He discussed the lack of adequate training of new truckers. He also talked about road congestion and needed improvements in the nation's highway system to better accommodate trucks.

Nora Volkow, MD, Director of the National Institute on Drug Abuse, part of the National Institutes of Health

Fentanyl overdoses are the leading cause of death for Americans ages 18 to 49, more than car accidents or suicides. On average, one person dies of a fentanyl overdose in the United States every seven minutes, and the number of Americans killed by the drug has jumped 94 percent since 2019. Dr. Volkow discussed why the problem has skyrocketed and what steps the federal government is taking to address it. She said that, while the epidemic was worse in certain rural areas of the US in past years, the problem has now overwhelmed every city and state. She talked about the importance of education and treatment programs, and also explained why fentanyl is a particularly troubling issue for pregnant women.

Girls drop out of organized sports at twice the rate of boys at age 14, and half have quit by 17. Sixty-five percent develop disordered eating habits that compromise their ease around food, sometimes irreparably. Ms. Fleshman talked about emerging research on the physiology and psychology of young athletes, and what coaches and parents should know. She outlined changes in organized sports to empower and encourage young women to join and stay.

She led a study that evaluated the effectiveness of a school-based, adolescent suicide risk screening and found that it successfully identified at-risk adolescents and increased initiation of mental health services. She explained how the screening works and the reasons some schools or parents may be reluctant to give it a chance.

General Shelton was a Tarboro, North Carolina native and graduated from with his first degree from North Carolina State. His distinguished military career culminated with assignment as the 14th Commander of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff at the Pentagon from 1997-2001 under President Bill Clinton. General Shelton founded the General Hugh Shelton Leadership Center at North Carolina State University. The center was created to "inspire, educate, and develop values-based leaders, both locally and globally, committed to personal integrity, professional ethics, and selfless service." Among other objectives, the center created Leadership Camps for high school students at various college and universities.

Dr. Drew Zieglar, PhD oversees the renowned **General Hugh Shelton Leadership Camp** at Methodist University. Dr. Mark Kline and a staff following his direction operates it for six-days and 5 nights each summer for about 30 high school students.

The vision for the Shelton leadership camp is to focus on leadership "basics" as General Shelton calls them. He says he felt fortunate to have been taught them by his parents but has observed that many young people have missed being exposed to them. That is what inspired him to develop his week-long camp and make it available to high-school students.

Dr. Mark Kline heads up operation of the camp on the Methodist campus! They invited parents and grandparents to submit the names of nominees for the camp experience. services and retail, brick and mortar locations are less important than they used to be. Mobile on wheels and on line have expanded their roles. Even in the workplace, offices have been deemphasized, with more people working flexibly online at home – or even hybrid office and home work schedules.

As Wages have risen, Employers have become more selective in competing for quality workers. Tiffany Lesane, Coordinator of the Career Development Center at Fayetteville Technical Community College, says development of the workplace going forward will require sharper workers getting paid more. And employees willing to become more qualified can also ask for more.

On Talkback Today, two different sets of dates on the calendar of upcoming events in Fayetteville and Cumberland County. Last Spring, 215,000 area residents and guests were attracted Fayetteville's Annual Spring welcome mat, the Dogwood Festival – centered around Festival Park in Downtown Fayetteville. The Dogwood Festival's Executive Director Sarah Grace Mitchell will fill us in on the stage acts, activities and schedule for the 2023 edition, slotted for Thursday, April 27th through Sunday the 30th. That's coming up later in Talkback.

First, updated approaches to law enforcement and criminal justice have been in the headlines in our country over the past several years. The Cumberland County, North Carolina, Courts and Justice System have received an abundance of credit across the U.S.A. in recent years for initiative in making sure when non-violent, victimless crimes are committed by perpetrators who suffer from drug abuse, human trafficking or mental illness, instead of the perpetrators being prosecuted as criminals to the fullest extent of the law, it is the causes of the crimes WITHIN the people that are aggressively treated in drug courts, human trafficking courts and veterans courts, diverting criminal prosecution in hopes of rehabilitating offenders.

In the last six years, Cumberland County has understood that some non-violent crimes committed in Cumberland County have been by momentarily lost individuals who made mistakes as momentary flaws, after sufficient time has revealed these crimes were exceptions as opposed to repeated life patterns. Led by former long-time Cumberland County Commissioner, former Fayetteville City Councilperson, former Congressional candidate and NOW heading his advocacy foundation Project Fresh Start, Charles Evans...along with Cumberland County District Attorney Billy West Jr. and Fayetteville Mayor Mitch Colvin, comes the sixth year of an Expungement (or criminal record removal) initiative that might benefit qualified past offenders of certain non-violent Felony and Misdemeanor crimes in Cumberland County.

