities prevent, prepare for and respond to emergencies. On today's segment, Helen Carroll discussed getting ready for the Hurricane season; their disaster services; upcoming blood drives in the River Region area; the blood type most needed; how blood is collected and the safety measures taken; and Project Share - The Alabama Region administers the only registered Project SHARE (Service to Help Alabamians with Relief on Energy) in Alabama. Now in its 30th year, Project SHARE continues to provide emergency energy assistance to elderly and disabled Alabamians in peak winter and summer months. The program assists Alabamians in 58 counties statewide. She also told viewers where, how, and when to send donations. Sometimes it is best to send money rather than canned goods and clothing. That way, the Red Cross in that particular can get the recipients what they need.

Topic: Alabama's Agriculture Industry - John McMillan - Commissioner, Alabama Department of Agriculture and Industries was this Sunday's guest. While Alabama was known as the Cotton State since the mid 1860s, Alabama agriculture has become incredibly diversified. Over 80 percent of Alabama's production is in livestock and livestock products, ranking thirteenth nationwide. Poultry and eggs account for 65 percent of total Ag sales, cattle and calves for 11 percent, nursery and greenhouse crops for eight percent, and cotton for only four percent. Mr. McMillan discussed industrial economic and development in the state; industrial possibilities; state industry; food safety regulations; export opportunities for the state, and the department's budget.

Topic: Transforming Communities by Investing In Urban Youth - Bryan Kelly, Founder, Executive Director, Common Ground – Common Ground's mission is to glorify God by being instrumental in redeeming impoverished and under-resourced communities through spiritual and community development. Their slogan is "transforming communities by investing in urban youth". Their ministry is to the whole person, both physically and spiritually. Mr. Kelly addressed the needs of a community: spiritual, physical, healthcare, economic, housing, educational and recreational. Short-term teams assist Common Ground through participating with the Christian community to address housing needs. Their ministry in Montgomery is focused on Montgomery's Washington Park Community, a predominately West Side Black community where Mr. Kelly and his family who are Caucasians live. He discussed living arrangements; meals, group dynamics (15-20 team members each week); leadership; transportation; and provided a day to day breakdown of their activities. He discussed the budget of the mission, and what it does and does not cover. Their main purpose, he said, is to save our youth. And they partner with local churches in doing this.

Topic: “Meeting at Mt. Zion” - C.P. Everett, IV, Playwright; Dr. Toneya “Tommie Stewart”, Dean, Alabama State University Department of Visual and Performing Arts – In 1955 the Montgomery Improvement Association, who organized the Montgomery Bus Boycott, was formed in Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church. During the Selma to Montgomery marches in 1965, marchers rested at the church on their way to the capitol. Mr. Everett wrote the stage play that tells the story of the meeting at the Montgomery church that led to the founding of the Montgomery Improvement Association and its young leader, Martin Luther King, Jr. Dr. Stewart, a noted television and movie actress who is now a Dean At Alabama State University, directed the play. She got her department at ASU involved in the production end of the play. Proceeds from the play will benefit the Mt. Zion AME Zion church Memorial Annex, which is on the U.S. National Register of Historic Places. Mr. Everett spoke of growing up in the old Mt. Zion AME Zion Church where he was baptized, married, and buried many of his family members.

Topic: Black Male Empowerment Summit - Senator Quinton Ross, Mr. Paul Davis, Davis Entertainment - Senator Ross and Mr. Davis who are both members of the H-O-P-E Team talked about a summit meeting that will be held this upcoming Friday at Union Station that is designed to help reduce the Black on Black violence in Montgomery. According to the summit fact sheet, 78% of the murder victims this year in Montgomery have been black males under the age of 25 . . . and almost all of the suspects are also black males under the age of 25. They spoke of the need for positive male role models and mentors for the youth in the community, and reminded those in positions of authority to extend helping hands to single mothers, one parent families, and the youth in our area. Education, both believe, is the key to curb violence in the city, and the country as a whole.

