Library Renovation	News Program	08/14/23	7:31p	3:00 mins	<p>New Ashford Library August 14, 2023</p> <p>Deborah SFX: On July 7th the Dothan Houston County Library Systems Board of Trustees approved terms of a US Department of Agriculture Community Facilities Loan for the renovation of the former MidSouth Banks IT/Data Center as the new Ashford Library. Dothan Houston County Library System Board Chairman Brad Kimbro says the new library will make a positive difference for Ashford and for all of Houston County.</p> <p>Brad Kimbro SFX:</p>

We applied for and received a USDA loan to be able to renovate the new Ashford library. Mid South Bank was able to donate a building when they moved out vacated to the AERA the downtown Redevelopment Authority for Ashford. We were able to donate that to the Dothan Houston County Library and relocate existing library where it is now to a more desired location doubling square footage.

And what this loan with USDA is gonna allow us to do is to get started on renovating that building to turn it into a really First Class Library for our Ashford community and surrounding areas, Houston County.

This is the first step we're still going to enter into a fundraising campaign to try to raise the funds needed to do the renovation work. But this this long from USDA will allow us to go ahead and get started. I think that when people see progress and see what that building can be and how great that location is going to be. All the enhancements that will come from that for the library. We believe seeing that will help people want to participate and financially help support this community library in our Ashford area.

Veterans (DAV) is seeking volunteers to assist with driving local veterans to medical appointments. DAV is a nationwide organization that assists veterans and their families by providing help securing benefits; representing the interests of veterans and their families in local, state, and federal government; providing transportation assistance to medical appointments; help veterans transition to civilian life; and connecting veterans and their spouses with employment opportunities. To help with this mission, DAV retired Commander Daniel Blackmon says the local chapter has purchased a new van and help is needed to drive veterans to weekly appointments.

Daniel Blackmon SFX: Were one of the few organizations in the state that provide transportation for veterans to medical facilities Tuskegee Montgomery with has Chantilly and also Perry Hill, which is the main VA Hospital in Montgomery. Currently, we run when van Enterprise runs a van. So those are the two organizations in the Southeast Alabama that provides transportation for veterans free of charge, by the way to veterans. We can't do it without volunteers. A lot of people call us and say well and want to drive your van for you. But how much does it paid? Well, it doesn't pay anything.

None of the local chapter members get paid anything for the work we do for veterans. It's all volunteer and we have a good group of volunteers now that drive the van force. They

drive anywhere from eight to a 10 hour a day when they drive the van so we're always looking for volunteers to drive the van. They don't have to have any special qualifications to be a van driver. You can be civilian mom a civilian day, retiree don't have to be prior military if you're willing to give one two days a month of your time and drive veterans to Montgomery, Chantilly and various other locations. We would love to have you as part of the team.

All you have to do is call us make sure that you get an application get it process. We transport you to Montgomery, you're actually working for the VA volunteer services. You're not working for the chapter. We just helped do the recruiting and getting the word out like if you're interested in doing a little volunteer work as much or as little as you want. We're the perfect opportunity for you. We'd love to have you join our team.

Deborah SFX: How would someone get in touch with you?

Blackmon SFX: Our local chapter is located at 301 West Lafayette and for most locals, they know that as the Old Young Junior High that's the Saliba Center. Starting in October residents within the city limits of the City of Progress can call a day ahead to get a ride to their destination within the city.. Mike Crittenden Transportation Director with the South Alabama Regional Planning and Development Commission.</p> <p>Crittendon SFX We are scheduled to start up October 2 and we are taken care of all the preliminaries things we need to do to ensure successful start-up. The type of services are similar to what we do in Dothan called the demand response system.</p>

essentially you call for a ride today for tomorrow so everything is scheduled so you define service area for Enterprise right now is just within the city limits of Enterprise. There is always potential for growth and there is always potential for connectivity between the two systems. The city of Enterprise has its own defined service area which is within the city limits of Enterprise.

So will it be very similar to Dothan you pay the two dollars a ride or something like that?

Crittendon SFX

We are actually going up. The two dollars a ride in Dothan right now will be increasing to 3 dollars beginning of the fiscal year October 1st. Enterprise will begin the same local oneway fair of 3 dollar a trip so 6 dollars round trip

Deborah SFX

Will it be Wiregrass Transit buses from Dothan going there?

