Host: Tim Lennox

Topic: Oscar Night - Since the Academy Awards air tonight on WNCF, we invited Dr. Tonea Steward over the Theatrical Department at Alabama State University to appear on our show and share her experiences of appearing in major television series and movies. She discussed her educational background and how she got her start in entertainment. As you know, Dr. Steward was one of the major stars in "In The Heat of the Night", and "A Time to Kill" opposite Samuel L. Jackson. She discussed projects in the making at Alabama State University, how she inspires her students to reach for and achieve their goals, ASU's annual TAPS Camp, and her relationship with last Year's Oscar Winner, Octavia Spenser.

Topic: Also on this show was Bobby Jon Drinkard with the AIDT (Alabama Industrial Development Training). They train students in all aspects of movie making - producing; directing, sound, photography, graphics, etc. He discussed the movie industry, the education/training it takes to get in the entertainment business, and some people who go some of their training at Alabama Industrial Development Training. AIDT was established to build a healthy state economy by recruiting and training a skilled workforce to attract new industries to the state and to expand existing industries. Job specific pre-employment and on-the-job training programs are provided. The program provides a full range of customized technical training programs that are offered at no cost to employers and to the trainees.

Topic: The Salvation Army – Captain Mark Gilliam was this segment's guest. He gave a background of his involvement with the Salvation Army; he and his wife are officers, they have been with the Army for 10 years, and Montgomery is his 4th appointment. He shared with the host what he has learned about the homeless – substance abuse is a common thread. He said the maximum stay at the shelter for anyone is 30 days then they have to see that the person gets to a place that deals with their condition. Since the economic slump in '08-'09 there have not been an increase in residents, but they are seeing different people coming in who are women, children, and families. Typically it was always a male dominated scene at the shelter and they have had to change how they operate (to make it a safe environment). Cuts in government spending have not hurt the operation of the Salvation Army as it is mostly supported by the community. They use government funds as they become available, but want to be community driven. The emergency shelter has been on Maxwell Blvd for years and the Mayor wants it moved. Captain Gilliam understand the Mayor's desire to beautify the city but thinks this is done by taking care of our people and loving those in need. He is working with the Mayor on this. His goal is meeting the needs of those in need.

Topic: Habitat For Humanity – Elizabeth Saliba, Executive Director of Habitat for Humanity was the guest on this segment. Habitat for Humanity has been active in Montgomery since 1987 and has a 25+ year history. They have great community support in Montgomery and are going strong as providing four houses this year alone is a big step. She discussed the difference in the two types of houses they provide – one starts with land and built from the ground up, and the other is to rehabilitate a donated house. Wells Fargo Bank has donated property, and other banks have helped them to expand and grow. She told how families are chosen and there is three criteria for selection – need; ability to repay no interest loan, and a willingness to partner with Habitat to help build their home and other families homes. Several hundred hours have to be put in. She also talked about their annual fundraisers coming up The annual "Home In One" Golf Tournament on Thursday, April 18; and the Faith Built House that 9 local congregations are coming together to share the cost and volunteer the labor on this home. They have never experienced a foreclosure in Montgomery, but one family did walk away from the home (which was then given to another family). Habitat is a Christian Housing Ministry. Topic: New Police Chief – Prattville's new Police Chief Mark Thompson was the guest on this segment. Chief Thompson, formerly a captain in the Montgomery County Sheriff's Office was sworn in on January 15th, replacing Tim Huggins who had been Prattville's Chief since 2011. Chief Thompson is a graduate of the FBI Academy 178th Session, former President of the Deputy Sheriff Association on behalf of Montgomery County and a former president of The Alabama Tactical Officers Association. He talked about recent highly publicized crimes/arrests and discussed his mission to bring the very best in law enforcement, service, protection and crime prevention to Prattville. He discussed new programs are being integrated into the department that has 83 sworn officers, 12 support personnel, and two part-timers, and the arrest rate in the city.