Topic: Aid to Inmate Mothers – Carol Potok – The organization provide services to Alabama's incarcerated women with emphasis on enhancing personal growth and strengthening the bonds between inmate mothers and their children. About 3,000 children in Alabama have a mother incarcerated. AIM asks the public to donate time or money to help support these children and reunite separated families. They hold several different fund raising events each year for literacy and parenting classes to incarcerated mothers; prep for release classes; visitation and outreach to children; one year post release follow-up; transport children back and forth to visit their mothers in prison; personal counseling; storybook program where moms tape bedtime stories for their children; YMCA summer camp for children and inmates; as well as school supplies and uniforms. For those recently released, Ms. Potok said they have clothes closet, computer resource center, and empowerment classes for women. She also discussed a community development block grant that the organization received.

Topic: Equal Justice Initiative – Bryan Stevenson, Executive Director – Mr. Stevenson has won national acclaim for his work challenging bias against the poor and people of color in the criminal justice system. Since graduating from Harvard Law School and the Harvard School of Government, he has assisted in securing relief for dozens or condemned prisoners, advocated for poor people and developed community-based reform litigation aimed at improving the administration of criminal justice. He is also on the law faculty at New York University School of Law. He discussed children in adult prisons; those currently under the death penalty which includes mentally ill people; prisons and sentencing reform (200,000 to 2.3 million in the past 40 years has led to unprecedented prison overcrowding and put tremendous strain on state budgets); and race and poverty (Black men are eight times more likely to be incarcerated than white men). Mr. Stevenson's organization is an Alabama based civil rights organization. They published their findings about rapes in Alabama prisons in a report that was made available to the U.S. Department of Justice. He also discussed this with Tim on this segment.

Topic: Easter Seals – Debbie Lynn, Executive Director, Easter Seals Central, AL – Locally, Easter Seals Central Alabama serves more than 1,500 clients across all of their programs. Ms. Lynn said the Janice Capilouto Center for the Deaf serves nearly 1,000 clients yearly with their interpreting program. They serve a 31 county area in the state. Ms. Lynn spoke about the many services they offer and is especially proud of their Autism Family Resource Center that allows parents and caregivers to access valuable information on the disability. In addition to the Capilouto Center for the Deaf and the Autism Center, they also have Life Skill Classes that meets the needs of children 14-18 who require social skills building. They have a Certified Nurse Assistant (CAN) Program that offers a five week Nurse Aide Training Program that is designed to provide a quality education for entry into the health care field. They have a Rotary Work Center,; Job Placement; On The Job Training (they believe people with all disabilities are able to return to the workforce and be successful. On the job Consumers are placed at a work site for 160 hours, and the salary is paid by Easter Seals of Central Alabama. The employer has no obligation to hire the person); aid people seeking employment; life skills classes. They have a Sumer Seals Camp, provide student vocational assessment, and several other programs. She also discussed the remainder of their 2013 fund raising events that benefits the organization's programs.

Topic: Poverty – Kimble Forrister, Executive Director, “Alabama Arise” - Mr. Forrister talked about the group’s position on many issues facing the poor in the state. His organization lobbies the Legislature for policies it believes will help the poor in Alabama, and its membership is composed largely of churches and other faith-based groups. He has been the coordinator for the past 20 years. He discussed some of the issues they have championed on behalf of the poor and disadvantaged – housing for low income people; renters’ rights; Alabama’s tax system; state funding for social services such as Medicaid health coverage for the poor and disabled; the death penalty - making sure money and race don’t have a role in determining who winds up on death row; public transportation; immigration; the state constitution. He also discussed poverty in general, and what it does to a person, and his budget that is provided by foundations such as the Robert Wood Foundation. Mr. Forrister gave a phone number and a website for people to call who are in need of the organization’s services.

Topic: Poverty – Dennis Johnson, Director, Head Start – Montgomery Community Action Agency – The Montgomery Community Action Agency, Inc. Head Start Program has provided comprehensive health, educational, nutritional, parental involvement and social services to more than 14.6 million preschool children from low income families. Mr. Johnson said the Montgomery Head Start program promotes growth and development in young children, encourages self-reliance in families and helps enhance the lives of low-income families. Mr. Johnson discussed the changes and the improvements the program have made during the years he has been there. Head Start gives children from low-income homes the same advantages of middle/upper income children. They all get a “head start” on education. They learn to love books and get a good foundation for reading. Every day they eat delicious, nutritious meals that are prepared in the Head Start Center. They and their families have access to high quality, free health care in their own communities with year round check-ups, dental care and mental health services. At the center they learn about healthy living, good nutrition, and are taught to wash their hands before meals and brush their teeth everyday. Children with disabilities are a welcome part of the program. Mr. Johnson also discussed the impact of the Community Action Agency on the city of Montgomery. The budget is made available to view for anyone who go by the center to see it. A phone number was given to contact the agency.