This is a big deal for anyone who's ever filled out a job or housing application and come to the question, "Have you ever been convicted..." Checking that box can have painful consequences that overshadow all the good behavior and positive actions that have followed the mistake you made. Not everyone is eligible, but you can learn more about the Expungement process AND OTHER ACTIONS YOU CAN TAKE at an upcoming meeting THIS SATURDAY February 25th, 11am at Seabrook Auditorium on the Fayetteville State University campus! February is Heart Month and Women's Heart Month! – dedicated to the health of one of our most vital organs. In recent years, Heart disease has surpassed cancer as the leading cause of death for both men and women.

Following an incident in an NFL Football game on January 2nd of this year, America saw one of the most dramatic examples of how someone who'd suffered cardiac arrest could be brought back to life within minutes through a combination of hands-only Cardio-Pulmonary Resuscitation (CPR) and a defibrillator - a device that sends an electric pulse or shock to the heart to restore a normal heartbeat.

After making a tackle, Buffalo Bills safety Damar Hamlin – seemingly in outstanding physical condition - dropped to the ground motionless. Fortunately, the Buffalo Bills medical team rushed to his aid and restarted his heart. It took more than 9 terror-filled minutes – but was ultimately successful.

Our first guest today's talkback, Benjamin Beeson, Patient Care Manager of Cape Fear Valley Hospital's Cardiac Services, will discuss with us the value of hands-only CPR and defibrillation — how we can be trained on both - easy and free — so that we may, at the time we are needed, save a life. He'll also tell us how important it is to know it....because nearly 90 percent of those who suffer a heart attack outside a hospital die, That's according to the American Heart Association.

But if you call 911 at the first moment after a cardiac event occurs – and apply hands-only CPR and a shock from an automated external defibrillator (AED) – the chances for survival increase greatly! Please listen. (Interview)

Dr. Gerald Newton, The City of Fayetteville's Development Services Director, Chief Planning & Development Officer has served our City, its residents and citizens, its elected leadership, an its management and would-be developers since October 2017. He has over 30 years of executive steward leadership of public and private multi-state, local government, and business experience leading teams and communities in transformative work, development, and growth including resolving complex real estate development and redevelopment, business, land use, and regulatory issues. He is married and has four children, a son-in-law, and three grandchildren.

As the Director of Development Services, his department is responsible for the city's planning, zoning, building inspection, permitting, and codes enforcement, all of which is done in conjunction with other departments, the city manager's office, and the city council. But BEFORE we can go on, this bit of background...

Since starting with the city in 2004, and with the exception of five years spent Manager of a city in Florida BEFORE returning to become Fayetteville's City Manager in 2016, City Manager Doug Hewitt has always placed a premium on recruitment of quality candidates for jobs in Fayetteville's City Government.

Because of Dr. Newton's rich and principled background, Dr. Newton was sought and recruited for application by City Manager Doug Hewitt.

We'll hear this interview with Dr. Newton in two parts, the first today and the second next Sunday.

Something I only learned after I had completed my original interview with DR. NEWTON is one of HIS daughters – in her interest in family history, had traced the lineage of their Newton name back to England's Sir Isaac. Sir Isaac Newton FRS (1642=1726)[was an

English <u>mathematician</u>, <u>physicist</u>, <u>astronomer</u>, <u>alchemist</u>, <u>theologian</u>, and author who was described in his time as a "<u>natural philosopher</u>". He was a key figure in the philosophical revolution known as the <u>Enlightenment</u>.

In his writings, Newton formulated the <u>laws of motion</u> and <u>universal gravitation</u> that formed the dominant scientific viewpoint for centuries until it was superseded by the <u>theory of relativity</u>. Newton used his mathematical description of <u>gravity</u> to derive the <u>laws of planetary motion</u>, account for <u>tides</u>, the <u>trajectories</u> of <u>comets</u>, the <u>precession of the equinoxes</u> and other phenomena. Just a few things like that!

And even though our conversation with DR. Newton leaves us with the feeling he will always rely on HIS OWN judgement, work, achievements and stewardship principles, it gives us a little perspective into conscience when DR. Newton says in the beginning of our chat that among the

forces with which he weighs his decisions include thoughts of wherein he's come. And now...our conversation....(Program and interview with details on city planning, inspections and zoning to keep housing and residents healthy safe.)

He's also kept hos watchful eye on those who would try to take water from the Cape Fear River (which feeds Fatyetteviille's water needs.

Conversation 3 – Jason Green – Water Treatment Facilities Manager – explained how keeping grease and slow-dissolving cloth and heavy paper and cardboard out of our sanitary waste water stream. He says so-called "Disposable Wipes" really aren't.

One area vitally important to conservation of resources at PWC is its vast customer base, not only household members in Fayetteville but wherever the Public Works Commission serves water customers. And helping customers manage their use is always job #1 for anyone working at PWC.
