## **Issues and Programs, WSLU-FM Repeater Station**

## January, February, and March 2023

This station operates as a satellite of the North Country Public Radio network (flagship station is WSLU, Canton, NY). WSLU, Canton, NY and its satellite stations and translators make up the North Country Public Radio (NCPR) network. North Country Public Radio produces extensive coverage of local and regional stories and issues in order to serve all of its listeners in this rural region. NCPR's news director and reporters, as well as the station manager and other department directors, talk with listeners regularly and frequently, gathering information about community concerns and issues. In addition, the station uses broadcast and digital platforms to encourage listeners to share their thoughts and concerns by phone, mail, email, and social media. These comments receive a reply from station management and are often the basis for local and regional news and feature content. This content is aired during the weekday morning regional news program Northern Light and/or Story of the Day, which airs weekdays at 5:48pm, and/or North Words, which airs on the last Friday of each month at 12 noon. All three programs are also available as a podcast, and online for reading and listening at ncpr.org. Here are some examples of the station's treatment of key stories and issues in the coverage area. ## NCPR's Mitch Teich on the limericks, generators and sounds of the 1998 Ice Storm