Topic: Parents Involvement in Education – Andrea Price, Alabama PTA Representative; Candance Longnecker, Montgomery County Council of PTA President – Montgomery schools resume tomorrow while many private schools are already operating. Education is discussed today. The Alabama PTA is the strongest statewide organization working exclusively on behalf of children and youth. Founded in 1911, Alabama PTA's primary objective is to strengthen the family unit through parent involvement. Today's guests discussed the parents' role in their children's education on both the state and local level. Parents are encouraged to get to know and communicate with the teachers; to visit the classroom when possible; and to be familiar with the classes their children are taking, and to know when exams are given. Membership is the backbone of the PTA as it represents a potential for unified action; an unified attack on major problems, a unified push for improved legislation, and opportunity to act on new ideas, and a chance to meet with others and discuss mutual concerns. They said by joining the local PTA, the individual member becomes a member of both the state and national organizations. The PTA address ways to improve the laws affecting schools throughout the state. They invited every parent to join the organization, and phone numbers and websites were provided

Topic: Partners in Education – Amy Sykes – The Partners in Education (PIE) is made up of many businesses and organizations that sign up to help a particular school with any need that they may have, no matter how large or small. Partners in Education is a program that works to unite Montgomery County Schools with local businesses and organizations for the benefit of our entire community. Ms. Sykes says the program allows them to integrate the ideas and energy of our young people with the knowledge and experience of the business and civic community. Partners have the opportunity to enhance the learning environment in our public schools with their expertise, time and financial or material resources. They have mentoring programs, where some of the partners participate in a reading program. They visit their partner, school, usually weekly, to help students with reading problems. Some partners provide books and supplies; landscape, paint, or repair buildings, and some partners make financial contributions. A number was given for anyone who would like to become a partner.

Topic: Employment – Thomas Surtees, Commissioner, Alabama Department of Labor – Mr. Surtees served as Director of the Department of Industrial Relations from 2007 until that department merged with the Department of Labor in 2013 when he then became The Commissioner. Mr. Surtees discussed jobs, the economy, new businesses, etc. The unemployment rate in Alabama is 6.3% for August which is slightly up from the previous month, but significantly down, he says, from the previous year according to data from the Department of Labor. That rate represents 134,367 unemployed persons, compared to 134,847 the prior month and 161,435 in August of the previous year. The jobless rates were 6.2% for July and 7.5% for August in 2012. Mr. Surtees said Alabama's unemployment for August really doesn't show much change over the month. He said while we saw a slight increase in jobs, we didn't really see much change in the number of people who are still unemployed. He said getting these people back to work continues to be our top priority. He said that the labor force decline in August as students leave the labor market to go to school, and those in education return to work. He said nearly 20,000 more people are working this August than were working last August. He discussed new industries coming to the state, as well as the continuing low unemployment rate in the Bible Belt areas of the state.

Topic: Employment & Hyundai's Presence in the River Region – Robert Burns, Hyundai – Robert Burns discussed Hyundai Motor Manufacturing Alabama (HMMA), and its impact on Montgomery, and the State as well. The \$1.7 billion plant is the company's first U.S. manufacturing facility and employs more than 3,000 people with high paying jobs and full benefits. It is One of the biggest employers in the River Region. Also, more than 72 suppliers have located businesses throughout North America to support the Hyundai plant. Altogether those suppliers are expected to create 5,500 additional jobs with a combined capital investment of \$500 million. The plant resides on 1,744 acres of land that has a stamping facility, paint shop, vehicle assembly shop, a two mile test tract, and two engine shops. The plant currently assembles Sonatas and Elantra sedans, and is capable of producing up to 399,500 vehicles per year at full capacity. Mr. Burns told the viewers how and where to apply for employment at the plant, and gave a website address and a phone number to call to get more information on employment. The Company is very active in the community as well, and sponsors many local charity events. On Saturday, August 10, 2013 a group of HMMA Team Members went back to school, but with rakes and brushes instead of pencils and paper. As part of Montgomery's Annual School Clean-Up Project, several HMMA Team Members were in attendance bright and early at Pintlala Elementary School. The Team Members pressure washed the side walks, did landscaping work and cleaned up the school's outdoor study areas to help beautify the school for the students' return. The School Clean-Up Project takes place each year thanks to the efforts of the Montgomery Area Chamber of

Commerce and businesses across the Montgomery area. The project's goal is to ensure that students come back to school campuses that are clean, neat.

