Doctors consider a person to be constipated when they're having fewer than three bowel movements in a week. Between 10% to 20% of Americans live with persistent constipation that doesn't have a discernible cause, according to a recent survey. They tend to have hard, dry stools that may cause pain and bloating.

FABULOSO CLEANER RECALL: BACTERIAL CONTAMINATION

Donna and Matt Belanger discuss the large-scale recall of Fabuloso Multi-Purpose Cleaner. The product has been removed from shelves due to bacterial contamination. The manufacturer warns that a preservative was not added at the intended level during manufacturing, and that those with weakened immune systems, use external medical devices, or have underlying lung conditions are at the highest risk of complications from product contamination.

Julia discusses topics relating to American Heart Month, which is celebrated every February and notes that the first Friday in February is National Wear Red Day to acknowledge the occasion. Julia talks about NFL player Damar Hamlin, who collapsed on-field after being hit and suffered cardiac arrest. Demar Hamlin's life was saved because one of his trainers was professionally trained and certified to perform CPR. Julia notes that music star Sheryl Crow was inspired to learn CPR because of what happened to Damar. Julia emphasizes the importance of CPR knowledge and how it's easy to learn. She provides listeners with resources to gain CPR certification and She directs listeners to go to the Minnesota Red Cross website, where they have a calendar for open CPR classes.

The song's lyrics advocate for inclusion and the word "rainbow," which the rainbow serves as a symbol of LGBTQ+ identity, are not controversial and banning this song further pushes an anti-LGBTQ+ agenda forward.

The study found that the most viewed content on TikTok related to either food, nutrition, or weight, and that content paints a very unrealistic and inaccurate picture of food nutrition and health to young users. It also found that the people influencing this type of behavior are not qualified to speak accurately about nutrition and health. The study also shows that popular videos glorifying weight loss puts negative mental pressure on kids.