Topic: CampMDme – Hanna Chadee, of Envision 20/20 was the guest. She said that part of the answer to the physician shortage is to "grow our own." So, this summer will be the first Camp MDme, which is for rising 10th and 11th graders in the River region who are strong in math and science and interested in becoming physicians. Ms. Chadee has attended student assemblies and met with top administrators and applicable faculty counselors. Topic: State of Pike Road – Gordon Stone, Mayor of Pike Road, AL discussed the state of his city. It has been a municipality since 1997, and Mayor Stone is the city's first Mayor. He doesn't just see Pike Road as a bedroom community for Montgomery, but as a nice complement to everything else. It is one of the fastest growing cities in Alabama, going from 350 to 6,000 residents in 8 years. His city has a lot of history, and the citizens' goals are to preserve and protect that history. He said the volunteerism in the city is amazing, and they have plans on how to grow. The city is in the process of establishing its first school system, and the Mayor said it is in the fun stages now and everything is coming together; they are going to be this summer; they will break ground this fall; the doors will open in the fall of 2015. The Mayor discussed the 9 different organizations in the city; he has gotten inquiries from 3 different retailers in the past week; they have a new Veterans Memorial, and new trail that the whole county can enjoy; the city participates in the county's library service, and contribute money to Montgomery's public school system (they help support entities in Montgomery); and they support the mutual aid agreement. His goal is to make sure the region grown. Find out more about the city at www.pikeroad.us.

Topic: Programs in the Montgomery Police Department – Montgomery Police Chief of Staff John. E. Brown, and Brenda Mitchell, Director of Emergency Management were our guests. Chief Brown discussed the Police Academy that the police department runs – Montgomery Police are trained at one site, and officers from other cities in the state are trained at the State Regional Academy. The Alabama Emergency Vehicle Operational Center is opening the first week in April. This is huge, and police from all over the state will come here to train. Chief Brown also discussed the Leadership development Class where they teamed up with AUM. When officers come from the Academy they are trained on how to become leaders so when they reach the rank of Major or Captain they have already been exposed and are familiar with leadership, leadership development; critical thinking; motivational requests, etc. It won't be new to them as they will get leadership development at an early age. Director Mitchell who used to be with the Police Department, discussed severe weather preparedness – being ready to react and how to prepare citizens throughout the year. She works with law enforcement, the sheriff, police, fire department, etc. They train them on any type of disaster so they will know how to react. They took a look at Newtown and how to be prepared if the same happens here locally. Any precautions that can be taken should be taken. Regular citizens will start CERT (Community Emergency Response Training) training on April 4 and continue for 7 consecutive Thursdays from 6-8 P.M. at the Red Cross Building on Carmichael

Road. This training will prepare citizens to assist in cases of disaster prior to emergency response units arriving. Quarterly meetings to readdress what they have learned and updates on new information will be scheduled at different times.

Topic: Joy To Life Foundation and Upcoming Events - Joy Blondheim was the guest on today's show. She discussed her foundation's upcoming walk, and other scheduled fund raisers and how participation is more necessary than ever this year because of budget shortfalls in the state. They have committed over \$300,000 to the Alabama Department of Public Health to fund mammograms for underserved women in the River Region Area. They hope to have over 5,000 people at the walk this year. A breast cancer survivor, Joy also discussed the importance of having yearly mammograms. After being asked, she discussed her thoughts on the study that said yearly mammograms are not beneficial.

Montgomery's downtown area has grown tremendously and there is always something to do. There is a convention center, several new restaurants, bars and night clubs, and areas where family friendly activities can be held. Montgomery, she said is truly a "City of Dreams". In the future a representative will appear on the show each month to let the viewers know they don't have to leave Montgomery to experience first rate entertainment.

Topic: Truancy Intervention Program/Families/Crime – District Attorney Ellen Brooks discussed the truancy program that is administered by the Helping Montgomery Families initiative that was piloted at Davis Elementary, E.D. Nix Elementary, and Bellingrath Middle Schools. It is now expanded to all Montgomery Public Schools. She said school attendance isn't an option; it's the law and we are losing promising young people to the juvenile justice system because they don't regularly attend school and fall prey to criminal activity. The MPS Superintendent Barbara Thompson works with the District Attorney in this program. Tim also asked Ms. Brooks questions on what's happening, and what she is busy with in her role as Montgomery County's Attorney General.

OPELIKA ATTEMPTED MURDER

Montgomery police are reaching out to local area churches to make sure they protect themselves from crime after the Maggie Street Missionary Baptist Church in Montgomery was robbed just a few weeks ago, and an employee was assaulted.