Topic: Church Address Black on Black Crime/Religion: Rev. Claude A. Shuford – Reverend Shuford, Pastor of the local Mt. Zion A.M.E. Zion Church discussed crime, especially Montgomery’s murder rate – 36 homicides so far in 2013. Rev. Shuford discussed his church’s and denomination’s role in trying to address the problem. He talked about the programs his church already have in place that addresses the problem, and ways it is of service to the community. His church have children and youth programs – a local Boy Scouts Troop; a Sons of Varrick Mentoring Ministry; a clothes closet, a food program, and a weekly breakfast that reaches out to the disadvantaged. They have thrown block-parties for the community so they would have someplace to go and stay out of trouble, and they have planned a Vigil/Prayer service later in the month for the families of murder victims. All local churches are asked to participate in this vigil.

Topic: Stemming the Street Violence in Montgomery – Layne Ballard, (ICE); Sandra Passmore (ICE) – Members of ICE participated on today’s show. They said they are a network of people who choose to do what is necessary to bridge the gap between poverty and riches, white and black, young and old, homeless and homeowner, lost and saved. They feed the hungry, homeless, outcast and destitute. They said they must meet the need of those placed in their paths. They asked the public’s help in joining them to change your street, your block, your neighborhood, your state, and your country. The group goes into the sections of town that others refuse to go in to provide what is needed such as food, clothing, books, bible study, love. They encounter shootings, gang activity, robberies, and other crimes, but their hope is to bring hope to those in doubt, love to those in need, and food to those who are hungry. Once a month they hold an all day event for residents in the city’s most impoverished area. They also hold weekly bible study groups in these areas. They stress education, knowing it is the key that will steer the youth away from crime.

Topic: Law – Mark Potok, Editor in Chief, Southern Poverty Law Center’s “Intelligence Report”, Senior Fellow, Southern Poverty Law Center – On this morning’s program, Tim talked with representatives of two organizations many Alabamians would call Liberal, though the organizations might quibble with that label. They discussed same sex marriage, the school accountability law, and more! The SPLC represents Children at risk in prisons and jails. Most are Black or Latino and live in poverty. Approximately 100,000 children and teens are locked up in juvenile facilities and thousands more are incarcerated in adult prisons. Mr. Potok said the SPLC is working on reforming our juvenile justice system; reforming school discipline – for too many, the path to prison begins in underfunded schools – they rely on zero tolerance discipline policies that result in suspending, rather than investing in the basic educational and social services that will help trouble youth succeed; hate and extremism – they monitor and expose hate and extremist groups throughout the United States. There are 1,000 hate groups across the country; immigration justice – working to stop workplace exploitation and other human rights abuses. Immigrants perform some of the most dangerous jobs in our economy for the least pay and are cheated out of wages and denied basic protection; LGBT rights – they defend the rights of this community and defend students and work to ensure safe schools for all students, including LGBT.

Topic: Activities at the Law Center - Susan Watson, Director, Alabama ACLU – The American Civil Liberties Union describes itself as the “Nation’s premier defender of the rights enshrined in the U.S. Constitution” . . . yet conservatives hate the organization which they see as extremely left wing. Ms. Watson was asked what’s liberal about defending the constitution? She went on to explain what the ACLU does, who all benefits from the organization, and gave a brief history of Alabama’s chapter. The American Civil Liberties Union’s battle to protect and expand the civil liberties and civil rights of Alabamians has a long and rich history that began when the ACLU raised money for the defense of the Scottsboro Boys in the 1930s. In the 1940s, the organization represented striking coal miners and other labor organizers. Throughout the 1950s and ‘60s, the ACLU collaborated with its closest partner, the NAACP, to thwart the government’s attempts to break the back of the civil rights movement. In the 1970s and ‘80s, the organization’s historic voting rights work permanently altered the political landscape in Alabama. Ms. Watson talked about the segregation of prisoners with HIV in Alabama; immigration; death row inmates; same sex marriage; and students’ rights to pray or not to pray. She said that they are a private non-profit organization that does not receive any state or federal government funding, but is funded by Alabamians who are interested in furthering the work of the organization.

