The leader of Kentucky's largest School District--Jefferson County's Marty Pollio--has coined a name for it: Pandemic Poverty.

The effect COVID 19 has had on our children's learning. And performance.

Particularly test scores--that determine where they and their schools rank compared to the rest of the Commonwealth--and of the country.

The Herald-Leader finds only a fifth of Kentucky's schools had more than half their students hitting high levels in math. How do we fix it?

Gorton won the Primary with 71 percent of the vote--losing only one precinct.

Kloiber barely missed the cutoff for the General Election.

But since the primary 23 people have lost their lives to violence.

No secret that the Commonwealth's jails and prisons are crowded beyond capacity. Too many inmates--too few people to guard them --creating dangerous situations for the offenders and the officers.

The crisis not only has trickled down to Kentucky's Juvenile Justice system --it may be worse

Last month--disturbances turned to riots in Adair County, which holds both boys and girls--tweens and teens--albeit in separate wings.

But State Police are investigating reports one girl was raped.

Kentucky lawmakers--certain to take up whether to legalize medical marijuana when Session convenes in two weeks and two days.

Governor Andy Beshear's Year-in-Review news conference this past week, more of a reminder of works-in progress--or in one case--a project just beginning.