It will still be Wiregrass Transit the buses will say Wiregrass transit but those particular vehicles will be assigned to the city of Enterprise. Enterprise will operating vehicles not as large as what we have here in Dothan now. Those vehicles will be the high roof transit style vans. All the vehicles are lift equipped so we can carry ambulatory as well as people who use wheel chairs.

I'm quite sure you will be needing drivers?

Crittendon SFX

That is correct. In fact we are in the process now recruiting drivers and dispatch personnel for the city of Enterprise. We are trying to recruit from that particular area there and I think in the beginning we will probably need up to six drivers and maybe two or three office personnel.

Will they need to contact you to become a driver?

Crittendon SFX

We have an online application with the Regional Planning Commission and our Humane Resources is advertising for positions on like on our Facebook Page as well as Indeed as well as other pages or go to our website and apply for the job

Therapy Dogs for Trauma Victims	News Program	09/18/23	7:31p	3:00 mins	<p>Wiregrass Angel Paws September 18, 2023</p> <p>The Wiregrass Angel House has a program called Angel Paws.. where a therapy dog is used to help children to feel loved and not judged when dealing with trauma...Tony Luker talks about Mandy and how she helps to alleviate anxiety, fear and helps children and adults work through their traumatic experience ..</p> <p>Tony Luker SFX</p> <p>The Wiregrass Angel House provides direct services to victims of violent crimes and family members of homicide victim. The sheriff's departments and the police departments will call us out to a homicide and we go out just to be with the family to provide support to them. We a license counselor on staff we also have an attorney on staff that helps in emergency situations with the victims and we also do what we call what is crime scene cleanup and that is we do for the homicide and we branched out and started doing for suicides.</p> <p>I can imagine a family losing a loved one and then they had to clean up the aftermath. So we'll step in and provide the service to clean up this scene. But we also go with them to every</p>

court session. We have a victim service officer that will go with the families to every court that they have to go to.

My part of it is we call it Angel Paws this a dog program and we do a lot in the court system. Mandy she's seven now she is a mix between a lab and a golden she provides comfort especially like to the children. When children have a crime perpetrated on them they end up having to testify in court. You know our court system says that the person accused has the right to face their accuser and it doesn't say except they're five years old or six years old. So they have to go on the stand and testify. Mandy will go on the stand with them and provide that comfort to them so they can tell their story and tell what happened.

Deborah SFX:

And tell us some of the things that Mandy does other than just being a support dog?

It was important for me to look at it when we interact with the kids not only to provide that comfort, but Mandy can interact with the children. She bowls with them, she can take a car and push it to them, and they can roll it back to and they play cars and trucks. She can pick up puzzle pieces and give it to them to put together. She can turn pages in books. She also does math. She can pick out colors you can tell her you know pick blue and she can do that.

					<p>We just wanted to be able to interact with the kids felt most of the time when we come in a specially in the in the beginning. We come in contact with the child. Of course they're scared. They're crying. It's amazing you introduce Mandy to them. You don't hear the prime but you hear laughter It was kind of like when we walked into your office here at WOOF I looked and everyone that came in contact with you know what they did? They smile and so it's amazing the human and animal bonds that's there. So no matter where that child goes, they'll have a blanket that makes them aware that there are Rotarians throughout the globe through Rotary International, even the Dothan Tuesday Rotary Club, they care about them and that provide them with something that they can carry with them every single day. Because a lot of kids they come into foster care with nothing and they may go to foster care to foster care foster home and it's nice to have that very own blanket and that's initiative that we decided as a group to put together and make that happen this year through our Dothan and Tuesday Rotary Club.

And it takes about 45 minutes to complete one blanket but it has certain stitching and then you tie it so that it really personalizes so it just doesn't seem like a piece of fleece material, but it's very personalized and we get to try out our skills.

This is my very first year as service chair for dogs and cheese or rotary and I've just started doing a little research online. We found a company in the Midwest and they partner with Rotarians so we're excited to be able to order over 100 just for our club in our community. So we'd love to increase that number. The total cost is \$15.75. We've rounded that down or you know \$15 Or somebody wants to give a whole number of \$20. We certainly can apply that to the very next blanket