Topic – Brantwood Children’s Home – Varina Mead – Since 1917, the Brantwood Children’s home has been providing a safe, stable and structured environment for abused, neglected or other at-risk children. More than a program or a place to live, it is truly a home and family for young people in desperate need. Ms. Mead said the children are encouraged to help one another, to rely on each other for friendship and support, and to build a true sense of camaraderie, much as any siblings would provide for each other. The Children’s Home recently held one of its main fund raising events to benefit the school. Ms. Mead talked about all aspects of the home and explained what happens from the child a child is referred to the home until the time the child leaves. For most of the children that enter the home, they have never slept in a bed, have never had three meals a day, have never had a birthday or Christmas celebration, have never had new clothes, and some have never even been hugs. Some of the children stay in the home until they are adults. Ms. Mead said that a school is located on the property at the children’s home where the students attend until they graduate. The school is accredited and all of the teachers are certified by the State of Alabama. The teacher to student ratio is so small that Ms. Mead says it is almost like the students have their own private tutor. The home serves children from the ages of 10 – 21 and some of the children remain at the home until they are 21, as they won’t put them out on the streets. They want to make sure they know to function in the world before they are released.

Topic: Blue Jeans for Babies and Other MOD Campaigns – Linda Gross, Senior Community Director, Alabama March of Dimes – One of the March Dimes major fundraisers, Ms. Gross came on the show to encourage the public to get involved, support the organization by buying Auburn or Alabama Beanie Babies, and wearing Auburn or Alabama shirts that are also sold by the organization on the Friday before the Alabama/Auburn football game. Employers let employees that participate in this fundraiser wear blue jeans on that day as well. Ms. Gross gave a history of the March of Dimes – how it got its start when it was founded by President Franklin D. Roosevelt in 1938 to combat polio. The name "March of Dimes" was originally used for the foundation's annual fundraising event that requested each child donate a dime. She said that there was a shortage of dimes in the early days because so many people donated them to the fundraiser. The organizations combats birth defects, and also works to offset preterm birth; very preterm; low birth rate; and very low birth rate. Premature birth is the leading cause of infant death and half of these births are for unknown reasons. The MOD also fight against late term abortions.

Topic: Montgomery Kiwanis Club & Charities - Russ Dunman, 2012-2013 Kiwanis Club President – Mr. Dunman is the club's outgoing president. The Kiwanis Club of Montgomery currently holds the ranking of the second largest Kiwanis Club in the world, out of 8,000 clubs within Kiwanis International, its parent organization. In 1954 the club began its annual fundraiser by founding the Alabama National Fair. Over the last 57 years, the Kiwanis Club, through its Kiwanis Club of Montgomery Foundation, has given over \$6 million to local charitable organizations. The Kiwanis Scholarship program awards \$4,000 a year to local high school students applying to college. The Jack L. Carr Scholarship Fund awards an annual \$1,500 to a local high school student who wishes to study engineering and attend an Alabama University. Both scholarships are administered by the Central Alabama Community Foundation. In 1966 a long time faithful bachelor member, John A. (Pete) Peterson, willed a major portion of his estate (\$775,000) to our Kiwanis Club, with instructions that the principal was to be invested by a bank trust department with the income donated to the youth charities of the city. Since that time over \$2.3 million has been donated from this fund to the youth of our city with a present fund principal balance of over \$2.6 million. This fund over the past few years has contributed approximately \$100,000 annually through the Kiwanis Club to the charitable youth needs in this city and surrounding areas. Also, proceeds from the Alabama National Fair are donated each March to youth charitable organizations in the River Region. In addition to the contributions to youth organizations, from all sources the club donates approximately \$200-300 annually to the emerging charitable needs in Montgomery.
