ARTS

All-Star Orchestra #102: What Makes a Masterpiece?

Airdate/Time: Sunday, October 6, 2013, 6:00pm

Length: 60-minutes

Description: "All-Star Orchestra" delivers "masterpieces for the masses," helping viewers enjoy, explore and experience the celebrated classical music of Beethoven, Stravinsky, Dvorak, Shostakovich, Tchaikovsky, Schumann and Mahler. The educational and entertaining series features the world-class talents of the All-Star Orchestra, an ensemble comprised of top players who gathered together in August 2012 for a one-week recording "summit." This episode features an exploration of the creative process, tracing the genesis of Beethoven's iconic Symphony No. 5 and the development of Philip Glass's Harmonium Mountain. Interactive features show how short rhythmic and melodic motives evolve into vast symphonic organisms. Interviews include leading Beethoven scholars and the All-Star musicians.

All-Star Orchestra #105: Relationships in Music

Description: This episode of "All-Star Orchestra" features Johannes Brahms: Academic Festival Overture; Robert Schumann: Symphony No. 3 "Rhenish" and explores the turbulent relationship among Robert Schumann, his wife Clara - herself a gifted pianist and composer - and Schumann's protégé, Johannes Brahms. Clara became a lifelong friend and source of inspiration for Johannes Brahms resulting in a turbulent musical and emotional relationship among these three. State of the Arts #3201

Airdate/Time: Sunday, October 6, 2013, 8:00pm

Length: 30-minutes

Description: The HBO series "Boardwalk Empire" tells the story of Atlantic City gangster boss "Nucky" Johnson. Get the real story as State of the Arts meets author and historian Nelson Johnson, writer of the best-selling book on which the TV series is based. Teens from Trenton ask whether the troubled city holds any promise for their future in a new play created with Passage Theatre, and performed in the revitalized Gandhi Garden. And, State of the Arts visits an under-the-radar house concert series in Ringwood, NJ called Live@Drew's, where critically acclaimed singer-songwriter Joseph Arthur debuted material from his new album The Ballad of Boogie Christ.

Gaetano Federici: The Sculptor Laureate Paterson

Airdate/Time: Wednesday, October 30, 2013, 8:00pm

Length: 60-minutes

Description: "Gaetano Federici: The Sculptor Laureate of Paterson" is about the life, works, and legacy of a gifted New Jersey artist who depicted with historical realism many leading civic and religious leaders of the city between 1904 and 1957. These include U.S. Senator Charles Hughes, Rep. James F. Stewart, Attorney General Thomas McCran, Mayors Nathan Barnert and Andrew McBride, Bishop Thomas McLaughlin, Dean William McNulty, and comedian Lou

Costello. Statues for ethnic groups were also created (the Dublin Spring, Columbus, and Pulaski) as well as bronze plaques honoring nationally prominent local athletes. About 40 of his works can be found within a two-mile radius of Paterson's City Hall, including in front of that building as well as the County Court House, St. John's Cathedral, Eastside Park, Westside Park, Pennington Park, other local churches and cemeteries, and the Paterson Board of Education. In his apprenticeship, he worked on massive sculptures for world's fairs and other celebratory events in Birmingham, Alabama; Buffalo, New York; St. Louis, Missouri; and Havana, Cuba. Other works of his can be found in Brooklyn, the Bronx, Newark, Saratoga, and Italy. Many of his works—whether larger-than-life statues or plaques in bronze or cast stone, studio pieces in plaster or clay—are depicted in this documentary, with commentary from Passaic County Historian Edward A. Smyk and Federici biographer Flavia Alaya, with narration by William Paterson University Professor Vincent Parrillo.

State of the Arts #3202

Description: Andrea Miller is 31, a brand-new mom, and already the 7-year veteran artistic director of the internationally acclaimed Gallim Dance Company. State of the Arts finds out more about her wild and joyful new work "Fold Here," a recent world premiere at Montclair State University's Peak Performances. Also, a visit with Gerald Stern, one of America's most acclaimed poets, at his home in Lambertville, New Jersey. At 88, Stern is as prolific as ever, publishing books of verse and prose, winning major awards, and doing public readings. In music, the Princeton Symphony Orchestra teams up with a jazz band to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation. Migration Series JazzConcerto's composer Derek Bermel says his inspiration was painter Jacob Lawrence's legendary series about the Great Migration of African-Americans from the rural south to the industrial north. Nearby, at the Princeton University Art Museum, New Jersey as Non-Site explores how the state became a hot bed of experimental art in the 1950s and '60s, with rarely seen work by George Segal, Robert Smithson, and more. State of the Arts is there as Fluxus artist Geoffrey Hendricks presides over a recreation of his 1969 happening "The Sky is the Limit."

Nova #4017 "Megastorm Aftermath"

Description: One year after Hurricane Sandy's deadly strike, NOVA follows up on its 2012 film "Inside the Megastorm" with a fresh investigation of the critical questions raised by this historic storm: Was Sandy a freak combination of weather systems? Or are hurricanes increasing in intensity due to a changing climate? What can we do to prepare ourselves for the next Sandy and what progress has been made toward making our urban infrastructure more resilient? Much of Sandy's wrecking power was due to an extreme storm surge that left large swaths of New York and New Jersey underwater. And with sea levels on the rise, flooding will only become more frequent. What is the role of global warming in driving these rising seas and what will it take to make cities like New York more resilient? NOVA travels around the world to see how other low-lying urban areas are combining extraordinary engineering with natural landscape restoration and a smarter, more flexible power grid to prepare for an uncertain future. At the same time, NOVA meets the climate scientists who are racing to understand how a warming world will affect extreme -- but unpredictable -- weather phenomena like hurricanes and tornadoes. To many, Sandy was a wake-up call: one year later, are we still listening? And how will we answer?

Nature #3103: Saving Otter 501

But the effort has stalled, and no one knows why. This is the story of the Monterey Bay Aquarium's 501st attempt to save an orphan otter. From her discovery as a stranded newborn pup crying on the beach through her rehabilitation in secret roof tanks atop the Aquarium, we follow as Otter 501 learns how to dive, hunt, eat, and fend for herself in the wild, where survival is a long shot at best.

But Dr. Rankin's focus shifted away from traditionally practiced Western medicine through a combination of personal and professional experiences with illness and ailing patients whose symptoms - and eventual successful treatments - defied conventional attitudes towards medicine. Dr. Rankin now presents her groundbreaking synthesis of this research in her first public television program, Mind Over Medicine: The Science of Healing Yourself. Dr. Rankin demonstrates how the brain is the most important organ for our optimal health, and she explains how thoughts, feelings and beliefs have been proven to alter the body's physiology. She explains the body's innate ability to self-repair and how we can control these self-healing mechanisms with the power of the mind. During the program, she provides viewers with techniques to activate the relaxation response and to reduce the stress response - both critical to putting the body into the state in which self-healing

can take place. She also teaches viewers how to use a new model of whole health as a guide to living an optimally healthy life.

A Legacy of Achievement: The Italian Americans

Description: "A Legacy of Achievement: The Italian Americans" explores the significant contributions of the Italian-American population to New Jersey's government, culture, education, economy, agriculture, and science. A wealth of Italian-Americans, including a doctor, former mayor, nun, engineer, Port Authority director, judge, artist, physicist and actor Joe Piscopo reminisce about the Italian-American experience. Like many who flee poverty and repression in their homeland to seek opportunity in the United States, emigrants from Italy brought a strong sense of family, responsibility and loyalty. But over time, their assimilation into American culture caused certain traditions, including their native language, to lapse. The program profiles Italian heritage initiatives at two New Jersey universities, where third- and fourth-generation Italians are reclaiming their heritage.

Latino Americans of NY & NJ

Description: This local companion program to PBS's national documentary series "Latino Americans" highlights the rich history, culture and influence that this large community has had in the metro region. As one of the oldest and broadest immigrant groups in the metro area, the Latino population includes people who originate from Mexico, Puerto Rico, Cuba, the Dominican Republic and countries in Central and South America. Today, over four million Latino Americans call the New York and New Jersey region home adding its own texture to the fabric of the region's history and culture. This half-hour documentary is made up of personal stories, as told by members of the region's Latino American community as well as experts in Latino history and culture.

The Jewish Americans

Description: This series is about the struggle of a tiny minority to make its way into the American mainstream. Beginning with the first Jews to arrive in New Amsterdam in the 17th century, the film offers a portrait of a people who epitomize the immigrant experience. Even as they have faced bigotry and rejection, Jews have embraced American culture while keeping alive their traditions and heritage.

It explores the origins of the people from Africa whose enslavement led to the creation of the African American people, as well as the multiplicity of cultural institutions, political strategies, and religious and social perspectives that African Americans have developed against unimaginable odds. All of these elements define black culture and society in its extraordinarily rich and compelling diversity from slavery to freedom, from the plantation to the White House. Hosted by Harvard scholar Henry Louis Gates, Jr., and drawing on some of America's top historians and heretofore untapped primary sources, the series guides viewers on a journey across 500 years and two continents to shed new light on the experience of being an African American.
